

## Lena-Winslow fights Forreston for shot at state title

Before any other business can be handled and before basketball is allowed to get everyone involved for Thanksgiving Tip-off Tournaments, Lena-Winslow and Forreston will still have to play one more football game.

The Panthers host the defending State Champion Cardinals in the Saturday, 2 p.m., Class 1A Semi-Final. The winner of the "expected sellout" will be asked to move on to represent the NUIC in the 2017 IHSA Class 1A State Finals next weekend in DeKalb.

It is a fantastically familiar theme for many northern Illinois football fans. With so much heritage playing from the heart of Jo Daviess County to the banks of the Rockford Rivera The Panthers host the defending State Champion Cardinals in the Saturday, 2 p.m., Class 1A Semi-Final. The winner of the "expected sell-out" will be asked to move on to represent the NUIC in the 2017 IHSA Class 1A State Finals next weekend in DeKalb.

weekly, the bracket seemed to indicate this type of a situation occurring.

Many former State Champions call the Northwest home and a lot of NUIC teams were in the State's Elite Eight this year. Five teams from the Upstate and Northwest represented the best of Class 1A Football this season. Upstate Champion Stockton, runner-up Milledgeville and Freeport Aquin joined Lena-Winslow and Forreston in the second round games. The winners moved on to the Quarterfinal last week. Now it's the Semi-Final. Lena-Winslow is already a champion this season. They ran through their regular campaign undefeated. An impressive theme considering they won the NUIC outright. They were 9-0 against some of the best teams in the State of Illinois and they knocked off EPC, Dakota and Forreston along the way.

They were the highest scoring offense entering the IHSA Class 1A State Tournament and ranked topthree on the defensive side. They are the "team to beat!" Now they have to get through the defending State Champion Cardinals for the right to play for the Class 1A Title at Huskie Stadium next weekend.

Forreston lost 28-14 in its second game of the season. Since the Lena-Winslow win they ran off ten straight victories. They haven't allowed more than 19 points a game since the week three showdown with the Aquin Bulldogs, in which they scored 50. They haven't scored less than 40 points a night since the second round, Class 1A win over the Fulton Steamers, 30-6. The Cardinals shut out the

Princeville Princes last week 42-0 to advance to the 1A Semi-Final. They are rolling and come in with a lot of experience. Forreston has been in the playoffs every year since the end of the 2009 season. They have two State Titles in that span.

The Panthers are a perfect compliment. They haven't scored less than 34 points any night since their week two, two touchdown win over Forreston. Lena-Winslow has been in the playoffs every year since 1999 with Head Coach Ric Arand gradually learning each season how to forge an even better team the next. They are shooting for their third Class 1A Title in the past seven years on Saturday.

# O'Ville Broncos bring big bang to basketball season

The Orangeville Broncos boys' basketball team was a good team last year and they found ways to beat back some historically-strong programs along the way. This year there is already talk brewing about how things could shape up. The Broncos are senior-laden and that means they have a good chance to bank on their earlier, career successes, in high-pressure situations.

The Broncos have a chance to get the quick start they need as they play as in invited guest in the River Ridge Thanksgiving Tip-Off Classic next week. When it comes to seeing if they are built to collect tournament hardware, the meeting with area familiars should provide a good, early season snapshot.

A lot of the offense is going to be looking to go through captain and veteran leader Austin Guy. The senior joins with senior teammates Blake Beightol, Caden Getz, Josh Boomgarden, Noah Parriott, Trey Sullivan and Andre Minnaert. They are going to have chances to score a lot of points and the defense they could bring with a solid forward presence, could provide a lot of "put-back" opportunities.

On Wednesday, Nov. 22 the Broncos face host River Ridge in the season-opener. They will be looking to improve upon their 17-13 February 2017 close and Regional Championship finish. The Wildcats were Regional Champions in 2012 and followed it up with the honors through the close of the 2014 season. They were 17-6 when they closed 2016 and they were 19-9 last year. They have been getting better for a while now. The night-one meeting with Orangeville could be an early indicator of how competitive the West might be.

