Fruit and vegetable growers conference

University of Illinois Extension will host the 25th annual Stateline Fruit and Vegetable Growers Conference this February 2021. This conference attracts commercial vegetable and fruit growers from farms in Illinois and Wisconsin, all of whom sell to small and/or wholesale markets, in order to provide them with updated production-related information from Extension specialists at the University of Illinois.

This year, the conference will be delivered via the Zoom platform. Because of the breadth of content, the conference will be held over multiple dates. These webinars will be held live.

The core of the program, fruit and vegetables disease and insect updates from Drs. Mohammad Babadoost and Kacie Athey, extension specialists with University of Illinois Extension, will occur on the following dates:

**Thursday, Feb. 18
(Fruit Track) 1-3:30 p.m.**

- Apple Insect Pests and Their Control Options- Athey.

This presentation will cover the major and minor apple insect pest growers are likely to encounter in our region. The control measures discussed will include both conventional insecticide sprays as well as cultural and biological control options. The talk will be broken down into sections with time for questions and discussion throughout.

Observations in 2020 and recommendations for 2021 of •Apple and Cherry diseases- Babadoost.

**Thursday, Feb. 25
(Vegetable Track) 1-3:30 p.m.**

- Cucurbit insect pests, conventional and cultural control techniques-Athey.

This presentation will cover the major cucurbit insect pests and control options. This will include spray options and a discussion on insect exclusion techniques which may be of interest to conventional and organic growers alike. The talk will be broken down into sections with time for questions and discussion throughout.

- Outcomes of the recent research studies on Cucurbit and Tomato diseases- Babadoost.

To compliment these tracks, additional sessions have been scheduled on Fridays in February. These Zoom sessions will be held from noon to 1 p.m.

Friday, Feb. 12

- Diversifying Your Farm With Hard Cider Production, Carla Snyder, Penn State Extension.

Learn about market potential for the addition of hard cider to your existing farm or orchard operation. We'll delve into the styles, production techniques, financial benefits and reasons why hard cider is a growing trend across the nation. Carla Snyder, Penn State Extension, will share examples from new world cider makers in New Zealand and traditional artisans in the UK about how they adapt to new trends and how the growing U.S. market is changing.

Friday, Feb. 19

- Pumpkin Production: Variety Selection and Weed Management, Nathan Johanning, University of Illinois Extension.

Hear about current research on pumpkin variety performance in Illinois and successful weed management programs for pumpkins.

Friday, Feb. 26

- High Tunnel Tomato Production: Variety Performance and Basic Production Practices, Bronwyn Aly, University of Illinois Extension.

Learn about basic high tunnel tomato production practices and observations on different varieties being grown in research trials in southern Illinois.

"Each year, we have University of Illinois Extension specialists deliver research based information to give growers timely updates to better manage their crops for the upcoming season," states Grant McCarty, Local Foods and Small Farms educator for Jo Daviess, Stephenson and Winnebago counties. "We also cover topics that growers are interested

hearing more about like pumpkin varieties and high tunnel production." Sarah Farley, Local Foods and Small Farms educator for Lake and McHenry counties added, "We are thrilled to offer a live lineup of experts who can answer grower questions with evidence-based research and highlight market opportunities such as hard cider production. Offered virtually with no travel constraints, we hope to reach growers where they are and support their educational needs as we look forward the growing season."

The cost for the entire program (Thursday and Friday sessions) is \$20. Participants may also register just for Thursday sessions (\$10) or Friday sessions (\$15). Participants will receive access to the live presentations, handouts, and YouTube recordings of the sessions.

Grants help libraries add to collections

Secretary of State and State Librarian Jesse White has awarded \$752,835 in "Back to Books" grants to 187 Illinois libraries for fiction and nonfiction books.

"It is important that our libraries have access to a diverse collection of books available for knowledge and enjoyment," said White. "These grants are a great way for libraries to encourage reading and get more people to utilize their local library."

Libraries submitted applications specifying the types of books that were needed. Requests included:

- Building collections in women's studies and sociology.
- New materials in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).
- Cultural, geographical and travel books.
- Spanish-language fiction and nonfiction books and audiobooks.

