Woodstock, other area police, investigating several incidents

The following is a statement from Woodstock Police Chief John L. Lieb, issued Jan. 25:

"On Monday, Jan. 24, at approximately 10:30 p.m., the Woodstock Police Department was dispatched to the 1700 block of Yasgur Drive in reference to a "shots fired" call. The initial investigation revealed that an altercation occurred in which firearms were used resulting in multiple bullets striking a house and a female at the residence. The female victim is receiving medical treatment. The offender(s) fled prior to police arrival.

The Woodstock Police Department Investigations Division continues to aggressively investigate this incident. As part of a multi-faceted investigation, WPD detectives are collaborating with investigators in and around the Rockford area in an attempt to determine if the Woodstock incident is connected in any way to a reported stolen vehicle and several reported armed robberies in the Rockford region; all occurring within a short, but plausible, time span for these incidents to be connected. This multi-jurisdictional investigation includes witness, forensic, and electronic

information and evidence.

To best ensure that a quality investigation occurs, WPD detectives are taking the time to work methodically and systematically to assemble an "airtight" investigation; we strive to hold those who come to Woodstock and commit such crimes accountable for their actions. Detectives will continue to follow-up on all potential evidence and leads as they become available.

Understandably, some Woodstock citizens are concerned about the current safety of our community; crimes like this are a rarity in such a safe community as Woodstock. What can be assured is that WPD Officers are continuously available for anyone who believes they are in danger or if they believe that a crime is being, or about to be, committed.

WPD has a strong relationship with our community, and realizes that we need to work together to keep Woodstock a safe place to live. Therefore, if you have any information regarding this incident, then you are encouraged to call the Woodstock Police Department Investigations Division at 815-338-2131."

RVC Center for Learning in Retirement recognized for technology innovation

Rock Valley College's Center for Learning in Retirement (CLR) was recently awarded the Illinois Council for Continuing Education and Training (ICCET) 2021 Innovation Award.

The award is a result of the collaborative efforts between RVC, McHenry County College, Harper College and College of DuPage.

"Resulting from the pandemic and seeing how it was negatively impacting older adult programs, [the colleges] reached out to each other, brainstormed, shared resources, and created a profitable and sustainable model supporting older adults across four community college districts," said ICCET President Jessie McClusky in her award letter to the colleges.

In the fall of 2020, program directors from the four community colleges came together to collaborate on programming for older adult programs. The COVID-related cancellations and challenges of transitioning to online learning had put stress on programs and reduced enrollment numbers. The colleges needed to be innovative to shift programmatic offerings in order to attract participants.

"We came together to combine our resources allowing students from all four colleges to participate in a set number of shared courses allowing students to participate from anywhere via Zoom," explained Tammy Lewis RVC Center for Learning in Retirement Program Director. "The collaboration has been a great success."

The collaboration helped

to fill the enrollment and program gaps each college was facing. The collaboration launched in the spring of 2021, breaking down location-specific boundaries community colleges have traditionally operated within.

The technology innovation of CLR was not limited to collaboration. CLR volunteer instructor and Zoom trainer Bob Bertolasi was presented with the City of Rockford Challenge Coin Award. Rockford Mayor, Tom McNamara, and the Rockford City Council present this award to recipients for going above and beyond to move the city forward.

According to Lewis, "Bob

has been committed to getting hundreds of seniors in northern Illinois connected and comfortable with taking online classes via platforms like Zoom."

Bertolasi has conducted dozens of training sessions, been willing to help people one-on-one if needed, and been present for most CLR Zoom classes to offer his expert advice and assistance. In addition to this support, he teaches several CLR courses each semester.

BBB Alert: Avoid an APP attack!

How to avoid app store scams
APP scams are becoming more common as reports come into the BBB Scamtracker. From passwords to banking details, you store important personal information on your mobile devices. Unfortunately, scammers are lurking on the app stores of Apple and Google and using various techniques like pop-up ads and emails on the hunt for victims.

Dennis Horton, director of the Rockford Regional Office of the Better Business Bureau, says, "Trusted app stores don't eliminate the threat of app scams, but they do offer a higher level of protection. You are much more likely to download an app that will send spam messages or expose your phone number if you download it from an unofficial or little-known app store."

To avoid getting scammed, BBB recommends the following tips when downloading an APP. Only download apps from official app stores.