On night two, Friday, Nov. 24, the Broncos face East Dubuque. The Warriors were impressive last season. They won 31 games and wrapped up a five-season stretch that saw them win 125 games. Pearl City stands up to Orangeville on night three of the River Ridge Thanksgiving Tip-Off Classic. They will suit up for battle on Saturday, Nov. 25.

It will be important for Orangeville to stand strong in the season-opening tournament at River Ridge. They have to be ready to face East Dubuque to open the NUIC schedule just a few days later. The two teams meet on Tuesday, Nov. 28.

A short break after the East Dubuque road game will be over in December as the Broncos face the Forreston Cardinals for the 2017-2018 home opener on Thursday, Dec. 7.

# ROM LENA'S KITCHE



Thanksgiving is fast approaching, and this week's recipes are some you might want to try. Several use the crock pot, so they won't use oven space. Have a great time picking out food for the big day.

The first recipe is for an interesting ranch dip. If you like avocados, this is great for your appetizer before eating turkey dinner. I know that I like to have a few appetizers to keep people out of the kitchen while I am finishing up dinner!

#### Avocado Ranch Dip

- 1 avocado
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. buttermilk
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. mayonnaise
- 1/2 C. parsley
- 1/2 C. dill
- 1 chopped scallion
- 1 T. wine vinegar

Salt and pepper

Puree the avocado in a food processor with the buttermilk, mayo, parsley and dill. Add the green onions and pulse. In the feeder tub, add the wine vinegar. Season with salt and pepper. Serve with baby lettuce leaves, cu-

cumber spears, or celery.

This recipe was suggested to me from a reader who got it at the Senior Center in Freeport. The use of the jellied cranberry sauce makes it a great Thanksgiving or Christmas salad. The ginger ale gives it just a little zip. Enjoy this nice salad any time during the holidays.

#### **Holiday Jell-O**

1 can (13 oz.) crushed pineapple 1 box (6 oz.) lemon Jell-O 1 bottle (7 oz.) ginger ale 2 C. jellied cranberry sauce Topping:  $1\frac{1}{2}$  C. Cool Whip, thawed

1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened Toasted pecans

Drain the pineapple and add water to make 1 cup. Heat to boiling. In a large bowl, dissolve gelatin in hot pineapple water. Cool add the cranberry sauce, ginger ale, and pineapple. Pour into a 9 x 13 pan and refrigerate until set.

In a mixing bowl whip the cool whip and cream cheese until smooth. Spread over Jell-O salad and top with toasted pecans.

traditional vegetable for The Thanksgiving is the green bean casserole. This easy and good recipe is made in the crock pot, so you keep your oven free for the "big" stuff.

#### Green Bean Casserole in the **Slow Cooker**

3 T. butter

1 pkg. (8 oz.) sliced fresh mushrooms

- 4 green onions, sliced
- 2 cloves garlic, sliced
- 5 T. flour
- 1 C. half-and-half
- 2 t. salt
- 1 t. Italian seasoning
- 1/2 t. pepper

2 lbs. fresh green beans, cut in 20 inch pieces

1 C. French fried onions

Spray a 4-6 qt. slow cooker with cooking spray. In a large skillet, melt butter over medium heat. Add the mushrooms and onions; cook, stirring occasionally, until tender, about 5 minutes. Stir in garlic; cook for 1 minute. Stir in flour and cook, stirring constantly for 2 minutes. Gradually stir in half and half, salt, Italian seasoning, and pepper. Cook until mixture thickens, 2 to 3 minutes. Stir in green beans, and spread mixture into slow cooker.

Cover and cook on low until beans

are nearly tender, 4-5 hours. Stir mixture and increase the heat to high. Cook, uncovered, stirring occasionally until sauce is thickened and beans are tender, about 30 minutes more. Transfer to a serving dish and top with French fried onions.

