## Enjoy nature or get a workout at bird sanctuary

*Valley of Eden offers trails, sledding, bird-watching opportunities*

Visiting the Valley of Eden bird sanctuary just outside Stockton provides outdoor enthusiasts with a wonderful place to experience the magic of nature year-round. The sanctuary offers many ways for visitors to relax and enjoy the outdoors. "This is a very special place," said Steve Barg, executive director of the Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation.

Nature lovers have more to enjoy at the Valley of Eden than just rare birds. Family sledding is now available at the sanctuary as well as several miles of groomed cross-country ski trails that are suitable for both skate skiing and traditional diagonal stride track skiing. Winter sports enthusiasts also enjoy snowshoeing around the sanctuary.

"The gentle slopes allow for a

good workout whether skiing, snowshoeing or hiking," Barg said.

Bird watching varies from season to season, Barg said. In the winter, visitors might see short-eared owls. These are endangered in Illinois and are found primarily in grasslands and marshlands instead of in forests. They hunt during the daytime and fly very low over the ground. Snowy owls are also fairly common at the sanctuary.

Throughout the other seasons, visitors buy valid Illinois fishing licenses to go fishing in Rush Creek. Hiking on the sanctuary's 10 miles of trails is also a very popular outdoor activity.

"The stunning beauty of the preserve is the main attraction for visitors and keeps them coming back,"

## Pandemic, social unrest, statehouse scandals top the stories of 2020

It was a year like no other, and one most Americans would just as soon forget, but 2020 is sure to last in the history books as one of the most tumultuous in modern history.

It was a year when face masks and hand sanitizer became ubiquitous items of everyday life and when major sporting events that many Americans use to mark the passage of time were canceled or delayed.

It was also a year marked by racial and social unrest following the killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor and other Black Americans at the hands of police. And it was a year of economic catastrophe that brought about some of the highest unemployment rates the nation has seen.

For Illinois, the year seemed to begin on a hopeful note. The state was running a budget surplus for the first time in many years. By February, unemployment had fallen to an all-time low.

But things were about to change amid a backdrop of pandemic and government corruption scandals that rocked the foundation of power of the nation's longest-serving state legislative leader.

### COVID-19 pandemic

On Jan. 24, a Chicago woman who had just returned home from Wuhan, China, where the COVID-19 pandemic originated, tested positive for the disease. A few days later, her husband tested positive as well, marking the first known instance of person-to-person spread in the U.S.

On March 9, Gov. JB Pritzker declared a statewide disaster and quickly began invoking his emergency powers with a series of executive orders including closure of K-12 schools to in-person learning and a statewide stay-at-home order that

brought much of the state's economy to a grinding halt.


By year's end, COVID-19 had claimed the lives of more than 16,000 Illinoisans as the rapid distribution of a pair of vaccines marked new hope that the "beginning of the end" of the pandemic was near.

### Madigan scandal

After more than three decades as one of the most powerful men in the state, Illinois House Speaker Michael Madigan faced an uncertain political future as 2020 neared its end.

His future as speaker and Democratic Party of Illinois chairman was first put in doubt on July 17 when

# FROM LENA'S KITCHEN



The not so skinny cook

I hope you all had a good New Year's celebration. It was probably quiet and low key. I felt that I wanted 2020 to be over. I am not sure what 2021 will bring, but we are tough people and will keep going.

We did get our first big snow of the season. The TV station kept saying that Freeport got 8 inches; everyone in Lena and west of here thought it was more like 10 or 11. No matter how much it was, there was a lot and it was hard to move. One of the big problems in my neighborhood is where to put it. Perhaps this one is the last snow of the season.

This week's column features some great belly-warming soups, a crisp winter salad and some good sweets.

## Perfect Winter Salad

This salad is a great winter favorite. The crisp apples, onions, cranberries and nuts provide the crunch to an ordinary lettuce salad. The dressing is also interesting with the maple syrup.

**Ingredients:**  
 ¼ C. mayonnaise  
 ¼ C. maple syrup  
 3 T. white wine vinegar  
 2 T. finely chopped green onions  
 2 t. sugar  
 ½ C. canola oil  
 2 pkgs. spring mix salad greens  
 2 medium tart apples, thinly sliced  
 1 C. dried cranberries  
 1 C. pecan halves  
 ¼ C. thinly sliced red onion  
 In a small bowl, mix first five ingredients; gradually whisk in oil until blended. Refrigerate, covered, until serving (at least one hour). To serve, place remaining ingredients in a large bowl; toss with dressing.

