A number of years ago a local newspaper featured a photo of a barn shadowed in the light of the setting sun. The caption read: "Nothing is more beautiful than seeing the sunset behind a McHenry County barn." The thought that such a scene in this once prominent Illinois dairy farming county may soon end up as nothing more than memories gave rise to McHenry County Historical Society's Quilted Barn program in 2000.

The project combines the tradition and beauty of quilt designing with the durability of American barns and their adaptability as showcases for public art. Participants select a quilt pattern and paint it onto a 4-foot-square sheet of five-eighths- or three-quarterinch plywood. It then is attached to a barn in a place that is easily visible from the road. Owners can paint it themselves, recruit interested students or work through the Society to find professional help. ## Kenneally denounces **House Bill 163**

Patrick D. Kenneally, McHenry County State's Attorney, announced that the Illinois State's Attorney's Association (ILSAAP) has come out in strong opposition to House Bill 163. Every elected state's attorney in Illinois, with the notable exception of Kim Foxx, joined in calling for this last minute bill that a small group of legislators is seeking to ram through "lame duck" session to fail.

Said Patrick Kenneally: explained by ILSAAP, this bill is wrong, disastrous, and dangerous on so many levels. Without hyperbole and if passed in its current form, this bill will all but mandate the immediate pretrial release of drug-dealers, sex offenders and drunk drivers irrespective of their likelihood of reoffending, the danger they pose generally to the public, or their willingness to comply with conditions of

their release. "The timing of House Bill 163, coming on the heels of Chicago's

murder rate nearly doubling in 2020 and violent crime having increased throughout the state, is bewildering. It is no wonder that this bill's legislative advocates are trying to push this sprawling

and destructive bill through at the "11th hour" and with only three days to consider.

"House Bill 163 could never withstand open consideration and is profoundly out of step with the expectations that victims and the average Illinoisan have for their justice system. Criminal justice reform is something we should all work on together. It is not something that should be dictated to the entire State by a few narrowly interested politicians in Chicago."

I'm so glad we did.

As I scrolled through, there were lots of photos of fun family times, at home and at the lake. There were lake

views, holiday pics, and restaurant photos, you know, the usual.

I knew he loved taking photos of us and over time I learned to smile patiently whenever we went to a restaurant and he made a big to-do about getting up and taking my picture. In one of my favorites, I'm sitting at a table with a mirrored wall behind me so the photo features not only me, but his mirrored image holding the camera.

Of course he took photos of our granddaughter. In one video, he and I were at the fleet supply store; it must have been in the spring because they had baby chicks and ducks. The video starts out with my face, full frame. He narrates. "Here I am with Grammy at the store and we found some baby chicks." Then he pans to the metal bins holding the tiny birds. As he videoed, he encouraged our granddaughter to ask her mommy for a pet ducky.

It was all fun, of course. We had a lot of fun. I miss that. I miss that a lot. We were so darn cute together.

## Staying safe this winter

Old man winter is finally here. I can tell the temperature has dropped and the wind has picked up as I work at my desk. Sitting along a west wall, between two windows, I have noticed the recent changes. It is the season of extra layers, space heaters, and extra blankets (I have one here at the office for those really cold days.) At home, a wood fire helps fight off the cold.

The cold tends to keep us inside. but as you travel this winter:

-Make sure your car is in good operating condition before using it in extreme cold.

-Keep condensation (water) out of our gas tank by keeping the tank as full as possible.

-Maintain a storm kit in your car with such items as a cell phone and charger; blankets; extra clothing; jumper cables; a flashlight; extra oatteries: high-calorie, not perishable food; and matches or a

-Plan your trip carefully. If cold, snowy, or icy conditions exceed your ability or your car's ability, don't travel. If you must travel be

-Tell someone about your travel

-Never leave the motor running in a vehicle parked in an enclosed

or partially enclosed space, such as a garage.

Be prepared for extreme cold. snow and ice. For more information and copies of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) and National Weather Service (NWS)'s Winter Weather Preparedness Guide and winter weather road conditions. visit https://www2.illinois.gov/ ready/. This winter remember "Safety first"!





## New Democratic speaker Welch unseats Madigan

CAPITOL NEWS ILLINOIS

One of the most transformative six-day periods in the history of Illinois government came to an end Jan. 13 with the election of Rep. Emanuel "Chris" Welch, D-Hillside, as the state's House speaker—the first black man to hold the title.

Equally groundbreaking was the fact that Welch unseated Rep. Michael Madigan, D-Chicago, the nation's longest-serving legislative leader who had been speaker for all but two years

Welch sought a unifying tone in his first floor speech as speaker, telling his fellow lawmakers "today will be the last time I talk about us as Democrats or Republicans."

