

tains the majority of its stock from the Northern Illinois Food Bank, Jennifer Nau, Communications Director at the food bank said, "The Northern Illinois Food Bank is currently providing food to pantries in 13 Illinois counties. The pantries in our network must have a board of directors, a governing body or a formal advisory group that establish policies and procedure including budgeting. For every \$1 spent a network food pantry receives \$8 in food."

Nau said, "Food pantries in our network must be a 501(c)(3) non profit, but are not required to have a separate 501(c)(3) registration if they are part of a church or other charitable organization.

"Although there may be some fluc-

churches involved in the food pantry act as a board of directors and provide the majority of the funding. Bucheneau said, "We also receive contributions directly from people in the area as well as cash contributions from some businesses and community organizations like the VFW. The churches and other groups such as schools have food drives as well, providing canned and packaged goods.

'Sunbeam Bakery in Monroe, Wi. has helped us with bread and baked goods. Several other businesses in Illinois and the Monroe area have also been very helpful."

When asked about the facilities, Bucheneau said, "The church does a good job with the building upkeep. The church operates the clothing and thrift store that is in the front of the building. At the back of the building is the Frienship Center for the elderly who cannot be on their own during the day. The food pantry is in between.

"The inside of the pantry is pretty well organized. We have freezers and refrigerators for meat, frozen items and perishables. Two volunteers are on duty to run the pantry when we're open. The majority of our volunteers come from the churches that sponsor us. We do our best to use different volunteers each week to vary the work load.'





VIEWPOINT And another thing explain better than me, we remember til it's brimming with enough mem-

Remember the good ol' days? Those golden-hued times when everyone was happy? When we were all employed in well-paying jobs we loved, when disease was all but wiped out, when schools were routinely graduating everyone who came through their doors, when crime and other social maladies were practically non-existent, and when everyone al-

ways said please and thank you? Do you remember these times? Yeah, I don't either.

I'm about midway through my seventh decade on this planet (that means I'm in my 60s, but who's counting?), so I've been around long enough and witnessed enough and survived enough to categorically say that the "good ol' days" weren't that great. They weren't that bad, either. They were good and bad. They were . . . davs.

There's something about the past that causes us to romanticize and feel nostalgic over decades-old mundane events that we thought little of when they happened. But through some filtering process that psychologists can

the good and leave the bad behind. Most of the time, anyway.

Perhaps you recall a trip to the beach many years ago when the sky was a deep azure blue which was reflected on the calm, still water, water so warm it felt as if you were reclining in a bath tub, and the sun was a golden ball in this deep blue sky which provided just enough rays to give you a golden tan that lasted all summer and was the envy of your many, many friends.

What you may not recall was your dad griping about the traffic on the way to the beach, the car's lack of air conditioning on this sweltering day, the hassle to find a place for your beach towels and other items because everyone else in three counties had the same idea, the flies buzzing around your food, and the sunburn so intense you couldn't sit back in a chair for two days.

But, you filter out the bad and keep the good and, presto, a good memory you can add to your Good Memory Account that is safely tucked away at the Good Ol' Days Bank and Trust. Eventually, this account grows unories to provide material for a feelgood Disney movie and two sequels. There is, though, one little problem. These golden memories of ours must be put into the context of the era in which they were created.

Like others of my vintage, I remember things big and small from my late-50s, early-60s childhood. And, like anyone else, I filtered out much of the bad and kept much of the good. I remember the good days and filter out the bad because there were, to me anyway, more good than bad, so the task was easy. The Cuban Missile Crisis and the beginnings of the Viet Nam war didn't mean too much to a 10-year-old. But, what happens when the bad outweighs the good? What happens when day-to-day existence is so terrible, so stressful, so horrid that very little, if anything, can be remembered with the golden light of nostalgia?

Folks currently in their early 80s may remember the early 1940s as a wonderful time because they were small children then. To them, life was blissful and simple and filled full of the usual childhood joys that

we all experienced. But to an adult back then, the time was not so ideal, nor was the decade that preceded it, the decade of the Great Depression. Memories of war, hunger, unemployment, and the poverty that touched so many lives then were so pervasive, that when these people approached old age, it is highly doubtful that they considered the 1930s and 40s as the golden age of their lives. Not with all they had to go through.

So when would these people who are now in their 90s and older consider their Good Ol' Days to have been? Perhaps the 1950s, a decade that by comparison to the previous two, must have seemed like bliss. As described by historian David Halberstam in his aptly-titled book, The Fifties, the decade of the Eisenhower administrations was anything but stagnant, as some have said. Many of the people that had suffered danger and privation during the preceding twenty years now found themselves in a stable environment with their own home in a new neighborhood, their own new car, their own appliances, and an overall idyllic lifestyle that allowed them to make money (and babies). NBC newsman Tom Brokaw called this group of people The Greatest Generation for good reason. After what they went through, they are rightly entitled to their Good Ol Days.