- Don't rely solely on a high star rating when deciding to download. Keep in mind that shady app developers can generate or purchase fake reviews. One telltale sign of a scam is when an app has thousands of five-star reviews with no written comments and hundreds of one-star reviews with negative comments. App developers may have purchased the good reviews to cover up the bad reviews that expose the app as a fraud. Even written reviews can be purchased, though, which leads us to the next tip.

- Read good and bad reviews. Scammers can artificially push good reviews to the top of the list by getting fake users to mark them as "helpful." They can also pay people to create written reviews claiming the app is

great. Take a closer look at the positive reviewers' accounts, and ask yourself if they look like they are coming from a real person who actually used the app. And don't stop after reading a few good reviews. Take the time to check out poor reviews to find out what people didn't like about the app. All apps will generate a few bad reviews, but if you notice an app has several reviews where users mention they were "scammed" or the app didn't deliver what it promised to, steer clear.

- Read the app's privacy policy before you download. Take a few minutes to read the app's terms of service and privacy policy and take note of what personal information the app will access and how it will use that information. It could be a red flag if the permissions don't make sense (for example, if a weather radar app says it needs access to your contacts to work). In addition, any app that doesn't have a privacy policy is probably not safe to use.

- Make sure you download the real version of any app you look for specifically. One popular tactic scammers use is to create copycat apps to trick people into downloading. If you are looking for a popular app, keep in mind it may not be the first to appear on the list after you search for it. Look out for similar but not-quite-right logos and app developer names that don't look legitimate. Read the app's description text carefully, too. Impostor apps often contain descriptions that don't make sense or spelling and grammatical errors.

- Keep an eye on free trials. Many app store scams start by offering you a free trial. Scammers hope you'll sign up for a free trial and then forget to cancel. Many scam apps charge for weekly instead of monthly

subscriptions, which can add up quickly, even if you are only charged a few dollars at a time.

Whenever you sign up for a free trial, test it out right away and unsubscribe before you get charged if you don't plan on using the service. Both Google and Apple allow you to access all of your subscriptions in a single place, so you don't have to do any digging to find an "unsubscribe" button that an app developer may have hidden.

- Do regular app housekeeping. Out-of-date apps are particularly vulnerable to hackers. This is because they may have security issues that haven't been addressed through updates. If you haven't used an app in a few months, or you notice an app hasn't been updated by the developer recently, it's probably best to delete it.

- Watch out for shady app behavior after you download. If you decide to download an app after reading reviews and the privacy policy, you'll still want to keep a critical eye on how it works. Asking for unnecessary permissions, disappearing from your home screen, draining your battery or data even when not in use, and not doing what it promised to do are all signs of a scam.

- Report fraudulent apps. If you spot an app scam, report it. In the Google Play store, you can flag an app as inappropriate and then explain the reason. In a recent update to Apple's iOS, you can now "report a problem" on any app's description page and then select "report a scam or fraud." You can also report app scams to BBB.org/ScamTracker.

Boone County COVID-19 testing opportunity

The Boone County Health Department is announcing opening an appointment based COVID-19 testing site Thursday, Feb. 3, 10, 17 and 24. These testing clinics will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the North Boone Fire District 3, 305 W. Grove St., Poplar Grove, IL 61065. Appointments are available on a first come first serve basis.

"Our department is pleased to bring additional testing availability to our county. Testing has been an effective tool for slowing the spread of COVID-19 and these clinics will offer our county residents another option for getting tested," said Amanda Mehl, Boone County Health Department's Public Health administrator. "Access to testing has been a barrier in our community and after months of

planning and sifting through a variety of obstacles, we are finally able to launch this crucial initiative." continued Mehl.

This testing is made possible through a federal partnership with the Midwest Coordination Center (MCC) which helps K-12 public and private schools, and congregate settings safely reopen and remain open by implementing a COVID testing program. Individuals coming for testing must wear a properly fitting mask covering their nose and mouth at all times and must bring a photo ID. Symptomatic individuals must report their symptoms upon registration.

Child sexual predator arrested in Poplar Grove

On Wednesday, Jan. 26, a Poplar Grove man was arrested on multiple child sex offenses.

Brian Sample, 40, of Poplar Grove, was arrested on two counts of predatory criminal sexual assault of a child (Class X felony). Sample remains in Boone County Jail on a \$750,000 10 percent bond.

On Jan. 27 Boone County sheriff's detectives arrested Sample after it was alleged he had sexually assaulted a child under the age of 13 multiple times since December 2020. A Class X felony is punishable by six to 60 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections. Each Class X felony charge must be sentenced consecutively meaning a sentence of 12 to 120 years in the

Illinois Department of Corrections.

