Stockton High School National Honor Society hosts biannual blood drive

STOCKTON — Folks give blood because they like to help others and because giving feels amazing. In busy, complicated times, giving blood is an easy and meaningful way to make a difference. In fact, a simple gift can enhance the lives of up to three people.

Early Wednesday a green RV looking vehicle pulled into the Stockton High School parking lot and for the rest of the day, a steady stream of students and area residents gave a half hour of their time and a pint of

"Our honor society is hosting a blood drive for the Rock River Valley Blood Center," said Stockton High School National Honor Society Advisor Sharon Malone. "Today's drive is our second of the year. We always have two, one in the spring and another in the fall."

According to officials at the Rock River Valley Blood Center virtually every high school in the center's seven-county region participates in at least one drive per year, and during the school year the high school program and its donors can account for between 10 and 20 percent of the blood supply.

The Rock River Valley Blood Center, a not for profit com-

1. When do I need to change my clocks?

On the second Sunday in March, (March 13, this year,) move your clocks ahead one hour; you should reset your clocks before going to bed, so you won't arrive at appointments an hour late

2. What effect does the time change have on my body?

The effect depends on a person's age and work, eating and

STATELINE — Here's what sleep schedules, according to David Earnest, a professor of neuroscience and experimental therapeutics at Texas A&M University.

'Our internal clocks have to shift, be it only an hour, and the ability to do that varies from individual to individual," Earnest said.

Sleep-wake cycles change as people age, so adults 65 and older may struggle with the time change more than others.

(They) tend to go to bed earlier, wake up in the middle of the night and have sleep interrupted in the middle of the night by frequent waking and difficulty getting back to sleep," he said. "A typical person should be able to adjust to the new time change within a day or two.'

3. When was daylight saving time signed into law?

In 1966, President Lyndon Johnson signed the Uniform Time Act into law. The U.S. Department of Transportation is the keeper of daylight sav-

4. Why does it exist?

One argument for daylight saving time is that fewer accidents happen during daylight hours, so extending morning daylight in winter and evening daylight in summer results in a slight reduction in automobile accidents.

The idea behind daylight saving time is to take advantage of daylight hours and save energy. According to a 2008 federal Department of Energy study, U.S. electricity use decreased by 0.5% for each day of extended daylight saving time, resulting in a savings of 0.03% for the year as a whole, KING-TV, Seattle, reported.

The savings are small in percentage terms, but in absolute terms, they added up to 1.3 billion kilowatt-hours enough to power about 122,000 average U.S. homes for a year. These savings come in the summer months of daylight saving time, not the Standard Time months we are about to enter.

The time change actually is rooted in an agricultural society, Earnest said. The

town," Malone said. "Now, we are able to fill the day pretty well."


The Rock River Valley Blood Center collects blood and then tests and stores it centrally. The Hospital Services department works with the different area hospitals on an hourly basis moving the products, whether red blood cells, platelets, or plasma based on their surgical and trauma needs.

And, as the need for a safe and adequate blood supply increases The Rock River Valley Blood Center high school program remains a priority.

Malone said community service is an important part of a diverse education.

'I think that the students learn that they cannot do too much individually, but they can accomplish a lot as a group," she said. "It doesn't take very long and each student only spends one class period, but all the National Honor Society members working together will fill the whole day by providing just a little bit of their time and in the process benefit everyone."

STATELINE — This past week was the last scheduled day of session for an entire month. Yes, I said an entire month. The next session day scheduled is for Monday, April 4th. You are probably thinking with that long of a break we must have solved all the states problems; not exactly. Did we solve the budget crisis? No. Did we vote on meaningful reforms to help alleviate some of the mounting financial pressures? No. Did we do anything that is going to make things better today than yesterday? No, we did none of the above.

As the Speaker of the House was ready to call for adjournment on Thursday evening, neighboring State Representative Tom Demmer (R-Dixon) stood to make a motion to not adjourn so that we could continue to work on the budget. After deliberating behind the podium for around five minutes, the Speaker replied that Rep. Demmer's motion was "out of order" and thus proceeded to rapidly adjourn, denying the opportunity to debate the motion.

The Speaker and staff behind the podium literally ran out the door.

