Honk if you love Jesus. Drive while distracted if you want to meet him

STATELINE — Drawing the attention of teens to the negative relationship between drinking and/or texting and driving is the purpose of mock accidents staged last week in advance of spring break and prom in both Stephenson and Jo Daviess Counties.

The scenario is simple, but shocking. After celebrating prom, some high school students have a bad traffic accident. One student is pinned in a vehicle and dies. Several are badly injured and require an airlift to immediate medical attention while others, less seriously injured are taken by ambulance. Meanwhile, a teen driver is arrested and faces charges of Driving Under the Influence and Manslaughter.

"The students see firsthand the results of people's choices," said Louise Lameyer, a paramedic with Leamon Ambulance Service. She participated in the mock accident staged Wednesday in the parking lot behind the Lena-Winslow junior high school.

She said the intent is to have students plan ahead and not make spur-of-the-moment decisions that could have deadly results.

"This is not just about alcohol," Lameyer said. "It's also about distracted driving, drinking, drugs, and all of the various activities that sidetrack a driver's attention."

Lameyer said a few of the kids get the message.

"The kids do pay attention and some do get it," she said. "If we can reach that one kid that does not get behind the wheel after drinking or while using a cell phone and save a life, then it was all worth it."

In addition, health officials are increasingly reaching out to parents with tips for conversations to have with their teens about safe driving, not drinking and driving and not getting in a vehicle with someone who has been drinking.

"The intent is to give young people choices if they find themselves in different situations by themselves or with the person they came with," said pediatric trauma prevention coordinator Cary Cain. ""We're presenting the hazards of drunk and distracted driving."

He said each of the injuries is completely preventable.

"Students can witness the hazards and discuss future plans," Cain said. "They have so much life and hope for the future. They need to understand the consequences, so they can make safe choices."

Research shows that driving while using a cell phone can pose a serious cognitive distraction and degrade driver performance. The use of a cell phone while driving increases your chance of getting into a crash by 400%. Texting while driving makes you 23 times more likely to crash.

According to the Illinois State Police records, driver inattention is a factor in more than 1 million crashes in North America annually, resulting in serious injuries, deaths, and an economic impact that some experts say reaches \$40 billion per year. Every single time someone

ISP announce Distracted Driving Enforcement Campaign

STATELINE — April marks the National Distracted Driving Awareness Month. U.S Department of Transportation and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) are sponsoring the 2016 National Distracted Driving Enforcement Campaign. The Illinois State Police (ISP) will be joining those efforts to crackdown on motorist who fail to abide by the texting while driving law and other distracted driving violations.

The ISP will be using a combination of traditional and innovative strategies to crac down on motorists who text while driving. The national "U Drive. U Text U Pay" high-visibility enforcement campaign has two goals: conduct intense enforcement of anti-texting laws; and couple these efforts with advertising, media and social media outreach to inform drivers about the enforcement and convince them to obey the law.

"Driving and texting is not only dangerous and irresponsible, it's illegal, said ISP Colonel Tad Williams. Drivers who

break our state's texting law will be stopped and fined. Texting and driving is a safety issue, and we're trying to work toward a resolution by identifying violators. If you drive and text, you will pay," Williams said.
Violating the Illinois texting

law, which became effective on January 1, 2014, can be costly. A first violation for this offense is \$120 and can increase with multiple violations or if a violation occurs in a work zone or school zone.

Distracted driving statistics paint a grim picture: In 2014, an estimated 3,179 people were killed. An additional 431,000 were injured in motor vehicle crashes involving distracted drivers. It is clear that distracted driving continues to be a deadly driving hazard.

"Texting and driving requires motorists to take their eves off the road, hands off the wheel, and mind off the task of driving. This is a conscious choice, and no one should feel they have the right to put another person's life at risk," said AAA Chicago spokesperson Charlene Sligting.



From the desk of State Representative Brian W. Stewart

STATELINE — Well, it was an interesting week in Springfield. We worked on several important issues. The Democrats pushed through a \$3.9 Billion spending plan (Senate Bill 2046) which was essentially the same one they proposed before, except with a slightly larger price tag. Just like before, this one has no funding mechanism, no way to pay for it. What it amounts to is a false promise to Illinois families and only adds to the stack of unpaid bills on the Comptroller's desk. I'll tell you about our Comptroller, Leslie Munger.

