## Jo Daviess County Country Fair Charities, Inc. hands out grants

GALENA — For the 12th straight year, Jo Daviess County Country Fair Charities, Inc. (JDCCFC) handed out grants to not-for-profit organizations within the county at a presentation on Thursday, June 18 at the Elks Club in Galena.

JDCCFC gave out grants to 27 local not-for-profit organizations for a total of \$45,868.70. In addition, \$15,505 was given out to churches and organizations that supplied workers for the 2014 fair. The City of Galena received \$10,000 and \$500 was donated to the Galena Police Department, who helped with parking, and the Galena EMS, who were on hand at the fair for any emergencies. These funds translate to \$72,373.70 given out this year and a total of \$807,259 given out in the 12 years of the organization's

"To accomplish this with all volunteers is impressive and, as you can imagine, we are very proud we've been able to do

this," said JDCCFC President Chuck Jackson.

FHN Family Counseling and Sojourn House received &750 for dual diagnosis treatment collaborative and the FHN Family Counseling Center received \$1,250 for their Big Brother/Big Sister program.

Dr. Jennifer Aurand, who accepted both grants, explained the two organizations.

"We work with people with mental health problems and substance abuse problems. With Sojourn House, we've been able to pool our resources to attack these problems."

"For the Big Brother/Big Sister program, we're always looking for fun, family-oriented activities and we'll use the funds for playing games or for taking the little brothers and sisters to events."

The Warren Area Ambulance Service received \$2,991.75 for a stair chair upgrade. "A stair chair is a chair with a track on the back that helps two peo-

## Stockton Veterans Memorial to be dedicated on July 3

STOCKTON — The Stockton Veterans Memorial Committee wishes to thank the community and specifically the dedicated Area Businesses and Organizations that helped complete the veterans memorial.

The Memorial Committee formally organized on February 4, 2010 with 13 citizens and local Veterans signing the original by-laws with the following mission statement.

During the planning and constructionperiod various fund-raisers were conducted; brat sales, pancake breakfast, raffles and concerts. Direct mail and newspaper campaigns were initiated. also We are very thankful to the members of the Stockton community for your support.

Construction started in the spring of 2014 with the assistance of Ernie Lieb, a mili-

tary veteran of the community. Many area businesses and organizations were instrumental in the construction of the memorial. Donors are recognized on the donor wall at the entrance to the memorial. Our efforts were realized in October when the granite walls,



ple safely assist a person up or down the stairs," said Lucas Bourquin. "We have them in two of our ambulances and this one will go in our third."

The Galena Center for the Arts got a grant for \$1,800 for their Friday at the Movies series for children and the East Dubuque Fire Department received \$1,930 for a Paramedic equipment upgrade. The Jo Daviess County Sheriff's Mounted Patrol was given \$1,000 to purchase portable radios.

The Stockton Police Department received \$800 to help with Explorer Post 105, being founded by the Stockton and Warren Police Departments. The Stockton Police Youth Club also received \$1,000 to help pay for snacks and pay for programs for the town's children.

The Galena Elks Lodge was given \$2,000 for their annual Christmas Food Basket program. In the program, they give out 450 baskets throughout the county.

Several churches were given money for their assistance programs that help local citizens by paying bills for those having trouble getting by, or giving gas cards to people in need of traveling to see loved ones in hospitals. Warren United Methodist Church was given \$1,000. The Church of St. Mary in Elizabeth/St. John's in Hanover received \$1,200. St. Mary's Catholic Church and St. Michael's Catholic Church, both of Galena, were each given \$2,000 to help assist destitute individuals. The Stockton Ministerial Association received \$1,500 to help pay for hotel rooms for people in emergency

The Jo Daviess County Sheriff's Office was given \$2,694 to

replace their radar units.

Lt. Tim Wand said "some of the radar units are 15-20 years old. No one likes getting tickets, but everyone likes people to go the speed limit, so it's a necessity to replace them."

The Workshop in Galena, who employ people with developmental disabilities, received \$3,400 for an industrial water softener replacement. The Workshop has a commercial laundry that helps employ about 14 people and the upgrade will not only keep their customers happy, but it will keep the laundry in business.

Stockton Ambulance received \$1,620.95 for infant/pediatric cables for monitoring pulse. "We've been helping, unfortunately, more and more pediatrics," said Deb Heidenreich. "The equipment for adults doesn't work as well for the pediatrics."

The Galena Kiwanis Club received \$2,480 and the Galena High School Key Club received \$1,112 for their joint project of the upgrade of the Tot Lot Park.

