State Sen. Brian Stewart for all services. Checks or (R-Freeport) will host three free in-person community events to help constituents learn more about the federal Medicare program on Nov. 4, provide Mobile Secretary of State Unit services on Nov. 9, and talk with constituents about their state government concerns on Nov. 16.

Facilitated by the Illinois Senior Health Insurance Program, the Medicare 101 program offers information about eligibility, coverage, help with out-of-pocket expenses, and open enrollment. New and current beneficiaries are welcome. The event is scheduled for Nov. 4, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., at the Freeport Public Library, 100 E. Douglas St. in Freeport.

The Mobile Driver Services Facility is scheduled on Nov. 9, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., at the State Bank Community Room, 1005 Cameron Drive in Durand. Services provided by the Illinois Secretary of State's office at the Mobile Driver Services Facility include: renewal/correction of driver's licenses for persons younger than 75, obtaining a state ID, purchasing license plate stickers. NO REAL IDs. Senior citizens ages 75 and older will need to visit a permanent Department of Motor Vehicles facility to renew their driver's licenses. Proper dentification will be needed

Stewart is also encouraging area residents to attend an in-person regional town hall event he is hosting on Nov. 16, from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the Elks Lodge, 1279 Franklin Grove Road in Dixon. Attendees are asked to RSVP at https://www.ilsenategop.org/ stewartrlt2.

On Nov. 10, 2021 Cuba City will receive awards from the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation and Wisconsin Rural partners for its recent Presidential Plaza project. The event will begin at 1:00 p.m.

### City Awards Ceremony Cuba (

On Tuesday, Nov. 10 the City of Cuba City will receive the awards garnered by its recent Presidential Plaza project. The awards are from the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC) Main Street Program Award for Downtown Innovation, and Wisconsin Rural Partners for their Top Rural Development Initiative Award. The short ceremony will include introductions of the many partners involved in the project and will also include a walk through the Plaza. The Ceremony will begin in the Common Council Chambers at Cuba City's City Hall at 108 N Main Street at 1 p.m.

The residents of Cuba City had long expressed their desire for a downtown gathering place. This was noted in the City's 2020 Comprehensive Plan Update as well as in recent high school student surveys. Whether old or young, the community sought a downtown

area to enjoy a cup of coffee, or to just "hang out." Partnering with the University of Wisconsin-Platteville's (UW-P) Senior Design Team program brought the services of four senior engineering students into the project in early 2020. The Design Team provided a vision for how the area around the City's Presidential Caboose on Main Street could be enhanced to create a community space, while also bringing traffic to the City's downtown businesses. Working through the many challenges of Covid 19, the team also assisted in a grant application for AARP's Community Challenge Grant, a program seeking innovative approaches to downtown revitalization that also features multi-generational aspects.

The design team created a vision for the space that included new green space with trees, seating, games, a new bicycle rack and a Bluetooth sound system. The Cuba City Telephone Company provided free Wi-Fi service while the UW-PArt Department added a 4,200 square foot, interactive ground mural of the Mississippi River. The mural also includes a salute to the Covid 19 Frontline Workers and a Presidential Hopscotch area. Another key item was the installation of three ADA Compliant sidewalk ramps enabling individuals with disabilities to more easily access the Plaza.

AARP received over 2,800 applications for the Community Challenge Grant and Cuba City was very pleased to be among the 184 communities nationwide to be awarded funding for their project. Between the pandemic and the resulting shortages of construction and electronic equipment, the project did not progress as smoothly as first envisioned. "With considerable help from our many partners, we were able to complete the project before the Dec. 18 deadline from AARP. AARP proved to be an outstanding partner, as were the many other organizations that assisted us in the project," stated Mayor John Van De Wiel. "Among the many partners

School, and the City of Presidents Committee. Thanks to the generosity of these groups as well as the Telephone Company, no City funds were required to complete the project," added Van De Wiel. Other partners included several local businesses and the students and residents who assisted in the project.

Cuba City is understandably proud of these two Awards as it was when the City won the same WEDC Main Street Award in 2017 for its downtown improvement efforts. That project included a highly successful façade improvement program for downtown businesses, new street lamps and planters. Cuba City is also well known for its "Parade of Presidents" Presidential Shields that adorn the street lamps. The City of Presidents Committee is a local philanthropic organization that maintains the City's Presidential theme among other activities. They were a key partner in the Plaza project, providing both guidance and funding for the mural.

