Yoga for seniors comes of age in downtown Stoc

Folks that have reached senior status are finding the practice of yoga to be a great form of exercise with a focus on mental clarity, balance, and physical flexibility.

Jane VanHamme is opening V's Yoga in downtown Stockton and will host an informational session and introduction to the science Monday, April 23, from 10:30-11:30 a.m. in the Keystone Dance Studio, located at 118 W. Front Street. She will also be a speaker at the May 12, Living Well Expo at Apple Canyon Lake where she will offer a presentation on the benefits of yoga.

"I went to my first yoga class in 2010," said VanHamme.. "It was a little daunting because I really had no idea what I was doing, but I walked out of there with a lot of curiosity."

She went online and Googled, "yoga schools" and the first one that came up offered training in Schaum-

"I signed up for the class thinking I was just going to take one class and I would be done," she said. But, one class led to another class and another and now, approximately eight years later, I have my 200 Hour Certificate

with Yoga Fit, an international Yoga bit." School Company and I've decided to continue working to the next level. We could say one thing led to another and I fell in love with it.'

VanHamme said among her original yoga goals was a desire to gain knowledge and calmness.

"I was at that point in my life where my kids had all left the house," she said. "It was kind of that empty nest syndrome, and I was looking for something that would help me stay fit. I'm not much for weight bearing exercises, but I wanted something to stay active. I wanted something that works not just my body, but my brain as well. Something that would be good for me mentally and emotionally And I really found my fit with

V's Yoga is starting a seniors' class and taking signups during the April 23, introductory session.

'The class will be held on Mondays from 10:30 until 11:30," Van-Hamme said. "I think that's a good timeframe to get seniors up and going for the rest of the week. Also, I thought that getting out of the class at 11:30 would allow those seniors that love to stop by Stella's to have their noontime lunch and socialize a

She believes there is a real need in this area for yoga for seniors.

"I am leading a class now for seniors at the Lena Living Center and it's going quite well," she said.. "The ladies really enjoy it, but I want to emphasize that men are welcome as well. Yoga is not just for women. Men will benefit from the practice of yoga as well. There are definite benefits for everyone especially in the area of keeping the muscles lengthened. It's not important just to be strong. It's important to keep the muscles lengthened and flexible.

VanHamme said not to be intimidated by the word yoga.

"I think a lot of seniors need to realize that yoga is for anybody and you don't have to be a certain shape, you don't have to be athletic, you don't have to be young," she said. 'Yoga is for everybody.

Her intention with the seniors class is to make the yoga poses fit to the participants' bodies, and make answer session before staging a short their bodies fit the poses.

"Folks that participate in the class should see an increase in their flexibility and their mobility," Van-Hamme said. "Hopefully they will find more mental, emotional, and physical balance in their lives. And, I really hope to see our older folks get together and enjoy a sense of camaraderie. Yoga can create a wonderful environment of coming together and sharing an experience.

The new Keystone Dance Studio next to the Dental Center in downtown Stockton features a huge room with beautiful oak flooring and ample room for the practice of yoga.

"It's a beautiful facility for people to enjoy. I think it's a great asset for Stockton," VanHamme said.

She suggests folks bring water and a mat if they have one for the first get together. She expects some seating to be available and will share information and lead a question and

class with some breathing exercises and a short pose or two, so the group will know what to expect.

She said as yoga gains respect in professional and amateur sports we're seeing more yoga instructors and classes in this area.

"I understand that people are more comfortable practicing yoga with others their own age and we will build our classes with that in mind," VanHamme said. "It's important for folks to feel comfortable which is why I'm just focusing on seniors right now. I want to see this get off the ground and then I may go ahead and offer other classes for other age groups.'

"The seniors' class will meet for six weeks, and at the end of that initial class V's Yoga will stage another sign-up.

A Step Back

"The great use of life is to spend it for something that will outlast you." -William James

I, Ashley Carroll, got to interview my grandpa, Clyde, and grandma, LaVonne, for the day. I learned about their life as children and their school. They talked about their childhood, and how they grew up.