But to you, the reader: what are your Good Ol' Days? Are they just a few sunny days at the beach when you were kids, a complete decade that offered a respite after twenty years of suffering? Perhaps they're when you're just entering adulthood and you got that first good job right after marrying your high school sweetheart and then before you know it, you're reading Good Night Moon to that precious little baby who has no idea what you're saying because she's just a baby, but that doesn't matter because she's your baby and she's perfect.

Yeah, maybe these will be your Good Ol' Days someday. You won't remember the jabs to your ribs at 3 AM and then hearing those six little words you really didn't want to hear; "It's your turn to feed her." Well, most of those times, anyway. But, you will remember, "Goodnight stars, goodnight air, goodnight noises evervwhere.'








Have you ever dreamt of spending the night in a museum? No, this is not a movie, it's Science Siesta! Hosted by University of Illinois Extension, this annual event for fourthsixth grade girls will take place on April 21 and 22. Once again, this program will be held at the Discovery Center Children's Museum in Rockford. This action-packed overnight will combine the fun of a pajama party with hands-on science experiences. "This is our sixteenth year of conducting Science Siesta, we have reached over 2,400 girls so far and we are excited to continue to offer this fun, interactive event to encourage girls to consider science-related career fields," said Johnna Jennings, University of Extension 4-H Youth Development Educator.

At Science Siesta, girls have the opportunity to meet females in actual science career fields from throughout northern Illinois. The scientists will share information about their background and involve the girls in activities much like they complete in their work every day.

Following the face-to-face interaction with female scientists, youth participate in activities based on the "Wonderwise" curriculum developed by the University of Nebraska. This curriculum highlights the work of female scientists and then translates their work into hands-on science based activities, which are fun and engaging. Participating girls

may choose one of three workshop tracks for breakout sessions. Their choices include activities from "Vet Detective", "Parasite Sleuth" and "Urban Ecologist". Statistics show that girls are less

Statistics show that girls are less likely to pursue degrees and careers in science and mathematics than boys. Researchers agree that this is a complex problem with no easy answers, but believe that there are things that can be done. They suggest that having role models that girls can look up to, as well as making science fun and interactive will encourage girls to stay involved and interested in science. Events such as Science Siesta are designed to help bridge the gap for girls at a time when many may start to lose interest in science or question whether science is a field they should choose.

Science Siesta for Girls will begin with registration at 5 p.m. on Friday, April 21 and will conclude with check-out at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, April 22. The registration fee is \$40 per girl. The registration fee covers pizza, snack, breakfast, admission to the Discovery Center Children's Museum and all hands-on activities. The not so skinny cook

One day it is warm, and the next day it is freezing. My tulips are confused! Sounds as if this week will be no different than the past several weeks have been. And as they say, time marches on (a little pun on March there). Lent is in full force, so there are a couple of meatless recipes. St. Patrick's Day is coming up-Sullivan's has a lot of corned beef in the meat case. Today the column features two recipes for the Irish in all of us.

Slow Cooker Corned Beef

and Cabbage Stew Stew:

1 T. oil

2 large onions, chopped 2 large garlic cloves, finely chopped

- 4 C. sliced cabbage
- 3 C. sliced red potatoes
- 1 carton (32 oz.) chicken broth
- 2 C. water
- 2 dried bay leaves
- 1/3 C. chopped fresh parsley

1/2 t. pepper

spice packet

Spray a 6-7 quart slow cooker with cooking spray. In a large skillet, heat the oil over medium-high heat. Cook the onions and garlic in oil for 4-5 minutes, stirring occasionally, until softened. Add the cabbage and cook 2-3 minutes until slightly wilted. Spoon the mixture into the slow cooker.

Add the potatoes, broth, water,, bay leaves, 1/3 cup parsley and the pepper to the slow cooker; stir. Top with corned beef and sprinkle with the contents of the spice packet. Cover and cook on LOW heat setting for 6 hours.

Remove beef from slow cooker. Discard the bay leaves. Chop beef, discarding fat. Return the beef to slow cooker and stir other ingre-1 corned beef brisket (3 lbs.) with dients. Serve with the horseradish

Horseradish Sauce

1 C. sour cream

- 3 T. prepared horseradish
- 1 T. chopped fresh parsley
- 1 t. grated lemon peel.

In a small bowl, stir together the ingredients. Refrigerate until serving time.

