Stockton police stage first annual Backpack Giveaway

The Stockton Police Department put together their own back-toschool bash last week. The officers were able to give away backpacks, paper, pencils, markers, and more for free, because of dedicated volunteers, generous donations, and community involvement.

"The department has been collecting resources to put this program together," said Stockton Police Chief Thomas Sheehan. "They've been collecting donations and actually putting the backpacks together. It has all been done by the police officers themselves."

Sheehan said the program was

He said the department intends to make its Backpack Giveaway an annual event.

Mapping the 2018 Stockton FFA Alumni **Antique Tractor Drive**

Plans are underway for the 2018 Stockton FFA Alumni Antique Tractor Drive. This year's event will include a full day worth of touring rural Jo Daviess and Stephenson

The event will be held on Saturday, Aug. 25. It's an opportunity for antique tractor lovers from all areas to join in and showcase their family collections. All tractors that are model year 1988 or earlier, and that can travel at least 10 mph, are welcome to participate.

Participants should check in no later than 8:00 AM at Stockton High School which is located at 540 N. Rush St. just off U.S. Route 20 in Stockton. The drive will start promptly at 8:15 a.m. and will cover approximately 44 miles round trip. Stops along the route will be Apple River Canyon State Park, Gavilon Grain (Warren, IL), Saunders Oil Company (Warren, IL), and Mahon Farms & Seeds (Lena, IL) as we return to Stockton High School around 4:30 p.m.. The event will be held rain or shine, but poor weather conditions may alter the route.

Registration is \$40 per tractor and it will include lunch, tractor sign, button, name tag, and refreshments. Drivers must be least 16 years of age and have a valid driver's license in order to drive in this event. Drivers will need to sign a Driver Safety Pledge prior to participating. There are approximately 15 seats available on a covered wagon that will be a part of the drive at a cost of \$25 per seat. Passenger will be required to sign a Passenger Liability Waiver. Anyone under the age of 18 will need a legal guardian's signature on the required paperwork as well.

Registration forms need to be returned to the Stockton FFA Alumni, c/o Rick Duchow, 312 N. Hudson St., Stockton, IL 61085. Pre-registration is preferred by August 20th, 2018, but people can register the day of the event as well.

"There was a similar program in Freeport, but the King Center put it on instead of the police department," said Powers. We saw a similar need here in Stockton and decided to help."

"Once I got the grant from them I went around to several local businesses and every business I went to wanted to help," he said. "Everyone I spoke with chipped in. I tried to limit it this first year because we weren't sure how much we would need, but we had people asking to help after we were finished fundraising. That's certainly a good sign for next year."

With the funds they were able to raise they not only put together a hundred backpacks filled with school supplies, but they were also able to find items the teachers need in their classrooms.

There's paper, pens, pencils, highlighters for the boards, even dry eraser materials: just a broad range of school items," Powers said. "Like I said, everybody wanted to help and we should be able to make this even bigger next year."

He said the student's response has been very positive.

"There were actually some people that didn't want to take the backpacks," said Powers. "They had already been shopping and had gotten what they needed for school, so next year we intend to start a little earlier and maybe combine this with some other event like maybe a pool party or something.'

HCC joins U of I Extension to host Soybean Research Demonstration

The Highland Community College Ag program is partnering with the University of Illinois Extension to host a Soybean Research Demonstration from 9 to 11 a.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 29 at the Highland agriculture research plot located at 3472 W. Loras Drive in Freeport, Ill.

The public is invited to learn about research taking place at Highland, as well as the University of Illinois Extension. There will be specialists to talk about soybean insects, disease, weeds, and production issues.

The research plot at Highland is in its first year of production. The 10-acre plot serves as a place where students studying agriculture gain hands-on knowledge of crop production. This year's research is on the effects of various soybean rates, treatments and yield issues. Students in the Ag program at Highland will be on hand for the demonstration and will report their final data to the public after harvest.



New law will improve medical care for sexual assault survivors in Illinois

announced that a new law will require better care for survivors of sexual assault in Illinois. The new law, initiated by Madigan, makes Illinois a national leader in providing specialized care to conduct examinations and treat emotional trauma in the aftermath of sexual assault

House Bill 5245, sponsored by Rep. Michael Unes and Sen. Julie Morrison, was signed into law earlier today. The new law will expand the Sexual Assault Survivors Emergency Treatment Act to ensure that Illinois hospitals provide specialized sexual assault care in emergency rooms, which will include Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANEs). SANEs are trained to collect physical evidence following a sexual assault, respond to the medical and psychological needs of a survivor and testify in court. Despite years of SANE training provided by Madigan's office to nurses in Illinois, few hospitals currently provide specialized care for sexual assault victims.