Clyde LeRoy Eden was born on June 6, 1934. He lived in an old farmhouse with his mom, Sadie, his dad, Roy, his 3 sisters, and his brother.

Clyde and his siblings went to the Old Rock one room schoolhouse. The school house had multiple purposes including school and church. There were about 15 kids who went to the school at the time Clyde did, and 5 or 6 kids were in his class. They had to walk to school, and for him it was a tenth of a mile walk which took him about seven minutes. The

schoolhouse had no running water so to get water they had to walk across the street to Clyde's grandpa's house. He always had a job that needed to be done. Henry never wanted to put chains on his truck so he would have all of the kids stand on the running boards. When he got enough speed going they would all jump off. One time Henry got stuck in the barnyard

and didn't tell the kids not to stand behind the tires. They took half of the barnvard back to school with them. Another time Clyde and John Pole had to fill the furnace. They put a stump that was too big in so they had to go to his grandpa's to get a saw, but he needed help loading hogs. By the time they got back the schoolhouse was pretty smoky. When they got in trouble they had to write what they did 25 times. If they did it again it doubled and so on. He got in trouble a lot so at one point he had 1000 written in advance.

Clyde's dad, Roy, was a farmer, and when Clyde got home from school he had to help his dad with chores. He usually hauled manure. His horses were Mabel and Florey.

they were working them hard they would switch teams, and the other team he used was Topsey and Silver. Clyde knew he wanted to be a farmer so he only went to school until eighth grade. The state wanted to fine him \$1,000. He didn't pay it. He went to the service, and before he was done he took the GED. He scored high on that so he got his high school diplo-

LaVonne Esther Eden went to Bethel School house for eight years. It was about a mile and a quarter down the road to and from each day. She later went to Elizabeth for high school. When she went to Elizabeth she rode the bus. To get to Bethel School they had to walk through muddy roads so she and her brother usually went through fields. Her brother was older than she. So to keep up with him, she had to take two steps to his one as they walked to school. In the eight years she went there, she had three different teachers. Their teacher, for five years, lived in the schoolhouse. She stayed in the library with a small hot plate to cook her meals. Since the teacher lived there Monday-Friday it was always warm when they got there. In the basement there was a big coal and wood burner, and there was a register in the classroom that they would stand on if the students got cold. LaVonne would stay after school to help the teacher clean up. The teacher would give her apricots, which she loved, or a little money for helping. They had outhouses until at the very end they finally got indoor plumbing. They had two bathrooms then. When walking into the schoolwas the boys' bathroom and the other

pack their lunch every day. LaVonne remembers packing her lunch bucket with a meat sandwich and cookies. They had a water bucket outside and ten cups. Clyde took a thermos full of coffee and a jelly sandwich. After lunch they would get recess. They played games like baseball, hide and go seek, and handie recess over. At the end of the year both schools had a family picnic. The picnic signaled the end of the year and summer break. The Bethel school house also did a Christmas play. Both of them remember watching the other grades learn on the blackboard as well as their own. All the families they know of made decent livings for

Illinois living organ donor seeks to raise awareness, help set Guinness World Record

My name is Joan Henderson. I am writing you to inform you of an event taking place this week.

More than 250 living organ donors have already registered for an unprecedented event on Saturday, April 21, in Chicago and I plan to be among

By doing so, I will help organizers set a Guinness World Record for the largest gathering of living organ donors in history. The meet-up, known as the Guinness World Record Attempt: Living Donor Rally, will happen at Millennium Park's Cloud Gate, the bean-shaped sculpture that is known as "The Bean."

Even more significantly, we are aiming to raise awareness of the significant need for living donors. The event is happening during National Donate Life Month.

So far, donors from nearly 40 states and from as far away as India have registered to come to the gathering. (Others from the area may also be participating in the event, too.)

Although roughly half of all American adults have registered to be organ donors upon their death, it's not nearly enough. According to the American Transplant Foundation, more than 120,000 people in the United States are waiting for organ transplants and on an average day, about 20 people die while waiting for a transplant.

