## Informative new stream crossing signs

People driving over bridges on McHenry County highways can now learn more about their water, thanks to new signs being placed at stream crossings.

The Stream Sign Project is a collaborative effort between the McHenry County Division of Transportation and the Environmental Defenders of McHenry County to place informational signage at stream crossings throughout McHenry County. Each sign identifies the name of the stream, as designated by the U.S. Geological Survey, as well as the name of the watershed the stream flows through. All McHenry County streams are part of either the Fox River Watershed or the Kishwaukee River Watershed.

"While stream crossing signs are common in many parts of the country, there were very few in McHenry County," McHenry County

Water Resources Specialist Scott Kuykendall said. "We hope the Stream Sign Project will help people learn to recognize streams in the county and develop a personal connection to the land and water around them."

The Environmental Defenders obtained an \$8,100 grant from the Full Circle Foundation for the project, which covered the cost of the sign stock, posts and other hardware. The MCDOT is printing the signs and installing them at stream crossings on roads under MCDOT jurisdiction.

The group hopes to work with other communities to add the signs at stream crossings on municipal and township roads.

"The Environmental Defenders are hoping to create a better understanding of the streams in our watersheds through this project," Second

Vice President Nancy Schietzelt said. "We believe that having consistent stream signage will improve awareness of, and concern for, water quality in our streams."

## Hunter safety camp for children

Aspiring young hunters ages 9 through 17, this camp is for you. In this five-day non-competitive day camp running July 19 through 23, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., the McHenry County Conservation District staff teach all the requirements of the Illinois hunter safety course, including hunter responsibility and ethics, firearms and ammunition, fire-

arm safety in the home, state regulations, and more.

Staff also offer you the chance to go out into the park off-trail to practice blood trailing and tracking, setting up a tree stand, first aid scenarios and transporting your deer. As a summer camp opportunity, the district also offers games and activities regarding wildlife management and conser-

vation as well as an archery class and a wild game cook-out. At the end of the week you will be offered the test for Illinois hunter safety certification for free. This camp includes instruction from certified hunter safety instructors as well as camp counselors.

## Electronic automobile insurance verification

Program cracks down on uninsured motorists

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White is reminding drivers that electronic verification of automobile insurance has begun and vehicle owners who are unable to prove insurance will face a license plate suspension and \$100 reinstatement fee.

Enforcement of the state's mandatory insurance electronic verification program began on July 1. Insurance companies are working in conjunction with the Secretary of State's Office to confirm electronically that motorists have automobile insurance. The vast majority of vehicle owners will not have to do anything, as electronic verification of automobile insurance will be confirmed automatically.

"My office has led the effort to establish and implement an automobile insurance verification system online that uses innovations in technology to help reduce the number of Illinois motorists driving while uninsured," said White. "The message is simple: if you don't have auto insurance, get

covered now. It is the law."

The program follows national standards established by the Insurance Industry Committee on Motor Vehicle Administration and is expected to reduce the number of Illinois motorists driving while uninsured.

Under the new Illinois Insurance Verification System (ILIVS), vehicle owners' automobile insurance will be verified electronically at least twice a year at random intervals to ensure that vehicle owners are complying with the state's mandatory automobile liability insurance laws.

If electronic verifications are unsuccessful, the Secretary of State's Office will send a written request to the vehicle owner giving them the opportunity to prove they have insurance before suspending their vehicle registration. Vehicle owners must contact their insurance company or notify their insurance agent that they received a letter with a specific reference number from the Secretary of State.

The insurance agent's re-

sponsibility is to confirm electronically with the Secretary of State—through [www.ILIVS.com](http://www.ILIVS.com)—that the vehicle owner does in fact have automobile insurance on the verification date stated in the letter.

It is important to note that vehicle owners who receive the letter should not visit a Driver Services facility; instead, they should contact their insurance company or agent, who can provide the necessary electronic proof of insurance needed to cancel the license plate suspension.

Vehicles owners who do not currently have automobile insurance must obtain insurance to avoid license plate suspension.

White chaired the Uninsured Motorist Verification Advisory Committee that worked with insurance companies, traffic safety advocates and members of the General Assembly. The advisory committee reviewed best practices and helped provide the guidelines used to establish legislation and program requirements.

Chemical Association (IFCA).



# Enough change their minds to reject splitting OT costs with county

What a difference a week makes. In the case of whether the city of Belvidere and Boone County should split overtime costs of the COSSAP officer, it made a big difference.