Rep. Keicher appointed to Legislative Ethics Commission

State Rep. Jeff Keicher, R-Sycamore, has been appointed to the bicameral, bipartisan Legislative Ethics Commission by House Minority Leader Jim Durkin, R-Western Springs, in a move made official on Jan. 21. The Legislative Ethics Commission is the Illinois General Assembly's watchdog tasked with holding state lawmakers accountable for their conduct

in office. "I'm honored to be asked to serve on one of the most important committees in our General Assembly. This committee helps ensure ethical conduct by our members and helps to hold the General Assembly accountable. Our first and most immediate priority must be to fill the vacancy of Legislative Inspector General with a qualified, impartial in-

vestigator. It is a disappointment that this position has not been filled already," Keicher said. "Furthermore, I believe we need to pass legislation to give the legislative inspector general's office independent subpoena power. Restoring public trust in the state legislature after years of scandal requires the utmost transparency and putting teeth into our ethics laws and procedures."

Keicher has been appointed to replace Rep. Avery Bourne, R-Morrisonville, who stepped down from the commission last week. The commission is comprised of eight members; four state senators and four state representatives, including an equal number of Democrats and Republicans. Senator Jill Tracy (R-Quincy) is the current chairperson of the Legislative Ethics Commission.



Garage fire on Bennett Street

At 11 a.m. on Thursday, Jan. 28, the Belvidere Fire Department responded to the report of a car fire inside of a garage in the 300 block of Bennett Street. On arrival two minutes after receiving the call, BFD command reported a fully involved detached garage fire. Belvidere Fire initially operated in a defensive mode and extinguished the fire from the exterior due to the involvement and stability of the structure at that time.

Belvidere Fire received assistance from seven different agencies: District #2 Fire, District #3 Fire, Cherry Valley Fire, Kirkland Fire, Boone County EMA, Lifeline

Ambulance, and Capron Rescue Squad. In total, on scene, were 25 firefighters, four fire engines, two chiefs, two Quints, two ambulances and one other vehicle. There were no injuries.

The fire was under control within 10 minutes of the first arriving fire units. One bystander was evaluated by medical personnel on scene and was not transported to the hospital. No other fire or civilian injuries were reported and the scene was turned back over to the homeowner at approximately 12:45 p.m.

The cause of the fire is under investigation and the estimated loss is \$50,000.

Legislation introduced to protect citizens when local officials are charged with crimes

Local elected officials charged with crimes that could harm local residents can be temporarily removed from office until their criminal cases are resolved, under legislation sponsored by state Sen. Dave Syverson (R-Cherry Valley) and cosponsored by local area legislators. Senate Bill 3460 gives local governments the tools necessary to protect citizens in cases when elected officials have been charged with crimes that put the public at risk. "Under current law, local government employees charged with a crime re-

lated to their office can be placed on leave until their criminal cases are resolved. However, county-wide and township-wide elected officials indicted for work-related crimes cannot be put on leave. They are allowed to continue to work in their office until their legal matter is resolved in court, which could take years," Syverson said. "Senate Bill 3460 puts provisions in place that would allow elected officials charged with a felony to be placed on leave until their case is resolved."

Funding approved for education and training

The McHenry County Board approved its first three funding requests under the Advance McHenry County program to invest tens of millions in federal COVID-19 recovery money in projects that directly benefit the community.

Board members voted unanimously at their Jan. 18 meeting to approve a \$1.69 million award to help fund state-of-the-art educational and training equipment for McHenry County College's new Foglia Center for Advanced Technology and Innovation. Another \$1.5 million award to Community High School District 155 will finance a jobs readiness and exploration program for nursing and other fields. The County Board also approved \$500,000 to support the Child Advocacy Center of McHenry County's mission to help child abuse victims.

"These first three awards approved by the County Board are the epitome of what we had in mind when we created Advance McHenry County," County Board Chairman Mike Buehler, R-Crystal Lake, said. "We look forward to seeing more and more requests come before us to put this funding to work for the people in thoughtful and impactful ways."

The first phase of the Advance McHenry County plan will invest half of the \$59.7 million the county is set to receive in American Rescue Plan Act funding. Of the \$29.8 million to be disbursed in this phase, \$14 million will be allocated to infrastructure capital projects, and \$8 million will be dedicated to manufacturing, workforce development and jobs programs. Just under \$3 million will be allocated to nonprofit agencies, and another \$3 million will be set aside for special districts and other local governments that did not receive ARPA funds.

