

# VIEWPOINT Federal government proposes cutting support for Meals on Wheels

The Trump administration budget blueprint released in March calls for the elimination of two federal block grants: That's money the federal government gives the states for social welfare programs, and those programs include home-delivered meals and meals served in senior centers.

Most of the nation's 5,000 meal programs also rely on money from the Older Americans Act passed in 1965 to fund about 35 percent of the cost of the meals they serve. Those funds are also in jeopardy. The budget blueprint calls for an 18 percent cut to the budget of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), which administers the Act, and programs are bracing for more cuts.

Paul Kraintz who heads the senior nutrition program at Meals on Wheels in Martinez, California, says while his program would lose about \$67,000 it now gets from one of the block grants, he's really worried about the potential budget cut at HHS. "If they take 18 percent of that, it's going to be big.'

Why the attack on meals delivered to the elderly, many of whom are homebound, ill, and unable to cook or shop?

At his March news conference, budget director Mick Mulvaney told reporters, "Meals on Wheels sounds great," but to take that federal money and give it to the states, and say, 'Look we want to give you money for programs that don't work' - I can't defend that anymore." He claimed the program was "just not showing any results."

Mulvaney didn't say what he meant by results. He didn't have to. His comments were aimed at creating doubt in the minds of legislators who might look favorably on cutting the Health and Human Ser-

vices funds for use elsewhere in the federal budget. The potential impact on hungry elders was not a high priority. It didn't matter that thousands of seniors on waiting lists for food in communities across the country are, in effect, stuck in a bread line.

Several academic studies examining meals on wheels programs have challenged comments like Mulvaney's regarding the program's effectiveness. A recent randomized controlled study funded by the AARP Foundation showed significant differences among seniors on waiting lists, those receiving home-delivered meals, and those getting deliveries of frozen foods. Seniors with home-delivered meals reported the greatest improvement in health and quality

Federal funding has not kept pace with the need. Money from state and local governments and private philanthropy hasn't been able to provide the rest of the money to feed ev-

eryone who needs a meal. "The gap has grown so much there's no way private philanthropy will fill it," says Ellie Hollander who heads Meals on Wheels America.

Philanthropy works only in places where there are lots of wealthy individuals and corporations to tap. In Dallas, donors who can write checks for \$1 million or \$2 million have

Go back a few years, or maybe more than a few. Think about that time in school when some kid said to you, "Hey, see that kid over there? He's a real jerk (or something else not suitable for print)." The point here is that all of us are impressionable, especially when we are young. If we have little knowledge to draw upon, then we'll just assume that when a person you admire or perceive as an authority figure tells you something, you believe it. Here's an example from my own childhood. When I was a kid, I was a big fan of Tarzan movies, especially the ones starring Gordon Scott. One day, in reference to these films, my dad said to me (forgive me, these are his words, not mine), "The reason the Africans' teeth are so white in those Tarzan movies is because they eat a lot of fruit." And I believed it. So, instead of brushing my teeth before I went to bed, I ate an orange.

thing still happens, in school and out of school, in childhood and adulthood. When I proposed the idea for a series of columns to this paper's editor, I stated that they would not be political in nature, and this one isn't, either. But, there is an example or two that I think illustrates my above-taken points.

Barack Obama was a human lightening rod when he was president. It was a real love-him-or-hate-him situation. There are those who think Obama was a great president based solely upon his administrative and policy decisions, and there are others who were less than enthralled with his decision-making abilities and the decisions he made. My dad hadn't really stated his opinion about the politics of the day, at least not to me anyway, but I remember that I voted for Nixon. Why? Because he had black hair like my dad. And, later that night, I ate an orange and went to bed.

helped whittle the waiting list from about 3,000 a year ago to 2,000 to-

day. What do those still on the lists do? "People have come to us who are literally starving, or they ask family to bring stuff from the food bank. It's whatever they can do to get food into their homes," says Katherine Krause, president of VNA Texas, the agency that delivers the meals.

Programs like those in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, aren't as lucky. There aren't many rich donors or big companies. "It's worse now than it ever has been for funding," says Director Betty Bradshaw.