Aldermen, sitting as a Committee of the Whole, voted 6-4 June 28 to recommend approval of a county request to modify the intergovernmental agreement it had with the city, which had been signed by both parties. The revised Paragraph 5A read, in part, "In addition, the parties agree that any overtime costs associated with the Officer's services that are not reimbursed as a grant-eligible expense shall be equally divided between the county and the city."

One week later, sitting as city council on July 6, those same aldermen voted 6-4 to overrule that recommendation and reject county wording of the amendment.

Here's the vote from June 28: YES, Fleury, Frank, Mulhall, Prather, Snow, and Stevens. NO, Freeman, McGee, Porter and Brereton.

Changing their minds from one week to the next were Aldermen Wendy Frank and Clayton Stevens. Neither offered an explanation as to why that happened.

Alderman Ric Brereton began the discussion July 6, saying, "Just for clarification, the COSSAP (Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant and Substance Abuse Program) officer already has been appointed. This is just to allow overtime,

correct?"

"I already stated there would be no overtime," Mayor Clint Morris replied. "That said, this (revised IGA) is contrary to what we agreed upon. I spoke about how I felt about that at the last committee meeting. I asked the committee (June 28) not to pass this, and they passed it, 6-4. So, here we are."

Alderman Tom Porter said he was going to reiterate that. "Since there will be no overtime or any additional expenses, I will vote 'no' on it," he said.

But Alderman Dan Snow said he thought the revised IGA was "a fail-safe mechanism for some time in the future, if and when such an incident occurs (and) overtime is authorized. This enables the city to get that money from the county."

Alderman Sheryl Prather asked Police Chief Shane Woody if he knew where the health department was on asking the Department of Justice to revise the grant, so overtime is included?

"No," he answered. "It has been submitted to the DOJ and the (health department) project manager is waiting to hear back."

"So, your intention at this point is the (COSSAP) officer will not be working any overtime, correct?" she asked.

"That is correct," he said. Prater concluded the discussion by asking, "So, if that would change at anytime in the future, it would be because it (overtime) was included in the grant, correct?"

"That would have to be a consideration at that point in time," Woody replied. "It would be brought back to council for discussion."

## Accepting anonymous contributions questioned by 2 aldermen

One of two recent contributions to the police department to allow the purchase of a new canine was from a citizen who wanted to remain anonymous. Such contributions usually have been accepted without question, but that wasn't the case at the June 28 Committee of the Whole meeting.

The anonymous contribution was for \$7,000, which combined with a \$6,500 donation from resident Bonnie Jeanne Baker, would cover the \$13,500 needed to buy a 14-month-old Dutch shepherd from M.H. K9 in Berrien Center, Mich.

Alderman Ric Brereton questioned not knowing who was giving the \$7,000.

"While I greatly appreciate any donation to the city or police department, I believe it's not a good practice to accept any anonymous donations," he began. "So I'm going to have to oppose this, unless the motion was amended to show who the donor was. Unless we could get more information on that."

Donor Baker was seated near

the rear of the meeting room and made a few comments on the matter, but she could not be heard. So City Attorney Mike Drella brought a microphone to her, so she could be heard.

"When monies are donated, people come out of the woodwork and ask you to donate to their particular cause," she explained. "Donations to the police department can be anonymous. All you have to do is donate to the FOP (Fraternal Order of Police union), which is required by law to forward it to the police department. So the council isn't involved in it. This time I decided to do it (donate) in public."

Alderman Matt Fleury said, "Some people just want to remain anonymous. If people want to give their money, they should be able to do it anonymously."

Brereton continued that he had been on council for two years and that there was one other instance in which there was an anonymous donation. Aldermen were given the name (of the donor) and so that was fine with him, he added.

But after that decision, he said he was questioned by citizens about who the donor was and why that person's name was not disclosed to the public.

"So, we're kind of in the cross-hairs with this," he said. "I hope we can fix it somehow."  
**Known to police**

Police Chief Shane Woody said the department's command staff knew the identity of the current, anonymous donor.

"It's someone who has donated to the police department in the past, and remained anonymous in the past," he said.

Earlier, Alderman Marsha Freeman expressed concern that an anonymous donor might expect favoritism should he/she have a problem that involved the police. But Alderman Dan Snow said command staff knowledge of the identity of an anonymous donor would eliminate that possibility, because of the name being known to police.

Despite that, Brereton moved to amend the motion on the floor to include the donor's name. The second came from Freeman.

Before the vote, Alderman Natalie Mulhall said she was "just a little bit concerned about the amendment," because the donation was based on the identity of the donor remaining anonymous.

