## Lady Wolves upsetting <br> tournament bracket

The defending Sectional Champion Pearl City Wolves took another step towards attempting to defend their 2016 Title as they worked through the early rounds of the IHSA Class 1A Girls' Softball State Tournament. As they go, they are upsetting teams along the way.
When the 2017 regular season came to a close the Lady Wolves had started to get a few pieces working even more, as the fluidity of their game became decidedly more noticeable.
Even as the IHSA Selection Committee issued the Lady Wolves the six-seed, expectations were kept low. They were favored to knock off nineseed Freeport Aquin in the "play-in" Monday, May 15 match and they accomplished that task, winning 12-0 in the rules-shortened affair. After that though, the seeds began working against them.
Pearl City started fast and scored three runs in the home half of the first inning. They added five in the second and had collected the 12-0 edge by the end of the third frame.
Aquin was held to three hits in the loss. Pearl City had plenty of offensive support and they spread around the duties of run collection in their firstround win.
Tyra Clark had two home runs in the game, knocked home five runs and scored a pair of her own. Kendra Melville was 2-3 with three runs scored for Pearl City. Teammate Macayla Pilson and Meg Tessendorf also ended the day batting at a .667 clip. The Lady Wolves moved to 16-10 following the win.
Things got a lot harder for the de-fending Sectional Champion Lady Wolves as they battled in the Class 1 A Eastland Regional semi-final. They had to face the home team and the overall number-two seed Eastland. Things were even harder still for the

Lady Cougars as they failed to connect on starting pitcher Kendra Melville. Her perfect game was only marked by two team errors committed.
The talented senior hurler struck out nine batters in her seven innings of work and helped pilot the upset of Eastland. The win put Pearl City in the Eastland Regional Final on Saturday, May 20 and things turned out exactly as Head Coach Mark Melville had hoped.
Lena-Winslow fought into the final inning but could not complete their journey, as the hope for a shot for the right to play in the Dakota Sectional this week opened without them.
Pearl City captured the round one title and looked for more this week as they prepared to face either twoseed Pecatonica or upset-minded, sixseed Ashton-Franklin Center in the Tuesday, May 23 Dakota Sectional semi-final. Those two teams met on Monday, May 22 as a result of a weekend weather influence. Details on that match are unavailable at this time.

## Bustos deeply concerned by Trump

 administration's decision to undermine job-creating rural development programsCongresswoman Cheri Bustos (D-IL), Co-Chair of the Democratic Policy and Communications Committee, expressed great concern regarding the Trump Administration's decision to eliminate the Rural Development Undersecretary position. This week, it was announced that they have decided to eliminate a senior level, Senate confirmed position at the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) that spearheaded the department's efforts to create jobs and grow the economy in rural communities. As was reported, new Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue made the decision to restructure the USDA, including an extremely ill-advised decision to eliminate the position of Undersecretary for Rural Development.
The Rural Development mission area is the only mission area at USDA focused exclusively on improving the economic and quality of life in rural and small town America. Rural Development programs help provide financing and support for local businesses and construction of key infrastructure in these communisystems, electrification, broadband, rural hospitals, police stations, nursing homes, and even fire trucks and emergency sirens.
This news comes following the March release of President Trump's budget blueprint which included a devastating 21 percent cut to the USDA's budget, including completely eliminating key water infrastructure
programs and business programs, and the April announcement to disband the White House Rural Council.
"Today's news is a gut punch for anyone in rural America who wants to see small businesses succeed on their Main Streets, new opportunities in their communities and better jobs for them and their neighbors," Congresswoman Cheri Bustos said. "After proposing devastating cuts that would hurt family farmers, now the Trump Administration is planning to eliminate the dedicated Senate confirmed leadership post focused exclusively on rural economic development programs with a proven track record of creating jobs in rural America and helping small businesses in small towns succeed. President Trump might say something different in his tweets, but his actions send an unmistakable message that rural America isn't a priority. I'm committed to putting hardworking families first and this action is step in the wrong direction.

## Background:

According to testimony to the House Committee on Agriculture, during the last Administration, the USDA's Rural Development program helped about 112,000 rural small businesses grow, creating or saving an estimated 450,000 jobs. It also provided funding for more than 6,600 critical community projects such as hospitals, libraries, schools, and public safety facilities while sup-

porting more than 3,000 multi-family housing developments. In just fiscal year 2015 alone, the USDA's rural development program also helped more than 1.1 million rural families buy, repair or refinance a home, enabling more than 141,000 rural Americans to achieve the American dream of homeownership. Rural Development also manages a loan portfolio of 1.3 million loans valued at over $\$ 216$ billion in investments in rural America.

