Will 2022 be the year for F4 jet memorial?

In early 2018 a handful of veterans and some community members met in Lena to explore the possibility of making an F4 Phantom Jet Memorial in northwestern Illinois. The site in Lena on Main Street was selected, as the land was donated to the committee for the purpose of a memorial. After filling out the paperwork and filing it with the State of Illinois, the group acquired one of the last remaining F4s (most of the others were being used for target practice). The only problem was that the jet was located in New Mexico.

Some members of the community attended a fly-in in Oshkosh, Wisconsin and met Jim Talbert from the Almodoro, New Mexico Airport. Jim offered to move the F4 from the air base to his airport and store it until funds were raised to bring it back to Illinois. The offer was quickly accepted and a timeline was set to take possession.

After the generosity of the northwestern Illinois communities, selling of engraved pavers and grants, the funds were raised to pay the initial cost of bringing the aircraft to Lena. On one of the coldest days in history, with sub-zero weather, World Wide Aircraft of Nebraska brought the jet and Lyons Well Drilling of Stockton

helped unload it at its temporary position at Rafters just outside of Lena. The aircraft will remain there until it has been restored and painted.

Over 100 pavers have been engraved that will be placed at the memorial. All donations are appreciated but there are categories which will receive special recognition-Bronze level \$250, Silver level \$500, Platinum level \$5,000 and Diamond level \$10,000. The committee is very appreciative of all who have donated.

As for most everyone, 2020 was not kind. That has not diminished the enthusiasm of completing this project. The project has required pylon engineering, "buttoning up" the jet for display, and ongoing fundraising. Future plans include painting of the jet, construction of the pylon, moving the jet to the permanent site, lifting the jet up onto the pylon, and completing the work on the Memorial Park.

At this time, help is still needed and more funds need to be raised. There are many individuals and businesses who have been very generous in donating services.

If your organization would like someone from the committee to speak at a meeting, committee members would be happy to do so.

Lady Broncos off to 3-0 start

The Orangeville-Aquin softball coop is off to a great start after taking third in state in 2021. Lon Scheuerell, the Broncos' Head Coach, is in his 21st season at the helm. Scheuerell's career record improved to 441-179 after Orangeville-Aquin got off to a 3-0 start for the 2022 season.

Scheuerell has big expectations for this year's team, as they return five starters from last season's 21-3 squad. The five returning starters are a talented core with senior shortstop, Tessa Janecke, and four sophomores in second baseman, Megan Holder, catcher, Meghan Carlisle, first baseman, Hanna Broge, and outfielder, Laney Holland. Three of those players were All-Conference players or better.

Janecke returns off a season in which she won the NUIC Most Valuable Player award, First Team All-Conference, and First Team All-State. While

Janecke is committed to play hockey at Penn State University her talent isn't lost on the softball field. The senior led the team offensively with nine homeruns and a batting average over five hundred. Holder provides another serious bat for the lineup as well as an exceptional wall in the middle infield. The sophomore second baseman returns off a season in which she posted a .445 batting average with two home runs, while earning Second Team All-Conference. Carlisle is another key factor on both sides of the ball as she comes off a freshman season with a .402 batting average while earning Second Team All-Conference Catcher.

The trio are expected to lead the way, but the Broncos have talent up and down their lineup. Scheuerell spoke about some holes the team will have to fill this year and how they plan to do so. "We will have to replace Tori Plowman who was our main pitcher, last year. We have a trio of pitchers that

we hope to use this season", Sherell shared. Those three pitchers include Leah Baker, Holland, and Janecke. While Plowman leaves big shoes to fill, Scheuerell is confident with Carlisle behind the plate.

The Broncos will also put a strong defense behind their pitchers as Scheuerell said, "We have a strong middle infield with Janecke at shortstop and Holder at second." With such a solid roster, it's no surprise to see such expectations surrounding the Broncos. Scheuerell spoke about the team's goals saying, "We hope to compete for a conference championship and have a postseason run." The Orangeville-Aquin head coach recognizes that is easier said than done, however. "The NUIC conference is going to be as tough as it has ever been since I have been coaching. Last year four of the six teams won Regionals", Scheuerell explained.