"You have to keep in mind that these donors may not be individuals," Alderman Tom Porter interjected. "The donor for the bodycams was a corporation."

Alderman Wendy Frank said transparency in government is very important these days. "Could this be for our eyes only, so we know?" she asked.

There was no response to that possibility, with Snow wrapping up the discussion by saying, "At this point I'm going to vote 'no' to this amendment."

With there being no further discussion the mayor called for a voice vote on Brereton's motion to amend, which yielded mixed results and was deemed to have failed.

Another voice vote, this one on the original motion to accept both donations, including one from an anonymous donor, passed with one in opposition.

## Three arrested on drug, weapon charges

On Thursday, July 8, the Belvidere/Boone County Metro Narcotics Unit arrested two Belvidere residents and one male from Elgin on multiple drug and weapon offenses. The Metro Narcotics Unit was assisted by members of the United States Drug Enforcement Administration Rockford office and Belvidere SWAT.


The Belvidere SWAT team executed a narcotics search warrant in the 2600 block of East 6th Street, Belvidere. During the

## Jesse White extends driver's license, ID card expiration dates

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White announced that expiration dates for driver's licenses and ID cards have been extended an additional five months—from Aug. 1, 2021, to Jan. 1, 2022. The new Jan. 1, 2022, extension also includes expiration dates that will occur between July and December of this year.

As a result, expired driver's licenses and ID cards will remain valid until Jan. 1, 2022, so customers do not need to

rush into Driver Services facilities, especially during hot weather. This extension does not apply to commercial driver's licenses (CDL) and CDL learner's permits.

"Extending expiration dates until Jan. 1, 2022, means people with an expired driver's license or ID card do not need to rush into a Driver Services facility immediately," said White. "During hot weather, I would suggest residents consider delaying visits to Driver

Services facilities. But if you must visit a facility, please come prepared to wait outside due to continued social distancing efforts, which limits the number of people inside a facility at one time. We are allowing more people in the facilities at one time due to relaxed protocols."

White noted that Senate Bill 2232, which Gov. Pritzker signed into law and

# Cowboy Mounted Shooting competition returns to fair

One of the nation's fastest growing equine sports. The Northern Illinois Outlaws is affiliated with the Cowboy Mounted Shooting Association. They will conduct a four-stage mounted shooting competition in the Pony Arena of the Boone County Fairgrounds. This family friendly sport is fun and exciting as a competitor or as a spectator. Mounted contestants compete in this fast action

event using two .45 caliber single-action revolvers similar to those used in the late 1800s by the American cowboys. Each gun is loaded with five rounds of specially prepared blank ammunition. Courses are set using ten balloon targets in specific patterns where the rider shoots the first five, holsters his/her gun, picks up the second gun and continues with the rest of the pattern.

Mounted shooting events are similar to other rodeo events like barrel racing and pole bending as they are a timed event. The courses are designed to test the rider's ability to control their horse at various speeds and turns while successfully shooting each balloon

While speed is important, accuracy is equally as important for the competitor's success. Penalties are added

to their time for a downed barrel, missed balloon, or an improper course run. An average course takes between 15 and 25 seconds to complete.

Competitors are broken into divisions based on ability, age, and gender. A rider moves up in levels based on the number of qualified competitions they have won. The Cowboy Mounted Shooting Association has developed

the rules and guidelines for this equestrian sport.

The Northern Illinois Outlaws Club has been running and gunning around the northern portion of Illinois for 15 years. Club members range from five-years-old (our wranglers) to our seniors who are in their 70s. It is a family-friendly event with grandparents riding with grandchildren and best friends competing against

each other. With the many different breeds of horses and the riders dressed in western gear (as outlined by the CMSA), this is an exciting, fast-paced sport to watch.



# Woodstock man pleads guilty, awaits sentencing

## Charges include attempt murder and aggravated battery

Patrick D. Kenneally, McHenry County state's attorney, announced that on July 1, Angel G. Cardoza, 50, of Woodstock, entered pleas of guilty before the Honorable Judge Coppedge to the offenses of attempt murder and aggravated battery.

These charges stem from an incident that occurred on September 24, 2019. On that date, Sarah Sullivan was walking home on the Ridgefield Trace bike path in Crystal Lake when the defendant approached her while on the bike path and repeatedly struck her on her head with a hammer.

Dolores Gorski was riding her bicycle on the path at the time and saw the defendant hovering over Sullivan, who was yelling for help. Gorski yelled to the defendant to stop and that she was going to call 9-1-1. The defendant then stopped attacking Sullivan and ran toward Gorski and struck her in the arm with the hammer before fleeing the scene.