"We will need to work together to make difficult decisions, folks," he said, receiving applause from Republicans. "Let's get ready. Because we are going to have to make some difficult decisions to control spending while we protect our most vulnerable residents and while we ensure schools receive the funding that they need."

After the floor speech, Welch said during a news conference he had not had time to digest the historic events that led to his speakership. The House adjourned its Jan. 12 session at 4:14 a.m. the following morning and reconvened to pass a massive criminal justice reform bill and certify Welch as speaker just hours later.

#### Welch urged to run by House Black Caucus

The 22 members of the House Black Caucus urged him to run for speaker in a closed-door caucus, Welch said, and he had no plans to do so before their

All but one of those members had supported Madigan on the first closeddoor ballot between Democrats over the weekend. In the end, they provided the backbone for Welch's late push after Madigan suspended his campaign and Welch built a broader support coalition than three other challengers—Reps. Ann Williams, D-Chicago, Stephanie Kifowit, D-Oswego, and Kathleen Willis, D-Addison.

'We are walking in uncharted territories, with COVID-19 still running rampant through our communities, a major budget crisis, a (legislative) remap, all while immediately following the huge footsteps and monumental legacy of Speaker Madigan," West said, later calling for a standing ovation for Madigan. "But I firmly believe that Welch did not choose this moment. This moment chose Welch because he has the wherewithal to convene the great minds within this caucus, so that we could tackle these issues together.'

But Welch's election did not receive the backing of every Democratic member in the House. Rep. Kelly Cassidy, D-Chicago, and Lance Yednock, D-Ottawa, voted present.

#### Welch addresses allegations

Cassidy later issued a statement saying diversification of leadership in Illinois should be celebrated, but she called for a "vigorous review" into allegations against Welch that were outlined in a Chicago Tribune article in the waning hours of his run for

The Tribune cited a 2002 police report from west suburban Hillside that accused Welch of slamming an ex-girlfriend's head into a kitchen countertop numerous times after she called him "a loser." The Tribune said the woman elected not to press charges after talking it over with Welch's relative, according to the report.

Welch denied the allegations at the time, according to the Tribune report. He also issued a statement last week when confronted with the past allega-

"This verbal argument occurred nearly two decades ago," he said in the statement. "I will be honest that I have reconciled with the individual since that night. In fact, after our dispute we sought out the authorities ourselves. Their family lives in my district and are proud supporters of my public service and work.'

"He has denied each allegation, and we certainly have seen plenty of examples of black men being wrongfully accused," she said. "I feel strongly that I have been too outspoken on issues of sexual harassment and domestic violence to simply ignore these ques-

Asked about the allegations in a news conference after his election, Welch said he did not see a need to go beyond the statement and he respected the privacy of the individuals involved.

'And I think my life's work here in the legislature shows my respect for women," he said.

As Cassidy referenced, Madigan's decades-long vice grip on power as House speaker and Democratic Party of Illinois chairman was weakened in 2018 amid a sexual harassment scandal that led to the firing of several top aides from his administration, including his longtime chief of staff.

Madigan was further weakened last year when he was named in a court document by utility giant Commonwealth Edison. The company admitted to a yearslong bribery scheme aimed at influencing Madigan by providing jobs to his associates.

#### Working with Durkin

Welch and Minority Leader Jim Durkin, R-Western Springs, both made statements Jan. 13 that they were willing to reach across the aisle, and they noted they live about five miles from one another.

But rifts in their relationship scratched the surface Jan. 13 in their floor remarks and in news conferences following the vote.

Durkin, prior to Welch's election, accused Welch of being an extension of Madigan, and he has been critical of Welch's handling of a House Special Investigating Committee into Madigan's ComEd ties. Welch chaired the committee, not requiring Madigan to testify and voting to end it after only three hearings in four months.

Durkin repeated again Jan. 13 that Welch, as chairman, "did a disservice to the body" and called the process "an embarrassment."

While Welch thanked Madigan, Durkin, who is now the longest-serving legislative leader in Illinois having served in the post since 2013, said he did not "have anything positive to say" about Madigan, calling government institutions "better off" with him out of leadership.

Welch was more laudatory, although he later alluded to potential changes to the committee process and leadership from the previous practices of Madigan's administration.

"While our state has many problems, our schools are better, more children have access to health care, and our working-class families can more easily live the American dream thanks to the strong leadership of Speaker Madigan," he said.

The new speaker and minority leader will also have to get past their disagreements with how the process played out over the previous six days in the General Assembly—Democrats frequently cut off floor debate in an effort to pass a sweeping Black Caucus agenda and other major reforms before the clock ran out and new lawmakers

"Speaker Madigan ran through a number of bills that were not well thought out," Durkin said. "Despite

the statements on the floor that these issues have been around for a long time, every one of these major bills that were passed have a cost tag to them, ... and many of them were dropped on us last night without any negotiation."