Another staple side at holiday time involves a corn casserole. This recipe is a bit different because it uses Swiss cheese. The evaporated milk makes it extra creamy.

#### Swiss Corn Casserole

- 4 large eggs 1 can (12 oz.) evaporated milk
- ¹∕₂ t. salt
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> t. pepper
- 4 C. frozen corn, thawed
- 3 C. shredded Swiss cheese, divided
- 1/4 t. chopped onion
- 3 C. bread crumbs
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. butter, melted

Preheat the oven to 350. In a large bowl, whisk together the first four ingredients; stir in corn, 11/2 cups cheese and onion. Transfer to a greased 11 x 7 baking dish sprayed with cooking spray.

Toss bread crumbs with melted butter and distribute over the casserole. Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake, uncovered, until golden brown and heated through, about 35-45 minutes. Let stand for 10 minutes before serving.

This nontraditional dressing or stuffing recipe is a great one to try. In our family we always had some traditional dressing and some other kind of dressing. (My mother liked to try new things, and my father wasn't very good about trying anything. I think she made some different dishes at holidays because she really wanted to try new things, and she figured that someone would help her eat them!) This stuffing has some cheese, some mushrooms, and lots of great flavor.

#### **Cheesy Mushroom Stuffing**

4 T. unsalted butter, plus more for the dish

- 12 oz. mushrooms, sliced 4 green onions, sliced (white and
- green parts separated) 1 T. chopped fresh thyme
  - Salt and pepper to taste
  - 6 large eggs
  - $2\frac{1}{2}$  C. heavy whipping cream
  - 1¾ C. chicken broth
  - 1 garlic clove, grated 12 C. of cubes of stale crusty white
  - bread
  - 1<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. grated fontina cheese
  - 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. grated cheddar cheese

 $\frac{1}{2}$  C. chopped fresh Parsley Preheat the oven to 340. Melt 2 T. butter in a large nonstick skillet over

medium-high heat. Add the mushrooms and cook, stirring occasionally, until tender and lightly browned, about 6 minutes. Push the mushrooms to one side of the skillet and add the remaining 2 tablespoons of butter, then add the green onion whites, thyme, 1 t. salt and 1/8 t. pepper. Cook, stirring until the onion is softened, about 3 minutes.

Whisk the eggs, heavy cream, broth, garlic, 1 t. salt and 1/8 t. pepper in a large bowl. Stir in the bread cubes, mushroom mixture, 1 cup each of the fontina and the cheddar, the greens from the onions and the parsley. Let sit 20 minutes to allow the bread to soak up the egg mixture.

Butter a 3 quart baking dish. Add the stuffing and top with the remaining cheeses. Bake until golden brown, about 1 hour. Let sit about 20 minutes before serving.

I don't often put a roast turkey in the column. This one was suggested to me because of the addition of the Dijon and the Worcestershire. I do loosen the skin and place butter under my turkey's skin; this butter has just a little more flavor than usual. I also put onion and celery in the cavity of my bird for flavor and just because I think it needs something. My mother and my grandmother rarely ever stuffed the bird with dressing. This practice was started long before the cooking instructors decided that it wasn't always healthy to stuff the bird with dressing. We all survived, but today you really need to check everything for safety sake with a meat thermometer.

#### **Roast Turkey with Herb Butter**

- 1 C. butter, softened
- 2 T. dried sage
- 6 cloves of garlic, minced
- 2 T. Dijon Mustard
- 2 T. Worcestershire
- 1 t. pepper
- 1 turkey (14 lb.) thawed
- 2 T. oil

Preheat the oven to 325. Mix all the ingredients except the turkey and oil in a bowl until well blended. Remove the neck and giblets from the turkey cavities; discard or reserve for another use. Pat turkey dry with paper towels. Free the legs from the tucked position. (Do not cut band of skin.)

