U of I Extension and 4H Youth Development stage successful babysitting clinic in Elizabeth

University of Illinois Extension and 4H Youth Development hosted a babysitting clinic last week at the Elizabeth Community Building. The sessions were designed to help young entrepreneurs interested in babysitting learn to choose age-appropriate activities, create healthy snacks, and build the leadership and decision-making skills necessary when providing care for little people.

"We have 40 young people here learning about caring for young children in the areas of food and nutrition, safety, business practices," said 4H Youth Development Educator Jackie De Batista, during a break in the day's clinic sessions.

She said the curriculum for the clinic is based on graduated age stages, so the young entrepreneurs learn what to expect from different ages and life-stages of the youngsters that may require their care.

"It's been really fun and we've had a great turnout," she said. "We've had a lot parents tell us their kids are looking for babysitting jobs, but could use training."

She said there is no similar program available in the area, so when the opportunity knocked, U of I Extension and 4H Youth Development answered the call.

"We decided to give it a try and we thought we would have maybe 20 kids sign up, but we got double that," said De Batista. "It's wonderful."

Their day started with a session covering Ages and Stages.

"We went through the children's ages starting with 0-12 months and talked about caring for an infant," she said. "Then, we went through toddlers talking about what toddlers are like, how to care for them, what to expect from their behavior. We then talked about five to eight year olds, preschoolers and young elementary school age children be-

fore moving on to the nine to eleven year olds."

She said they decided to break the day into sessions covering different ages to make it more meaningful for the participants because different ages have different behaviors and things that caregivers need to watch out for and be aware of.

"After Ages and Stages we moved on to making healthy snacks," said De Batista. "We broke the kids up into four groups and took four recipes that they could easily make with their charges. Each group made their recipe and then they all tasted the final products."

Keeping it "hands-on" and fun
while covering important issues
including safety and nutrition was
the order of the day and the "baby-

sitters in training" were enthusias-

"I kind of know about caring for the older kids, so I wanted to come and learn about younger kids," said Warren High School Junior, Rebecca Raab. "This was a chance for me to learn how to deal with them being naughty or bad or something. It's important to know how to handle those situations."

She said the clinic was a learning experience.

"Considering that I've babysat before, I kind of already know some of these skills, but today's sessions are an opportunity to polish up on those skills as well as pick up some new ideas "soid Pach"

new ideas," said Raab.
Rebecca's sister Kimberlyn also attended the clinic. She regularly cares for six or seven children ranging in age between three and thirteen years old.

"There are always a lot of arguments and it's kind of hard to keep them all occupied, but once I find something for them to do, they settle in and its nice," she said. "There is one that is still in diapers and

that's difficult, but otherwise it's OK "

She said a trip to a neighborhood park or choosing an engaging board game is often the key to a successful day when babysitting.

"I would rather engage the kids in a conversation than put them in front of a TV," Kimberlyn said. "Multiple age groups like different things, but once they are talking among themselves things seem to smooth out. The skills I'm learning here at the clinic reinforce that and I will be applying these ideas."





EZ Sell USA announces plan for Galena relocation

EZ Sell UŜA, after over 10 years in Dubuque, Iowa, has moved to 201 North Commerce Street, in Galena, Illinois. EZ Sell USA was started in the back room of Choo Choo Charlie's in 1975, and after 2 moves, is making what we hope will be our last move to Downtown Galena. Owner, Linda Connor, and her Husband Paul, celebrated a quiet opening on June 6th, just in time to be Linda's birthday present. A ribbon cutting and grand opening are planned for July 7. The move has been 40 years in the making, and one that had many twists and turns along the way.

The journey started in 1976 when having served a short time as a Police Officer for the City of Dubuque, Paul resigned to open a retail store at 130 South Main Street, in Galena, Illinois. Opening a second hand store under the name of "Days of Yore", the store specialized in Garage Sale and Auction finds from the Tri-State area. The store shared a common archway with a newly opened Jewelry store that was managed by Linda. Spending many hours working retail led to a relationship that became permanent October 27, 1978. The day after sharing vows with family and friends on a Friday evening, Linda and Paul, along with other downtown merchants, held the first "Halloween Parade" on Saturday evening an event that continues to this day.