- Large-print books for senior citizens on topics related to retirement such as health, hobbies, finances and technology.

- Biographies and books on local, state, national and world history.

- E-books to support remote learning.

- Award-winning books such as Caldecott and Illinois Reads titles.

- Do-it-yourself projects, hobbies and craftsmanship subjects.

Awards ranged from \$465 to \$4,900 per library and were made possible by federal Library Services and Technology Act funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

Among the grant recipients was Fox Lake School District 114 in Spring Grove, which received \$2,500.

Business grant deadline extended

McHenry County has extended the deadline for small businesses suffering financial hardship because of the COVID-19 pandemic to apply for the Immediate Business Relief Grant program.

Eligible businesses that serve the food service, accommodation, arts, entertainment, and recreation sectors now have until 10 a.m. Friday, Jan. 15, to apply for the \$15,000 grants, which can be used to reimburse expenses incurred by the business from March 1, 2020, to Dec. 30, 2020. Many grants are still available on a first come, first served basis until the extended deadline expires.

To be eligible, businesses must be located within McHenry County and must have been in business for at least two years as of Sept. 1, 2020. They must employ between two and 25 employees, and must be able to demonstrate at least \$25,000 in lost revenue for any six-month period between March and October. To date, the most common reasons

for ineligibility have been that the business was not in the above list of eligible industries, or because the business had already received a state Business Interruption Grant.

A complete list of eligibility requirements and restrictions can be found at bit.ly/38nBEuE - business owners are encouraged to read the list in full before applying. Eligible businesses must apply through an application portal called "Neighborly," and must first complete an applicant profile; they can do so by visiting portal.neighborlysoftware.com/mchenrycountyil/participant.

Awards can be expected to be made to selected businesses by the end of January. Business owners can email McHenryCountyComDev@mchenrycountyil.gov with questions.





Complaints lead to arrests on drug charges in Belvidere


On Friday Dec. 21, the Belvidere/Boone County Metro Narcotics Unit concluded a several month long investigation with the service of a search warrant in the 300 block of E. Jackson St. in Belvidere. The investigation began with complaints and information from area residents concerning vehicle and foot traffic at the residence.

During the execution of the search warrant, cocaine, four pounds of cannabis, and United States Currency was seized. Investigators arrested four individuals on various drug charges. All four subjects were transported to the Boone County Jail to await court appearances.


- Juan Aguilera (age 42) was charged with Unlawful Possession with Intent to Deliver a Controlled Substance - a Class X Felony.

- Jaedan Aguilera (age 18) was charged with Unlawful Possession of Cannabis - a Class 4 Felony.

The investigation is ongoing and

additional charges are possible.

A Class X Felony is punishable by 6-30 years in the Department of Corrections.

A Class 2 Felony is punishable by 3-7 years in the Department of Corrections.

A Class 3 Felony is punishable by 2-4 years in the Department of Corrections.

A Class 4 Felony is punishable by 1-3 years in the Department of Corrections.

The Belvidere/Boone County Metro Narcotics Unit encourages anyone having additional information regarding narcotic trafficking or other criminal activity to call the Belvidere/Boone County Metro Narcotics Unit at 815-544-2135 or Crimestoppers at 815-547-7867.

Members of the public are reminded that these are only charges and are not proof of the defendant's guilt. Every defendant is presumed innocent and is entitled to a fair trial in which it is the state's burden to prove his or her guilt beyond a reasonable doubt.

Boone County Health Department continues vaccinating Phase 1a

The following was released by Boone County Health Department:

Boone County is currently providing COVID-19 vaccines to local healthcare personnel and emergency response staff who have been prioritized as 1a by the Illinois Department of Public Health.

Priority Group 1a includes: clinicians, such as nurses and nursing assistants, physicians (M.D., N.P., P.A.), respiratory technicians, dentists and hygienists, pharmacists, plasma and blood donation staff, morticians, public health nurses, home health, school nurses, optometrists, COVID testing staff, dermatologists, dialysis staff, urgent care workers, corrections, nurses/aides, physical/occupational/speech therapists, vaccine clinic workers, emergency 14 medical services (EMS), including fire department staff acting as EMS and air medical transport (rotor and fixed wing).