Comptroller Munger, the state's chief financial officer and the one responsible for cutting the checks to pay state bills, likens this situation to a family budget. According to Comptroller Munger, it's like a family sitting down at the kitchen table with \$100 and trying to pay down a \$7,000 stack of bills. A family can't afford to spend or budget this The State shouldn't either. The Democrats \$3.9 Billion spending bill that was passed this week just adds to the mountain of unpaid bills. It is an IOU with no way to ever pay it back; an empty promise to the people of Illi-

Let's take some time to talk about real solutions. Republicans have a proposal that funds Illinois colleges and universities with an actual funding source. It would give

Governor Rauner the ability to reallocate existing funds to meet our commitments to Higher Education. crats gave Governor Quinn this same flexibility during a budget crunch a few years ago, but are unwilling to do so now. It's yet another example of politics at its worst.

Last week, we introduced a bill to fund essential human services. The proposal uses savings achieved from common sense pension reforms to fund vital programs that serve children and families in need, seniors on fixed incomes and the disabled, among others. The reforms we're talking about are completely constitutional and could net an immediate, significant amount

What we need to recognize is that real people and families rely on the state services that depend upon us having a budget. An IOU is not the answer. Actions like the \$3.9 Billion IOU the Democrats passed this week only gives desperate people false hope. We need a real solution to pay the state's commitments.

Another issue we talked about this week was school funding. This is a huge issue across the state. If we look back at the past ten years, past governors have fudged the formula and schools only received a portion of the funds that the State of Illinois had promised them. Experts say that if we fully funded our schools, the schools would receive an additional \$120 million. I believe we should give 100% of the money that the state promised for K-12

That's more money for every school district across the state, including our own here in northern Illinois.

Looking ahead, next week is going to be another interesting one in Springfield. I am hopeful that meaningful progress can be made toward a budget agreement. On my side of the aisle, we have been trying to reach a compromise for the past ten months. My colleagues and I have tried each and every day to bring about a resolution to this impasse and I will keep working to achieve a reasonable and responsible

If we work together and in the spirit of bipartisanship, we can get rid of the waste and abuse and provide services to the children and families who rely on them. Illinois can once again be a place everyone can be proud of and afford to live, work, and raise

I would like to end this week on a note of recognition and remembrance of a long time friend that passed earlier this week and who was laid to rest on Friday, Michael "Mike" "Ponch" Pontius. Mike was a Freeport Firefighter who while in the line of duty was exposed to a toxic substance while fighting a house fire that eventually took his life. My thoughts and prayers to go out to his wife Dawn; his sons Josh, Jerek and Jordan; his daughter Kirsten and the entire Pontius Family. Mike comes from a family of Firefighters and every Firefighter's service to our communities reminds me of the Fireman's Prayer, "When I am called to duty, God whenever flames may rage, give me the strength to save some life whatever be its age. Help me to embrace a little child before it's too late, or some older person from the horror of that fate. Enable me to be alert and hear the weakest shout, and quickly and efficiently put the fire out. I want to fill my calling and give the best in me, to guard my neighbor and protect his property. And if according to your will I have to lose my life, please bless with your protecting hand my children and my wife.'

Durbin presses Abbott Labs on outsourcing 150 American jobs to Indian company

Senator Dick Durbin (D-IL) today announced that Chicagobased Abbott Laboratories has forced approximately 150 laidoff employees to sign a gag order preventing them from discussing the layoffs with federal agencies, as they are legally entitled to do. The employees

were required to sign sweeping non-disparagement agreements in order to receive any sever-

Last month, Durbin wrote to Miles White, the CEO of Abbott Labs, urging him to reconsider their plan to outsource the jobs of these U.S. workers, who have dedicated years of loyal service to the company. In a follow-up letter to White today, Durbin said it is wrong that we cannot hear firsthand from the American workers who are losing their jobs because of Abbott's outsourcing agreement.