Caring Neighbors Food Pantry in Warren was given \$2,000 to supply milk and food to fam-

ilies. "The goal of the food pantry is to keep families well-fed and healthy so they can lead and have an active life in our community," said Joyce Kent. "We do not handle milk in our facility, so we can use this to give tickets to people to buy locally."

The United Churches of Galena Food Pantry received \$3,500 for their Children's Backpack project. The Galena Community Garden was given \$325 for seeds, plants and organic products.


Elizabeth Community Ambulance was given \$1,000 to update their pagers. The Stockton Fire Department was also given \$1,715 to replace their pagers.

The Warren Fire Department received \$1,050 to purchase five Halligan bars. "Halligan bars are multi-purpose tools that can pry for forcible entry in a car accident or a house fire. We currently have two. This will help put one on every truck," said Paul Gray.

## SENATE WEEK IN REVIEW

#### June 15-19, 2015

SPRINGFIELD — Illinois lawmakers met for a one-day session June 16, but neither chamber addressed the state's budget issues, focusing instead on college affordability in the Senate, and restructuring the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity in the House of Representatives.

Also during the week, Illinois Auditor General Bill Holland announced his retirement; Illinois farmers continue to make progress on the state's crops despite a series of torrential rains in nearly every region; and a new report shows Illinois cities are losing population.

#### **Budget showdown** now in third week

The state's fiscal year comes to an end June 30, but the Governor and lawmakers are not any closer to a final solution to the Fiscal Year 2016 budget.

Democrat leaders have yet to send most of their budget package to the Governor's desk despite passing it nearly a month ago. However, Gov. Bruce Rauner has indicated he will not sign the Democrat

leaders' budget, which even House Speaker Michael Madigan and Senate President John Cullerton acknowledge is out of balance by more than \$3

Republican lawmakers have continued a steady drumbeat in their quest for meaningful government reforms to help Illinois move beyond the past 12-plus years of one-party dysfunction. They have joined the Governor in consistently expressing a willingness to work together with their Democrat counterparts on the state's budget, beginning with compromise on job-creating, economy-boosting reforms.

#### **Committee of the Whole** on higher education affordability

On June 16, the Senate met for another Committee of the Whole to discuss higher education affordability.

A number of panelists talked about need-based aid, community college funding formulas, and state support of the university system. They noted how much state tuition, fees and other associated costs had risen over the past decade. We asked

witnesses for insight into how to reduce administrative and tuition costs within the state's higher education system as a way to reduce the cost burden on students and parents in Illi-

Senators will return to the Capitol on June 23 for another Committee of the Whole, to discuss the minimum wage and sick leave policies.

#### **Auditor General** to step down

On June 17, Illinois Auditor General Bill Holland announced his intention to step down as the state's chief fiscal watchdog on Dec. 31. Holland has held the position for 23 years and has been a wellrespected staple of Illinois government during the tenure of five Governors.

Holland's January 2009 testimony during the Senate trial of former Gov. Rod Blagojevich was seen as key to the nowfelon's eventual removal from office. Holland's service to the people of Illinois was especially critical during the Blagojevich Administration's six years of abject fiscal failure.

His office also handled the

more recent audits of the now infamous NRI-scandal, which former Gov. Pat Quinn's Administration handed out \$55 million in state grants as part of his questionable and poorly managed crime reduction initiative. In 2014, Holland released a scathing audit of the program that Quinn launched prior to the 2010 election for Governor. Since that time, there have been several criminal grand jury probes into the NRI program, as well as a legislative audit.

#### Illinois farmers continue to battle weather

Rainy weather continues to hamper farmers' efforts to get back into the fields to finish planting soybeans and harvesting hay. According to the United States Department of Agriculture, statewide precipitation averaged 3.24 inches, leaving only 2.3 days rated as suitable for fieldwork. The average temperature last week was 75.8 degrees, which is 4.6 degrees higher than normal.

The state soybean crop is now 90% planted, up just two percentage points from last week, and still below the fiveyear average of 92%. 84% of

the soybean crop has emerged from the soil.

Hay producers have finished with 81% of their first cutting of the year, which is identical to the same time period last year, and just one percentage point behind the five-year average.

#### Illinois losing population

Recent media reports have shown that Illinois is the only state in the Midwestern region that lost population from 2013 to 2014. The Land of Lincoln lost nearly 10,000 residents and an overwhelming number of communities are losing population at an alarming rate. Central and Southern Illinois continues to experience the largest losses, and even Chicago's population has nearly stagnated for the past couple years.

Some suburban communities experienced population increases, but nothing approaching the Great Recession levels of pre-2008. In fact, only the communities of Naperville and Elgin saw meaningful growth. However, even with this growth, the state's overall population decreased overall, especially when coupled with the losses in Decatur and Rockford.