Cuba City is proud of its Main Street which can boast no empty storefronts and its daily average of 5,200 vehicles per



Osteoporosis is a skeletal disorder that is characterized by inadequate bone mass. Bone is a living tissue that is constantly being broken down and replaced. When your body makes new bone faster than it breaks down old bone, your bone mass increases. However, in someone with osteoporosis, the creation of new bone does not keep up with the loss of old bone. This leaves their bones weak, brittle and prone to fractures.

Osteoporosis can affect all bones. This includes the jaw bone. Changes to the structure, density and strength of the jawbone make it easier for bacteria to penetrate the bone, increasing the risk of periodontal disease. Periodontal disease further increases the

loss of bone and other supportive tissues for both teeth and dental implants.

porosis, such as race, sex, age, body frame size and family history, are not in our control. So it is important that we take advantage of those we can. Years of research have shown that adequate bone mass attained during childhood and adolescence is the most critical determinant of lifelong skeletal health. To promote your child's skeletal health start with good nutrition. Lifelong lack of calcium contributes to low bone density. Those three to five glasses of milk a day that we consumed as children are now more likely to be carbonated beverages, sports drinks or juice drinks. In addition to not getting the calcium and added vitamin D from milk that is crucial to bone growth, carbonated beverages have been proven to be harmful to developing bone. All that sugar and acid is also

wreaking havoc on their teeth. Along with nutrition, you need to monitor the amount of exercise that your child is getting on a regular basis. Starting regular physical activity early in life contributes to greater bone mass. Excessive time in front of the television or computer can lead to a lifetime of back and other musculoskeletal problems. While it is best to start when you are young, adopting a regular exercise program will benefit your bone mass no

matter when you start. Mix it up. Strength training will help vour arms and upper spine, while walking, jogging, running, etc. will help your legs, hips and lower spine. Balancing exercises will help reduce your risk of falling as you age.

Other risk factors for osteoporosis include eating disorders, surgery to help you lose weight, excessive alcohol consumption and tobacco use.

It is important that you notify your dentist if you are diagnosed with osteoporosis and if you are taking any antiresorptive medications. It is crucial that you see your dentist regularly for monitoring and treatment to prevent further bone or tooth loss.

High doses of antiresorptive medications are often given to cancer patients to reduce bone pain and abnormally high calcium levels associated with certain cancers. Oncologists will instruct patients to see their dentist before beginning these treatments. Dentists must treat any oral disease before cancer treatment begins. He will also develop a protocol to keep the mouth healthy during cancer treatments, when dental care is contraindicated. This will include teaching patients how to recognize, avoid and manage oral complications associated with these treatments.





## **Senator Stewart opposes repeal** of parental notice of abortion act

Senate Democrats pushed through an after-hours bill Oct. 26 to repeal parental notification of abortion in Illinois, despite Republican lawmakers taking a strong stand for parental rights in assuring the physical and mental well-being of their minor children.

State Sen. Brian Stewart (R-Freeport) said House Bill 370 is a direct attack on parental rights and will leave countless young girls vulnerable at a time when they desperately

need support and guidance. The bill passed by a vote of 32-22.

The Parental Notice of Abortion Act of 1995 requires that parents of minors be notified before their child receives an abortion procedure. Currently, the law simply stipulates that a parent be informed of the procedure. Parents are not required to provide consent.

Stewart issued the following statement after the vote, "This

is yet another example of this Governor and other Democrat leaders, and their insistence that they know what is best for our children. This is another overreach by the Governor and his supporters into the lives and homes of Illinois families. Instead of trusting the parents, grandparents, foster parents and guardians who have raised these children, they think they have the right to interfere in things as personal as medical decisions for minor children."

# FROM LENA'S KITCHEN



The not so skinny cook

We did get our rain two weeks in a row. In between we had some beautiful fall Halloween has weather. come and gone, and we are in November, the month of falling leaves and usually falling temperatures. As I write this column, we are still looking for the first really killing frost. The lawns are really green again even as the trees are becoming bare. Cooking is turning to some good warm recipes. This week we have a great appetizer, a healthy salad, two main dishes and two fall desserts.