Freeport Police Department donates retired vests to Ukraine

The Freeport Police Department is donating 33 retired Kevlar vests to Ukraine to help keep their citizens safe as they defend their homes and country. These vests were declared as surplus by the Freeport City Council on March 21, as the vests are past insurance expiration and are unable to be used by Freeport police officers. "We are thankful that we can assist the Ukrainian people in safeguarding their families and homes," said Freeport City Manager, Randy Bukas.

Earlier this month, the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police sent out a notice to police departments across the state seeking vest donations.

These ballistic vests will be shipped to the citizens of Ukraine with no cost to the City of Freeport. The Freeport Police Department joins several other Illinois police departments like McHenry, East Dundee, and Orland in donating to this cause.

What you drink at lunch is as important as what you eat. Water is critical for all body functions and processes, which includes digestion. Some people try to beat the mid-afternoon slump with carbonated beverages. The sugar in sodas is quickly absorbed, causing your blood sugar to spike. While this may give you a temporary feeling of energy, it also triggers an insulin reaction that can turn that sugar into fat, all while your unbrushed teeth are being attacked by some strong acids. While diet pop eliminates some of the sugar in your diet, it also produces cariogenic acids. It has further been shown that diets sodas increase your cravings for sweets and lead to the consumption of more calories. So, save thousands of calories, ditch the spare tire, avoid diabetes, and cavities and rehydrate with fluoridated water throughout your day.

Lena-Winslow softball wins after two losses

The Lena-Winslow Panthers earned their first victory of the 2022 softball season after dropping their first two. Lena-Winslow Head Coach, Ryan Hahne, who is entering his ninth season with the team and his second as head coach has just three seniors on this year's roster in Zoe Bardell, Kamryn Cain, and Payton Scace. They have a strong class of six juniors supporting them, however, as well as eight sophomores and four freshman. It will certainly take a group effort from all four classes in order for the Lady Panthers to find success in 2022.

In their season opener the Panthers traveled to face off with the Forreston Cardinals on Tuesday, March 15. While the Panthers got off to a slow start, the Cardinals had the bats going early. After allowing two runs in each of the first three innings Lena-Winslow found themselves trailing 6-0 before they could even get settled in.

The Panthers would begin to claw their way back with

one run in the top of the fourth. They inched even closer with a three spot in the top of the fifth as the Cardinals quickly saw their lead diminish to just 6-4. Forreston would respond with their own three run inning in the bottom half, however. With the score now 9-4 the Panthers weren't unable to comeback in the final two innings.

Despite the loss Le-Win could hang their hats on their offensive performance. They combined for nine hits while scoring six runs and leaving four on base. Strikeouts were their downfall, however, as 12 swing and misses got in the way of the Panthers' momentum. Junior Kansas White was a bright spot for Le-Win, going three for four with three RBIs and one run scored. All three of her hits were for extra bases as she finished with a pair of doubles and a triple. Rachael Setterstrom, a freshman short-stop and pitcher, was two for four with two runs scored and a stolen base.

Freshman pitcher Madeline Chiles took the loss for the Panthers. In three innings Chiles allowed nine hits and

four earned runs. Despite getting hit well Chiles had the strikeout pitch working as she collected five strikeouts in her three innings of work. Setterstrom came in for relief as she pitched three innings. Despite allowing three more runs, none of them were earned as she allowed just six hits while striking out three. Le-Win fell by a final score of 9-6.

Two days later, the Panthers held their home season opener as they played host to a different set of Cardinals out of Stillman Valley. It was a pitcher's battle in the beginning. Setterstrom started the game for the Panthers and was excellent as she kept the Cardinals scoreless through the first three innings. Unfortunately, the Le-Win offense was also scoreless through the first three innings as both pitchers had it going.

Things would spiral out of control for Setterstrom in the fourth, however. The Cardinals tallied three homeruns off the freshman, allowing them to take the first lead of the game. After going scoreless in the top of the fifth, it was sophomore Kaidynce Lynch who came in

for relief in the bottom half. Lynch would give up three runs in her first inning two of which were earned. Once again, the Panthers found themselves trailing big with limited opportunities left.