We have been working hard to identify those [who] fall into this phase but are sure that there are some we have not reached. If you are part of 1a, and would like information on upcoming clinics, please call us at 815-547-8591 or email us at COVID19@boonehealth.org.

Long-term care facilities (LTCF) are also part of Phase 1a priority and Boone County LTCF are enrolled in a Federal Program, called the Pharmacy Partnership Program. This program is a direct partnership between LTCF and pharmacies.

While we wait to complete vaccination in this phase, we all can practice the basics of what we know works:

Stay Home. Refrain from any non-essential activities and stay at home as much as possible. If you must go out for essential activities, such as work, to attend school, get tested for COVID-19, get a flu shot, or to shop for groceries:

- Wear a mask consistently and correctly over your nose AND mouth.
- Avoid close contact with others

and maintain a distance of at least 6 feet from others who do not live with you.

- Wash hands often with soap and warm water.

Limit Gatherings. Refrain from attending or hosting gatherings with people who do not live in your household. This includes recommendations to postpone holiday gatherings or host virtual celebrations to limit the spread of COVID-19.

Limit Travel. As much as possible, do not engage in any non-essential travel, including vacations or trips to visit relatives or friends.

Boone County awarded federal funds for food, shelter programs

Boone County has been chosen to receive \$33,975 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs. The selection was made by a national board that is chaired by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency and consists of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA; The Jewish Federations of North America, The Salvation Army; and United Way Worldwide.

A local board, made up of the American Red Cross, Boone County Council on Aging, Catholic Charities, Boone County Government, the Salvation Army, United Jewish Communities, Belvidere Ministerial Association, RAMP and United Way of Boone County, will determine how the funds awarded to Boone Co. are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service organizations in the area. The local board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds made available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the national board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) be eligible to receive federal funds, 3) have an accounting system, 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, and 6) if they are a private voluntary organization, have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

Boone County has distributed emergency food and shelter funds previously with the Salvation Army, Empower Boone, and the Baby Bank. These agencies were responsible for providing approximately 5,000 meals, 44 nights of emergency lodging, rent, or mortgage assistance to 28 low-income households and distribution of diapers to families in need.

Public or private voluntary agencies interested in applying for Emergency Food and Shelter Program funds must contact United Way of Boone County at 815-544-3144 for an application. The deadline for applications to be received is Jan. 27.

Landowners need to know timber's worth before selling

There comes a time when every forest landowner gets a knock on their door. Someone wants to buy their timber on a handshake deal.

"I get calls from landowners looking for information on the harvesting process and rates," says Duane Friend, University of Illinois Extension Energy and Environmental Stewardship Educator. "But by that time harvesting has already started and it's too late to help."

A landowner may only sell timber once or twice in their lifetime. Knowing in advance what the timber is worth and what should and should not be harvested puts the landowner in a much better position.

Extension Forestry specialist Chris Evans says a lot of Illinois timber is sold for a fraction of its true value.

"I usually recommend landowners reach out to a professional forester to work with," Evans says. "There is a lot of thought and planning that should go into a harvest, especially in terms of the larger, long-term sustainable management of that forest."

A consultant forester acts on the landowner's behalf and facilitates all the steps of a timber harvest. After the timber is sold, a portion of the proceeds go to the forester.

As part of the process, the forester will survey the land and determine if the timing is right.

"Not all woods are ready to cut and the timing of a timber harvest can influence the income the landowner

receives and the turnaround time for the next harvest," Evans says.

The consultant will also ensure the harvest is done in a healthy manner as part of a larger, sustainable management plan and they will market the timber to multiple buyers to maximize profit.

BCCD volunteers collect 250 pounds of seeds in 2020



Boone County Conservation District staff member, Aarron Minson, worked with 35 volunteers to collect 250 pounds of seed from 25 native plant species. This volunteer seed harvest represents a market value of \$32,000 to the Conservation District. This seed will be used to restore native habitat.