### **Cheesy Bruschetta** Spread

This simple appetizer is big on flavor and easy to prepare. The prepared pesto can be found in the Italian refrigerated section of the grocery store. I usually keep pesto in the refrigerator because you can use it in lots of recipes.

1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese,

- softened 1/2 C. prepared pesto
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> t. salt
- 1/8 t. pepper
- 2 C. grape tomatoes
- 1 carton (8 oz.) fresh mozzarella cheese pearls, drained

Minced fresh basil French bread slices (1/2 inch

thick) toasted In a small bowl, mix cream

cheese, pesto, salt and pepper until combined. Transfer to a greased 3 qt. slow cooker. Top with tomatoes and mozzarella cheese. Cook, covered, on low until heated through and the cheese begins to melt,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 hours. Sprinkle with basil. Serve with toasted bread.

### Harvest Kale Salad

Kale is a vegetable that is hearty and lasts in the garden even after a light frost. It is also the cooking rage this year as well as last. It is very healthy, and I think it takes a while for many people to develop a taste for it. This kale salad uses a lot of vegetables and that makes it healthier than ever. You can substitute white wine vinegar or rice vinegar for the champagne vinegar.

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. extra-virgin olive oil

- 2 T. fresh orange juice
- 2 T. Champagne vinegar
- 1 t. pepper
- 1 bunch kale, stemmed and sliced <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> inch thick
- 1 small red beet, peeled and thinly sliced

3 radishes, thinly sliced 1 carrot, peeled and shaved into ribbons

1 small Granny Smith apple, thinly sliced

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. sweetened dried cranberries

1/4 C. roasted salted pumpkin seeds

In a small bowl, whisk together the oil, orange juice, vinegar, salt and pepper. In a large bowl, toss together the kale, beet, and two thirds of the dressing. Refrigerate for 30 minutes to 1 hour. Just before serving, stir in radish, carrot, apple, cranberries, pumpkin seeds, and remaining dressing. Garnish with shaved Parmesan cheese.

### **Baked Pasta with** Sausage

This casserole is meaty and melty. Serve it with a salad and some good bread, and it will be a hit.

12 oz. farfel pasta 1 lb. ground pork sausage 1 onion, chopped

1 can (28 oz.) diced tomatoes with juices

2 T. tomato paste

1 red pepper, sliced 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. shredded mozzarella cheese

1 T. chopped parsley Coat a 3 qt. baking dish with cooking spray. Cook pasta according to package directions; drain. Return to pot. Heat oven to 350. Coat nonstick skillet with cooking spray. Heat over medium high heat; crumble in sausage and onion. Cook, stirring until sausage is no longer pink; 10 minutes; drain. Return to skillet. Stir in tomatoes with juice, tomato paste, pepper, and <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. water. Bring to a boil; cover. Reduce heat to medium-low; cook for 10 minutes. Toss with pasta. Transfer to a baking dish. Top with cheese; bake until melted. about 10 minutes. Top with cheese.

### **Honey Mustard Chicken Bake**

If you are a fan of honey-mustard sauce on chicken tenders, you will like the taste of this dish. I think chicken thighs are moister and have a lot of flavor. They are much more cost friendly than chicken breasts.

4 (8 oz. each) skinless chicken thighs

1 t. salt

- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. honey
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. Dijon mustard
- 3 t. fresh thyme leaves 1 lb. asparagus, trimmed
- and cut into 1" pieces

1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. cauliflower florets

1 medium red onion, cut into 1" pieces, layers separated

1 red pepper, cut into 1 " pieces

1 T. olive oil

Place one oven rack in the center of the oven and the other rack 6 inches from the broiler. Preheat oven to 400. Season both sides of the chicken with 1/2 t. salt and transfer to a plate. In a bowl, combine the honey, mustard, and 1 t. thyme. In a 9 x 13 baking dish that has been sprayed with cooking spray, toss together vegetables, olive oil and  $\frac{1}{2}$  t. salt and 2 t. thyme.