"Illinois hospitals must now provide sexual assault survivors with

Attorney General Lisa Madigan specialized compassionate medical care," Madigan said. "This new law will ensure survivors receive the care they deserve to treat the physical and emotional trauma they have endured after a sexual assault."

"This law will ensure that the trauma of a sexual assault is not compounded when survivors, particularly children, undergo the lengthy examinations that are necessary to collect evidence," Unes said. "I appreciate the work of the Attorney General and advocacy groups to make sure that under this law, all survivors receive prompt treatment and child survivors have the ability to be treated at pediatric health care facilities."

"The thousands of women, children and men who are sexually assaulted deserve nothing less than prompt treatment by medical professionals who have been trained to address trauma while simultaneously conducting thorough medical forensic examinations," Morrison said. "I was proud to work with the Attorney General to support survivors, and I will continue to push to improve care and services for the survivors of these unimaginable crimes.'

The law is part of Madigan's continuing effort to improve the response and care of sexual assault victims and increase successful prosecutions to ensure public safety. Under the new law, hospitals must ensure that a sexual assault survivor receives specialized care by a qualified medical provider within 90 minutes of arriving at a hospital by Jan. 1, 2022. The law also requires ongoing education to ensure that emergency room medical personnel such as attending physicians, physician assistants and nurses are trained to treat survivors

In addition, the law seeks to lessen the trauma on child survivors of sexual abuse by giving them the option to undergo the necessary and critical medical forensic examination in a more familiar setting. Under the law, sexual abuse survivors under the age of 13 can receive acute medical forensic services at an approved pediatric health care facility beginning Jan. 1, 2019. The approved pediatric health care facility must ensure that the medical services are provided by a SANE or specially trained physician.

Since 2003, Madigan's office has provided classroom training to more than 1.600 nurses across the state, yet only 315 of those nurses have completed the clinical training required to become a practicing SANE in large part due to a lack of support from the hospitals where they work. At present, only 188 SANEs are practicing in emergency departments in Illinois hospitals and no hospital has a 24/7 SANE

tisan group of legislators as well as the Illinois Coalition Against Sexual Assault, Illinois Sheriffs' Association, Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police, Illinois State's Attorneys Association, Children's Advocacy Centers of Illinois, OSF Healthcare, Chicago Alliance Against Sexual Exploitation, Rape Victim Advocates, Illinois NOW (National Organization of Women), International Association of Forensic Nurses Illinois Chapter, and the Illinois Emergency Nurses Association.

Attorney General Madigan is national leader in protecting survivors of sexual violence and strengthening their rights. Madigan drafted and successfully worked to pass legislation that improves the response of law enforcement to sexual assault survivors through evidence-based, trauma-informed, and victim-centered policies, procedures and training and obtained federal funding to provide the training required under the law. She also worked to pass the Preventing Sex-

The law is supported by a bipar- ual Violence on Campus Act to set standards for all Illinois colleges and universities to prevent and respond to sexual violence, as well as a law to eliminate Illinois' criminal statutes of limitation for all felony criminal sexual assault and sexual abuse crimes against children. In addition, Madigan successfully advocated for enhanced crime victims' rights under the state's Constitution to ensure victims have a voice in the criminal justice system. Madigan also initiated a law that made Illinois the first state in the country to mandate the testing of sexual assault evidence kits.

Attorney General Madigan's Crime Victim Services Division manages programs that provide assistance to crime victims and service providers. Two regional superintendents to shape critical statewide education funding discussion

Two regional education leaders will play a role in shaping the critical discussion on ensuring the state's new historic education funding reform model is also helping provide aid for at-risk youth in schools around the state.

Regional Superintendent lie Wollerman of Regional Office of Education #3, covering Bond, Christian, Effingham, Fayette and Montgomery counties in central and southern Illinois, and Gregg Murphy,

kee counties in northern Illinois, have been appointed to represent the Illinois Association of Regional Superintendents of Schools (IARSS) on the new state Evidence-Based Funding Professional Review Panel. The panel was created as part of the state's historic education reform law approved last year to steer millions of new state dollars into schools and programs that are in most need of extra aid, and it features lawmakers, Regional Superintendent for ROE educators and education advocates.

Rauner signs SB2866 concerning health

Gov. Bruce Rauner signed Senate Bill 2866 amending the Communicable Disease Prevention Act. The bill provides that the Department must provide all students (currently, all female students) who are entering sixth grade and their parents or legal guardians written information about the link between human papillomavirus and specified kinds of cancer, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's recommendation for children to be vaccinated with the HPV vaccine (currently, written information about the link between human papillomavirus

and cervical cancer and the availability of a HPV vaccine). SB2866 also provides that the Department shall adopt emergency rules to the extent necessary to administer the Department's responsibilities under the amendatory Act no later than July 1, 2019. And, it amends the Department of Public Health Powers and Duties Law of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois. The act also provides that beginning on January 1, 2020, the definition for "eligible individual" for provisions concerning human papillomavirus vaccinations includes male children under the age of 18 that meet specified conditions.

ber panel to review the entire evidence-based funding model and report its findings and recommendations back to the Governor, Legislature and State Board of Education. More information on the funding review panel is available here: https:// www.isbe.net/prp. The group's next meeting is set for Sept. 18.