Rural Development has also invested a total of $\$ 13.3$ billion since FY 2009 in new or improved infrastructure in rural areas through 10,623 water projects. These improvements helped nearly 18 million rural residents gain access to clean drinking water and better waste-water disposal. ## In Illinois' 17th <br> Congressional District

Jo-Carroll Energy, an electric cooperative in Elizabeth, Illinois, has been key in bringing USDA Rural Development funding to Northwest Illinois.

A $\$ 447,155$ loan was used to construct new equipment at Neumiller Farm, a third generation potato and vegetable farm operation located between Savanna and Thomson, streamlining their processes and supporting job growth.

Jo-Carroll Energy, Inc. received a $\$ 36,665$ grant in 2016 through the Rural Energy for America Program. They will use these funds to install a ground source heat pump system at their newly expanded and current facility, which will be around 6,800 square feet.

The project is expected to save them around $\$ 18,000$ in energy costs and save approximately 174,000 kWh ( $85 \%$ savings) per year, which is enough electricity to power 16 homes. These energy efficiency improvements are expected to have less
than an eight-year payback.
Rural Business Cooperative Service administers job training, energy, and business development programs, including cooperative and business development, community economic development, regional planning and financing, rural and Tribal placebased approaches and other self-help initiatives. RBS also offers programs to provide the educational opportunities, training, technical support, and tools for rural residents to start small businesses.

In FY 2015, RBS helped more than 12,500 rural businesses through $\$ 1.5$ billion in loans, loan guarantees, and grants. Since 2009, USDA has helped over 112,000 rural businesses start or expand operations with nearly $\$ 11$ billion in investments.

The Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant Program has made over 600 awards totaling over $\$ 365$ million assisting nearly 1,100 businesses and helping create or save over 31,000 jobs since 2009. In FY 2015, RBS made under this program 38 loans, totaling $\$ 38.6$ million, and 33 grants, totaling approximately $\$ 9.2$ million.
The Rural Energy for America Program (REAP) has significantly contributed to doubling the number of farms using renewable energy production in the last five years. Since 2009, RBS renewable energy programs have made 11,649 awards to provide over $\$ 720$ million in funding to agricultural producers and rural small businesses to strengthen rural economies.

In 1945, he established his own trucking business. Ray partnered with Fred Fogel of Lena in 1947 to start a rock phosphate business. This was expanded in 1950 to include the sale of barn cleaners, silo unloaders, feeding equipment, silos, and the construction and remodeling of farm buildings and barns. Ray and Fred built a warehouse for the Walnut Grove Feed Company. In 1961, Ray joined in partnership with Paul Lobdell to establish a fertilizer business that included the sale and spreading of liquid and dry fertilizers. After 45 years, Ray sold his business in 1988 to his son and daughter-in-law. The new business became Stamm Farm Systems, Inc. Ray was a member of Winslow Town Board, Gun Club, Paradise Cove Water Wheel Club, Lions Club (Charter), Boy Scouts (Charter Leader), Masonic Lodge and Consistory (30 years). He was a member of the Freeport YMCA for 23 years and the Lena Community Card Club for over 50 years. He served as a Director at the Citizens State Bank of Lena for 33 years before retiring in 1998. Ray was an avid sportsman that fished and hunted in Canada and several states. Ray belonged to a Wyoming hunting group for 25 years and a Montana hunting club. He was a lifetime member of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church (formerly Amity) in Lena. He served on the church council and many other committees, including the property committee for 25 years.

## Japanese Knotweed: an emerging invasive weed in Jo Davies County

Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation (JDCF) staff has observed a new invasive weed, Japanese Knotweed (Fallopia japonica/Polygonum cuspidatum), around streams and drainage ditches in in the Galena area. Invasive species, often plants or animals arriving from other continents, have
created huge challenges for land managers of conservation lands in NW Illinois. If left unmanaged Japanese Knotweed could spread further around the county including into preserved natural areas causing ecological and economic harm. JDCF staff would like to halt the spread of Japanese Knotweed by treating populations throughout the county with no cost to the landowner JDCF secured a grant from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation to assist in this effort.