Slow-Cooker Irish Soda Bread 1 egg

1 container (16 oz.) sour cream 1/4 C. butter, melted 1/4 C. packed brown sugar

3¾ C. flour

1 t. baking soda

¹∕₂ t. salt

1 C. raisins

Mix the egg, sour cream, butter and sugar in a bowl until blended. Combine the flour, baking soda and salt in a large bowl. Add the sour cream mixture and raisins; stir just until mixture forms soft dough. Place on a lightly floured board; knead 10 times or just until dough is smooth and no longer sticky. (Do not over mix.) Shape dough into a ball and place in a 4-qt. slow cooker sprayed with cooking spray. Use a sharp knife to cut 1/4-inchdeep "X" in top of dough. Cover with the lid.

Cook on HIGH 23/4 to 3 hours or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Turn off the slow cooker; remove the lid. Let bread stand 10 minutes. Run a knife around the edge of the slow cooker to loosen bread. Transfer the bread to a wire rack to cool. If you have some leftover bread, it is great served toasted and spread



• Pearl City School Board policy 2:230(2) read, "Identify oneself and be brief. Ordinarily comments shall be limited to 5 minutes". At the May 2013 School Board meeting, President Bremmer announced that they had a new "rule". They would be limiting public comments to 2 minutes. Still they allowed some to speak longer than 2 minutes and another individual used profanity during their comment time. Then others were told loudly and rudely by President Bremmer to sit down at the 2 minute time. A complaint was filed with the Attorney General's office in August 2016 concerning the OMA (Open Meetings Act). After receiving a copy of the complaint, Supt. Thill suggested at the September 2016 School Board meeting that they change the policy to read 2 minutes and the amended version of Policy 2:230 through that evening. Six board members voted yes, and R. Johnson voted nay. In October 2016, the Attorney General found that the Board violated the requirement of the OMA by imposing a restriction on public comment that is not authorized by its established and recorded rules. Supt. Thill then had to backtrack and take the correct action on amending a School Policy. The amended version was presented to the public at the November 2016 Board meeting, giving the public 30 days to review the changes, and then voted on at the December 2016 Board meeting. Again, vote was 6-yes, 1-nay. Why did the Administration and School Board Members not know their own school board policies? Why did they try to incorrectly amend it? Why did Supt. Thill state that the community member who filed the complaint cost the School District money? Confused??

When the budget was to be voted on at the November 2016 School Board meeting, a member of the audience ask why they did not supply a copy of the budget to those in the audience. Principal Wallace stated that it was on the School website for the past 30 days. This audience member had been checking the website everyday and the 2017/18 budget did not appear on the website until the day of the board meeting. Confusing???

Also in the December 2016 School Newsletter, Supt. Thill stated that there had been 3 Office of Civil Rights complaints filed. But at the December School Board meeting, Thill ranted to a member in the audience that CFE was lying to the community. He said that there had only been 2 OCR complaints filed and that the District did not violate any student rights. OCR's mission is to ensure equal access to education and to enforce civil rights in our nation's schools. OCR found evidence and reason to investigate each case filed. The School District signed a resolution agreement and took steps to address issues and correct policies. Based on this, how can Supt. Thill state that the District did nothing wrong? Only one School Board member spoke with the families and showed concern. What does this say about our other School Board members? Truly Confused!!!

A complaint was filed by a member of the community in regards to the spraying of the football field. This complaint was filed in concern for the safety of our children and the people of the community. The state found that the School District did not have a proper policy in place for the spraying and the ones who did the spraying did not have the proper license. The State handed out fines for pesticide misuse to the School District and those individuals involved in the spraying. A group of community members took up money to pay for the school fine. Supt. Thill recommended to the board that they "gift" the three people whom were fined, passes to all school home games. Thill also stated, "we can't give them money, but the passes would not cost the school anything". Really?? We certainly understand that the spraying was done out of the goodness of their hearts, and people of the community give their time and money for good causes. But the State has rules in place and schools have policies in place to protect the health and safety of all. Why did the School Board and Administration not accept that wrong was done and move forward? Why were people rewarded for an illegal act? Again! Confused!

Supt. Thill has made the statement at School Board meetings that people of the district were "costing" the district money. Again, in his December 2016 Newsletter, he mentioned the cost of legal fees because of frivolous complaints. OCR found reason to investigate. The Attorney General found the District was not following Policy, and the State found reason to hand out fines in the spraying incident. Why would the health and safety of our students, and the right to have your voice heard, be frivolous things to the Superintendent? It is the responsibility of the School Board and Administration to follow School polices and State laws. It is sad when community members have to file complaints to make sure the District does the "right" thing.

The School Board has read letters and heard from people of the district giving them praise and thanks for the wonderful job they are doing. But when they have individuals stand and voice a concern over their actions, not one board member or administrator thanks them for bringing their concerns to the board's attention. Really Confused???

• So we ask the School Board members - Do you know your School Board Policies and do you care that they are being followed correctly? Or do you simply lack knowledge of policies and rules and your duty as a School Board member?
