Benefit planned for Bonnie Stuckey

Bonnie Stuckey has devoted her life to serving others and to blessing countless people through her teaching career and her musical giftedness. In December this past year, following oral surgery, she continued to experience ongoing concerns with pain and swelling that eventually led to emergency surgery on Feb. 19 at the University of Wisconsin Hospital in Madison. It appeared that she had a serious infection in the jawbone.

As a breast cancer survivor for over 30 years, it did not occur to her or her physicians that cancer might be the source of this problem, but a biopsy during surgery revealed that there was cancer in her jaw. Following that diagnosis, she went through a very extensive eight-hour surgery to remove her entire left jaw, all of her teeth and then to place a reconstructed jaw made partially from her own thigh muscle.

After a lengthy recovery, she had 30 radiation treatments at UW Hospital and six weeks of intense chemotherapy as part of an experimental trial. Through so much pain, exhaustion, and disruption of taste as well as difficulty swallowing, Bonnie has continued her positive focus, even returning to play the organ at her local St. Paul Church of Epleyanna whenever her doctors and her physical condition allow. She continues to need rehydration therapy at SSM Health in Monroe until she is able to sustain enough intake to maintain correct electrolyte balance.

Millennials getting priced out of farmland market

A significant increase in farmland prices and low turnover rate are making it more difficult for many farmers to expand their operations.

And perhaps the demographic of farmers getting squeezed the most in the current economic environment are millennials, those between the ages of 26 and 41, according to AgAmerica, the nation's largest non-bank agricultural lender.

It recently reported more than 40 percent of U.S. farmland is owned by people older than 65. And now younger generations, who often have fewer resources compared to veteran farmers, are facing another real estate barrier to enter the ag industry as farmland prices surge.

"It's so tough to maintain an operation when it comes to rising operating and input costs," Pat Spinosa, director

America has lost its way

America has lost its way, or so I worry. Can we get back on track?

What do we mean by The American Way? Each of us might define it differently, though I think there are some common threads.

In 1937, social commentator William Herberg gave it a shot in a lengthy paragraph, from which I extract here some key words: self-reliant, striving, success, humanitarian, idealistic, stewardship, character.

America helped save the

globe during World War II, with our sacrifice and materiel. When I grew up post-WWII, America was on top. The rest of the developed world was prostrate from war devastation. We had some swagger. We were positive and generous. It was a great

time to grow up.

I thought of America as perfect, though we weren't. After all, blacks were still being casually lynched in the South, and until this year, Congress hadn't been able to pass a simple anti-lynching law.

Since my childhood, other nations have been catching up with us, as would be expected of energetic, well-educated, emerging nations.

We also lost some of the kick in our step with our failure in Vietnam.

In the 1970-80s, we allowed our manufacturing base to be hollowed out. And we can't seem to climb up from mediocrity in educational achievement. This may not have been important when I was a kid, but is now. Our university

and government-sponsored research have been top drawer, yet China is investing much more in its rapidly developing research centers and universities (they know where the future lies!) than are we.

Nor can we seem to resolve our "us v. them" squabbles among whites, blacks and browns; elites v. rural folks, and regarding gender roles.

Further, luxury has a corrosive effect on the spirit, I would contend, possibly weakening our resilience as a people. On my three visits to China as a visiting professor over the past 15 years, I found that the Chinese are not that impressed with us, maybe agreeing with their supreme leader Xi Jinping that Americans have become soft.

Then, we have the mind-bending, unsettling, warp speed rate of change in our world, with digital devices pushing the human aside, or threatening to do so. And, of course, the pandemic. And now, medieval bestiality in Ukraine, which I had hoped, naively, we had evolved away from in the 21st century.

So, we have little swagger left. Where are we? Where are we headed?

Many of my senior generation appear to have

given up, taking their still fertile brains to Florida and the links. The political class on the Left appears to think the way out of our plight, if such we be in, is to shower us with government money. On the Right, the objective appears to be to protect the incredible wealth being scooped up by a tiny fraction of us.