## Chicken Potpie Chowder

This chowder is hearty and warm for a cold winter night. It has everything you need for a dinner — meat, potatoes and vegetables. The cream cheese makes it extra creamy as it melts its way into the sauce. Enjoy this warm winter treat.

**Ingredients:**  
 ½ C. dry white wine or chicken broth  
 4 chicken bouillon cubes  
 12 oz. boneless and skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch pieces  
 2 medium red potatoes, cut into ½ inch pieces  
 2 cloves of garlic, finely chopped  
 1 medium onion, chopped  
 ¾ t. dried thyme  
 Salt and pepper to taste  
 ½ C. half-and-half  
 2 T. cornstarch  
 4 oz. cream cheese, cut into small pieces  
 1½ C. frozen peas and carrots, thawed  
 1 C. frozen corn, thawed

Chopped bacon and parsley for garnish

In a 5- to 6-quart slow cooker, whisk together wine, bouillon and 4 C. water. Add chicken, potatoes, garlic, onion, thyme, ¼ t. salt and ½ t. pepper and toss to combine. Cook, covered, until chicken is cooked through and potatoes are tender, three to four hours on high or five to six hours on low.

In a bowl, whisk together half-and-half and cornstarch. Stir into chowder along with cream cheese, peas and carrots and corn. Turn slow cooker to high and cook until vegetables are heated through and chowder thickens slightly, five minutes. Serve topped with crispy bacon and parsley.

## Hearty Southern Vegetable Soup

If you are wanting a meal without meat, this vegetable soup will do the trick. If you aren't into vegetable broth, (it is really easy to find in most grocery stores) you could use beef broth (vegetarians will not like you!). Serve with a salad and bread, and you once again have a complete dinner meal.

**Ingredients:**  
 1 T. canola oil  
 2 C. chopped red onion  
 ¼ C. minced garlic  
 3 T. tomato paste  
 1 can (28 oz.) diced tomatoes  
 3 C. vegetable broth  
 2 C. 1/2 inch cubed red potatoes  
 4 C. frozen mixed vegetables  
 1 T. honey  
 2 t. chopped fresh thyme or ¾ t. dried thyme  
 1½ t. salt  
 1¼ t. pepper

In a large soup pot or Dutch oven, heat oil over medium heat. Add onion and garlic; cook, stirring frequently, until vegetables are softened, four to five minutes. Add tomato paste; cook, stirring constantly, for two minutes. Add tomatoes, broth and potatoes; bring to a boil. Reduce heat to medium-low; cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, until potatoes are just tender, 10 to 12 minutes. Stir in honey, thyme, salt and pepper. Serve with crackers or crusty bread.

## Broccoli and Crab Bisque

A church friend has this crab bisque soup that is both creamy and

delicious. Use half-and-half for the cream or substitute with evaporated milk. (The evaporated milk makes it less rich and less calories but not as good.) You also can substitute shrimp for crab if you want. Be sure you clean and de-vein the shrimp (remove tails too); I don't think cooked shrimp would be as good because it can get rubbery. Serve with a salad and crusty bread. It is delicious.

**Ingredients:**  
 1 C. onions, sliced  
 1 C. fresh mushrooms, sliced  
 1 C. chopped broccoli, fresh or frozen  
 1 garlic clove, minced  
 ¼ C. butter, melted  
 ¼ C. flour  
 ¼ t. dried thyme  
 Pepper to taste  
 1 bay leaf  
 3 C. chicken broth  
 1 C. cream  
 ¾ C. shredded Swiss cheese  
 1 pkg. (6 oz.) frozen crab meat, thawed and drained

In 3-quart heavy pot with a tablespoon of canola oil, combine onions, mushrooms, broccoli and garlic; cook until tender, about three to four minutes. In a bowl, blend melted butter with flour; add thyme, pepper and bay leaf; add to mushroom and onion mixture. Add chicken broth and cream. Whisk until thickened and bubbly. Remove bay leaf. Add cheese and stir until cheese is melted. Add crab meat and heat through.