How can we solve the budget crisis if we are not scheduled to be in Springfield and the Democrats refuse to stay? I have been getting hundreds upon hundreds of emails, phone calls and visits to my office pleading for me and all of the other legislators to find a compromise to solve the budget crisis. My Republican colleagues and my attempt to do just that were flat out denied by one person's rules. If the rhetoric all the House Democrats are constantly spewing about the Governor delaying this process were true, don't you think they would want to be in Springfield trying to find a compromise instead of going on vacation for an entire month? Not one Democrat legislator stood up in support of Rep. Demmer's motion. They all brushed off his statement with their usual Super Majority smug smiles, happily strutting back to their districts believing the political partisan appropriation bills that they voted yes on were going to solve all the problems of the state. Also visiting was a local group from the district in support of A Brotherhood Aimed Toward Education (A.B.A.T.E.) of Illinois during their Legislative Day in Springfield. Thank you for stopping by the office!

The word being thrown around this budget crisis is compromise. It seems like such a simple concept. Two parties who cannot agree on an issue both give a little to find common ground in agreement. This term has been falsely defined multiple times

during this budget impasse. I want to make sure people understand what compromise is and what it takes to get the job done. As mentioned earlier, my fellow colleague and neighboring State Representative, Tom Demmer, gave a meaningful definition of compromise on the House floor this week that I want to share. "A compromise is not a product; it is not a piece of paper that we point to. A compromise is a process. A compromise requires conversation, negotiation, give and take. A compromise requires the willingness to actually work together." I am tired of the Speaker's unwillingness to do anything that remotely resembles compromise. Adjourning for an entire month while the state's most vulnerable people are hurting speaks for itself.

SENATE WEEK IN REVIEW

February 22-26

SPRINGFIELD — Gov. Bruce Rauner is touring the state with lawmakers to talk about his proposal to fully fund the state school-aid formula for elementary and secondary education, for the first

time in seven years.

The Governor and Republican lawmakers are pushing to approve the funding plan for the coming fiscal year now, to ensure schools are not caught in political crossfire and to protect downstate and subur-

ban schools from paying for Chicago Public Schools (CPS) system financial failures.

Legislation would ban drones over prisons

I am working to help prevent drugs and cell phones from being smuggled into state prisons by prohibiting the use of unmanned aerial vehicles, or "drones," over prisons. I introduced Senate Bill 2344 in response to several incidents across the country where drones have been used to drop drugs, cell phones, pornography, and even escape tools into prison yards.

Senate Bill 2344 adds one year of imprisonment to the sentence of a person convicted of bringing contraband into a prison by drone, in addition to any other penalty handed down by law.

Proponents of the ban note there are inmates willing to go to great lengths to smuggle drugs, cell phones or other banned items into Illinois' correctional facilities. With the use of drones continuing to increase, the legislation is a proactive measure intended to send a strong message that those who use these tools to send contraband into state prisons will face serious consequences.

Rauner continues education push

Gov. Rauner is visiting schools across the state—including stops in Lombard, Chicago, Peoria, Springfield and Belleville—to talk about his proposal to increase state K-12 general state-aid funding to record levels.

During his annual Budget Address Feb. 17, Rauner proposed fully funding general state aid to schools for the first time in seven years. The Governor wants to increase foundation formula funding by \$55 million, in addition to increasing funding for early childhood education programs by \$75 million.

Mandate relief for school districts is also part of the Governor's plan to help Illinois schools, and legislation has already been introduced by Republican lawmakers that would allow districts to decide whether to release

students from P.E. requirements and would ease current restrictions on using outside contractors.

The Governor noted that many of his proposals to help schools control costs simply extend the same freedom of choice to downstate and suburban schools that Chicago schools have benefitted from for years. Estimates show his mandate relief bill could save schools \$200 million per year statewide.

Rauner also recently used an executive order to create the "Governor's Cabinet on Children and Youth," commonly referred to as the "Children's Cabinet." The newly formed entity will help streamline and reorganize state services to more effectively work with kids, while strengthening partnerships with non-profit and private organizations.

Rauner said that, "It will

Rauner said that, "It will ensure Illinois children are getting the resources they need and deserve, while expediting true reforms that will transform our education system to ensure a bright future for our students."