In the top of the sixth the Panthers gave themselves hope by posting four runs. Kieran Madigan, Cain, Chiles, and Setterstrom each came in to score in the inning bringing the Panthers within two, down 6-4. The Cardinals quickly put an end to their run by bringing their top pitcher back in with Kaelyn Williams. Williams struck out three consecutive batters to end the game as the Panthers fell by a score of 6-4. Madigan led the way offensively, going two for three with two doubles, two RBIs, and one run scored. Lynch was one

for three with a pair of RBIs.

On Monday, March 21, it was a new week for the Panthers as they were looking fresh playing host to the Morrison Fillies. Chiles was exceptional in the circle for Le-Win as she pitched a complete game which was a benefit for Hahne as the rest of his hurlers got an added day off to start the week.

The Panthers found themselves trailing 2-1 as they came to bat in the bottom of the fourth. It was the small ball that got things going for Le-Win as they took advantage of a defensive error and some walks by the Fillies which allowed them to bring in three runs. Now up 3-2, it was the first lead the Panthers held all season.

They certainly were not going to surrender the lead either.

The Panthers tacked on a pair of insurance runs in the bottom of the fifth. Those runs were more than enough for Chiles, as she closed the game with three scoreless innings to give the Panthers their first win of the season. Chiles finished with a stat line of seven innings pitched, nine hits allowed, three strikeouts, two walks, and one earned run. The complete game was the freshman's first victory as a varsity pitcher.

Setterstrom was two for three at the plate with a pair of runs scored. Cain was one for two with two runs scored and Chiles went one for three with an RBI and one run scored. After facing off with Boylan Catholic and Galena, the Panthers will travel to face off with Newman Central Catholic, Wednesday, March 30.

Thus far, the team is living up to those expectations. On Tuesday, March 15, the Broncos opened their season with a matchup against Ashton-Franklin Center. The Broncos wasted no time getting to work on both sides of the ball as the offense was electric, while the pitching and defense shut AFC down. The Broncos got off to a 6-0 lead in just the first inning alone. They outdid themselves in the second inning by posting another eight runs. With Baker keeping AFC off the scoreboard and the Broncos rallying runs, Orangeville found themselves in a position to end the game early. Despite allowing a run in the top of the third, the Broncos would post another four in the bottom half. Freshman Addyson Wheeler came in to close the game out by holding AFC off the board in the top of the fourth, allowing the Broncos to win by a score of 18-1.

Although the offense put up

big numbers, it was the pitchers who shined for Orangeville. Baker, Holland, and Wheeler combined for a four-inning no-hitter in the season opener. Baker was the winning pitcher with two innings pitched, four strikeouts, and zero walks. Baker also finished the game with two hits and three RBIs. Sophomore outfielder Isabelle Talbert was two for two with an RBI, while Broge was also two for two with an RBI.

The next day the Broncos were originally set to travel and face off with Kirkland-Hiawatha. However, due to field conditions, the game was moved to Orangeville, allowing them to play on their home field.

The Broncos would put on another show as their momentum carried over from the night before. In the bottom of the second Orangeville-Aquin took a 4-0 lead when Holder hit a three-run homer and they did not look back. Holland was dealing from the circle as she pitched four innings, while striking out four and allowing just three hits. The Orangeville offense exploded for nine runs in the third inning when Holder added another RBI thanks to a double. Talbert was two for three, while senior first baseman Samantha Mock went two for four. Altogether the Broncos combined for 13 hits as they tallied 15 runs to beat Kirkland-Hiawatha 15-1.

On Thursday, March 17, the Broncos played host to the Eastland Cougars. Baker was in the circle as the Broncos' starting pitcher for the game and she had another impressive performance. The junior pitched all five innings while striking out six and allowing just five hits.

The first run of the game came in the bottom of the first when Janecke doubled to lead off the game. After stealing

third Janecke was able to score off a Holder ground ball and the Bronco stampede began.