Japanese Knotweed was originally introduced to North America from Asia as an ornamental plant. Once established it spreads rapidly creating a density that out-competes native species reducing the health and wildlife habitat in forests, stream corridors and wet prairies. Japanese Knotweed grows well in moist areas such as stream banks, roadsides, and floodplains. Dense patches of Japanese Knotweed destabilize stream banks leading to erosion and physical degradation of sensitive areas. Japanese Knotweed can grow 3-10ft tall with large triangular to heart shaped leaves and multiple spikes of white flowers. The most identifiable characteristic is the thick jointed stem that is often a reddish purple color see photo. If you believe you have Japanese Knotweed on your property please contact JDCF at striketeam@ jdcf.org or (815) 858-9100.

All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in
most states ( 16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood donors can now save time at their next donation by using RapidPass to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, prior to arriving at the blood drive. ## U of I Extension offers Water Bath and Pressure Canning Workshop

If you are thinking of giving canning a try this summer great! Welcome to the world of home food preservation. "Home food preservation has become extremely popular, once again. Years ago, people preserved their own food out of necessity. Now, people are preserving their
food for more other reasons. Canning provides a sense of healthfulness, independence, and canning benefits the environment, by reducing your carbon footprint," states University of Illinois Extension Nutrition and Wellness Educator, Diane Reinhold. Canning is a great way to preserve
the foods you have grown in your garden, or have purchased from your local Farmer's Market. Moreover, canning allows you to enjoy the wonderful tastes of summer all year long.
There are two methods of canning, water boiling canning and pressure

canning. The acidity of the food will actually determine the processing method. The boiling-water canning method will be used for foods that are acidic, meaning they have a pH of 4.6 or less. Most fruits are naturally high in acid and thus are safe to process, using this method. How ever, some foods require additional acid such as pickled foods, tomatoes and figs.

Low-acid foods on the other hand will not be acidic enough to prevent the growth of a dangerous bacterium called Clostridium botulinum. Therefore must be processed using a pressure canner. A pressure canner is the only safe method for processing low acid foods. Low-acid foods include carrots, corn, green beans, potatoes and peas, just to name a few.

From the offices of U.S. Senator Dick DurbinSenators call for answers on stalled student debt relief
Following reports that the Trump Administration has stopped granting relief to student loan borrowers defrauded by for-profit colleges, U.S. Senators Dick Durbin (D-IL), Chuck Schumer (D-NY), Patty Murray (DWA), Sherrod Brown (D-OH), and Elizabeth Warren (D-MA) demanded answers regarding the delay of payment on tens of thousands of student loan discharges and refunds approved under the "borrower defense" authority.
On January 13th, the U.S. Department of Education announced that it had notified 23,000 defrauded students that they would receive discharges and refunds within 60 and 120 days. In recent weeks, Politico and the New York Times have reported that the new Administration has essentially halted the processing of tens of thousands of pending borrower defense applications from former students of Corinthian, ITT Tech, and other schools. In addition, many
Red Poppies and Memorial Day

In 1915, inspired by the poem "In Flanders Fields," Moina Michael conceived of an idea to wear red poppies on Memorial day in honor of those who died serving the nation during war. She was the first to wear one, and sold poppies to her friends and co-workers with the money going to benefit servicemen in need. Later a Madam Guerin from France was visiting the United States and learned of this new custom started by Ms. Michael. When she returned to France she made artificial red poppies to raise money for war orphaned children and widowed women. This tradition spread to other countries. In 1921, the Fran-co-American Children's League sold poppies nationally to benefit war orphans of France and Belgium. The League disbanded a year later and Madam Guerin approached the VFW for help.
Shortly before Memorial Day in 1922 the VFW became the first veterans' organization to nationally sell poppies. Two years later their "Buddy" Poppy program was selling artificial poppies made by disabled veterans. In 1948 the US Post Office honored Ms. Michael for her role in

That problem is nothing compared to the hundreds of acres of corn that still need to be planted. I think I had better quit whining and move on to some recipes for the week. I pray for sun and drying out! This week's recipes are some you can use for the Memorial Day holiday.
The first recipe is for an interesting deviled egg. It uses the won ton wrappers for a little crunch as a garnish, the cream cheese spread which makes for a nice creamy egg, and some crab meat. Enjoy these unusual deviled eggs.