## Lacy Oatmeal Cookies

These cookies are light and airy; the ingredients are few, but the taste is great. Many people don't like oatmeal cookies because people put in chocolate or white chips, cranberries or nuts. These are just plain oatmeal cookies. Enjoy them with a cup of coffee or tea or a cold glass of milk; cocoa works well also.

**Ingredients:**  
 1 C. quick-cooking oats  
 ¼ C. flour  
 1½ t. baking powder  
 ½ t. salt  
 1 C. sugar  
 ½ C. butter, softened  
 1 egg  
 1 t. vanilla

Stir together oats, flour, baking powder and salt in a bowl. In a mixing bowl, beat together sugar and butter and mix on high speed until fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Mix in oat mixture just until combined.

Cover and chill one hour. Position the rack in center of oven and preheat to 325. Line two large baking sheets with parchment paper.

Using a leveled measuring teaspoon, portion and shape dough into about 48 (1 t.) balls; arrange 3 inches apart on prepared baking sheets. Bake one pan at a time until edges are golden and centers are just starting to set, about 16 minutes. Cool completely on pans. Remove carefully with a spatula. Cookies can be stored in an airtight container for three days or frozen up to three months.

## Chewy Brownie Cookies

If you have a yearning for chocolate cookies, this recipe has cocoa and chocolate chips in it. The brown sugar gives it a slight molasses flavor. They are good ones to dunk too. My mother was a lover of Crisco shortening for cookies. She would have loved this recipe.

**Ingredients:**  
 2/3 C. shortening  
 1½ C. packed brown sugar  
 1 T. water  
 1 t. vanilla  
 2 eggs  
 1½ C. flour  
 1/3 C. baking cocoa  
 ½ t. salt  
 ¼ t. baking soda  
 2 C. semisweet chocolate chips  
 1/3 C. chopped pecans

In a large mixing bowl, cream shortening, sugar, water and vanilla.

Beat in the eggs. In a separate bowl, combine flour, cocoa, salt and baking soda; gradually add to creamed mixture and beat just until blended. Stir in chocolate chips and nuts. Drop by rounded teaspoonsfuls 2 inches apart onto an ungreased baking sheet. Bake at 375 for seven to nine minutes; do not over bake. Cool two minutes before removing to wire racks.

## Final thoughts

# State COVID numbers stabilize slightly

## More than 125,000 vaccines given

As Illinois' COVID-19 hospitalization and case numbers have stabilized since the second-wave highs last month, the governor's office announced 126,211 vaccinations were administered throughout the state, including Chicago, as of last week.

The state has delivered 108,225 vaccine doses of Pfizer and 161,400 doses of Moderna to hospitals throughout the state, not including Chicago, according to Gov. JB Pritzker's spokesperson.

On Dec. 30, the Illinois Department of Public Health reported 7,374 new confirmed and probable cases of COVID-19 in Illinois, and 178 additional deaths caused by the virus.

The state's death toll has reached 16,357 among 955,380 cases and more than 13 million test results reported since the beginning of the pandemic.

As of early last week, 4,244 in Illinois were hospitalized with COVID-19, a slight decrease, leaving roughly 28 percent of hospital beds available statewide.

Of those, 882 COVID-19 patients were in the ICU, a decrease of 22, and 496 patients with COVID-19 were on ventilators, a decrease of 10 from the day prior. That left about 22 percent of ICU beds available statewide, and about 72 percent of ventilators available statewide.

The preliminary seven-day statewide case positivity rate from Dec. 23 to Dec. 29 was 7.6 percent, which is two-tenths of a percentage point higher than the seven-day average case positivity rate reported Dec. 29.



## Solar tax credit gets extension

The government spending and COVID-19 relief bill signed recently by President Trump includes an extension on a federal tax credit for solar installations.

The Dec. 27 measure includes a 26% federal investment tax credit for residential solar installations, according to a news release from Stateline Solar in Lena. Previously, the tax credit was scheduled to drop to 22% on Jan. 1 and then drop to 0% in 2022.

"This clean energy package included in the omnibus bill is being broadly praised by the renewable energy industry," the release said. "Since

coming into law initially in 2006, the ITC is credited for growing the U.S. solar industry by more than 10,000 percent."

