Stockton preparing for Fourth of July celebration

STOCKTON — Stockton, Ill. has a population of 1,900, but on July 4th thousands more people roam the Stockton Memorial Park to take part in festivities and witness an amazing fireworks display. This celebration is easily the largest and longest-running in the region, having grown into a "must-do" event throughout it's more than 50 years in existence.

The day starts off with a 3-on-3 basketball tournament in the Stockton school gyms. This tournament began in 2005 with only 32 teams, and since has grown into a 4th of July staple with at least 80 teams (limited to 100) coming back year after year to compete. Divisions range from boys and girls

entering 5th grade all the way through high school seniors. It also features very competitive men's and women's divisions. The tournament has become a "who's who" of current, former, and future northwest Illinois basketball stars. The 3-on-3 has donated over \$25,000 to Stockton youth sports and other various school organizations that have volunteered over the

Decades ago, as a young adult, Rowe once asked his mom what was in the small wooden box on the shelf and all she said was "some old stuff." It was not until 2002 that Rowe discovered the "old stuff" was a collection of nearly 50 letters written during the Civil War by Tucker to his wife, mother,

Daviess County. The Tuckers owned a farm just south of Stockton. Cyrus enlisted in the Army in Savanna in 1862.

Rowe shared the letters with a cousin, who transcribed the beautifully penned letters exactly as Cyrus wrote them, with little or no punctuation and numerous misspellings. In almost every missive there is an apology, "Excuse this auck-ward writing." And "Can you read my letters? I hope you don't show them to any boddy, they are so poor rote.'


Despite his lack of polished prose, what shines through Tucker's letters is his love and concern for his family, his belief in the Union's cause, and insight into the daily life of an ordinary soldier. By inference, we also glimpse how his beloved Mathilda is coping

Illinois Forage Expo to be held in Kent

Forage Expo will be held Tuesday, June 23 and hosted by Lawfer's Willow Valley Dairy Farm in Jo Daviess County. Located at 4389 South Willow Road, Kent, the event will start at 9 a.m. and conclude at 3 p.m.

The Forage Expo will consist of field demonstrations including mowing, raking, and harvesting plus commercial displays of forage related products and equipment. Also featured will be a tour of Lawfer's robotic milking system. In addition, educational sessions will be presented that focus on forage management.

Also, a Quality Hay & Haylage Contest will be available for producers to enter 2015 harvested hay and haylage bales. Entries in the Quality Hay & Haylage Contest must be delivered on site from 8:30 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. There is no entry fee and NIRS analysis will be provided free of charge. Bales weighing over 100 pounds need an official scale weigh ticket. Four hay classes and one haylage class will be available and class winners will receive a certificate. Producers are limited to one entry per class.

Specifically the Forage Expo site can be reached by taking US Route 20 west of Freeport, continuing west through the intersection of Route 20 and Illinois Route 73 for 6 miles, then turn south on South Willow Road and continue about

4 miles to the site. Watch for signs. There is no admission charge and food will be available for purchase on site.



SENATE WEEK IN REVIEW

June 1-5, 2015

SPRINGFIELD — With the General Assembly in the first week of a rare overtime summer session, work continues to address the major problems facing Illinois, including high property taxes; a dismal jobs climate; and a \$6.1 billion budget deficit—the largest of any state.

After a tense final week of May, the ball is squarely in the legislative Democrats' court, with few signs of compromise emerging. Instead, legislative Democrats continued fullsteam-ahead with partisan battle tactics—using a House committee hearing on June 3 to throw barbs at Gov. Bruce Rauner's education secretary, and a June 4 House floor session to force through a non-compromise compensation bill, immediately dismissed by Gov. Rauner as "phony."

Sadly, gridlock in Springfield is expected to continue. One June 9, the Senate will convene in a rare "Committee of the Whole" meeting to discuss freezing property taxes in Illinois. Late last week, legislative Democrats killed a Republican compromise proposal to freeze property taxes on a party-line vote in committee.

The battle in Springfield has a consistent underlying theme. Democrats are refusing to compromise and are pushing a major tax hike as the only solution. Republicans insist that pro-jobs reforms and property tax relief have to come before new revenues.

Rauner announces cuts;

Democrats propose giveaways

The difference between the two parties were clear this week, as Gov. Rauner and Senate Democrats pushed in two opposite directions in response to the looming \$6 billion budget deficit.