## Crab Rangoon

 Deviled Eggs3 won ton wrappers, cut into $11 / 2 \mathrm{x}$ 14-inch strips
1 dozen hard cooked eggs
$1 / 2$ C. mayonnaise
$1 / 2$ C. cream cheese spread
1 can ( 6 oz. ) crab meat, drained,

## flaked

2 green onions sliced; divided
Preheat the oven to 375 . Place won ton strips in single layer on baking sheet sprayed with cooking spray. Lightly spray the wrappers with additional cooking spray. Bake 3-4 minutes or until crisp and lightly browned. Remove from pan and place on paper towel. Set aside.

Cut eggs lengthwise in half. Remove the yolks; place in medium bowl. Mash with fork. Add the mayo and cream cheese spread and mix well. Stir in crabmeat and half the onions. Spoon the yolk mixture into the egg white halves. Top with remaining onions and baked won ton strips.
This unique strawberry salad is a take-off on the strawberry pretzel salad/dessert that is very popular. The crust is different, and you do have to plan ahead. This salad is a good one for the whole summer not just Memorial Day.

Preheat the oven to 350 . Combine the crushed chips, $1 / 4 \mathrm{C}$. sugar and the melted butter; press onto bottom of 9 x 13 baking dish sprayed with cooking spray. Bake 10 minutes. Cool.
Beat cream cheese, milk and remaining sugar in medium bowl with mixer until blended. Stir in 1 cup whipped topping; spread over the crust, completely covering crust. Refrigerate until ready to use.

Add boiling water to Jell-O mix in a large bowl. Stir for 2 minutes until completely dissolved. Stir in cold water, orange juice, lime zest and juice. Refrigerate $11 / 2$ hours or until thickened.

Stir strawberries into gelatin mixture; spoon over cream cheese layer. Refrigerate 3 hours or until firm Serve with a dollop of remaining whipped topping. Sprinkle with additional lime zest and garnish with lime wedges and a strawberry before serving.

This recipe uses the seasonal asparagus in a really easy pasta recipe. It is meatless (I think you could add some sautéed shrimp) and really easy to make. It has lots of good vegetables. There is very little clean up because it uses a pot and a skillet!

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Meanwhile, melt the butter in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add the asparagus, peas, green beans, onions, and a pinch of salt. Cook just until the onions soften, about 5 minutes. Add the heavy cream and chicken stock and cook until reduced slightly, about 3 minutes.
Add the pasta to the boiling water and cook as the label directs. Drain the pasta and transfer to the sauce; toss gently. Transfer everything to a serving bowl. Garnish with the parmesan and basil.
Memorial Day usually signals the first cook out. The next two recipes are great ways to eat the grilled meats that signal the beginning of summer. The chili dogs have a couple of unique spices that really enhances the flavor. Try this great chili sauce for plain old hot dogs. The second recipe is for an interesting take on brats; the addition of the Reuben elements gives the bratwurst a unique flavor. If you don't want to use beer, I have just boiled them in water, and the taste is really good. There are great brats at A.J.'s Meats and Sullivan Foods. We are lucky to have good meat right in our neighborhood.

## Cincinnati Chili Dogs

$11 / 2 \mathrm{lbs}$. ground beef
2 small onions, chopped and divided
2 cans ( 15 oz. each) tomato sauce
$11 / 2$ t. baking cocoa
$1 / 2 \mathrm{t}$. ground cinnamon
$1 / 4 \mathrm{t}$. chili powder
$1 / 4 \mathrm{t}$. paprika
$1 / 4$ t. garlic powder
2 T. Worcestershire sauce
1 T. cider vinegar
10 hot dogs
10 hot dog buns, split
Shredded cheddar cheese
In a large skillet over medium heat, cook and stir ground beef, crumbling meat, until no longer pink; drain In a 3 qt. slow cooker combine the browned beef with one chopped onion; add the tomato sauce, cocoa, cinnamon, chili powder, paprika, garlic powder, Worcestershire sauce, and vinegar. Cook, covered, on low for about 2 hours; add the hot dogs. Continue cooking, covered, on low until heated through, about 2 hours longer. Serve on buns; top with shredded cheddar and remaining chopped onion.

## 4 Brat buns

Heat a gas or charcoal grill. In 2-quart saucepan, heat beer to boiling. Add the bratwurst; reduce the
heat to low. Cover and simmer 15 minutes.

Drain bratwurst. Place on grill over medium heat. Cover the grill; cook 5-10 minutes, turning once, until brown.