In the last 10 years, the average annual growth of solar energy has increased more than 50%.

## Veterans home resident tests positive for Legionnaires' disease

### State health officials investigate

A resident at the state-run veterans home in Quincy has tested positive for both COVID-19 and Legionnaires' disease, according to a news release from the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs.

The Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs and the Illinois Department of Public Health announced the agencies are investigating the case of Legionnaires' disease in a single resident, who tested positive for COVID-19 on Nov. 30 and showed pneumonia symptoms on Dec. 16, according to the news release.

The Illinois Veterans Home at Quincy was notified on Dec. 22 of the resident's positive test for Legionnaires' disease, which is a severe pneumonia caused by the inhalation of waterborne bacteria.

No other residents have tested positive for Legionnaires' disease, according to an IDVA spokesperson.

The positive resident lives in Hammond Hall, which had not previously reported the presence of Legionella, the type of bacteria that causes Legionnaires' disease. Hammond Hall

is one of six residential halls at the Quincy facility in Adams County.

After the positive Legionnaire's test was reported on Dec. 22, Quincy facility staff and officials with the Adams County Health Department spoke by phone with representatives from the Illinois Department of Public Health, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and Dr. Avery Hart, who is a medical consultant for the IDVA homes on behalf of IDPH, according to the news release.

"On the call, the CDC asked for clean-out and flushing logs which are part of the water management plan for the facility. All actions by the Illinois Veterans' Home in Quincy are consistent with the water management plan following CDC protocols," according to the IDVA news release. "IDPH infectious disease staff are working with the facility to collect information and further investigate the resident's illness."

On Dec. 28, an IDVA spokesperson said the resident who tested positive for Legionnaires' disease and COVID-19 is responding well to treatment.

The last legionella test at Hammond Hall was conducted Oct. 27 and was negative, according to the

IDVA release.

The last case of Legionnaires' disease was reported at the Quincy facility on Dec. 21, 2019, in Fifer Hall, according to the release. An outbreak of Legionnaires' disease between 2015 and 2018 killed 13 residents at Quincy.

The single incident of Legionnaires' disease at the Quincy home comes as the facility also faces an outbreak of COVID-19.

As of Dec. 26, the Quincy facility has reported five resident deaths related to COVID-19, 123 total positive cases among residents and 143 total positive cases among employees since the pandemic began.

The state-run veterans homes at Manteno and LaSalle have also reported COVID-19 outbreaks, prompting Gov. JB Pritzker to send members of the Illinois National Guard to assist staff with administrative tasks at all three veterans homes experiencing outbreaks.

As of Dec. 26, the Manteno facility has reported a total of 19 resident coronavirus-related deaths. Since the outbreak began, Manteno has reported 69 positive cases among residents and 69 positive cases among employees.

# Three new laws take effect

## Minimum wage bumps to \$11

When a new year begins in Illinois, there typically are dozens if not hundreds of new laws going into effect.

Not this year. Like so many other things in 2020, the legislative spring session was stunted by COVID-19. Once the global pandemic reached Illinois in March, the General Assembly would meet for only four more days — wrapping up the odd session during masked and socially distanced gatherings at the Capitol and Bank of Springfield Center. The fall veto session was scrapped altogether.

As a result, only three new laws took effect on Jan. 1. Here's a look at them, as well as the next increase in the minimum wage:

**Insulin costs cap**

Senate Bill 667 (Public Act 101-0625) amends the Illinois Insurance Code to cap out-of-pocket insulin costs at \$100 per month for all patients using a state-regulated insurance plan, regardless of the amount of insulin or type of covered prescription insulin drug used to fill the insured patient's prescription.

Roughly 1.3 million adults in Illinois, or 12.5 percent of the population, have diabetes, according to the legislation.

SB 667 also provides that the Illinois Department of Insurance, along with the Department of Human Services and the Department of Healthcare and Family Services, must create a public insulin pricing report that includes a summary of insulin pricing practices and public

policy recommendations to control and prevent the overpricing of insulin prescriptions.

Sen. Andy Manar, D-Bunker Hill, chief sponsor of the Senate bill, said in a statement that the legislation shows Illinoisans don't have to accept costly prescriptions as the status quo.