#### all know what is really happening in Springfield Letting you

ve been inundated with inquiries regarding the "inside" happenings of Springfield. Constituents have seen the news, press conferences, and the attack mailers circulating the state and while two sides initially engaged in a dialogue, it has devolved into

one side yelling and the other side trying to have a conversation. Some of you reading this have questioned, why the Republicans keep voting "present" on the "Governor's legislation." Well, Democratic leadership continues to play games with the lives of our

citizenry by creating a budget that is \$4 billion over projected tax revenue. When the government doesn't have the money, it means a tax increase on all of us. Governor Rauner and many Republicans across the state have refused to consider a tax hike without structural reform. This means Republicans refuse to vote for a tax increase until the Democrats will implement changes to our system that would drive Illinois back to more prosperous times. My friend, colleague, and House Minority Floor Leader, Representative Ron Sandack, recently wrote an incredibly succinct synopsis of the shenanigans in Springfield.

Rep. Sandack is excerpted below:

"Illinois' voters elected a Republican Governor and a Democrat-controlled House and Senate. That means there are Democrats who voted for Bruce Rauner because they want the state's fiscal crisis addressed once and for all. Divided, or I prefer shared, government is still very new in Illinois and there have definitely been some growing pains. Because the majority party has

controlled the House, Senate and the Governor's office for the last 12 years, there formerly was a noticeable lack of checks and balances. Democrat lawmakers could push their agenda through knowing former Governors Quinn and Blagojevich would likely sign it. Simply put, they've been used to getting their way. Now, the majority party must deal with a Republican Governor who has pledged to veto bills that keep Illinois on a bad financial path. This is not sitting well with House Speaker Madigan and Senate President Cullerton. Governor Rauner came to Springfield on January 12 ready to tackle important issues, and formed numerous bipartisan working groups which included Republicans and Democrats from both the House and Senate. He wanted these bipartisan

and bicameral groups to negotiate and compromise until common ground could be found in several areas. Governor Rauner's plan to turn things around in Îllinois includes several reform initiatives that aim to reduce fraud, waste and abuse, and make Illinois a businessfriendly state to increase job growth. The Governor also said he would entertain an increase in revenue, but only after some of his reform initiatives were approved by lawmakers. To that end, the following reform bills were filed in the House in May Republicans:HJRCA39: Term Limits; HJRCA40: Fair Maps; HB4223: Workers Compensation Reform; HB4224: Property Tax Freeze and Voter Empowerment for Local Collective Bargaining; HB4214: Allowing for Municipal Bankruptcy; and HB4222: Lawsuit (tort) Reform.

Speaker Madigan has said he does not think budget talks should be tied to non-budget issues, but the Governor is adamant that they be discussed together. Why? Because Illinoisans need only look back at



Cook rigatoni according to package directions. Sprinkle the chicken with garlic salt, and then add the flour and toss to coat. In a large skillet, heat 1 tablespoon oil over medium high heat. Add chicken and cook and stir 4-5 minutes or until no longer pink. Remove from the pan.

In the same skillet, heat remaining oil over mediumhigh heat. Add the mushrooms and garlic; cook and stir until tender. Add chicken broth, wine, parsley, basil, salt, pepper, red pepper flakes and chopped tomatoes; bring the mixture to a boil. Stir in the chicken and heat through. Drain the rigatoni and add to the chicken mixture. Sprinkle with cheese and toss to coat.

This next recipe is a takeoff on the popular strawberry pretzel dessert. It adds the cool taste of lime to change it up just a little. You bake the pretzels in a large pan and let them cool. You add the pretzels to the cream cheese and use it as a base. It makes for a great base for the strawberries and lime. Enjoy this great and cool chiller of a dessert on a hot summer night.

#### Strawberry-Lime Bars

2 C. finely crushed pretzels 3/4 C. sugar, divided 1/4 C. butter, melted

2 C. boiling water

1 pkg. (6 oz.) strawberry gelatin 1 lb. fresh strawberries,

chopped 2 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese,

softened

1 T. grated lemon peel 1/4 C. lime juice

1 t. vanilla

Preheat the oven to 350.

Place crushed pretzels and 1/4 cup sugar in a small bowl; stir in the melted butter. Spread into an ungreased 15 x 10 x 1 inch baking pan. Bake 9-11 minutes or until golden brown. Cool completely.

In a large bowl, add the boiling water to gelatin; stir 2 minutes to completely dissolve. Gently stir in strawberries. Cool slightly and refrigerate for 30 minutes.