Ballot Ready provides free, non-partisan information on the candidates. The data on the candidates is collected from the candidates' websites, Facebook pages, and Linked

In profiles. Endorsements the candidate has received are listed. There are also links to recent newspaper articles about the candidates. Ballot Ready partners with political science departments at universities to collect this data. All information on the site is directly linked to its source.

In addition to information

about the candidates, Ballot Ready also provides information about your polling place and early voting in Illinois. It also provides a link to the Illinois State Board of Election site so that you can check to see if you are registered to vote.

Voices for Illinois Children releases update to September report

STATELINE — The Fiscal Policy Center at Voices for Illinois Children has released an update to its September report outlining the devastating human impact the budget impasse continues to have on children, families and communities. The updated report provides a useful look at some of the pain the ongoing budget stand-off is causing in 60 service areas across the state, particularly for seniors, children and underserved families.

Illinois is now in its ninth month without a budget, leaving no funding for critical programs serving people in every corner of the state.

The result is the continued dismantling of the foundations of Illinois' health and human service system, resulting in long-term damage that will take years to repair.

To prevent further damage to children, families, and communities, lawmakers and the governor need to take responsibility for funding our state's priorities by restoring the revenue we need so that we can begin to repair the damage and put the people of Illinois first.

Below are just a few examples of the foreseeable and preventable results of not having a fullyfunded budget.

HIV/AIDS Prevention and Treatment Services: The Pediatric AIDS Chicago Prevention Initiative, a program that works with medical providers statewide to ensure that pregnant women who are HIV-positive deliver HIV-negative babies, will close its doors in October of 2016 unless funding is restored. The program saves the state about \$35 million each year, and without it, there will be babies who could have been born HIV-negative that will be born HIV-positive

The Autism Project of Illinois: Nearly 1,800 families across the state have either lost services or are at risk of losing critical autism services after TAP closed its doors on September 30, 2015. Previously, TAP was a national leader in providing

services and supports to children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD). One in 68 children has been identified as having ASD by the Centers for Disease Control.

Home-delivered Meals for Seniors: Roughly 3,200 seniors have lost home-delivered meal services statewide. In DuPage County, the DuPage Senior Citizens Council has cut program staff by 55% and has closed its community dining program. In Rockford, 250 meal slots have been eliminated, bringing

the number of seniors on the wait list for meals to 400. The provider, Lifescape Community Services, reports serving 17,000 fewer meals in the first quarter of 2016 compared to the first quarter of 2015.

Sexual Assault Services and Prevention: All 29 agencies serving survivors of sexual assault have instituted furloughs and left staff vacancies unfilled. Agencies across the state have instituted waitlists for counseling services. One center reports 65 survivors are on a waiting list

for critical trauma-centered sexual assault counseling services in Chicago alone.

Substance Abuse and Prevention Programs: Approximately 47,000 individuals across the state have been denied services or have had reduced service delivery, and most providers have a waiting list of 3 months or longer. That leaves many adults with substance abuse disorders

at risk of entering the criminal justice system-a much more costly outcome for the state.

Centers for Independent Living: In FY14, Centers for Independent Living (CIL) served 95 of Illinois' 102 counties, equipping people with disabilities with resources, supports, and skills to live independently. CILs across the state, including Chi-



Pastor's Corner

Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean

LENA-"For I know my transgressions, and my sin is ever before me. Against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight so that you may be justified in your words and blameless in your judgment. Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow. Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from your presence, and take not your Holy Spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and uphold me with a willing spirit." (Psalm 51:3-4; 7; 10-12)

Lent is a penitential season. In other words, it is a time for reflection on our sins and our need for a Savior. The beautiful words in these Psalm verses is David's confession to God after his friend Nathan confronted him about his unfaithfulness with Bathsheba. Picture this mighty king down on his knees, crying out to God through tears over his sin. He was truly sorry and knew that God, and only God, could restore his soul. David begs, "Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean."

Have you ever wondered what that means? Do you even know what hyssop is?

Hyssop is an herb, a member of the mint family and a species of marjoram. This aromatic plant grew freely in the Middle East and northern Africa, often in rocky crevices and stone walls. The hyssop plant has clusters of colored flowers and grows just under three feet tall.