Baker got the second inning started with a single to center field. Talbert followed with a walk and Mock reached base on a bunt, allowing the Broncos to load the bases with no outs. With a scoring opportunity in front of her, senior outfielder Emma Gustafson singled to right, bringing in Baker to score and keeping the bases loaded. Broge followed up with a single of her own driving in two runs and putting the Broncos up 4-0. Later in the inning Carlisle doubled with one out, driving in Broge and Janecke to go up 8-0.

Already holding the big lead Orangeville-Aquin would only extend their lead in the bottom of the fourth. Holder singled to get the inning started and Baker followed up with a double to center, bringing in Holder to score. With two outs, Mock hit a single to center, which allowed the Broncos to go up 10-0 and gave them an opportunity to end their third consecutive game early. Despite allowing the bases to get loaded with no outs in the top of the fifth, Baker came through one more time to ensure the Broncos' victory. Baker drew up a fly out, a strikeout, and a ground ball from three straight batters to put Eastland away 10-0.

It is not often you can call a team with just three seniors experienced, but the Broncos have one of the most experienced squads while also being one of the youngest. With Janecke, Mock, and Gustafson's leadership as seniors, there's no telling what the talented under-classmen will accomplish in their Orangeville careers. The Broncos will be back in action for the fifteenth annual Orangeville Softball Tournament on Friday, April 1 and Saturday, April 2.

Village of Lena news

2022 Brush pick-up ordinance

No person shall put on the street the following items : grass clippings, brush/branches, yard waste and leaves. All such items must remain off the pavement and on the easement grass area next to the street.

As a courtesy service to residents (residential only), the Village will provide the service of picking up brush/branches on the first and third Mondays of the month starting in April and ending in October. Said brush/branches may be placed by the street up to 24 hours before pick-up. The brush/branches may not exceed 4 inches in diameter or 4 feet in length. The amount picked up at any one pick up date may not exceed the size of one forty-four (44) gallon container. Any brush or branches exceeding these limits will not be taken by the Village and the property owner

will be responsible for removal. A container, while not required, is strongly encouraged and would be greatly appreciated to speed up pick-up and reduce Village operating costs.

Village residents may haul only grass clippings, brush/branches (sized as defined above), yard waste, and leaves to the respective areas marked south of the Village Street Department Building located off of Townline Road. Debris from complete tree removal must be disposed of by the resident/contractor privately and should not be brought to the Village site. Any trimming done by a contractor must be disposed of by the contractor, and cannot be taken to the Village site.

These facilities are monitored 24 hours a day, 7 days a week by cameras and violators will be fined based on the fines established in Section 11-99 of the ordinance code.

Storage containers

All residence and commercial properties are required to have a permit for temporary placement of a storage container or Pod on their property. A storage container can only be on the property for a maximum of 30 days. Contact the Village office for more information.

Village reminders

Hydrant Flushing - The Village Water Department will be flushing hydrants April 18 through April 29. Please do not wash clothing while the hydrant is being flushed in your neighborhood as it can cause a discoloration of your clothing.

Grass - Grass length on all properties in town must be kept at eight inches or less. Please do not blow grass clippings into the street as this could cause a blockage in the storm sewers during a rain event, thus leading to flooding.

Animals - The only animals permitted within village limits are cats and dogs. At this time no residence can have chickens, pigs, cows, or other domesticated animals. All animals are required to be on a leash when outdoors.

Board Meeting - The Village Board meets twice monthly on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of the month at 6 p.m. Everyone is welcome at the meetings. If you would like to speak at the meeting during public participation portion of the meeting please contact the village office by Friday at noon the week prior to the meeting to be added to the agenda.

ACH Payments - You can now pay your water bill via ACH, stop into Village Hall to pick up a form and learn more.



Shifts in food purchase patterns could be permanent

The pandemic greatly accelerated online food purchases and created a new revenue stream for many restaurants in the form of curbside sales.

And now, even as masks come off with the lifting of mandates at many locations around the U.S., those trends in the food industry are expected to continue or even grow.