Rauner announced a total of \$400 million in spending cuts, in anticipation of a lack of agreement by the start of the next fiscal year on July 1. The cuts include:

Freezing all vehicle purchases for the state police

Grounding the state's airplane passenger service

Closing five state museums to visitors

Suspending the State Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (SLIHEAP)

Identifying one or two juvenile correctional facilities to close

No awarding of grants for the Department of Natural Resource's Open Space Land Acquisition Development Program in FY 2016

Immediate suspension of all future incentive offers to businesses, including Economic Development for a Growing Economy (EDGE) tax credits.

While Gov. Rauner began the process of anticipating an austere budget, due either to the absence of a compromise budget on July 1 or the Democrats' passage last week of a spending plan that's \$4 billion out of balance, Senate Democrats went in the opposite direction with a significant spending proposal that would put the state's balance sheet in even larger deficit. Their proposal includes:

Increasing in the state's minimum wage, to \$11 per hour in four years

Free tuition and fees at Illinois community colleges

employer-State-mandated paid sick time

A state tax credit for tuition and higher education

The Senate Democrats failed to provide a cost estimate for their proposals, or an analysis of how much further these proposals would put the state into

Illinois currently faces a \$6.1 billion budget deficit, by far the biggest of any state. Democrats passed a "spending plan" last week with a nearly \$4 billion deficit.

Concerns over national economy spill into Illinois

Last month, a troubling report from the U.S. Commerce Department showed reason for major concern over the national recovery. The report showing a 0.7 percent decline in the Gross Domestic Product, one of the most important economic indicators. The report continued to reflect "the weakest performance emerging from a recession in the post WWII period." The report also pointed to "softness" in retail sales, and a six-month low in consumer sentiment.

Illinois' economy is particularly susceptible to a weak national economy, with the worst credit rating of any state, a major budget deficit, and the loss of 300,000 manufacturing jobs since the turn of the century.

Illinois' jobless rate is currently at 6.0 percent, one of the highest in the Midwest and well above each of our neighboring

The weakened state of the economy is further proof of why Republicans continue to push for pro-jobs reforms, and a change to the broken status quo that contributed to a stagnant

Illinois economy.

Papers: Rauner/Republicans on the right track

Editorial boards have expressed concern for a wide variety of troubles facing Illinois. As the debate unfolds in Springfield, many have continued to call for a change from the status quo.

On June 2, the Chicago Tribune editorialized: "Their party [the Democrats] lost the governorship because the people of Illinois were fed up with the status quo. That hasn't changed. The people want to fix how this sorry state does business."

On June 3, an editorial in the Chicago Sun-Times said that "Rauner came into office vowing to "shake up" Springfield, which is why we endorsed him, and this is what a shake-up looks like. He is right to demand basic pro-business reforms before he will even talk about raising taxes to fill a budget hole of more than \$3 billion. No sense putting good money after bad."

itizen Lincoln Project unveiled

SPRINGFIELD — Local artist Ramon "Jay" Castro crafted and donated a 27 inch bronze sculpture of Captain Abraham Lincoln to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum Wednesday, May 27, 2015. The sculpture was created to remind the nation of history of the Black Hawk War of June, 1832, which included citizen soldier Abraham Lincoln.

State Representative Brian Stewart (R-Freeport) introduced the artist and promoted the project during an unveiling

at the 16th President's Library.

"The sculpture is absolutely stunning," said Rep. Stewart. "Jay's vision for the project was tremendous. However, we need all the help we can get to finish what he started, which is a 7foot bronze sculpture of Captain Lincoln. The small scale sculpture on display at the library should help promote the project, but we need everyone back at home to help as

not-for-profit proj-The ect, sponsored by Stephenson County, is aiming to place a 7 foot bronze sculpture of Captain Abraham Lincoln at the Black Hawk War Memorial, located near Kent, Illinois, site of the 1882 Kellogg's Grove battle. The Lincoln sculpture will complement the National Historic Plaque, laid in 1969.

Combine the honey, mustard, green onions, and salt in a jar with a lid. Add the oil, lemon juice, and vinegar; secure the lid and shake the jar until dressing is combined and lightly thickened. Put the lettuce in a large bowl, and drizzle with desired amount of dressing. Toss well to coat. Serve immediately.