Volunteer support is a critical component to carrying out the mission of the BCCD. With two full-time staff members in the Natural Resources Management Department, we would not be able to collect this much seed without the help of the dedicated volunteers. This seed will be used to restore over 80 acres of native habitat in Boone County.

Despite the pandemic, volunteers were able to give over 800 socially distanced hours of service in 2020 towards maintaining native habitat. Seed collecting consists of harvesting seed heads from native plants, sorting seed, and cleaning the seed. BCCD provides all equipment and training needed to make this mission possible.

A few of the seeds that were collected:

- 34,400,000 seeds of *Blephilia ciliata*, common name is Downy Wood Mint
- 915,000 seeds of *Echinacea pallida*, common name is Pale Purple Coneflower, and
- 187,000,000 seeds of *Penthorum sedoides*, common name is Ditch Stonecrop

Reminder that driver services facilities reopen

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White is reminding the public that Driver Services facilities statewide have reopened. Facemasks are required, and social distancing and other safety measures will remain in place. White is reminding the public that driver's licenses and ID card expiration dates have been extended until June 1, 2021. As a result, people do not need to rush to visit a facility, especially during winter

weather conditions.

Additionally, White stressed that many transactions can be conducted online at www.cyberdriveillinois.com instead of waiting at a Driver Services facility. Some of these services include:

- Renewing a license plate sticker;
- Renewing a valid driver's license for qualifying drivers;
- Renewing a valid ID card for those aged 22-64 (seniors 65 and

older have free, non-expiring IDs);

- Obtaining a driver record abstract;
- Filing Business Services documents, such as incorporations and annual reports; and
- Customers with issues involving administrative hearings may contact adminhearings@ilsos.gov.

In an effort to reduce facility visits for in-person service, White has expanded online renewals for driv-

er's licenses and ID cards. Not everyone qualifies, particularly those who are required to pass a written or road test. For qualifying drivers, individuals will receive a letter with a unique PIN approximately 90 days before the expiration date. The PIN is required to renew online. For more information on determining one's eligibility for online renewal, visit www.cyberdriveillinois.com and click on "Read more on how to renew your driver's license or ID card online" near the top of the main page.

More than 34,000 customers have already taken advantage of the expanded driver's license and ID card online renewal program, which results in fewer customers waiting in person at Driver Services facilities.

"Throughout this pandemic, my commitment has been to do everything we can to help protect the health and safety of our residents and my employees, while providing services to the people of Illinois," said White. "This remains our goal and

guides our decision making."

To ensure the public's health and safety, customers visiting Driver Services facilities, along with Secretary of State employees, will be required to wear facemasks. Plexiglas dividers have been installed at all workstations and tape has been applied to the floor in six-foot intervals to follow social distancing guidelines, which limits the number of customers inside a facility. As a result, customers should come prepared to wait outside in cold weather because of the limited number of people allowed in a facility at one time.

For drive tests, employees will wear facemasks and face shields due to the close proximity with the customer inside the vehicle. Customers will be required to wear facemasks. Disposable plastic will be used to cover the vehicle seats during the drive test and then discarded immediately after the conclusion of the drive test.

emergencies. Participants with complete the course will receive a two-year certificate.

Farm Bureau members and family members (12 years and up) are eligible for the class. (Children, ages 12 to 17 years old, must be accompanied by an adult.) Cost is \$50 per person (\$50 Savings). Information on how to access the online course (approximately two hours) will be emailed to participants once registration is received. Registration deadline is Feb. 12.

Participants will need to bring proof of completion of the online course to the classroom portion on Saturday, Feb. 27 to participate. Classroom size is limited to 10 people per hour (minimum of eight people required). The first class will begin at 9 a.m. on Feb. 27. Additional classes will follow as needed.

The project is made possible in part by funding from the Farm Safety Grant provided by the Illinois Farm Bureau and COUNTRY Financial. Contact the Winnebago-Boone Farm Bureau office at 815-962-0653 if you have any questions.