Attempt murder is a Class X felony punishable by six to 30 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections. Truth-in-sentencing applies at 85 percent. Aggravated battery is a Class 3 felony punishable by two to 10 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections, or a period of probation up to 30 months. The case is set for a sentencing hearing before Judge Coppedge on Sept. 2 at 1:30 p.m.

This case was investigated by members of the McHenry County Conservation Police Department, the Crystal Lake Police Department and the McHenry County Sheriff's Police Department. This case is being prosecuted by Robert Schuman of the McHenry County State's Attorney's Office.

# Moody's upgrades Illinois' credit rating

## Pritzker says action will save 'tens of millions' in interest costs

Illinois received its first credit rating upgrade in 23 years on June 29 when Moody's Investors Services raised the state's rating one notch, citing "material improvement in the state's finances."

Although the upgrade still leaves Illinois bonds rated just two notches above so-called "junk" status, Gov. JB Pritzker said it marked a turning point for the state, and he credited the General Assembly and members of his own administration for bringing greater fiscal discipline to the state's budget.

"Make no mistake, despite all the challenges of the last year, after eight credit downgrades our state suffered under my predecessor, I say with full certainty Illinois' fiscal condition is heading in the right direction for the first time in the 21st century," Pritzker said during a Statehouse news conference.

In a statement, Moody's said its decision was based in part on the recently passed budget, which increases pension contributions, repays last year's emergency borrowing from the Federal Reserve and keeps the state's bill backlog in check, with only "constrained use" of federal aid from the American Rescue Plan Act.

Moody's also noted, however, that Illinois still faces significant long-term financial pressures, including its unfunded pension liabilities which the agency said "are routinely shortchanged under the state's funding statute."

"These liabilities could exert growing pressure as the impact of federal support dissipates, barring significant revenue increases or other fiscal changes," Moody's said.

"That is certainly something that we need to continue to work on," Pritzker said. "As you know, from the beginning when I took office, we put forward a variety of methods for us to begin to deal with that. One of those has been a pension buyout program that has been successful. And so we're going to continue to work on that to make sure that we expand that and offer buyouts to everybody who is in the retirement system that may want one."

Pritzker said the rating upgrade would save Illinois taxpayers "tens of millions of dollars" in interest costs paid on its debt, some of which he said taxpayers are already seeing in the form of rates paid on some of the state's most recent notes.

"I think it's worth pointing out that the bond market trades typically ahead of credit rating agencies," he

said. "So our bonds actually were trading at a kind of higher level, as if the rating had already changed, because people were looking at what we were doing and, on their own, rating our bonds, the investors themselves."

In addition to upgrading the state's general obligation bonds, Moody's also upgraded the state's Build Illinois bonds—a program begun in 1985 to fund state and local infrastructure, economic development, education and environmental projects — as well as bonds issued by the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority.

Those rating upgrades affect about \$33 billion worth of bonds, according to Moody's, including \$27.7 billion in general obligation bonds, \$3 billion in Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority bonds and \$1.9 billion in Build Illinois bonds.



# New book relates how serial killer poisoned Boone County resident

Before Jack the Ripper, before the Devil in the White City's H.H. Holmes, the world's deadliest serial killer was Thomas Neill Cream. The Canadian doctor murdered as many as 10 people in Canada, the United States, and Britain between 1877 and 1892 including Daniel Stott of Garden Prairie in 1881 escaping suspicion, arrest and even a life sentence in Joliet prison to kill again and again. The new book "The Case of the Murderous Dr. Cream: The Hunt for a Victorian Era Serial Killer" to be released by Algonquin Books on July 13, is the definitive account of this ruthless poisoner and the Scotland Yard investigation that finally brought him

to justice. It's a story of crime detection, forensic science, and madness that Publishers Weekly has praised as "a true-crime masterpiece" and the New York Times has selected as a summer must-read. It has also been chosen by Apple Books and Amazon.com as a Best Book for July. "When a doctor does go wrong he is the first of criminals," Sherlock Holmes observed during one of his most baffling investigations. "He has nerve and he has knowledge." Incredibly, as the words of the world's most famous fictional detective appeared in the British magazine *The Strand* in 1892, a doctor responsible for a string of murders in Chicago and Can-