1980 found Paul and Linda busy with family, Linda was working at the Galena Territory and Paul was in training to be part of the opening team for Target T-86 in Dubuque. Having combined the Galena stores from two into one "Days of Yore" moved to 121 South Main Street. As the years marched on Paul spent a season selling Jewelry at the Target store and as he prepared to spend his first Christmas in the Toy

cept the job of General Manager for the Happy Joe's in Galena that was built in 1982. Linda progressed in her career with the Galena Territory becoming part of the team helping to open the original Inn in the heart of the Territory.

The Main Street store was closed in the early 80's so both Linda and Paul could devote full attention to their new careers. Paul was active with the Galena Chamber of Commerce helping to celebrate the Sesquicentennial of the organization in 1988. Paul served as a member of the Zoning Board of Appeals and City Council for Galena. Linda kept busy with 4 children and a fulltime job as she continued to serve the property owners and guests at Eagle Ridge Inn and Resort.

The 1980's quickly become the 1990's, and January of 1992 Linda was called at home while the fire sirens sounded in Galena, with news that the Inn at Eagle Ridge was on fire. The fire destroyed the Inn and the Restaurant and took the resources of 27 local volunteer fire Departments to contain. The Inn was rebuilt, and Linda along the management team at Eagle Ridge, helped opened the Inn as it is today. In the early morning hours of May 4, 1999 Paul was called by a team member at Happy Joe's (whose husband had just been called to a fight a fire at the restaurant). The fire destroyed the restaurant but with a great team it was rebuilt in just 5 months. Having worked through the devastation caused by fires, Linda and Paul moved forward with family in a community they both called home.

Linda's career took a turn in 1994, having worked with new owners at Eagle Ridge through the fire and the rebuild, corporate changes found her unemployed and looking for a new challenge. In 1994 Linda and a partner opened a vacation rental

Madigan warns consumers to recalled products

Attorney General Lisa Madigan joined with Kids in Danger today to urge Illinois consumers shopping on second-hand markets to be aware of recalled products that may be sold without warning.

Madigan and Nancy Cowles, executive director of KID, a nonprofit organization dedicated to protecting children by improving children's product safety, urged any consumers who may be shopping on sites like Craigslist, eBay or other second-hand markets to check if the product or item may have been recalled. Consumers can view information about recalls on the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission website and KID's website.

This week IKEA voluntarily recalled 29 million dressers and

chests after the deaths of six toddlers from tip-over accidents. Consumers - especially consumers with young children – who own the dressers that are not anchored to the wall should stop using the dressers until they can be anchored. IKEA has advised consumers that they can receive a refund or store credit for their dresser or received a free repair kit to anchor the dresser to

the wall to prevent a tip-over accident. For more information about the IKEA recall, contact its customer service at (866) 856-4532 or visit its website.

"Consumers shopping for used products should know that recalled products may be sold online without warning," Madigan said. "It's critical to check if an item has been recalled before making any second-hand purchase and learn what information or repairs may need to be made in order to ensure the item is safe in your home. Consumers can also contact my Recall Hotline for information on recalled

"While it's illegal to sell recalled products, online sellers may be unaware their product has been recalled," Cowles said. "On-line sites should do what they can to keep recalled products off their sites, and buyers should check as well at CPSC.gov or by searching at kidsindanger.org on a mobile de-

Madigan and KID also warned families and caregivers to the risk of tip-over accidents for unsecured furniture that has led to increased reports of injury and deaths across the country. Madigan and KID urged families to follow CPSC guidelines to secure furniture in their homes:

Anchor furniture to the wall or

Place televisions on sturdy, lowbase stands or furniture, or anchor the furniture and the television on its base, and push the television as far back to the wall as possible;

Keep remote controls, toys and other items of interest to children off of television stands or furniture;

Keep television and cable cords out of reach; and

Ensure that freestanding kitchen ranges and stoves are installed with anti-tip brackets.