"We can change the fact that prescription medication costs more in the United States than any place in the world. This legislation passed because people spoke up and told their story. This historic legislation doesn't become law without them and their effort," Manar said in the statement.

**Use of DNA in missing person cases**

House Bill 2708 (Public Act 101-0266) amends the Missing Persons Identification Act to allow law enforcement agencies to obtain a DNA sample of a missing person or a DNA reference sample from family members' DNA, once a missing person report is made.

The law also provides that law enforcement cannot retain DNA samples from family members or the missing person after the person has been located.

It also adds the National Missing and Unidentified Persons System, a national information clearinghouse for missing persons, to the list of laboratories that law enforcement agencies can work with when trying to find a missing person.

Sen. Tony Munoz, D-Chicago, who was one of the bill's sponsors, said in a news release that using the national system will hopefully help law enforcement find missing people sooner.

"Successfully finding a missing person requires law enforcement to move fast, and we want to make sure they have every tool available to do

**Keeping victims' addresses confidential**

House Bill 2818 (Public Act 101-0270) amends the Address Confidentiality for Victims of Domestic Violence Act by including survivors of sexual assault and stalking in the Illinois Address Confidentiality Program (ACP), which offers survivors protection from their abusers by allowing them to acquire and use a substitute address instead of their real address.

HB 2818 allows survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking who fear for their safety to apply to the ACP through the Attorney General's Office. The ACP forwards all first-class mail and provides survivors with a substitute address for public records and documents, such as driver's licenses and state-issued identification cards.

The bill also changes the name of the law, from the Address Confidentiality for Victims of Domestic Violence Act to the Address Confidentiality for Victims of Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault or Stalking Act.

In a written statement, Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul said ACP is an important added layer of protection and peace of mind for survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking.

"I am committed to ensuring that survivors have access to the resources and support needed to aid their recoveries, and I encourage survivors to participate in this program that can help protect them from the individuals who perpetrated crimes against them," Raoul said in the statement.



### Minimum wage increase

The minimum wage in Illinois rose from \$10 per hour to \$11 per hour on Jan. 1.

The Illinois General Assembly passed increases to the minimum wage in 2019 with legislation that raises the minimum wage \$1 every

year until it reaches \$15 per hour in 2025.

In 2020, wage earners saw their hourly wage increase from \$8.25 to \$9.25 on Jan. 1, and to \$10 on July 1.

"We want to make sure that workers earning minimum wage are aware that the \$1 increase should be reflect-



said Barg. "So does the wide variety of rare and endangered bird species for the novice and avid bird watchers."

"The wide-open panoramic views are a rare treat in the driftless landscape of northwest Illinois."

The 410-acre property was purchased in the early 1990s by Nancy Hamill Winter, a board member at the time on the Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation board. She was interested in converting the land to a wildlife habitat and did so

over the next two decades or so. The sloped, tillable acres are now a grassland habitat and there are more than 10,000 newly planted hardwood trees.

"Within a few years, the newly created grasslands, newly planted forest and existing upland oak woods began to attract a wide variety of nesting bird species, many of them having been in population decline in Illinois since the 1960s," said Barg.

Birds like bobolinks, eastern and


western meadowlarks and Henslow's sparrows returned and nested. Other rare birds, like the northern harrier and short-eared owl, regularly visit to hunt prey especially in the winter.

The sanctuary, 5559 E. Rush Creek Road, is open dawn to dusk daily except for a few deer firearm hunting weekends in late November through January. For more information, visit <http://jdcf.org/properties/valley-of-eden-bird-sanctuary/>.



"Parent educators in the program not only provide parents with information on child development but can also connect them to resources in the community that may be needed to ensure that area children have the best home environment to support their in-school education," Mercier said in the release. "We can help parents identify their children's strengths and abilities as well as addressing any areas of concern."

Staff of the program at FHN will be offered the opportunity to transition to the Regional Office of Education with the program.

As of Dec. 27, the LaSalle facility has reported 34 resident deaths related to COVID-19 since Nov. 1. Since the start of the pandemic, 108 residents at LaSalle have tested positive and 105 employees have tested positive.

Three legislative committees are investigating the administration's response to the LaSalle outbreak, and the Illinois Department of Human Services' acting inspector general has also announced an investigation into the deaths at LaSalle.