From what I see among my former university students, our well-educated young are buoyant with energy and optimism, which is great. At 81, I think my generation, with its immense aggregate wealth, needs to do a better job of supporting my former students, and our grandchildren.

I have cynically mused that the U.S. could use a "good little war" to unite us in behalf of a renewal, an awakening. We have such a little war in progress in the Ukraine, plus an economic war with China. In the Middle Ages, war was economic development; today economic development is "war."

This can be seen by China's efforts to extend its sphere of dominant influence, from Southeast Asia to Africa.

Yet most Americans are so consumed with our pursuit of material stuff that we are

blithely ignorant of what is transpiring in the world beyond our border.

If anything, The American Way has been about success, achievement, stability, example. These are the really big issues that aspiring national leaders should be trumpeting to the American public. Yet, I fear many so-called leaders fear such declarations would fail to capture voter imagination and spirit, and so they tap into voter fears and anger. One of the downsides of democracy is that, to stay in office, leaders often become followers.

I smile when I see the bumper stickers: "Ask me how much I love my grandkids!" How much, indeed? Enough to provide them a stable nation and world? If we can do that, we will have reclaimed The American Way.

Everyone in Illinois is represented in Washington, D.C. by three legislators; your local member of Congress and two United States Senators.

Questions related to Social Security, Medicare, international affairs, immigration policy, and federal spending, for example, should be directed to your local Congressman and/or United States Senators.

Illinois' two United States Senators are Dick Durbin and Tammy Duckworth. Both have regional offices located throughout the state where you can contact them, or you can reach them online at durbin.senate.gov and duckworth.senate.gov, respectively.

To find your Congressman, all you have to do is enter your zip code on the

official website of the U.S. House of Representatives, www.house.gov. Then click on your Congressman's name and you will be automatically linked to their website, with contact information for getting in touch with the local office in your area. No matter where you live in northwest Illinois, you will have a new Congressman come January 2023, thanks to redistricting and the retirement of our area's two current members of Congress, 17th District Democrat Cheri Bustos and 16th District Republican Adam Kinzinger at the end of this year.

You are also represented in Springfield by one State Representative and one State Senator. Contact information for all of Illinois' 118 State Representatives and 59 State Senators can be found by visiting the Illinois General Assembly website, www.ilga.gov, or by calling the State of Illinois Directory Assistance line at (217) 782-2000. I currently represent the 89th House District, which includes all of Stephenson and Jo Daviess Counties in addition to portions of Winnebago, Carroll and Ogle Counties.

If you don't know whether your question or concern is local, state, or federal in nature, that's ok! Feel free to contact any of your elected officials and they can direct you to the right place.

Deadline extended for license, ID, permit registration

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White announced that expiration dates for driver's licenses, ID cards and learner's permits are being extended until Dec. 1. The previous extension was set to end on July 31. As a result, expired driver's licenses, ID cards and learner's permits will remain valid until Dec. 1, so customers do not need to rush into Driver Services facilities. This extension does not apply to commercial driver's licenses (CDL) and CDL learner's permits.

White's office expanded online renewals for expired driver's licenses and ID cards and continues to mail letters to eligible customers. The letter provides driver's license and ID card drivers with a unique PIN needed to renew online instead of visiting a facility and waiting in line. Customers may call 217-785-1424 to confirm their eligibility for online renewal or to obtain their PIN. They may also visit <https://apps.ilsos.gov/renewalldid/eligible.jsp>

look up their eligibility status. Customers who must visit a facility include first-time driver's license or ID card applicants, first-time REAL ID applicants and drivers ages 75 and older who are required by state law to visit a facility when renewing their license.

White continues to encourage people to conduct other business online at ilsos.gov. In addition to driver's license and ID card renewals for those who qualify, online services include obtaining a duplicate driver's license or ID card, ordering a driver record and purchasing license plate stickers.

White noted his office is also extending the expiration dates of Restricted Driving Permits (RDPs) to Dec. 1 for those that expired on or after Dec. 1, 2021 through Dec. 1, 2022.

As a reminder, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security has extended the federal REAL ID deadline to May 3, 2023.

