## New Apple River market opens in celebration of family and community

The thistle is beautiful, fierce and robust making it a perfect native born icon for Jo Daviess County with its stunning landscapes, tumultuous history and resilient people. And, the plant is ideally suited as a name for a new business in Apple River called The Thriving Thistle Market.

"The thistle really is kind of an analogy for lots of things in life," said Liz Stocks who owns and operates the new market with husband Geoff, their two little people and a new puppy. "Starting with the roots, having a strong foundation, having a strong sense of community whether that's the Apple River community or the Jo Daviess County community or your family and then coming up to find the thorns on the stem representing the twists and turns in life or the harder edge, but if you can look past the harder edge and continue on your journey you find a beautiful, soft and downy flower which is also known for having medicinal healing prop-

She said not many people want thistles, but the Stock family does; The Thriving Thistle Market that is.

"This all came about as Geoff's big heart saw a need in the Apple River community," Stocks said. "The old gas station has been closed for quite a while now as has the grocery in the village, so we just saw the need and started working to make it happen."

The market will be a full service gas station offering both premium and regular gas and the premium will

"We will also offer diesel," said Stocks, "We will have a "made to order" kitchen for breakfast and lunch as well as a full service coffee bar and a complete convenience store. We will carry local products too."

She lists products from nearby Arnold's Farm known for its grass fed beef and plump chickens, Dee's Delights with her homemade jams and salsa, products from Galena Garlic, Molitor's chickens, honey from Master Beekeeper Terry Ingram and his Apple Creek Apiaries.

We want this all to be kind of a celebration where folks could come to one place and find products that are produced locally," Stocks said. "During the summer we're going to have a Farmer's Market on Friday afternoons and Saturday mornings. And, we are looking for area farmers regardless of the size of their operations to participate in that market. Contact us if you are interested."

She said the new enterprise is not at all what they expected life to look like, but it is exciting and they are ready to go.





## And another thing

Remember the good ol' days? Those golden-hued times when everyone was happy? When we were all employed in well-paying jobs we loved, when disease was all but wiped out, when schools were routinely graduating everyone who came through their doors, when crime and other social maladies were practically non-existent, and when everyone always said please and thank you?

Do you remember these times? Yeah, I don't either.

I'm about midway through my seventh decade on this planet (that means I'm in my 60s, but who's counting?), so I've been around long enough and witnessed enough and survived enough to categorically say that the "good ol' days" weren't that great. They weren't that bad, either. They were good and bad. They were . . .

There's something about the past that causes us to romanticize and feel nostalgic over decades-old mundane events that we thought little of when they happened. But through some filtering process that psychologists can

the good and leave the bad behind. Most of the time, anyway.

Perhaps you recall a trip to the beach many years ago when the sky was a deep azure blue which was reflected on the calm, still water, water so warm it felt as if you were reclining in a bath tub, and the sun was a golden ball in this deep blue sky which provided just enough rays to give you a golden tan that lasted all summer and was the envy of your many, many friends.

What you may not recall was your dad griping about the traffic on the way to the beach, the car's lack of air conditioning on this sweltering day, the hassle to find a place for your beach towels and other items because everyone else in three counties had the same idea, the flies buzzing around your food, and the sunburn so intense you couldn't sit back in a chair for two days.

But, you filter out the bad and keep the good and, presto, a good memory you can add to your Good Memory Account that is safely tucked away at the Good Ol' Days Bank and Trust.

Eventually, this account grows un-

explain better than me, we remember til it's brimming with enough memories to provide material for a feelgood Disney movie and two sequels. There is, though, one little problem. These golden memories of ours must be put into the context of the era in which they were created.

Like others of my vintage, I remember things big and small from my late-50s, early-60s childhood. And, like anyone else, I filtered out much of the bad and kept much of the good. I remember the good days and filter out the bad because there were, to me anyway, more good than bad, so the task was easy. The Cuban Missile Crisis and the beginnings of the Viet Nam war didn't mean too much to a 10-year-old. But, what happens when the bad outweighs the good? What happens when day-to-day existence is so terrible, so stressful, so horrid that very little, if anything, can be remembered with the golden light

Folks currently in their early 80s may remember the early 1940s as a wonderful time because they were small children then. To them, life was blissful and simple and filled full of the usual childhood joys that

we all experienced. But to an adult back then, the time was not so ideal, nor was the decade that preceded it, the decade of the Great Depression. Memories of war, hunger, unemployment, and the poverty that touched so many lives then were so pervasive, that when these people approached old age, it is highly doubtful that they considered the 1930s and 40s as the golden age of their lives. Not with all they had to go through.

So when would these people who are now in their 90s and older consider their Good Ol' Days to have been? Perhaps the 1950s, a decade that by comparison to the previous two, must have seemed like bliss. As described by historian David Halberstam in his aptly-titled book, The Fifties, the decade of the Eisenhower administrations was anything but stagnant, as some have said. Many of the people that had suffered danger and privation during the preceding twenty years now found themselves in a stable environment with their own home in a new neighborhood, their own new car, their own appliances, and an overall idyllic lifestyle that allowed them to make money (and babies). NBC newsman Tom Brokaw called this group of people The Greatest Generation for good reason. After what they went through, they are rightly entitled to their Good Ol

But to you, the reader: what are your Good Ol' Days? Are they just a few sunny days at the beach when you were kids, a complete decade that offered a respite after twenty years of suffering? Perhaps they're when you're just entering adulthood and you got that first good job right after marrying your high school sweetheart and then before you know it, you're reading Good Night Moon to that precious little baby who has no idea what you're saying because she's just a baby, but that doesn't matter because she's your baby and she's perfect.