In a large bowl, beat the cream cheese, lime peel, lime juice, vanilla remaining sugar until blended. Stir in cooled pretzel mixture (yes the baked pretzel mixture). Spread into an ungreased 9 x 13 baking pan. Top with strawberry mixture. Refrigerate, covered, for 2 hours or until firm.

The last recipe is for an easy rhubarb cake. You can use all white sugar if you wish, but the brown sugar gives it just a little different flavor. Try yet another rhubarb recipe and let us know what you think.

#### Grandma's Rhubarb Cake

#### **Batter**

2 C. flour

1 C. white sugar

1/4 C. brown sugar, packed

1 t. baking soda

1/2 t. salt

2 eggs, beaten

1 C. sour cream or plain yogurt 2 C. diced rhubarb

#### Topping

1 C. sugar

1/4 C. butter, softened 1/4 C. flour

Cinnamon

Preheat the oven to 350. Grease and flour a 9 x 13 baking dish. In a large bowl, stir together the flour, sugar, baking soda, and salt. Add the eggs and sour cream and stir until smooth and fold in the rhubarb. (Batter will be thick and barely cover the rhubarb.) Pour into the baking dish and spread evenly.

er the sugar and butter until smooth. Add the flour and stir until mixture is crumbly. Sprinkle on top of batter. Dust lightly with cinnamon.

Bake until toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, about 45 minutes. Cool the cake for 1 hour before cutting.

the temporary tax hike of 2011 to see that simply pouring more money into the state's coffers does nothing to fix the structural reforms that have driven the state into the ground. Budgeting without reforms means the status quo continues. The voters of Illinois sent a clear message in November that the status quo is no longer acceptable. Governor Rauner and Republican lawmakers have shown [their] willingness to compromise. Empowerment Zones, or right to work zones, were an initial element of the Governor Rauner reform agenda, but he has since agreed to remove that item from the table for consideration. In fact, recently the Governor unilaterally removed other items from the table too. These compromises were met by Speaker Madigan with more digging in of his heels and a renewed refusal to budge. Democrats ultimately walked away from the bipartisan working groups and said they are not interested in reforms. In fact, in spite of the Governor's clear directive of reform before taxes, Speaker Madigan has held all six reform measures in the Rules Committee and has refused to bring them to the House floor for full consideration. By not allowing the reform bills to be heard, Speaker Madigan, by his own actions, took discussions of reform, and therefore new revenue too, off the table. [Democrats created passed a] budget with zero input from the Republicans and zero input from the Governor's Office. Speaker Madigan said "no" to bipartisanship and "no" to reforms, but now he wants bipartisan votes on a tax increase that he knows will be incredibly unpopular. Without reforms, the Republicans are not going to support an increase in rev-

to raise taxes, they have the supermajority votes in both chambers to make it happen. With the normal session adjournment date of May 31 now passed, the Speaker is calling the Representatives back to Springfield one day each week. Are we being called down so we can negotiate a balanced budget prior to the end of the current fiscal year on June 30? No. Are we being called back to consider the reform bills that represent the Rauner plan to help fix our state? No. We are being called to Springfield for a series of show trials where the Speaker is making a mockery of the process, and is collecting sound bites and roll call votes for the next election cycle where he hopes to strengthen his super-majority. It truly has been Springfield at its absolute worst. What you're seeing on the House floor right now is insincere legislation, sponsored by Speaker Madigan's leading allies and masked as "Rauner bills," that are part of a plan to thumb their noses at bipartisanship and reform. Their bills are not just insincere; they are sham legislation meant to embarrass the Governor. As a House Republican Caucus we are not supporting the sham legislation that is being sponsored by the Democrats that Speaker Madigan controls. We are standing together and refusing to be bullied into

enue. If the Democrats want

maintaining a status quo that has all but destroyed our state. At this point we have a spending plan of \$36 billion, projected revenues of \$32 billion, and a controlling party that has said no to spending discipline, no to job-creating reforms, no to fair maps/redistricting and no to term limits, while asking for bipartisan votes on a tax hike. In a negotiation, each side needs to give something up. Governor Rauner took several of his reform measures off the table; now let's see the Democrats give something up. Republicans remain ready to negotiate, and hope the Democrats return to the table so we can engage in an honest discussion about compromise and get past this stalemate. The citizens of Illinois voted for shared policy-making and lawmakers now need to work together to make that happen."

Asking the people of Illinois for an additional \$4 billion in tax dollars reminds me once again of a quote by Thomas Jefferson, "I predict happiness for Americans, if they can prevent the government from wasting the labors of the people under the pretense of taking care of them."