Congresswoman Bustos urges families to share gun violence videos

As Americans across our country mark a National Day of Action to reduce gun violence, Congresswoman Cheri Bustos is asking her constituents to share their stories online using the hashtag #17Stories. As a former journalist, Bustos interviewed more than 70 members of Congress during last week's sit-in protest to find out what is motivating them to take action to prevent gun violence. Included in these interviews was one with Congresswoman Jackie Speier who told a very personal story about how she was shot five times at Jonestown and how surviving gun violence has shaped

So now, Congresswoman Bustos is asking families from the 17th district to tell their stories about why this is so important to them.

In a short web video posted to Facebook and Twitter, Bustos urged her constituents to record a short video about how gun violence has impacted them or their communities – then share it on Facebook or Twitter using the hashtag #17Stories.

"I can't imagine the pain of los-

ing a child or loved one in a senseless act of gun violence, but that's what happened 35 times in my district last year," said Congresswoman Cheri Bustos. "These stories must be told so I'm asking my constituents to make short videos on Facebook and Twitter using #17Stories to share how gun violence has affected their lives, the lives of their loved ones or their communities. As the wife of a sheriff and owner of a gun myself, I know that we can strike the right balance to defend the rights of law abiding gun owners while making it harder for suspected terrorists or violent criminals to get their hands on deadly weapons.'

"Just one week after the historic sit-in on the House floor, leaders in

Durbin announces more than \$107 million for emergency preparedness in Illinois during FY2016

U.S. Senator Dick Durbin (D-IL) announced more than \$107 million in federal funding to improve emergency preparedness across Illinois. In fiscal year 2016, the Department

of Homeland Security (DHS) has awarded state and local authorities, transportation agencies, and port facility operators in Illinois preparedness grants totaling \$107,952,308 to prevent and respond to acts of terrorism and other hazards.

"The recent string of horrific terror attacks around the world has underscored a grim reality—we must ensure that Illinois is prepared to address emergency events, including preventing and responding to acts of terrorism," said Durbin. "This funding will help provide state and local agencies as well as transportation authorities with the necessary tools to keep Illinois residents, visitors, and businesses safe."



U.S. EPA updates work on Bautsch-Gray Mine Superfund site

The Bautsch-Gray Mine Superfund site is on South Blackjack Road, about four miles south of downtown Galena in rural Jo Daviess County. The site is surrounded by forests, residential areas, farms, wetlands and Smallpox Creek. The Mississippi River is approximately two miles west of the site.

The side includes three principal sources of contamination: a 40-acre mine tailings pile, a horseshoe-shaped settling pond west of the mine tailings pile, and contaminated soil along the overland flow route from the Settling Pond to Small pox Creek. All three

source areas contain elevated levels of arsenic, cadmium, copper lead or zinc.

U.S. Environmental Protection Agency collected soil, sediment (mud) and surface water samples at the Bautsch-Gray Mine Superfund in May and November 2014. The areas sampled were not managed in the 2010-2012 cleanups. The sampling results will help the federal Agency determine what is contaminating the groundwater, sediment, soil and surface water, and where and in what quantities the pollutants are located. U.S. EPA is currently assessing the sample results to determine potential cleanup options an plans to have those

potential cleanup options available for review later this year or in 2017. These potential cleanup options will be presented to the community for comment before a final cleanup decision is made.

The samples taken in 2014 are part of an investigation at the site called a remedial investigation, or RI and feasibility study, or FS. The remedial investigation is a long-term study designed to collect the sampling information necessary to determine the nature and extent of contamination at a site. The FS provides a description and analysis of potential cleanup alternatives for a site. The RI/FS is done under the EPA Superfund remedial program. U.S. EPA began this long-term investigation in 2012 after the site was placed on the National Priorities List in September of that year. The National Priorities List is an inventory of the nation's most serious uncontrolled or abandoned hazardous

In addition to the work being done at the site under the remedial program,

staffers in the emergency response section of the Superfund program continue to conduct quarterly site visits to check conditions and make sure there aren't any erosion or deposition issues. U.S. EPA's emergency response program under which U.S. EPA began working at the site in 2009 allows the Agency to quickly respond to time-critical situations where there are eminent health dangers to people and the environment.