Legislative Public Safety Working Group meets on gun violence, school safety measures

The newly-formed bipartisan bicameral Legislative Public Safety Working Group met late Thursday to begin discussions on a wide range of issues that impact the safety and security of Illinois citizens.

The meeting was the first in what Governor Bruce Rauner and legislators expect to be a series of discussions this session on a comprehensive approach to public safety. Rauner is working to engage with legislators to collaborate on critical issues of gun trafficking, school safety, mental health and crime prevention.

Thursday's meeting centered on gun issues and school safety. On the latter, the administration shared recommendations developed by a panel of school administrators, police and fire officials who are members of the Illinois Terrorism Task Force. Potential action items include behavioral threat assessments, information sharing among schools, student safety tip lines, active shooter drills, and enhanced fire alarm protocols.

The Working Group agreed to discuss the school recommendations at its next meeting.

In the aftermath of the tragic mass shooting at Stoneman Douglas High School in Florida on Valentine's Day, the Governor asked the four legislative leaders of the Illinois General Assembly to appoint members to serve on a legislative public safety working group. House Democrats and House and Senate Republicans attended yesterday. The Senate Democrat caucus has not appointed mem-

"Illinois already has some of the toughest gun laws in the U.S.," Rauner said. "Yet we have ample proof that current law doesn't do enough to

prevent people from obtaining ille- ing people safe and protecting our for meaningful policies to help elimviolence. The purpose of this group is to widen the lens on the problem and deliberate on measures to make Illinoisans in schools, churches - everywhere - safer."

"Now, more than ever, public safety is on the minds of people across the state and nation," said State Sen. Karen McConnaughay (R-St. Charles). "Recent acts of mass violence have really caused us to think about what we can be doing better to keep our children safe. The diffinding that balance between keep- practices and find common ground

Recoveries during Attorney General Madigan's tenure top \$14 billion

Attorney General Lisa Madigan the state of Illinois especially during today announced her office collected \$864 million in revenue on behalf of the state through litigation and collection efforts in 2017. Since Madigan took office, her office has collected over \$14 billion on behalf of the state.

The revenue collected for the state by Madigan shows that for every dollar of taxpayer funding her office received, she generated \$28.01 back to the state.

"Since becoming Attorney General, I have brought in more than \$14 billion for Illinois, including nearly half a billion dollars in funding for our state's pension systems as the result of the 2008 financial crisis," Madigan said. "I am proud of my work to generate needed revenue for

difficult economic times.

The revenue collected by Madigan in 2017 included \$19.5 million for Illinois pension systems from a settlement with Moody's Investors Service to resolve an investigation into its marketing and sale of risky residential mortgage-backed securities leading up to the 2008 economic collapse. In addition to this settlement, Madigan has reached six other settlements - with Bank of America, Citigroup, Goldman Sachs, JP Morgan Chase, Morgan Stanley and Standard & Poor's - stemming from investments in mortgage-backed securities that resulted in recovering over \$450 million for the pension systems.

Madigan's office also collected over \$339 million through collections litigation, including cases involving the collection of funds for damage to state property, child support enforcement, fines and penalties. Madigan also collected more than \$250 million through tobacco litigation and more than \$254 million in estate tax revenues.

In addition to recoveries for the state, Madigan's Consumer Fraud Bureaus mediated nearly 25,000 complaints in 2017 and provided more than \$6 million in mediated savings for Illinois consumers.

"I hope to see the working group foster bipartisan cooperation that leads to consensus for the creation of good public safety policy removed from the political wrangling that so often gets in the way," said Rep. Barb Wheeler (R-Crystal Lake). "Several of my colleagues and I have already begun to work together with this mindset, so I am optimistic this group can be the final piece of puzzle to get things done."

Yesterday was the first step in this process."

"This working group gives us a chance to move forward together on solutions that address the full scope of the issues that we face," said Senator Chuck Weaver (R-Peoria). "I'm pleased that we were able to focus on school safety at the first meeting and I look forward to the opportunity to continue working on these ideas and recommendations.'