When the Israelites were enslaved in Egypt, Moses gave instructions for God's people in preparation for the Passover. "And you shall take a bunch of hyssop, dip it in the blood [of the Passover lamb] that is in the basin, and strike the lintel and the two doorposts with the blood that is in the basin. And none of you shall go out of the door of his house until morning." (Ex. 12:22)

God promised his people that the angel of death would pass over the houses marked with the blood of the sacrificial lamb. It contained the saving, life-giving power that only He, the almighty, Triune God, possessed. That sacrificial lamb of Passover symbolized the future sacrifice of the Son of God, who would be the sacrificial Lamb of God. "The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him and said, 'Look the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world." (John 1:29) The shed blood of the Passover lamb foreshadowed the blood to be shed by the coming Messiah.

It was faith in God's promise that prompted the Israelites to paint their houses with the blood of the lamb. Faith in that promise of God saved their children. It was faith in God's promise of a future Messiah that saved their souls. Faith in that same Christ Jesus, the Lamb of God, saves you and me from our sins and assures us of eternal life.

During this Lenten season, we should examine ourselves and realize how helpless and hopeless we are in our own sinfulness. Kneel at the foot of the cross and say along with King David, "Purge me with the hyssop of your blood shed for me, clean my heart, renew my spirit, and assure me of the salvation you won for me as you emerged victorious from the grave!"

cago, Swansea, Joliet, and Alton, have instituted furloughs and layoffs, jeopardizing the roughly 63,430 direct services and information and referrals that were provided in FY14.

Services Seniors: Home Care and Adult Day Care have been especially hard hit. Lutheran Social Services of Illinois closed 7 home care and adult day care centers, eliminating services for 2,355 seniors in Canton, Chicago, DeKalb, Freeport, Moline, Peoria and Rockford. LSSI also cut case management and adult protective services programs for 2,713 seniors in Sterling, IL. The lack of state investment in home care services leaves more than 25,000 seniors at risk of losing services across Cook and Lake.



FROM LENA'S KITCHEN



The not so skinny cook

LENA — We have had a little of everything this week—I am in musical mode, so "March came in like a lion!" is certainly an appropriate observation. We are to start the warm up this week. I will be glad to see the snow go and the piles of ice in the back yard begin to melt. I am looking forward to a lighter coat, because I hate wearing my winter coat. This week we are gearing up for St. Patrick's Day with a few recipes—there are meatless recipes also.

The first recipe is for a tasty main dish which used the corned beef that comes from the deli. They have beautiful corned beef deli meat at Sullivan's. You can have it sliced to whatever thickness you like. The rye/pumpernickel bread makes for great bread crumbs to roll this delicious entrée in. You can serve this main course with the Irish potato pancakes in the next recipe. The first recipe pairs the corned beef with chicken. Many people don't like the taste of corned beef, so this gives another dimension to a traditional St. Patrick's Day meat. Enjoy the next two recipes.

Chicken Reuben Roll-Ups

2 slices swirled rye and pumpernickel bread, torn into 2-inch pieces

2 boneless skinless chicken breast halves (4 oz. each)

¹/₄ t. garlic salt

½ t. pepper

2 slices Swiss cheese

2 slices deli corned beef

2 T. Thousand Island dressing

Preheat the oven to 425. Place the bread in a blender. Cover and pulse to form coarse crumbs; place in a shallow bowl. Pound the chicken to ½ inch thickness,; sprinkle with garlic salt and pepper. Top with cheese and corned beef. Roll up the chicken from a short side and secure with toothpicks. Brush outsides with dressing and roll in the bread crumbs.

Place the roll-ups on a greased baking sheet, seam side down. Bake for 20-25 minutes or until the chicken in no longer pink. Discard the toothpicks and place on a serving plate.

Irish Potato Pancakes

3 T. unsalted butter

1 large onion, finely chopped Salt

2 lbs. russet potatoes, peeled and chopped

¹/₄ C. milk

1 large egg yolk

1/3 C. flour, plus more for dusting

½ C. shredded cheddar cheese

3 T. finely chopped fresh parsley

Freshly ground pepper

Finely chopped fresh chives for topping

Melt 2 tablespoons of the butter in a medium skillet over medium heat. Add the onion, season with salt and cook, stirring occasionally until golden brown and very soft, 25 minutes. Let cool.