Previous cleanup work

During a heavy rainstorm in August 2009, tailings (waste from mining operations) from the main waste pile on the mine property were carried across Blackjack Road onto residential property. Illinois EPA took samples on and around the site and the nearby residential properties and found high levels of lead in soil samples from both places. Illinois EPA then requested assistance from U.S. EPA. Under U.S. EPA removal program oversight, a water treatment system was installed on the residential property because of high lead levels in its well. The tail-

ings pile was regarded.

U.S. EPA cleaned up part of the site in September 2010 and into the summer of 2011. The federal Agency built four retention ponds on the mine tailings pile area. One residential property was cleaned up and a water treatment system was installed. A berm was built along Blackjack Road to keep tailings from washing onto the road again.

Another cleanup was done in September-October 2012 at the Horseshoe Area. The area was graded and covered with topsoil and biosolids. Biosolids are the nutrient-rich organic materials resulting from the treatment of sewage sludge generated from domestic sewage treatment facilities.

In this "green" cleanup process, biosolids are spread over non-vegetative tailing to prevent surface exposure of metals to the environment. The area was then seeded and native plants were put in. Today, the area is flush with vegetation; also, a drainage channel lined with riprap was removed.

the hind quarters of the deer to swing toward the back of the motorcycle. The deer struck and injured Donna Pearce. Kyle Pearce, who was able to maintain control of the motorcycle, transported Donna Pearce to the Elizabeth Ambulance building to meet awaiting emergency responders. Donna Pearce was transported to Midwest Medical center for treatment of non-life threatening injuries. The crash remains under investigation.



The not so skinny cook

The air conditioner is getting a break, although the weather people say we are in for a massive heat wave. I guess it is just in time for the fair. This week the column is deep into summer recipes. There is an easy appetizer, a cool summer salad, a tasty vegetable casserole, an interesting main dish, and two great

Need an easy appetizer? This recpe is an easy one to make and take to any get together. It is great on toasted bread—even toasted cocktail rye is great way to serve this summer

Layered BLT Dip

1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, soft-

½ C. mayonnaise

¹/₄ C. grated Parmesan cheese

1 C. finely chopped lettuce

8 bacon strips, cooked and crum-

4 plum tomatoes, chopped

4 green onions, chopped

1 ½ C. shredded cheddar cheese

Toasted French baguette slices. In a bowl, beat the cream cheese,

mayo and Parmesan until blended; spread into a shallow dish. Layer with lettuce, bacon, tomatoes, onions, and cheddar. Refrigerate until serving. Serve with bread slices.

This salad recipe is very refreshing. The combination of the melons and the blackberries which are tossed with the honey dressing is great for a hot day. The pinch of cayenne in the dressing is a little surprise!

crumbs, salt and pepper. Pour into the prepared pan.

In a microwave-safe bowl, melt the remaining 1/2 cup of butter on medium heat. Stir in the cracker crumbs until well combined. Sprinkle the crumbs onto the casserole and cover with foil. Bake for 20 minutes. Uncover and bake until golden brown, 25-30 minutes more. Let stand for 10 minutes before serving.

One of my friends made this casserole after reading about it in a local paper. The corn muffin mix makes for an easy base. You can use rotisserie chicken for an easy way to get this casserole on the table very quickly. Enjoy this easy casserole that doesn't take much time or effort.

Chicken Cornbread Bake

1 pkg. (8½ oz.) Jiffy Corn Muffin

1 egg 1/3 C. milk

2 T. butter

1 red pepper, sliced

1 small onion, chopped

2 C. chopped or shredded chicken

1 C. Barbeque Sauce

½ C. corn

1 C. shredded cheddar

Sliced green onions for garnish

Preheat the oven to 400. Grease an 8-inch square baking dish.

In a medium bowl, combine the cornbread mix with the egg and milk. Pour into prepared pan and bake 20 minutes or until the top is lightly browned.

While the cornbread is baking, melt the butter in a skillet over medium heat. Add the pepper and onion and cook until softened, about 5 minutes. Reduce the heat to low and add the chicken, corn and barbecue sauce. Stir until heated through. Pour the chicken mixture over the baked cornbread. Top with cheese. Preheat the broiler and place the dish in the oven for 2 minutes or until cheese is bubbling. Top with green onions if desired.