The spring salad would be a great side with this bow tie pasta recipe. I think you could use the rotisserie chicken if you didn't want to cook your own chicken. I really like the flavor

of the yellow squash, so this dish has both the meat, starch, and vegetable all rolled into

Bow Tie Parmesan Chicken

1 pkg. (16 oz.) bow tie pasta 5 T. butter, divided

1 lb. boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch piec-

1 t. salt, divided

1 t. pepper, divided

2 medium yellow squash or zucchini, cut into 1-inch pieces

3 T. flour

2 garlic cloves, minced

1 1/2 C. milk

3/4 C. grated Parmesan cheese

In a large stockpot, cook pasta according to package directions. In a large skillet, heat 1 tablespoon butter over medium heat. Add the chicken and cook and stir 7 -9 minutes or until no longer pink. Add 1/4 teaspoon each of salt and pepper; remove from pan. In the same pan, heat 1 tablespoon of butter over medium heat. Add the squash and cook and stir 3-5 minutes or until tender. Remove from the heat.

In a small saucepan, melt 3 remaining tablespoons of butter over medium heat. Stir in flour and garlic until blended; gradually whisk in the milk. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly; cook and stir 1-2 minutes or until thickened. Remove from heat and stir in cheese and remaining salt and

Drain the pasta and return to pot. Add the chicken, squash and sauce, heating through and stirring to combine. Garnish with parsley and shaved parmesan when serving.

Are you looking for an easy Mexican dish to serve? This one is a time saver because many of the ingredients are already prepared. If you can't

find the canned Spanish rice, you can use the Spanish rice in an envelope; you will have to prepare it before adding it to the recipe. The Mexican cheese blend is very easy to find. Enjoy this lasagna-like Mexican casserole.

Layered Mexican Casserole

1 lb. ground beef

1 jar (16 oz.) chunky salsa 8 corn tortillas (6 inch)

1 can (16 oz.) refried beans

1 1/2 C. shredded Mexican cheese blend

1 can (15 oz.) Spanish rice or an envelope of Spanish rice mix (1 3/4 cups of rice)

1 C. coarsely crushed tortilla

Preheat the oven to 350. Spray an 11 x 7 inch (2 quart) baking dish with cooking spray. In a 10-inch skillet, cook the beef over medium-high heat 5-7 minutes, stirring frequently, until thoroughly cooked; drain and stir in 1 cup of the salsa; heat about 2 minutes or until hot.

Line the baking dish with 4 tortillas, overlapping to fit. In a medium bowl, stir together refried beans and remaining salsa; spoon over the tortillas and spread evenly. Top with half of the meat mixture and 3/4 cup of the cheese. Layer 4 more fortillas over the cheese. Spoon and spread Spanish rice over the tortillas. Top with remaining meat mixture and cheese and top with tortilla chips. Bake 30-40 minutes or until hot in the center and bubbling along the sides.

This rhubarb dessert is a rustic one; you make it as a tart. I love making tarts because the crusts don't have to be as perfect as one you would make for a pie. You really do need a deep-dish pie pan (I use the word pie pan loosely,) because the filling will run out of a regular pie pan. Those rhubarb recipes just keep coming!

Rhubarb Tart with Almond Streusel

1 1/2 lb. rhubarb, cut into 1/2-inch pieces

1 C. sugar, divided

2 T. cornstarch

1/2 t. salt, divided 1/4 t. almond extract

1/4 C. flour

1 refrigerated piecrust

2 T. brown sugar

1/2 t. cinnamon

2 T. cold unsalted butter, cut into 1/2 inch pieces

1/4 C. chopped almonds

Combine the rhubarb, 3/4 cup sugar, cornstarch and 1/4 t. salt in a saucepan over medium heat. Cook until sugar dissolves and rhubarb begins to release its juices, stirring frequently. Reduce the heat to medium-low and cook until the rhubarb softens but some chunks remain, stirring occasionally. Stir in almond extract and remove from the heat. Let cool to room temperature.

Preheat the oven to 350. Let the piecrust stand at room temperature for 15 minutes. Line the tart pan with the dough. In a food processor, place the flour, brown sugar, cinnamon, 2 T. white sugar and remaining 1/4 t. salt in the bowl of the processor, Pulse to combine. Add the butter and pulse until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Transfer to a bowl and mix in almonds.

Lightly sprinkle the tart shell with white sugar. Spoon the rhubarb mixture into the tart shell. Sprinkle the streusel over the filling. Place on a rimmed baking sheet. Bake until crusts and streusel are golden brown and the filling is bubbling, about 25 minutes. Serve slightly warm or at room temperature.

This recipe was sent to me by a reader last year. It was labeled "Best Ever Strawberry Pie." I didn't put the best ever on the title because I have had some darn good strawberry

pies in my life, and I can honestly say that a lot of them were "Best Ever."