Yeah, maybe these will be your Good Ol' Days someday. You won't remember the jabs to your ribs at 3 AM and then hearing those six little words you really didn't want to hear; "It's your turn to feed her." Well, most of those times, anyway. But, you will remember, "Goodnight stars, goodnight air, goodnight noises evervwhere.'

## Science Siesta! girls + science = fun!

Have you ever dreamt of spending the night in a museum? No, this is not a movie, it's Science Siesta! Hosted by University of Illinois Extension, this annual event for fourthsixth grade girls will take place on April 21 and 22. Once again, this program will be held at the Discovery Center Children's Museum in Rockford. This action-packed overnight will combine the fun of a pajama party with hands-on science experiences. "This is our sixteenth year of conducting Science Siesta, we have reached over 2,400 girls so far and we are excited to continue to offer this fun, interactive event to encourage girls to consider science-related career fields," said Johnna Jennings, University of Extension 4-H Youth Development Educator.

At Science Siesta, girls have the opportunity to meet females in actual science career fields from throughout northern Illinois. The scientists will share information about their background and involve the girls in activities much like they complete in their work every day.

Following the face-to-face interaction with female scientists, youth participate in activities based on the 'Wonderwise" curriculum developed by the University of Nebraska. This curriculum highlights the work of female scientists and then translates their work into hands-on science based activities, which are fun and engaging. Participating girls

may choose one of three workshop tracks for breakout sessions. Their choices include activities from "Vet Detective", "Parasite Sleuth" and "Urban Ecologist".

Statistics show that girls are less likely to pursue degrees and careers in science and mathematics than boys. Researchers agree that this is a complex problem with no easy answers, but believe that there are things that can be done. They suggest that having role models that girls can look up to, as well as making science fun and interactive will encourage girls to stay involved and interested in science. Events such as Science Siesta are designed to help bridge the gap for girls at a time when many may start to lose interest in science or question whether science is a field they should choose.

Science Siesta for Girls will begin with registration at 5 p.m. on Friday, April 21 and will conclude with check-out at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, April 22. The registration fee is \$40 per girl. The registration fee covers pizza, snack, breakfast, admission to the Discovery Center Children's Museum and all hands-on activities. 

The not so skinny cook

One day it is warm, and the next day it is freezing. My tulips are confused! Sounds as if this week will be no different than the past several weeks have been. And as they say, time marches on (a little pun on March there). Lent is in full force, so there are a couple of meatless up-Sullivan's has a lot of corned beef in the meat case. Today the column features two recipes for the Irish

#### **Slow Cooker Corned Beef** and Cabbage Stew

1 T. oil

2 large onions, chopped

2 large garlic cloves, finely chopped

4 C. sliced cabbage

3 C. sliced red potatoes

1 carton (32 oz.) chicken broth

2 C. water

2 dried bay leaves

1/3 C. chopped fresh parsley

½ t. pepper

Spray a 6-7 quart slow cooker with cooking spray. In a large skillet, heat the oil over medium-high heat. Cook the onions and garlic in oil for 4-5 minutes, stirring occasionally, until softened. Add the cabbage and cook 2-3 minutes until slightly wilted. Spoon the mixture into the slow

Add the potatoes, broth, water,, bay leaves, 1/3 cup parsley and the pepper to the slow cooker; stir. Top with corned beef and sprinkle with the contents of the spice packet. Cover and cook on LOW heat setting for

Remove beef from slow cooker. Discard the bay leaves. Chop beef, discarding fat. Return the beef to slow cooker and stir other ingre-1 corned beef brisket (3 lbs.) with dients. Serve with the horseradish

#### **Horseradish Sauce**

1 C. sour cream

3 T. prepared horseradish

1 T. chopped fresh parsley 1 t. grated lemon peel.

In a small bowl, stir together the ingredients. Refrigerate until serving time.

#### **Slow-Cooker Irish Soda Bread**

1 egg

1 container (16 oz.) sour cream

1/4 C. butter, melted

1/4 C. packed brown sugar

3¾ C. flour

1 t. baking soda

½ t. salt

1 C. raisins

Mix the egg, sour cream, butter and sugar in a bowl until blended. Combine the flour, baking soda and salt in a large bowl. Add the sour cream mixture and raisins; stir just until mixture forms soft dough. Place on a lightly floured board; knead 10 times or just until dough is smooth and no longer sticky. (Do not over mix.) Shape dough into a ball and place in a 4-qt. slow cooker sprayed with cooking spray. Use a sharp knife to cut 1/4-inchdeep "X" in top of dough. Cover

with the lid. Cook on HIGH 234 to 3 hours or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Turn off the slow cooker; remove the lid. Let bread stand 10 minutes. Run a knife around the edge of the slow cooker to loosen bread. Transfer the bread to a wire rack to cool. If you have some leftover bread, it is great served toasted and spread with butter or your favorite jam.

"Anyone can be a victim of a scam, but scammers often target individuals whom they perceive as vulnerable, so older adults tend to be targeted again and again," said Graves. "These crimes take a toll, both financially and emotionally. Financial exploitation can seriously affect the lives of seniors and their families, who are often unaware until it's too late," added Graves.

Persons who expose themselves to sales situations, even legitimate ones, are more likely to be victimized by fraud. Consumers of all ages should start doing this today:

Get a non-published number and install an answering machine with a large caller ID display. Screen all incoming calls. Pick up only if you recognize the caller. Otherwise, let the call roll to the answering ma-

Opt-out of pre-approved credit offers by enrolling in the national credit bureaus' Opt Out program. Call (888) 567-8688 or go to www.DeliveringTrust.com and sign up online.

## It is a daily challenge to maintain health in our modern world