Place the potatoes in a saucepan and cover with water by 1 inch and season with salt. Bring to a boil, then reduce the heat and simmer until tender, 10-12 minutes. Drain, then transfer to a large bowl. Add the milk and mash until smooth. Let cool at least 30 minutes.

Preheat the oven to 250 and line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Add the cooked onion, egg yolk, flour, cheese, parsley, 1 teaspoon salt and a few grinds of pepper to the potatoes; stir until combined. Scoop 1/3 cupfuls of the potato mixture onto a lightly floured surface and form into twelve 3-inch pancakes.

Melt the remaining tablespoon of butter in a large nonstick skillet over medium-high heat. Working in batches, cook the pancakes until golden brown on the bottom, about 4 minutes. Gently flip, adding more butter to the pan if necessary, and continue cooking until browned on the other side, about 3-4 minutes more. Transfer to the prepared baking sheet and keep warm in the oven until ready to serve. Top with chives.

The slow cooker corned beef recipe that follows is a traditional one. It tells you to buy the beef with the flavor packet, but you aren't going to use it because you make one of your own. I think that a homemade flavor packet is much better than the ones that are made ahead of time. You control the freshness of your own packet. You can use either beef broth or a stout beer for the liquid. If you don't want the cabbage in the slow cooker, you can cook it separately on the stove before serving. The horserad-

ish gives it a special "kick." Corned Beef and Cabbage

2 lbs. red potatoes, quartered 1 lb. carrots, cut into 3-inch pieces 2 celery ribs, cut into 3-inch leces

1 small onion, quartered

1 corned beef brisket with spice packet (3 to 3 ½ lbs.)

8 whole cloves

6 whole peppercorns

2 bay leaves

12 oz. beef broth or 1 bottle (12 oz) beer (stout beer is the best)

½ small head of cabbage, thinly sliced

Horseradish for garnish

In a 6-qt. slow cooker, combine the potatoes, carrots, celery, and onion. Add the corned beef, discarding the spice packet. Place the cloves, peppercorns and bay leaf on a double thickness of cheese-cloth. Gather the corners of cloth to enclose the seasonings; tie securely with string. Place in slow cooker and pour beef broth over the top.

Cook, covered, on Low 8-10 hours or until the meat and vegetables are tender, add cabbage during the last hour of cooking. Discard the spice bag.

Cut the beef diagonally across the grain into thin slices. Serve beef with the vegetables and horseradish as a garnish.

In case you didn't want to have anything to do with corned beef, this next recipe is for an easy main dish meatless meal. It isn't a traditional spaghetti meal because there are no tomatoes involved. It is an easy way to serve tuna that is different than a traditional tuna and noodle casserole. The parmesan cheese makes the dish delicious. This meal can be made in about one-half hour. Serve with a salad and bread, and you have an easy Friday night meal or a weekday meal

ິSpaghetti with Tuna

3 T. olive oil 1 small diced onion 2 garlic cloves, minced ½ C. dry white wine

2 cans (5 oz. each) solid albacore tuna in water, drained

1/4 C. chopped fresh flat leaf parsley1 pinch crushed red pepper

1/4 t. salt

8 oz. cooked spaghetti

½ C. Reserve pasta water.

½ C. toasted panko bread rumbs

Garnish with grated Parmesan cheese

Heat the olive oil over medium heat in a large skillet. Add the diced onion and cook until translucent, about 5 minutes. Add garlic and cook, stirring for one minute. Add the wine and reduce the heat and cook until liquid is reduced by half. Stir in tuna, parsley, crushed red pepper and salt. Add the cooked spaghetti and toss. Add a little pasta cooking water if it seems too dry. Remove from heat and add the bead crumbs and toss. Serve warm and garnish with Parmesan.

If you want to go strictly meatless, this next recipe has spaghetti (no red sauce for this one either), asparagus, mushrooms and cheese. It is a great way to get kids to eat asparagus because there are so many other flavors. I think you could substitute broccoli for the asparagus if it works better for your family. Again, this recipe is a quick one for a week-day meal.

Swiss Angel Hair n'Asparagus

12 oz. uncooked angel hair pasta

1 lb. fresh asparagus, trimmed and cut into 2-inch pieces

½ lb. sliced fresh mushrooms 1 t. minced chives