Jesse White: Remove disability placards while driving

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White is reminding motorists to help improve road safety statewide, including not driving with disability placards or other items hanging from the rearview mirror.

"Disability placards must be displayed when the vehi-

cle is parked in an accessible parking space," said White. "Once the vehicle is moving, the placard should not be displayed. It is illegal to drive on roads with a parking placard hanging from the rearview mirror as stated on each placard issued by the Secretary of

State." People should not drive a motor vehicle with any objects obstructing the driver's view, placed, suspended, or hanging from the rearview mirror or between the driver and the front windshield, rear window, or side windows. Vi-

olators of this law can face up to a \$500 fine.

"One of my top priorities is road safety and driving with a placard or any other item displayed impairs the driver's view. Let's keep one another safe by making sure our windshields are unobstructed."

Public health officials announce 30,762 new cases of COVID-19 over the past week

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) reported 30,762 new confirmed and probable cases of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in Illinois, including 59 deaths since July 29.

According to the CDC, 59 counties are now rated at High Community Level for COVID-19. An additional 34 counties in Illinois are now rated at Medium Community Level.

Currently, IDPH is reporting a total of 3,594,415 cases, including 34,416 deaths, in 102 counties in Illinois since the beginning of the pandemic.

As of Aug. 4, 1,413 individ-

uals in Illinois were reported to be in the hospital with COVID-19. Of those, 140 patients were in the ICU and 51 patients with COVID-19 were on ventilators. The preliminary seven-day statewide case rate is 241 COVID-19 cases per 100,000 Illinoisans.

IDPH Director Sameer Vohra is urging parents and guardians to take the steps necessary to get children vaccinated, especially small children under 5 for whom COVID-19 vaccines were recommended by the CDC on June 18.

IDPH is supporting an education and outreach campaign by the Illinois Chapter of the

American Academy of Pediatricians to educate healthcare providers and parents about the effectiveness and safety of the newly authorized vaccines for children under 5.

The counties listed at High Community Level are Boone, Cook, DeKalb, DuPage, Grundy, Kane, Kendall,

Lake, Lee, McHenry, Ogle, Stephenson, Whiteside, Will, and Winnebago in northern Illinois; Adams, Brown, Cass, Champaign, Christian, Clark, Coles, Cumberland, Effingham, Fayette, Ford, Fulton, Henderson, Knox, Logan, Marshall, Mason, McDonough, Menard, Pike, Sangamon, Schuyler, and Warren

in central Illinois; and Alexander, Bond, Calhoun, Crawford, Franklin, Gallatin, Hardin, Jackson, Jersey, Johnson, Lawrence, Madison, Marion, Massac, Perry, Pope, Pulaski, Saline, Union, Wabash and Williamson in southern Illinois.

At the Medium Community Level, persons who are elderly or immunocompromised (at risk of severe outcomes) are advised to wear a mask in indoor public places. In addition, they should make sure to get up to date on their COVID-19 vaccines or get their second booster, if eligible.

This follows increases of Illinois farmland values between 2020 and 2021 of 26 percent for excellent ground to an average of \$14,700 per acre, 24 percent for good ground (\$10,710 per acre) and 21 percent for average land (\$7,455 per acre), according to the Illinois Society of Professional Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers.

Last year marked just the fourth time since 1970 Illinois farmland values increased 20 percent or more in a calendar year.

"We have to get the younger generation into farming but, with these farmland prices, many can't afford to buy a \$15,000 or \$20,000 piece of dirt and then have to deal with the high input costs on top of that," Spinosa said.

A low turnover rate of farmland, about 2 percent per year, and intense competition also continues to drive the market and put the squeeze on some potential buyers.

Farmers remained the top buyer of farmland in the state last year, but just barely, at 52 percent. Investors reeled in 33 percent of farmland purchases and institutions grabbed another 10 percent, with the remaining 5 percent made up of individuals who purchased land for recreational purposes, according to ISPFMRA.

"We do see a bit of inflation hedge with farmland," said David Oppedahl, senior business economist at the Chicago Fed. "Farmers and investors are interested in locking in value there through purchasing farmland."