Fresh Strawberry Pie

2 C. flour

2 t. sugar

1/2 t. salt 2/3 C. shortening

1 T. white vinegar

4-5 T. milk

Filling:

1 pkg. cream cheese (8 oz.) oftened

3/4 C. powdered sugar

2 t. grated lemon

1/2 t. lemon extract

Topping 6 C. fresh strawberries, hulled

3/4 C sugar

1 T. cornstarch

1/4 t. salt

1 C. water 1 pkg. (3 oz.) strawberry

gelatin 1 t. butter

In a large bowl, mix flour, sugar, and salt. Cut in the shortening until crumbly. Gradually add the vinegar and milk, tossing with a fork until the dough holds together when pressed. Shape into a disk and wrap in plastic wrap. Refrigerate 1 hour or overnight.

On a lightly floured surface, roll the dough to a 1/8-inch thick circle; transfer to a 9-indh deepdish pie plate. Trim pastry to 1/2 inches beyond the rim of the plate. Flue the edges and refrigerate 30 minutes. Preheat the oven to 425.

Line the pastry with a double thickness of foul. Fill the pie with dried beans. Bake on a lower oven rack 20-25 minutes or until the edges are golden brown. Remove the foil and beans; bake 3-6 minutes longer or until the bottom is golden brown. Cool completely on a wire rack.

In a bowl, beat the cream cheese, powdered sugar, lemon peel and extract. Spread carefully into the crust and refrigerate while preparing the topping.

Place the strawberries in a large bowl. In a small saucepan, mix sugar, cornstarch, salt and water until blended. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Cook and stir 1-2 minutes longer or until thickened and clear. Remove from the heat and stir in the gelatin until it dissolves. Stir in butter. Pour over the strawberries, tossing gently to coat. Arrange over the filling. Refrigerate at least 4 hours to set.

I got my first taste of fresh strawberries from the Farmer's Market on Saturday. They were so sweet and tender, and I remembered why this time of the year is one of my favorites. If you are in the mood for strawberries, don't forget the St. Joseph Catholic Church's Strawberry Festival on Wednesday, June 10. They have great homemade food and even better strawberry pie. It is a great treat for the summer to enjoy the food from the church's strawberry festival.

I am not a follower of horse racing, but I was glad to see that American Pharaoh won the Triple Crown. It had been way too long for a horse not to have won that. I heard on the television that some owners hold their horses back just so they can try to stop a Triple Crown winner. I am glad this rather unsuspecting horse beat everybody at its own

Abnormal posture affects neurology

remier chiropractic in Stockton Illinois has been certified in CBP technique for over 13 years. This article explains just some of the science behind what we do every day. In his texts and journal articles, Alf Breig reviewed the Adverse Mechanical Tensions on the Central Nervous System from abnormal postural loads. Most doctors are aware of the traction on the hindbrain, cranial nerves 5-12, cervical cord, and spinal nerve roots from flexion of the head and neck, which can be correlated to kyphotic cervical configura-

Wow that was a mouthful, what that means in plain English is when the neck curve is reversed or reduced, it pulls on the nerves and spinal cord. However, few have read Breig's work in sufficient detail to realize that he investigated a multitude of different postures and their adverse affects on the CNS. In 1999, Harrison et al. authored a series of reviews of the literature on deformations of the CNS from postural loads. It is obvious from these references that abnormal posture affects the nervous system, i.e. abnormal posture is a type of subluxation (two or more ver-



tebrae that have been moved from their normal position) as it has the necessary two components of spinal misalignment and nerve interference.

In 2002, Koch et al. described the circumstances consistent with the deliverance of a chiropractic spinal adjustment as "an asymmetry in the horizontal (front) and sagittal (side view) planes of body posture and motion." Such asymmetries in posture and motion adversely affect the nervous system through several mechanisms, as follows:

1. Abnormal afferent (sensory nerves) input into the central nervous system. Abnormal afferent input into the central nervous system has been linked to sudden infant syndrome, balance problems, visual disturbances, tinnitus, imbalance between the sympathetic and parasympathetic nervous systems, and impaired development of the pediatric central nervous system.

2. Tethering (adverse prolonged stretching) of the central nervous system. This results in spinal cord ischemia and consequent motor, sensory, and autonomic neurological dysfunction. Tethering of the spinal cord has been linked to demylenating diseases (example-M.S.).