McHenry County College's award will support more than half of the equipment costs for the new center. The college expects to break ground this summer on the state-of-the-art facility, which will house numerous manufacturing and technology-related jobs programs.

"On behalf of McHenry County College, we offer a tremendous thank you to McHenry County and the Advance McHenry County program," MCC President Clint Gabbard said. "This funding will allow us to provide

program equipment that will be at the heart of inspiring and training our students. Ultimately, our goal for the Foglia Center for Advanced Technology and Innovation is to produce an entrepreneurial, well-trained and confident workforce that drives a vital economy for McHenry County."

District 155's award will fund the creation of a certified nursing assistant program, as well as broader job training. The district consists of Crystal Lake Central, Crystal Lake South, Cary-Grove and Prairie Ridge high schools.

"Our partnership with the county emphasizes our shared commitment and vision to promote career exploration for our high school students, cultivate real-world experiences with local business, and fill the employment gap in McHenry County," Superintendent Steve Olson said. "We are grateful for the County Board's investment, which will have far-reaching benefits for our students, families, local businesses and taxpayers."

Advance McHenry County funding will allow the Child Advocacy Center to support its staff, and to provide extensive child abuse investigation training for law enforcement, mental health professionals and medical providers countywide. The center has served victims of child abuse since 1999.

"This funding also will enable us to help victims of child abuse and affected family members by providing them needed items such as clothing, personal hygiene items and gift cards for necessities such as groceries and gas," Executive Director Misty Marinier said. "We are so very thankful for this funding opportunity."

Funding requests received by the county are first evaluated by The Bronner Group, the firm hired to help administer the program, on a 100-point scale developed to gauge community benefit; the firm also ensures that the requests align with federal guidelines governing how ARPA funds are used. McHenry County College's proposal received a 91 percent score, with District 155 and the Child Advocacy Center receiving 83 and 81 points, respectively.

Scholarship essay to focus on McHenry County during WWII

The 2022 Nancy Fike Scholarship marks a seminal moment in history that occurred during the close of 2021: The 80th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Named in honor of the society's former administrator, the McHenry County Historical Society & Museum awards a \$1,000 scholarship annually to a graduating senior from a McHenry County high school who plans to study education, history, or the social sciences. This merit-based scholarship will be given in the winning student's name to his or her college/university.

Applicants must have a minimum 3.0 GPA, provide two letters of recommendation (one from a faculty member and one from another representative of the community), show proof of community service and write a minimum 500-word essay relevant to McHenry County. Essay topics will be announced each year by the society.

Applications, available online at GotHistory.org, must be submitted by April 15.

This year's topic is:

Dec. 7, 2021, marked the 80th anniversary of Pearl Harbor and the start of World War II for the United States.

What was McHenry County's contribution to the war effort? What was life like here, on the "home front?" How did the war change our county?

What we want you to con-

sider is how our county fit into the larger picture of the war.

There are many people still alive who remember World War II. You might try to interview someone. Also, use Newspapers.com to find out how the war was reported in our local press.

Essays will be judged on content, grammar, historical accuracy, originality and their bibliography (students are expected to cite their sources). In some cases, interviewing a person(s) about the topic is advised. Smart phones are no substitute for smart people.



Syverson says the legislation offers the steps needed to protect taxpayers and families, but in a way that also protects the rights of elected officials who have only been charged and not found guilty of crimes.

In helping craft the legislation, Boone County State's Attorney Tricia Smith wanted to ensure the process is not incorrectly used as a political tool. To that end, Senate Bill 3460 requires a three-fifths vote by a county board to direct the state's attorney to determine if the charges against a local government official are germane to the official's office activities. For example, if a countywide elected official was indicted on a traffic charge, it would probably not put the public at risk if the official remained in office until their case was resolved. However, if the state's attorney determines there is potential public risk associated with an alleged crime, the case would be taken to the chief judge of the Circuit Court, who would make the ruling if the county official should be placed on administrative leave while their case is adjudicated. In the case of township-wide elected officials, it would be the township's legal counsel who would make the ruling and take it to the court.

"I was honored to work with the senator and other

state's attorneys in crafting this legislation that will help protect our citizens when elected leaders are charged with crimes that impact the public," said Smith.

The need for this legislation arose after criminal charges were filed against the Winnebago County coroner. Even though there was a clear risk to taxpayers and families, the elected official was allowed to continue working at his office because under current law there was no mechanism in place to temporarily remove the elected official.

Boone County State's Attorney Tricia Smith helped craft Senate Bill 3460 which State Senator Dave Syverson sponsored.