"In the current inflationary environment, ag's been helped by some factors (commodity prices received by farmers increased 31 percent compared to last year, prior to a recent sell off in the market)," he noted. "At the same time, input costs are going up a lot, so that squeezes margins."

AgAmerica encourages farmers, particularly those among the younger generations, to build relationships with lenders and fellow farmers. Young farmers can also help farms advance in the future with the introduction of technology and by staying in touch with consumer needs, Spinosa noted.

"We've got a generational gap between who's farming now and we've got millennials coming into farming," he said.

"When you think about inflation, interest rates and

rising operating costs, now is the time to build relationships with lenders and have partnerships with someone who fits in your operation and helps you get through these tough times."

Building relationships is also vital for farmers in the highly competitive market for rental ground. Of the farmers enrolled in Illinois Farm Business Farm Management, just 23 percent owned their land, 30 percent was a crop share and 47 percent was a cash rental arrangement in 2021.

The not so skinny cook

Fall sports have begun, the band has had camp to prepare for Fall Festival and football games, the last of summer activities are being squeezed in, and time is marching on. This week we again feature the bountiful fruits and vegetables of the season. Try something new or revisit something old this week.

Summertime Corn Salad

If you are looking for a way to use up extra corn, this salad is a good one. It uses tomatoes and peppers to give the corn a lot of zip. If you can't find yellow tomatoes, you could substitute cherry tomatoes.

- 1/4 C. apple cider vinegar
- 2 T. sugar
- 3 t. extra-virgin olive oil
- 1/2 t. paprika
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1/4 t. pepper
- 6 ears fresh sweet corn, shucked
- 2 small yellow tomatoes, chopped (3/4 C.)
- 1 C. chopped orange bell pepper
- 1 C. chopped yellow bell pepper
- 2/3 C. chopped sweet onion

Dressing: Whisk together vinegar, sugar, oil, paprika, salt, and black pepper in a large bowl.

Salad: Cut corn kernels from cob (you will need about three cups of kernels). Blanch kernels in boiling water in a saucepan about 1 minute. Drain and rinse in a colander under cold running water to stop cooking. Transfer corn to bowl with dressing. Add tomato, peppers, and onion. Gently toss. Chill, covered, at least one-half hour or up to three days before serving.

Harvard Beets

One of my mother's favorite vegetables was beets. She loved to make Harvard Beets. I am not a beet lover, but I loved to see them in the vegetable bowl because they are beautiful. I read somewhere that Harvard Beets are a classic that has been around since at least 1910. It is known for its deep red color and was served at Harvard University. Crimson is Harvard's color, hence the name Harvard. The other story is that it was invented in a tavern in England that was called Harwood, and the Americans mispronounced to Harvard. Food history is one of my quirks, so I often read about it. You don't have to tell

me that my quirk is strange, because others have thought it strange for a long time. Now back to Harvard Beets...

- 3 medium whole beets, about a pound or 4 C. cooked, sliced beets
- 2/3 C. sugar
- 3 t. cornstarch
- 1/3 C. cider vinegar
- 1/3 C. water
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1/8 t. pepper
- 2 to 3 T. unsalted butter

Wash beets and leave an inch of stem and root end on each beet. Put the beets in a saucepan, cover with water and add about 1 T. salt per quart of water and bring the water to a boil. Reduce the heat; cover the pan and boil for 30 to 45 minutes or until the beets are tender. Drain beets and let them cool.

Slip off the skins. Slice the beets to your desired size. Combine the sugar and cornstarch in a saucepan. Whisk in the vinegar and water and cook over medium heat, stirring, until thickened. Add the sliced cooked beets and the salt and pepper and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer, stirring frequently for 6 to 10 minutes. Stir in butter and serve them hot.

You can use canned beets from the grocery store and skip the first paragraph. You can also wash the tops and use them in salads. Harvard beets can be frozen for later.

Pickled Beets

Since we seem to be on a beet roll this week, pickled beets are another way to use a bumper crop of these beautiful vegetables.