As they continued talking, however, their smiling faces turned more serious. One had several acres of beans that were under water. The other had a flooded basement which ruined carpeting, appliances and family photos.

On May 28th, CNN reported, "At least 37 people have died in the severe weather over the past five days, from either tornadoes or flooding brought on by epic rainfall. Those deaths include 17 in Texas, 14 in northern Mexico and six in Oklahoma. One Texas flood victim said. "It turned the living room into a gigantic washing machine" The Associated Press reported, "Recordings of 911 calls reveal frantic requests for help from people staying in homes along the flooded Blanco River in Central Texas, including a woman who said the house she was in was "floating."

Imagine how horrible it must have been for people experiencing nature's fury in Noah's Then reflect on how grateful Noah and his family were for having the protection and presence of God and his ark. # Natural areas surveyor Randy Nyboer will speak on July 8

GALENA — The Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation (JDCF) invites the public to a presentation by Randy Nyboer on "The Plants and Animals of the Driftless Area of North-western Illinois" at a potluck speaker event on Wednesday, July 8, at the Galena Territory Owners Club, 2000 Territory Drive, Galena. This is a free event. The potluck begins at 5:30, followed by the presentation at 7 p.m. If coming for the meal, please bring a dish to pass and table service. This is a BYOB event.

Randy Nyboer spends his days exploring the woodlands, wetlands and prairies of Illinois in search of rare and wonderful species and habitats worth conserving. As Coordinator of Field Surveys for the Illinois Natural History Survey, it is Randy Nyboer's job to discover remnants of our landscape as it existed historically prior to European settlement of the area. His talk will feature visuals of many of these natural areas, called "natural communities" because they include both the land and the living things on it. Some are unique to Northwestern Illinois.

As a young biologist in the 1970's, Nyboer participated in the first ever Illinois Natural Areas Inventory (INAI),

kind in the nation. Surveyors found 1,100 sites encompassing 25,000 acres across Illinois that still retained their original plants and animals.


Now, following field work, Nyboer and the INAI team are updating the inventory. The new survey used scientific knowledge and technology that was not available in the 1970's. The goal is to develop a list of high quality grasslands, wood-lands, and wetlands. "From there, we'll prioritize sites for preservation," says Nyboer. Working with private landowners and conservation groups is very important to the success

also the first inventory of its of his work, says Nyboer. "We want them to know what they have," he says.

The Illinois Natural History Survey is a division of the Prairie Research Institute at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. The Prairie Research Institute is home to the state's scientific surveys, including geology, water, sustainable technology, archaeology, and natural history, which is Nyboer's speciality. Nyboer has supervised multiple surveys throughout the state, including in Jo Daviess County, to locate areas where our natural heritage has been preserved. He coordinated the IDNR effort (ongoing) to acquire more than 10,000 acres of sand prairie, savanna, and floodplain forest at the old Savanna Army

Depot for preservation. As well, Nyboer coordinated the Illinois side of a joint reintroduction of peregrine falcons with the state of Iowa in Muscatine, Iowa. He has been a key player in acquiring many significant natural areas, or in making additions to them, including in northwest Illinois: Nachusa Grassland, Apple River Canyon, Hanover Bluff, Castle Rock, Mineral Marsh and Green River. He is the recipient of numerous awards and holds a Master of Science in Botany from Eastern Illinois University. ## Sheriff's Office reminds of summer safety tips

— With the warmer weather upon us, the Jo Daviess County Sheriff's Office would like to remind the public of some summer safety

When walking/running along roadways, pedestrians should use a sidewalk whenever available. If a sidewalk is not available you must walk on the shoulder as far as possible from the edge of the roadway. If there is no shoulder, the pedestrian must walk as far to the outside edge of the roadway as possible. If walking on a twoway road, the pedestrian must walk on the left side of the roadway so that you are most visible to oncoming traffic. If possible, wear bright visible

colored clothing. When riding a bicycle on the roadway, motor vehicle traffic laws apply to bicyclists. Bicyclists on roadways must stay as close as possible to the right-hand curb or right edge of the roadway. When riding on the roadway you cannot ride side by side as this can impede traffic. Motorist must be cautious overtaking pedestrians and bicyclist to avoid colliding with a pedestrian or a person on a bicycle.

Driving off road (utility) vehicles, golf carts, and all-terrain vehicles (ATV's) for recreational use on all county roads is illegal. Utility and special equipment vehicles are allowed on roadways when being used for agricultural/farming purposes and when outfitted with a red reflector warning device in the front and rear, with a slow moving emblem.



## TLP prepares restaurant play 'The Big Meal'