Wollerman and Murphy are both part of the subcommittee on the Regional Safe Schools Program (RSSP), which provides critical alternative education through ROEs for disruptive students who have been suspended or expelled from their schools. This subcommittee will review how to include RSSP and other alternative education programs into the new funding model.

"I am very excited to represent my colleagues and their programs that serve at-risk youth across the state," Wollerman said. "It's imperative that we find a way to properly fund such programs in an equitable and adequate manner."

"While our schools welcome the much-needed funding provided by the new formula, we cannot leave behind the at-risk students whose lives are changed from going through our alternative school programs," Murphy said. "I am eager to work with Julie and ensure IARSS has a strong voice for providing the resources our programs need to help these stu-







The not so skinny cook

Can you all believe that summer will soon be over? It is not very believable to someone who has spent most of the summer indoors. School will soon be in session. Tomatoes are coming in, and sweet corn is over. This week's recipes will still be featuring some of the great things from the garden.

The first recipe is for an interesting bean dip appetizer. In watching a million food shows this summer, beans are a trend that is both healthy and hearty. I have several vegetarian friends who love to use beans in many things and appetizers are a favorite way (and a cheap one too) of starting off a party or meal. This one is full of garlic, and cumin, so if like both of those, you are in for

Garlic Bean Dip

1 can (15 oz.) cannellini beans, rinsed and drained

1 T. cider vinegar 2 garlic cloves,, minced

½ t salt

½ t. ground cumin

½ C. mayonnaise

2 T. chopped fresh parsley Pita chips or fresh veggies

Place the beans, vinegar, garlic, salt and cumin in a food processor and process until almost smooth. Add mayo and parsley; pulse just until combined. Refrigerate and serve with chips or veggies.

This next salad is really great because of the blackberry dressing. The 'croutons" are sort of nifty because they are cheese balls. You could substitute croutons from a package, but the cheese ones are a lot tastier and a tad bit elegant. You could substitute any green leafy lettuce for the spring mix. Use the dressing on other salads too.

Summer Salad with **Blackberry Dressing**

1 pkg. (4 oz.) feta cheese 4 oz. cream cheese, softened

1/4 C. flour

3/4 t. pepper, divided

1 large egg, lightly beaten

1 T. water

1 C. panko bread crumbs

8 T. olive oil, divided

34 C. packed fresh basil leaves, di-

¹/₄ C. white wine vinegar

¹/₄ C. Blackberry Sauce

1 clove garlic

1 t. Dijon mustard

1 t. salt

6 C. salad greens, spring mix

½ of English cucumber, thinly

4 small tomatoes, quartered

1 C. fresh blackberries

1/4 C. thinly sliced red onion

In a small bowl, stir together feta and cream cheese until smooth. Diinto a ball. In a shallow dish, whisk together flour and 1/4 t. pepper. In another shallow dish, whisk together the egg and 1 tablespoon of water. Place bread crumbs in a third shallow dish. Dredge cheese rounds in flour mixture, shaking off excess. Dip in egg, letting excess drip off. Dredge in bread crumbs, pressing gently to adhere. Place cheese in a single layer on a foil-lined baking sheet. Cover and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes or up to 4 hours.

In a large nonstick skillet, heat 2 tablespoons of oil over medium heat. Cook half of cheese until lightly browned, 2-3 minutes per side. Let drain on paper towels. Repeat with 2 T. oil and remaining cheese.

In a blender, process ½ cup basil, vinegar, Blackberry Sauce, garlic, mustard, salt and remaining 4 T. oil and ½ t. pepper until smooth.

Divide the salad greens, cucumber, tomatoes, blackberries, onion and remaining basil and cheese among serving plates. Serve immediately with processed dressing.

Blackberry Sauce

2 c. fresh blackberries

2 C. sugar

1/4 . Water

In a small saucepan, cook all ingredients over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sugar's dissolved and berries are soft and falling apart, about 15 minutes. Let cool for 15 minutes. Transfer mixture to a blender and process until smooth. Strain through a fine-mesh sieve, discarding the solids. Cover and refrigerate for up to a week.

My Stockton friend Connie gave me this good salad recipe. It is a family favorite that she recently served at her family reunion. One of my other friends talked about how few Jell-O salads are served any more. I don't know about you, but I still like a refreshing jiggly salad. Be sure to use regular Coke and not Diet and to buy the canned cherry

Connie's Salad

1 can (12 oz.) Coca Cola

1 large box (6 oz.) red Jell-O

1 can (20 oz.) cherry pie filling 1 can (20 oz.) crushed pineapple,

In a saucepan, bring Coke to a boil. Stir in Jell-O until dissolved. Add the pie filling and pineapple and stir until it starts to set. Refrigerate until firmly set.