Both suggested they are willing to move forward more collaboratively.

"I'm hopeful that he will see by my actions that today is a new day, a new opportunity to develop a new relationship in this space and we'll go from there," Welch said of his relationship with Durkin.

## Elizabeth Harvey-Superintendent of County Schools

With Belvidere schools returning to limited in-person learning, this month's Rad Women of Belvidere article focuses on the second female superintendent of county schools, Elizabeth Harvey. The earliest schools in Boone County were located in country homes or oneroom schoolhouses. The first school in Belvidere was built in 1837 on the corner of N. State and Lincoln, followed by the Newton Academy constructed in 1838 on the southeast corner of the courthouse square.

These town schools were subscription schools where students had to pay tuition. The public school system with free education did not develop until 1842, when property became taxable. In those days, age was no limit and students from six to 27 attended the several schools that sprung up in town including the Baptist school on the corner of Van Buren and Hurlbut.

These schools, however, were rather lax about the knowledge required of teachers. Although laws specified that teachers be examined in several subjects, most rural areas found this requirement too strict and amended the law to specify examinations for teachers in just one subject. As the number of Belvidere schools grew and more public schools were built, the need for someone to oversee them became evident and the office of County Superintendent of Schools was established in 1845. The first person to hold that office was W.H. Dunham, followed by Julia Eaton Clark, both appointed by the school trustee board.

Elizabeth, however, became the second female superintendent when she ran a successful, grassroots campaign against L.R. Fitzer in 1910. A popular county and city

all areas of the county, recalling her horse-and-buggy travels with a rousing tale of her skirts getting caught and ripped away in the large wheels of the buggy, leaving her standing in her petticoats. She won by a majority vote of 1885 to 1061.

This determined woman with a sense of humor was born in Winnebago County in the Argyle community on March 3, 1874, the second daughter of Scotsman Robert Harvey and his wife Janett. With the addition of three more children (two sons and another daughter), the family moved to Belvidere when Elizabeth was three for better work opportunities. She grew up in the family home at 1025 Pearl St., attended Belvidere schools, graduated from Belvidere High in 1891 and went on to receive her teaching degree from Drake University in 1894. Elizabeth began teaching in the rural schools after graduation, landing her first city teaching job in 1897. She specialized in mathematics, and served as the head of the Belvidere Mathematics Dept. at the high school from 1900

After winning the superintendent election in 1910, Elizabeth became heavily involved with the farming community and rural students. She helped organize Boone County's Farmer's Institute in 1914 and personally sponsored two-week agricultural scholarships at Urbana State University for rural students. She absolutely insisted that the school year start the first week of Sept., after the county fair, so that all county and rural children would have the opportunity to attend and participate in the fair. Although her teacher, Elizabeth visited voters in early teaching and campaigning

> days were conducted by horse-andbuggy, Elizabeth bought her first car in 1910 and became an accomplished driver. She was not afraid to motor through the county in muddy or snowy weather and was known to travel to outlying rural areas to administer exams to students unable to make it to town.

Elizabeth Harvey was also devoted to all city students and the teachers who worked in the school system. She personally handed out diplomas to all elementary, junior high graduates, and senior high graduates. Elizabeth organized and oversaw the first local Teacher's Institute in 1916, with annual meetings and the first roster of all the teachers in the county including the Meehan sisters. She brought in educators from all areas of the country to speak on the latest in teaching methods and gave many speeches about the importance of proper school equipment and supplies at the annual Northern Illinois Teacher's Conventions. In addition, Elizabeth was on the front lines of the school system during the Spanish flu pandemic, assisting in closings and openings, while making sure everyone in the school system remained

Elizabeth served as the County Superintendent until 1923, when the position was given to high school Principal Ralph E. Garrett. Their contracts detailed, though, that Elizabeth would remain as associate superintendent with specific charge of the grade schools while Ralph would have charge of the high schools and administrative duties. This unusual arrangement continued until Elizabeth's retirement in 1940.

Elizabeth did not marry or have children of her own, preferring to devote her working time to Boone County students and her free time to the First Presbyterian Church, the Belvidere Women's Club, the Ladies Aid Society, and the Belvidere Chamber of Commerce Welfare Association where she served as the head of the funding/audit committee. She also served as the secretary and later First Vice President for the State Teacher's Association. It's hard to imagine this whirlwind woman having any free time, but she loved to travel and would spend her summers in Ireland, Great Britain, Scotland, France, Canada, Alaska, and Roscoe, Ill. where she owned a small summer cottage. This dynamite woman, who contributed so much to our local education system, passed away in 1954 at the age of 80 and is buried in the Harvey family plot in Belvidere Cemetery. Although she never heard of remote learning, Elizabeth Harvey would be proud of how our entire school system (teachers, support staff, students, and parents) stepped up to make education a top priority despite trying circumstances.