"I am deeply disappointed that your response confirmed you are replacing these workers, who have dedicated years of loyal service to your company, with contractors from Wipro, an Indian company that specializes in outsourcing American jobs," Durbin wrote. "I know from recent conversations that this layoff has taken its toll on the morale of your remaining workforce."

non-disparagement provision also does not make clear that a current or former Abbott employee can communicate with government agencies regarding workplace discrimination. This is especially troubling given the circumstances of these employees' termination. As I am sure you are aware, employees have a legal right to communicate with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and comparable federal, state, and local agencies," Durbin said.

rbor Day Tree Walk hosted by Master Gardeners

STATELINE — Join the University of Illinois Extension Master Gardeners for an Arbor Day Tree Walk at the Don Opel Arboretum on the campus of

Highland Community College. The walk will take place from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, April 30 starting and ending in Parking Lot D of Highland

Community College.

An Arbor Day Tree Walk has been prepared by the University of Illinois Extension Master Gardeners which features 68 trees and shrubs and includes a few of the trees original to the arboretum and many additional exotic, interesting and thought-provoking items. Trees and shrubs that are considered native, as well as trees from distant countries and distant times

are featured, including a tree once thought to be extinct, several trees in the threatened ash family and a few now considered invasive.



Koester is an ag transfer student at the Black Hawk College East Campus. In the fall she will transfer to the University of Illinois at Urba-



Lena-Winslow high school completes renovation project

LENA — The recently completed renovations to the Lena-Winslow high school front entrance and hallways bring a clean fresh look to the building.

"Ever since I've been here and even through the interview process when I got hired here there was some talk of some facility upgrades," said Lena-Winslow superintendent Dr. Tom Chiles. "The bond that was paying for the elementary school got paid off here recently and so it was an opportunity to run a referendum here and get some improvements done without our taxpayers seeing an increase in their tax bills since we had the old bond going off the books. It was just a good time for us to address some stuff and make it so the taxpayers don't get hit on their bills.'

Upgrades include new windows in the cafeteria, brick staining, a new flag pole, and a new canopy. New video display screens replace the main trophy

case and the project allowed for the refinishing of other trophy cases. The cream coloring applied to the hall wall blocks modernizes the entire building. There are new fixtures and paint in the bathrooms. The doors in the front foyer area are refinished. The staff workroom is remodeled, new lockers are installed in the halls and the windows above those hall lockers are replaced.

"Throughout history we've really addressed our academic rooms and our own maintenance staff has renovated room by room, but you really can't do that with extracurricular areas because they're big and they're a big project when you undertake them," said Chiles. "You can do a classroom at a time or a couple classrooms during the summer and that's a whole lot smaller project than trying to do a whole new gym or something similar."

He said renovating the weight room was one of the priorities.

"We've had a 1200 square

foot metal shed out back for a weight room and too many kids using it during the summer," Chiles said. "That made it a little dangerous and it just wasn't a quality place for our kids to utilize, so now, we use the new space for physical education every day and for sports before and after school; it's getting a lot of use."

They've added a designated wrestling room next to the weight/physical education/athletic room.

"When wrestling is not using the room our track team and our cheerleaders use it," he said. "Like I said, we've been upgrading our academic rooms for years, so there really wasn't a tremendous need in those areas, but we did see some need in the extracurricular areas."

Chiles said freshening the halls was another priority.

"If you've been in the building in the past you couldn't help but notice the sort of 1950's peach or salmon color on the wall bricks," he said. "We wanted to brighten those areas. We know a person's surroundings make a difference with what they're thinking and how they feel when they come into a facility. I think the upgrades we've done to the common areas really make the kids feel different when they walk in the building. It feels like a new building.

Lena-Winslow Elementary School Principal Mary Gerbode said safety is an underlying

cause behind the renovations at the high school.

"We had safety issues for our students that we wanted to think about as well as finishing areas that were never finished when the first referendum went through," said Gerbode. "We had a very unique opportunity

to fulfill the wishes of the taxpayers to take care of some safety issues to make sure that coming into the modern century we are meeting the needs of how sports have changed and we were also able to send some money back to the taxpayers, so it's a win/win for everybody."

As the Thunder prepared for its last assault, they were looking at a 6-4 deficit, a position not seen with Lena-Winslow in 2016.