Roast the pan in the oven on the center rack for 10 minutes; remove from oven. Toss the vegetables and then place chicken over vegetables. Spoon or brush half of honey-mustard sauce over chicken. Return to center rack and roast until vegetables are tender and chicken is cooked through, about 30 minutes. Spoon or brush honey-mustard remaining

oven to broil and move dish to upper rack; broil until chicken begins to brown 3 to 5 minutes. Serve immediately.

### **Cranberry Pie**

Donna Otte called me with this recipe that she makes all of the time. It is an easy pie that doesn't involve any traditional crusts. Enjoy this unique pie for the holidays. 1 qt. bag of cranberries,

washed and picked over 1/3 C. brown sugar

- 1/3 C. chopped pecans
- Batter:
  - 1/2 C. sugar
  - <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. flour
  - 1 egg, beaten

1/3 C. melted butter or mar-

garine Preheat oven to 350. Place cranberries in the bottom of a 9 inch pie plate. Sprinkle

with brown sugar and pecans.

sauce over chicken. Switch In a bowl, mix sugar, flour, beaten egg and melted butter. Pour over cranberries, leaving around 1/4 inch between berries and edge of pie plate. Bake at 350 for <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hour. Cool and serve

### **Pumpkin Cookies**

It is the season for pumpkin anything. These cookies are soft and easy to make (and easy to eat also). Enjoy yet another pumpkin recipe.

 $2\frac{1}{2}$  C. flour

- 1 t. baking soda
- 1 t. baking powder
  - 1 t. cinnamon
  - <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> t. ground nutmeg
  - ¹∕₂ t. salt
  - 11/2 C. sugar
  - <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. butter , softened
  - 1 C. 100% pure Pumpkin
  - 1 egg
  - 1 t. vanilla
- Frosting
- 1 t. vanilla

2 C. powdered sugar, sifted

Service Corner<sup>®</sup>

3 T. milk

1 T. butter, softened

Preheat oven to 350. Grease baking sheets (I use parchment paper and lightly spray the paper). In a bowl, combine flour, baking soda, baking powder, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt. Beat sugar and 1/2 C. butter in large mixing bowl until well blended. Beat in pumpkin, egg, and vanilla until smooth. Gradually beat in flour mixture. Drop by rounded tablespoons onto prepared baking sheets. Bake for 15 to 18 minutes or until edges are firm. Cool on baking sheets for 2 minutes; remove to wire racks to cool completely.

Frosting: Combine sifted powdered sugar, milk, butter and vanilla in a small bowl until smooth. Drizzle over cookies.

### • Kitchen (Continued from page 9) **Final Thoughts** Quick Pickles

This recipe calls for pickle crisp. I had to look up this ingredient. Pickle Crisp is a brand name for foodgrade calcium chloride made by the Ball Company. It is mainly used as a firming agent for canning pickles and other fruits and vegetables. It's a convenient and easy-to-use product that replaces the process of soaking produce for hours. The pickles are crisp and tasty. It says to run hot water over the jars. I think you could put them in the dishwasher and take them out right after the dry cycle.

1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> lb. pickling cucumbers, ends trimmed, sliced 1/4 inch thick

- 2 T. kosher salt
- 1 C. chopped fresh dill
- 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. cider vinegar 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. water
- 2 T. sugar
- 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> t. yellow mustard seeds
- 1 t. dill seeds
- 1/8 t. Ball pickle crisp
- 2 peeled and quartered garlic cloves, divided

Toss cucumbers with salt in a bowl and refrigerate for 3 hours. Drain cucumbers in colander (do not rinse), then pat dry with paper towels. Bundle fresh dill in cheesecloth and secure with kitchen twine. Bring dill bundle, vinegar, water, sugar, mustard seeds and dill seeds to a boil in large saucepan over medium-high heat. Cover and let steep off heat for 15 minutes. Discard dill bundle.

Rinse two 1-pint jars under hot running water until heated through, 1 to 2 minutes; shake dry. Add the 1/8 t. pickle crisp to each jar, then pack the cucumbers tightly with dill sprigs and garlic. Return brine to brief boil. Ladle hot brine over cucumbers to cover; distributing spices evenly. Let jars cool completely, cover with lids, and refrigerate 24 hours before serving. Keep jars of unused pickles refrigerated.