Andrew Harig, vice president of tax, trade, sustainability and policy for the Food Industry Association, and Hudson Riehle, of the National Restaurant Association, discussed food industry trends during USDA's 98th annual Ag Outlook Forum.

"2021 was one of the most difficult years we've faced, even more so than 2020, with COVID, supply chain disruptions and inflation that carried into 2022," Harig said.

"Consumers are being remarkably resilient. We've seen a big rise in online shopping, but a real anxiousness to get back to stores to select items for themselves."

A recent survey shows consumers' preferred method of shopping is a combination of in-store and online at 35%, followed by 34% in-store only and 28% online. The remaining 3% reported no preference.

These shopping trends are expected to continue with nearly two-thirds of consumers now purchasing at least a portion of

their food online. The top influencers of food purchases are good value, product quality and overall price, Harig reported.

Meanwhile, the restaurant industry bounced back last year from tremendous losses in 2020, but nowhere near pre-pandemic levels. Restaurant sales totaled just \$659 billion in 2020 (down from a forecast entering the year of \$899 billion) before recovering to around \$800 billion last year.

"There has been some recovery from the depths of the pandemic," Riehle said. "And (sales) continue to improve, but it looks to be another year of transition."

The food service industry continues to deal with a shift in sales from in-house to takeout, high food and transportation costs, and a lack of available workers. Wholesale food price inflation jumped 7.8% last year.

Only six states had as many or more food service workers at the end of February compared to pre-pandemic levels, according to Riehle. In Illinois, the number of food service workers is still down about 12% compared to pre-pandemic levels.

"On-premises restaurant dining is still down significantly," Riehle said. "Drive-through, curbside and delivery has been a lifeline to the industry."

Looking ahead, Riehle foresees more streamlining of menus in restaurants to adjust for supply issues along with

the use of more technology and more online orders.

"It's going to be a while before we can make adjustments to get the supply side caught up," Harig said. "Really, for the first time, I think a lot of consumers are beginning to realize just how complex the supply chain can be."

And the situation is even more complex now due to drought in South America and the Russian invasion of Ukraine. Those two countries account for about 29% of global wheat exports.

"The inflation story is really an energy and food price spike story," Jacob Shapiro, chief strategist for Perch Perspectives, told FarmWeek.

In Europe, for instance, energy prices were up more than 28% year over year and food prices increased more than 5% while other items increased just 2.3%, Shapiro noted.

"The Russia-Ukraine war

will only exacerbate that," he said. "Unless (the two sides) reach a settlement soon, expect higher inflation, especially driven by energy and food prices."

Northwestern Illinois Community Action Agency, as administrator of the Home Energy Assistance Program in Stephenson and Jo Daviess Counties, is pleased to announce that funds are available to assist income-eligible households with their natural gas, propane, and electric heating bills, furnace assistance for homeowners, and emergency water bill assistance.

The LIHEAP program began Sept. 1, 2021 for all income-eligible households. Applications will be taken on a first-come first-served basis through May 31. All income-eligible households are encouraged to apply.

Applicants may apply for a DVP payment or the PIPP program. The Direct Vendor Payment (DVP) provides a one-time benefit payment for income eligible households to gas or propane and electric utilities and for reconnection assistance.

Applicants with ComEd and/or Nicor Gas as utility providers may have the option of choosing the Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP) instead of the DVP. The PIPP program is a bill payment program that assists eligible customers by paying a monthly state benefit while the customer pays a monthly payment based on a percentage of their household income. PIPP applications will be taken on a first-come first served basis until March 31, or until NICA has reached maximum capacity of households for the program.

LIHWAP assistance with a one-time payment on their water/sewer bills is available for approved LIHEAP/PIPP applicants with one of the following conditions: water service disconnected or imminent disconnection, or past due water/sewer bills of \$250 or more.

Please call the office at 815-232-3141 or 800-883-1111 between 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. to receive an application packet. Completed application packets and documents must be submitted by mail, email, drop box, or fax. Limited appointments for special needs may be made, depending on current conditions.