In 1963 President John F. Kennedy, quoting the historian Arnold Toynbee noted in a special message to Congress, "a society's quality and durability can best be measured 'by the respect and care given its elderly citizens.'

That respect and care may be threatened if government support to feed the elderly is cut.



## Banner year for ticks can make for a miserable summer

By Tony Carton EDITOR

Diabetes risk

Since the weather is warming and the morels are popping up, ticks are appearing. This means we need to be on the lookout for them and take steps to prevent Lyme and other tickborne diseases: To avoid ticks, walk in the center of trails and avoid tall vegetation.

Use a repellent with DEET (on skin or clothing) or permethrin (on clothing and gear). Help younger children apply repellents and keep them away from mouth, eyes, and hands.

Check your body for ticks after being outdoors, even in your own yard. It also helps to shower and put on clean clothes

Remove an attached tick using fine-tipped tweezers as soon as you notice it. If a tick is attached to your skin for less than 24 hours, your chance of getting Lyme disease is extremely small. Be alert for fever/chills, aches/

pains or rash, and notify your healthcare provider immediately if you have been exposed to ticks and experience these symptoms.

Prevent family pets from bringing ticks into the home by limiting their access to tick-infested areas and by using veterinarian-prescribed tick collars or spot-on treatment.

## FHN Introduces Genetic Risk Assessment and Testing program

Why one person develops cancer and another doesn't isn't always known. But research has shown that certain risk factors may increase a person's chances for developing cancer.

Some of the risk factors can be controlled, like exposure to certain chemicals or behaviors such as tobacco use. Other factors are beyond our control, like our age, personal health history and our family history.

In an effort to help individuals and healthcare professionals evaluate risk, make more informed decisions and take a personalized, proactive response approach to patient care, the FHN Women's Diagnostic Center is introducing its new Screening and Risk Assessment Program.

"The program is designed to assist people with a strong personal or family history of cancer better understand their own risk of developing certain cancers," said FHN Women's Diagnostic Care Center Care Navigator Amy Bollon. "It allows people to be more empowered in their healthcare decisions based on the benefits of genetic testing."

The National Comprehensive Cancer Network, US Preventative Services Task Force, and American Congress of Obstetricians and Gynecologists have all provided guidance regarding the importance of further risk assessment based on a patient's personal and/or family history of cancer. Individuals found to have a hereditary cancer syndrome or an elevated risk for certain cancers may be candidates for increased surveillance or other prevention options.


Patients will be introduced to the program when they visit the Women's Diagnostic Center for their annual mammogram. A simple questionnaire will be offered to get the information needed to discuss cancer risk and determine if there are any red flags in the personal or family health history. Indicators may include multiple cancers on the same side of the family, any one cancer diagnosed at age 50 or younger or a rare cancer such as ovarian or male breast cancer at any age. The patient will then meet with the Care Navigator to discuss the benefits of hereditary cancer testing and be offered the myRisk Hereditary Cancer Panel test, a simple blood test.

The myRisk Hereditary Cancer Panel consists of 28 genes that impact inherited risks for eight cancers including breast, ovarian, gastric, colorectal, pancreatic, melanoma, prostate, and endometrial. The patient's panel results are typically available in 2 to 3 weeks, at which time the Care Navigator will personally review each patient's results. If the results indicate that additional screenings or medical management is recommended, the patient will be scheduled to meet with FHN Ob/ Gyn Ruhee Sidhu, MD, to discuss

Indicators may include multiple next steps, recommendations and management plans.

A copy of the results, along with national guideline recommendations, will be shared with the patient's healthcare provider and included in the patient's electronic medical record to assist in further screening management for high-risk patients. Patients who desire or are in need of referrals to specialists or additional resources will have the guidance and support provided by the team at FHN to help navigate the network of comprehensive services and programs available at FHN and beyond.

The objective of the FHN Screening and Risk Assessment Program is to empower, educate, and provide resources to patients who can benefit from genetic testing. For more information about the program, visit www.fhn.org or call 815-599-6421.