If you are looking for a one pot main dish that will be ready when you get home from work, this next chicken and vegetable dish is for you. I know we will have some hot days that will need a meal that won't heat up the kitchen. You can also save it for winter when you want to come home to an already prepared

Cheesy Chicken and Vegetables

11/2 C sliced carrots 1 C. chopped sweet onion

½ C. chicken broth

2 lbs. boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch pieces

2 sprigs fresh thyme

1 t. garlic salt

½ t. pepper

2 C. broccoli florets

1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, cubed and softened

2 C shredded cheddar cheese, divided

1 C. cherry tomatoes, halved

In a 4-quart slow cooker which has been sprayed with cooking spray, stir together the carrots, onion and broth. Add the chicken and thyme, and sprinkle with garlic, salt and pepper. Cover and cook on low until the chicken is tender, 44-5 hours.

Stir in broccoli and increase the heat to high. Cover and cook for 15 minutes. Stir in cream cheese and cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until cream cheese is melted and smooth and sauce is thickened, about 10 minutes.

Discard thyme sprigs and stir in ½ cup cheddar and the cherry tomatoes until they are heated through. Sprinkle with remaining cheddar; let stand for 5 minutes before serving.

This dessert is an easy one to make because you use prepared items. You could use a shortbread crust instead of the graham cracker.

Blueberry Cream Pie

Graham cracker pie crust

1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, soft-

1/3 C. powdered sugar

1 t. vanilla

4 C. frozen whipped topping, softened

6 T. blueberry preserves, divided Blueberries for garnish

In a large bowl, beat cream cheese with a mixer at high speed until smooth. Beat in powdered sugar until smooth; beat in vanilla. Fold in whipped topping.

Spread half of cream cheese mixture into crust; dollop with half of preserves by tablespoonfuls; swirl together with a knife. Repeat layers and swirl. Loosely cover and refrigerate for at least 8 hours before serving; Garnish pies with fresh blueberries.



Late July crop ratings remained steady, with corn rated at 80% good/ excellent condition. Daily high temperatures are expected to hold in the 80's throughout the remainder of grain-fill, with crop maturity expected by the first week of September. Now is the time when yield estimates will be calculated in anticipation of harvest for decision making regarding: delivery and storage, marketing, crop insurance, and cash-flow budgeting. One estimation that is quite useful for speed and efficiency is the Yield Component Method.

The Yield Component Method is based on the idea that one can estimate total grain yield by estimating the various components which attribute to yield: number of ears per acre, number of kernels per ear, and weight per kernel. Fortunately, these are all quite easy to determine in just a few simple steps. For step by step instructions on this method, see below:

Step 1: Determine an estimation site at random in the field. An estimation site should be representative of the field or area within the field. Consider factors like disease pressure, insect pressure, nutrient deficiencies, or lodging when selecting estimation sites.

Step 2: For each estimation site, begin by measuring off a length of a single row equal to 1/1000th acre. For 30 inch rows in corn, the single row length to measured is 17.5 feet. This value will change according to row spacing, so consider this when using custom planters or drills.

Step 3: Count the number of harvestable ears on the plants in the 1/1000th acre of row (17.5 feet).

Step 4: From the row, select 5 harvestable ears and determine the number of kernels per ear.

Step 5: Calculate the average number of kernel per ear for the estimation site by summing the values for all the sampled ears and dividing by the num-

Step 6: To estimate the yield (bushels/acre), multiply the harvestable ear number (Step 3) by the average number of kernels per ear (Step 5) and then dividing that result by a kernel weight "fudge factor". The fudge factor is used to account for variability in kernel weight, so multiple calculations using different "fudge factor" values (75, 85, and 95) are used to determine a vield range.

For example, say you counted a total of 160 harvestable ears at 5 estimation sites, giving you 32 ears per estimation site. When sampling every 5th ear it was determined that the average number of kernels per ear was 520. Using "fudge factor" values of 75, 85, and 95; the estimated range in yield for that sampled site would (32 x 520) divided by 75 = 221, or divided by 85 = 195, or divided by 95 = 175 bushels per acre

Remember, this method is used to estimate pre-harvest grain yield and provides only an estimate for decision making purposes; the closer to maturity the crop the estimates are performed, the more accurate they will be. Yield can easily be overestimated in a year with drought conditions during grain fill due to reduced kernel size and weight. Alternatively, yield can be underestimated in a year with excellent conditions during grain fill leading to larger kernel size and weight. Regardless, these estimates can give producers an idea of what to expect and still provide value when done correctly. 