Spread the dressing on cut sides of buns. Place bratwurst in buns; top with cheese, bratwurst and sauerkraut.

Broil directions: Set oven to broil. Place bratwurst on rack in broiler pan. Broil with tops 4-6 inches from heat for 5-10 minutes, turning once, until brown.
This recipe was sent to me last year. I managed to keep track of it, and I didn't lose it. Sometimes I put things away so well (you know about putting things away so you don't lose track of them) that I don't find them for several years. Enjoy this rhubarb bar that does require several steps. My reader said they are really good.

## Rhubarb Custard Bars

Crust:
$11 / 2$ C. flour
$1 / 2$ C. sugar
$1 / 8 \mathrm{t}$. salt
9 T . chilled butter, cut into small pieces
Filling:
$1 / 3$ C. flour
$11 / 2$ C. sugar
$11 / 2$ C. milk
3 large eggs
5 C. sliced rhubarb, cut into $1 / 2$ inch pieces

## Topping:

## $1 / 2 \mathrm{C}$. sugar

4 oz. cream cheese, softened
$1 / 2$ t. vanilla
1 C. Cool Whip, thawed
Preheat the oven to 350 . Crust: lightly spoon flour into dry measuring cups and level with a knife. Combine the flour, $1 / 2$ cup sugar, and salt in a bowl. Cut in butter with a pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse meal. Press into a 9 x 13 baking dish that has been coated with cooking spray. Bake at 350 for 15 minutes or until crust is golden brown.
Filling: Combine flour and sugar in a large bowl; add the milk and eggs, stirring with a whisk until well blended. Stir in rhubarb and pour the mixture over the crust. Bake at 350 for 40 minutes or until set. Cool to room temperature.
Topping: Place the sugar, cream cheese and vanilla in a bowl; beat with a mixer at medium speed until smooth. Gently fold in Cool Whip; spread evenly over the baked custard. Cover and chill at least 1 hour. Garnish with mint sprigs if desired.
Sometimes I get recipe suggestions from readers that are published in cookbooks in our area. This recipe is from the St. Ann's Catholic Church Centennial Cookbook. It is an old recipe for a rhubarb pudding. It is pretty simple and makes a great pudding that doesn't have the added calories of a crust. Try this different way to eat rhubarb that is "pie less."

## Rhubarb Pudding

4 C. rhubarb, diced

## A history of Memorial Day

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in service of the United States of America Over two dozen cities and towns claim to be the birthplace of Memorial Day. While Waterloo N.Y. was officially declared the birthplace of Memorial Day by President Lyndon Johnson in May 1966, it's difficult to prove conclusively the origins of the day.
Regardless of the exact date or location of its origins, one thing is clear - Memorial Day was borne out of the Civil War and a desire to honor our dead. It was officially proclaimed on 5 May 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in his General Order No. 11. "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late
rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed. The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle. On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers buried there

The first state to officially recognize the holiday was New York in 1873. By 1890 it was recognized by all of the northern states. The South refused to acknowledge the day, honoring their dead on separate days until after World War I (when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war).
It is now observed in almost every state on the last Monday in May with Congressional passage of the National Holiday Act of 1971.

## Senate takes action on budget

 and reform packageThe Senate began voting on a number of budget and reform measures that are part of the "Grand Bargain" budget plan, which has been worked on by Senate members on both sides of the aisle for months. The goal of the "Grand Bargain" is to create a bipartisan solution to the ongoing budget impasse in order to provide Illinois with a balanced budget along with structural reforms to help create jobs and boost the economy.
As voting on several of the measures began, Senate Republicans readily supported certain initiatives, such as pension reform and procurement reform, where bipartisan compromise was reached. However, we also urged our Democrat counterparts to hold on other critical measures that were not yet agreed upon, such as property tax relief, education funding reform, and local government consolidation. We reiterated the need to keep negotiating to ensure the best deal possible for taxpayers, students, and job creators. However, despite these requests Democrat lawmakers moved forward on a number of these issues.
Throughout the budget process, we have negotiated in good-faith with the Senate majority in an effort to bring budget stability and economic security to Illinois taxpayers. In the weeks leading up to the scheduled May 31 deadline, we remain committed to working with all parties to ensure the best deal possible is reached for Illinois residents. However, to act on legislation that is incomplete, or not agreed upon, may only derail the good-faith negotiations that they say are close to bearing fruit.