Gently loosen the skin over the breast starting at the body cavity opening by the legs. Spread the butter mixture onto the meat under the skin. Return the legs to the tucked position. Tuck wings under the turkey. Place the turkey breast side up on a rack in a roasting pan. Brush with oil.

Bake 3 hours and 15 minutes to 3 hours and 45 minutes or until meat registers 165 on the thermometer. Cover

the breast loosely with foil to prevent overbrowning if necessary. Remove turkey from oven. Let stand 20 minutes before carving.



# EWPOIN Attorney General Madigan applauds override of governor's veto of student loan Bill of Rights

Attorney General Lisa Madigan applauded the bipartisan coalition of representatives from the Illinois House of Representatives for voting to override Governor Rauner's veto of the Illinois Student Loan Bill of Rights. Rauner vetoed the legislation, which was passed to stop the abuses of the student loan servicing industry that have made it more difficult and more expensive for Illinois borrowers to repay their loans.

The Illinois Student Loan Bill of Rights was drafted by Madigan's office and sponsored by Sen. Daniel

Biss and Rep. Will Guzzardi to address widespread abuses and failures in the student loan industry. These abuses were revealed by thousands of student borrower complaints to Madigan's office and verified by Madigan's investigation into Navient, one of the country's largest student loan servicing companies. The House overrode Gov. Rauner's veto by a bipartisan vote of 98-16, and the law will go into effect Dec. 31, 2018.

"Student loan debt impacts thousands of Illinois borrowers who were steered into forbearance or costly re-

### New program helps former offenders become entrepreneurs

Gov. Bruce Rauner is announcing commitment to equip incarcerated a new, innovative program to help formerly incarcerated men and women start their own businesses.

The Pathway to Enterprise for Returning Citizens (PERC) program is the first of its kind in Illinois. In its pilot phase, the Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC) will screen candidates and select 125 people who are returning to communities on the south and west sides of Chicago. When they go home, they will receive in-depth training and coaching on how to run a business. This program will give them the opportunity to spur economic development and create jobs in the same communities in which they live.

"One of my most important goals since taking office has been to fix our broken criminal justice system and give people a real chance at success when they are released from prison,' Rauner said. "This program not only allows us to create jobs in underserved communities, it also drives down the recidivism rate and sets families on the right course."

The program highlights Rauner's

men and women with the tools they need to make a smoother transition back to the community. Earlier this year, he also initiated a five-year pilot program that provides them with training on how to prepare a budget, write a business plan, set realistic goals, and build interpersonal relationship skills. The governor also has created a pathway for former offenders to get a state ID, access to their birth certificates, and professional licenses in healthcare fields and cosmetology. The Illinois prison population is down 12 percent since Rauner took office in 2015.

"We are laser focused on improving outcomes for the men and women who leave our custody," said IDOC Director John Baldwin. "Many of them have entrepreneurial minds and this program is just what they need to hone their skills and build a better life for themselves."

Training services for the PERC program will be provided by The Safer Foundation of Illinois, Bethel

payment plans instead of being told and placed into better repayment options," Madigan said. "The Student Loan Bill of Rights will ensure that borrowers receive the necessary information to handle repayment of their student loans in a financially responsible manner. I would like to thank the General Assembly for overriding the Governor and supporting Illinois student borrowers, their families and our economy.'

'Today we took decisive action to override the Governor's wrong-headed veto and protect student borrowers in this state," Guzzardi said. "I'm deeply grateful to the Attorney General for taking student loan servicers to task for their fraudulent and abusive practices. And I'm proud of my colleagues in the General Assembly for standing up for our students and families.'

Over the past decade, student loan debt has doubled to become the largest form of unsecured consumer debt in the country with more than 44 million borrowers owing over \$1.4 trillion. Nearly 70 percent of graduates leave college with an average debt burden of \$30,000, and one-infour borrowers are behind on their payments or in default.