A reader sent me this rhubarb cream pie recipe—she didn't leave her name, but the pie sounds yummy. If you have fresh rhubarb, and Barb Wire had some at the Farmer's Market, this pie is for you. Enjoy this rhubarb recipe which the reader told me was good and pretty.

I don't often have recipes for cakes that take a lot of time, but this strawberry jam cake is the exception. You must use cake flour for this recipe. You could substitute regular spray and flour dust with your own flour if you don't have the spray with flour. This layered cake on a cake stand is one of the prettiest and best tasting ones I have had had in a long time. I think it is the cream cheese frosting that makes it special.

Strawberry Jam Cake

³/₄ C. unsalted butter, softened

1½ C. sugar

³/₄ C. strawberry preserves

1 t. strawberry extract

4 large eggs

2½ C. cake flour

11/4 t. baking powder

3/4 t. salt

½ t. baking soda

½ C. whole buttermilk

1/4 t. red food coloring

Strawberry Cream Cheese Frost-2 C. unsalted butter, softened

2 pkgs. (8 oz. each) cream cheese,

softened 8 C. powdered sugar

nine-inch round cake pans with baking spray with flour. Line the bottom

of pans with parchment paper; spray paper with baking spray.

In a large bowl, beat the butter and sugar with a mixer at medium speed until fluffy, 3-4 minutes, stopping occasionally to scrape the sides of the bowl. Beat in reserves and extract until well combined. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition.

In a medium bowl, sift together the cake flour, baking powder, salt, and baking soda. Gradually add the flour mixture to the butter mixture alternately with the buttermilk, beginning and ending with flour mixture, beating just until combined after each addition. Beat in food coloring until well combined. Divide the batter among the prepared pans.

Bake until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean, about 25 minutes. Remove from pans, gently remove the parchment, and let cool completely on wire racks.

Frosting: in a large bowl, beat the butter and cream cheese with a mixer at medium speed until creamy. Gradually add the powdered sugar, beating until smooth. Beat in the strawberries and extract until combined.

Spread the frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake. Garnish with strawberries, if desired. Cover and refrigerate for up to 3 days.

I got a call about the strawberry farm near Monroe. They are letting people pick, but it is the end of the season. A reader and her husband surprised me with a box of strawberries they picked. I was in strawberry heaven. There is nothing like the taste of homegrown strawberries. Another friend finished picking cherries; he is using the cherries to make wine. (I am a pie lover, so I would have made a cherry pie!) We continue looking for some strawberry, cherry, or raspberry recipes, so let us know how you are fixing them. We are also looking for some garden vegetable recipes. As I said earlier in the column, zucchini are everywhere once they start coming in!

Warm weather and swimming go hand in hand

Swimming is a great recreational sport that can be enjoyed by people of all ages, but it's important to know how to be safe while you're in the water. The American Red Cross offers these important swimming safety tips you should be aware of before you head out to the pool or beach:

Swim in designated areas supervised by lifeguards.

Always swim with a buddy; do not allow anyone to swim alone.

Never leave a young child unattended near water and do not trust a child's life to another child; teach children to always ask permission to go near water.

Have young children or inexperienced swimmers wear U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jackets around water, but do not rely on life jackets alone

Maintain constant supervision.

Make sure everyone in your family learns to swim well. Enroll in ageappropriate Red Cross water orientation and learn-to-swim courses.

If you have a pool, secure it with appropriate barriers. Many children who drown in home pools were out of sight for less than five minutes and in the care of one or both parents at the time.

Avoid distractions when supervising children around water.

If a child is missing, check the water first. Seconds count in preventing death or disability.

Have appropriate equipment, such as reaching or throwing equipment, a cell phone, life jackets and a first aid kit.

Know how and when to call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number.

Enroll in Red Cross home pool safety, water safety, first aid and CPR/AED courses to learn how to prevent and respond to emergencies.

Protect your skin. Limit the amount of direct sunlight you receive between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. and wear sunscreen with a protection factor of at least 15.

Drink plenty of water regularly, even if you're not thirsty. Avoid drinks with alcohol or caffeine in them