- 8 medium fresh beets
- 1 C. vinegar
- 1/2 C. sugar
- 1/2 t. whole cloves
- 1 1/2 t. whole allspice
- 1/2 t. salt

Scrub beets and trim tops to 1 inch. Place in a Dutch oven; add water to cover. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, covered 25 to 30 minutes or until tender. Remove from water; cool. Peel beets and slice. Place in bowl and set aside.

In a small saucepan, combine vinegar, sugar, cloves, allspice and salt. Bring to a boil; boil 5 minutes. Pour over beets. Refrigerate at least 1 hour. Drain before serving.

Pickled Eggs with Beets

My German ancestors never threw anything away. When the pickled beets were all eaten, there was the beautiful brine. Eggs were the answer to use this brine up.

Brine from pickled beets
12 hard boil eggs, peeled
In a small saucepan bring the brine to a boil. Place eggs in mason jars and pour brine over eggs. Cover tightly and refrigerate for 24 hours before

serving. My mother would arrange them in a pretty glass bowl. If we had company, they would be gone. However, if you had any left, put them in brine and cover. They will stay in the refrigerator for several days.

Creamy Lemon Chicken Pasta

Since the weather turned really warm again, this recipe is a good one to make on the stove. It has meat and vegetables along with the pasta. Serve with a salad and some bread, and dinner is ready.

- 1 T. olive oil
- 4 boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1/2-inch pieces
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1 t. pepper
- 1 carton (32 oz.) chicken broth
- 3 sprigs fresh basil
- 2 cloves garlic, thinly sliced
- 1 large lemon, zested and juiced
- 1 pkg. (16 oz.) rigatoni or penne pasta
- 1 C. Parmesan cheese
- 1/2 C. crumbled feta
- 2 C. fresh baby spinach

In a Dutch oven, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add chicken, salt and pepper; cook, stirring occasionally until lightly browned, about 5 minutes. Add broth, basil, garlic, and lemon zest; bring to a boil. Add pasta; cover and cook, stirring occasional, until tender, about 10 minutes.

Discard basil. Stir in lemon juice, parmesan, and feta until combined. Stir in spinach until wilted. Place on large platter and garnish with crumbled feta. Serve immediately.

Beef Stir-Fry with Sugar Snap Peas

Looking for something that

doesn't require a lot of cooking over a hot stove? This easy beef main dish can be made quickly. You do have to marinate the beef ahead of time, but it probably will marinate in the time it takes to chop the vegetables. I always buy the low sodium soy sauce to cut down on salt. The sugar snap peas have been appearing at the Farmer's Markets.

1 lb. sirloin steak, sliced into thin strips

- 2 T. cornstarch
- 6 T. soy sauce
- 1 1/2 t. sugar
- 1 T. rice wine vinegar
- 1 T. packed brown sugar
- 1 t. ground ginger
- 1/2 t. crushed red pepper (optional)
- 2 T. canola oil
- 1 C. thinly sliced onion wedges (about half an onion)
- 2 stalks celery, chopped
- 1 Carrot, sliced
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 3 C. sugar snap peas
- 1 yellow pepper, cut into bite-size strips
- 3/4 C. green peas

Put steak in a large bowl; sprinkle with cornstarch and stir to coat. In a small bowl, whisk together 1 T. soy sauce and sugar until sugar dissolves; stir into bowl with steak until combined. Chill, covered, at least 2 hours or overnight.

Stir Fry: whisk together remaining 4 T. soy sauce, rice vinegar, brown sugar, ginger, and crushed red pepper in a small bowl. Heat 1 T. oil in a large skillet or wok over medium-high heat. Add onion, celery, carrot, and garlic; cook, stirring, 3 minutes. Add snap peas, yellow pepper, and green peas; cook, stirring, until vegetables are crisp-tender, about 3 minutes more. Remove from skillet. Heat remaining ta-

blespoon of oil in skillet over medium-high heat. Add steak, cook, stirring occasionally to desired doneness, 3 to 5 minutes. Stir in vegetables and stir-fry sauce until combined.