Students who attended for-profit colleges are particularly hard hit, making up the vast majority of borrowers in default. While federal

income-based repayment options are available, the U.S. Treasury has reported that only 20 percent of eligible borrowers are enrolled in these options, which can lower payments based on income to as low as \$0 a month.

Madigan said Illinois borrowers frequently experience problems with their student loan servicers. Specifically, borrowers in Illinois have complained to her office that their loan servicers failed to inform them of affordable repayment options or to follow borrower payment instructions. Madigan sued Navient, one of the country's largest student loan servicers, in January 2017.

Because it is so difficult to get legitimate help from loan servicers, student loan borrowers are increasingly turning elsewhere for help. Scam artists have rushed in to exploit borrowers, much like they did during the mortgage crisis, with false promises to help in exchange for large, illegal upfront fees. Madigan has led the country in shutting down illegal student loan debt relief operations preying on borrowers.

The Illinois Student Loan Bill of Rights will protect student loan borrowers by prohibiting student loan servicers from misleading borrowers and requiring that servicers:

Properly process payments; Require specialists to provide and explain to struggling borrowers all of their repayment options, starting with income-driven plans; and

Inform borrowers that they may be eligible to have their loans forgiven due to a disability or a problem with the school they attended.

Attorney General Madigan is a national leader in investigating and enforcing consumer protection violations in the higher education field. In addition to her lawsuit against Navient and Sallie Mae, Madigan has investigated for-profit schools for fraud and repeatedly called on the U.S. Department of Education to immediately forgive federal loans of students who attended fraudulent for-profit schools. Madigan has also testified before Congress and urged the U.S. Department of Education to crack down on the many abuses and scams facing student borrowers. Last month as part of a national crackdown on student loan debt scams, Madigan filed suit against two Illinois companies that charged borrowers as much as \$700 for services already available to borrowers for free.

Madigan also instituted a free Student Loan Helpline to provide student borrowers with resources about repayment options, avoiding default or how to file a complaint about loan servicing at (800) 455-2456 (TTY: 1-800-964-3013).

### State Rep. Brian Stewart sponsors legislation to make battering a DCFS worker an aggravated battery

State Representative Brian Stewart (R-Freeport) filed House Bill 4147 to make attacking a DCFS workers in performance of their duties an aggravated battery and a Class 1 felony.

House Bill 4147, filed this week, would make battering a Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) in the performance of his/her official duties or in response to their official duties an aggravated battery and a Class 1 felony. Aggravated battery subject perpetrators to more severe penalties when facing prosecution and sentencing.

"My deepest sympathies and get well-wishes go out to the victim of this horrible attack, her family and everyone in her DCFS family. Everyday DCFS workers put themselves at risk to protect the most vulnerable children in our communities," said Rep. Stewart. "This legislation will give DCFS workers the same protections as policemen, firemen, and peace officers who also put themselves in harm's way."

This legislation is in response to the September 29th tragedy where a 59-year-old DCFS worker in Milled-

geville was checking on a child when she was viciously assaulted by the child's father.

State Representatives Tony Mc-Combie (R-Savanna) and Tom Demmer (R-Dixon), and John Cabello (R-Rockford) who will be co-sponsoring HB 4147, expressed their support of this legislation.

"I continue to pray for the victim of this senseless act of violence. It's unfortunate an act of violence was inflicted on a DCFS worker in order for legislation to be proposed, however, this bill will to give DCFS workers the additional legal protections they deserve," said Rep. McCombie.

"It's unfortunate that this type of measure is needed, but the safety of these state employees charged with protecting child welfare is paramount. Their work in protecting children and stepping into dangerous situations warrant additional penalty for those who cause them harm in the performance of their duties," said Rep. Demmer.

Current law makes it an aggravated battery and a Class 1 felony offense when the suspect causes great bodily harm, permanent disability, or disfigurement to peace officers, community policing volunteers, firemen, private security officers, correctional institution employees, or certain Department of Human Services employees.