ada was preying on women in London's downtrodden Lambeth neighborhood. Thomas Neill Cream killed as many as ten people in three countries, a rampage that eclipsed the crimes of the notorious Jack the Ripper. This is the true story of a Victorian Era monster, the ruthless "Lambeth Poisoner." "The Case of the Murderous Dr. Cream" is the first complete account of his crimes, his victims, and how Scotland Yard's best detectives struggled to end his final and deadliest attacks. It explores why the authorities in the United States, Canada, and Britain failed to identify and stop one of the earliest and most prolific serial killers of modern

times. It exposes the flawed police investigations and primitive forensic tests that enabled him to evade suspicion and detection, how he was convicted and imprisoned in the midst of his poisoning spree, and why he was freed to kill again. And it shows how the stifling morality and hypocrisy of Victorian society allowed him to prey on vulnerable and desperate women, many of whom had turned to him for medical help. The Glasgow-born son of a wealthy Quebec City timber merchant, Cream earned a medical degree from Montreal's McGill University in 1876 and almost immediately employed his "nerve and

knowledge" to lethal effect. His first victim was a young woman in Waterloo, Quebec, who fell ill shortly after their marriage that year. Suspected of killing a female patient in London, Ontario in 1879, he fled to Chicago, where he became an abortionist and murdered three more women before he was convicted of poisoning his lover's husband, Daniel Stott. After serving 10 years in an Illinois prison, Cream was set free in 1891—and headed for England to unleash his wrath on the prostitutes of London. To the *Chicago Tribune*, his

crimes marked the emergence of a new breed of killer, one who operated without motive or remorse, who "murdered simply for the sake of murder." Decades later, when George Orwell compiled a list of the most notorious killers in British history, Cream was among the first to spring to mind. The book is available for pre-order. ## Electronic automobile insurance verification

### Program cracks down on uninsured motorists

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White is reminding drivers that electronic verification of automobile insurance has begun and vehicle owners who are unable to prove insurance will face a license plate suspension and \$100 reinstatement fee. Enforcement of the state's mandatory insurance electronic verification program began on July 1. Insurance companies are working in conjunction with the Secretary of State's Office to confirm electronically that motorists have automobile insurance. The vast majority of vehicle owners will not have to do anything, as electronic verification of automobile insurance will be confirmed automatically. "My office has led the effort to establish and implement an

automobile insurance verification system online that uses innovations in technology to help reduce the number of Illinois motorists driving while uninsured," said White. "The message is simple: if you don't have auto insurance, get covered now. It is the law." The program follows national standards established by the Insurance Industry Committee on Motor Vehicle Administration and is expected to reduce the number of Illinois motorists driving while uninsured. Under the new Illinois Insurance Verification System (ILIVS), vehicle owners' automobile insurance will be verified electronically at least twice a year at random intervals to ensure that vehicle owners are complying with the

state's mandatory automobile liability insurance laws. If electronic verifications are unsuccessful, the Secretary of State's Office will send a written request to the vehicle owner giving them the opportunity to prove they have insurance before suspending their vehicle registration. Vehicle owners must contact their insurance company or notify their insurance agent that they received a letter with a specific reference number from the Secretary of State. The insurance agent's responsibility is to confirm electronically with the Secretary of State—through [www.ilivis.com](http://www.ilivis.com)—that the vehicle owner does in fact have automobile insurance on the verification date stated in the letter. It is important to note that

vehicle owners who receive the letter should not visit a Driver Services facility; instead, they should contact their insurance company or agent, who can provide the necessary electronic proof of insurance needed to cancel the license plate suspension. Vehicles owners who do not currently have automobile insurance must obtain insurance to avoid license plate suspension. White chaired the Uninsured Motorist Verification Advisory Committee that worked with insurance companies, traffic safety advocates and members of the General Assembly. The advisory committee reviewed best practices and helped provide the guidelines used to establish legislation and program requirements.

passed the House and Senate by overwhelming margins, authorizes the Secretary of State's Office to extend driver's license and ID card expiration dates to Jan. 1, 2022. Senate Bill 2232 was sponsored by state Sen. Laura Murphy (D-Des Plaines) and state Rep. Michelle Mussman

(D-Schaumburg). White continues to urge the public to consider using online services when possible instead of visiting a facility due to heavy customer volume. White has greatly expanded online services and encourages the public to visit his office's website

at [www.cyberdriveillinois.com](http://www.cyberdriveillinois.com). Many transactions can be conducted online, including the purchase of license plate stickers, obtaining a duplicate driver's license or ID card, and renewing driver's licenses and ID cards, including Real IDs, for those who are eligible.

As a reminder, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security has extended the federal REAL ID deadline to May 3, 2023. White's office continues to review ways to further expand online renewals for expired driver's licenses and ID cards to reduce the volume.
