



The not so skinny cook

I said goodbye to Easter and put my bunnies away. I really enjoyed having them out because I missed Easter last year. I also missed my spring flowers. Tulips are springing up in places I didn't know I had tulips. My daffodils are blooming; I hope they like cool and wet weather because that is what is forecast for this week. I feel sorry for the people who are scheduling sporting events and farmers who are in the field. Maybe the forecast is wrong; that's what we are all hoping. If weather is bad, we can stay inside and cook! This week's recipes have some different flavors and some traditional ones too.

This artichoke spread is a good one for the slow cooker. It uses water packed artichoke hearts and fresh spinach. When served on garlic bread pieces or pita chips, it is very tasty. You do have to like artichokes and spinach to enjoy this appetizer. If you have never tried artichokes in a dip with cheese, try this one.

Artichoke Spread

2 pkg. (8 oz. each) cream cheese, subed

1 can (14 oz.) water-packed artichoke hearts, drained and quartered 1 C. fresh spinach, torn

3/4 C. shredded Parmesan cheese 2 green onions, chopped

Combine cream cheese, artichokes, spinach, Parmesan, and green onions in a bowl; transfer to a 1½ qt. slow cooker. Cook, covered on low, until cheese is melted, 2-3 hours. If the mixture is too thick to spread, add milk a tablespoon at a time until you have your desired thickness. Serve on small pieces of garlic bread or pita chips.

Kale is still the "in" salad green according to the cooking shows. This one has a creamy peanut dressing. I also always use the low sodium soy sauce when I make anything. Enjoy this green salad that is full of vegetables.

Kale Salad with Peanut Dressing

¹/₄ C. creamy peanut butter

2 T. rice vinegar

2 T. lime juice

1 T. oil

1T. soy sauce

1 T. water

1 T. sugar

2 thinly sliced bunches of kale

34 C. frozen peas thawed

7 thinly sliced radishes

½ C. chopped peanuts

Sesame seeds for garnish (opt.)

Whisk, peanut butter, vinegar, lime juice, oil, soy sauce, water and sugar in a bowl or place in mason jar with lid and shake ingredients until blended. Place kale in bowl and add peas, and radishes. Toss with dressing. Sprinkle peanuts and sesame seeds over salad.

I was looking for a salad to take to a friend's home on Easter. I remembered one my mother and I both made. Tam, my card club friend, makes this also. I really love this salad. So I dusted off my recipes, and found this tasty Jell-O salad. Just an observation—not a lot a people make gelatin salads anymore. The section for gelatin and the number of flavors is getting much smaller. I hope it isn't going to go away forever because I would m

Sea Foam Salad

1 large can pears (1 lb. 13 oz)

1 large pkg. lime gelatin

1 8 oz pkg. cream cheese

2 T. cream

1 cup heavy whipping cream, whipped

Drain juice from pears. Heat 1 cup of the pear juice to boiling; pour over gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool. Beat cream cheese and 2 T. cream

until smooth. Add gelatin mixture and beat until blended. Chill mixture until partially thickened. Fold in well drained, mashed pears, and whipped cream. Pour into a mold or

a bowl. Chill until firm.

I have made beef stroganoff on the stove, but have never had it in casserole form. You could make it the night before and put it in the oven. I really like this way of preparing it, and I hope you will also.

Beef Stroganoff Casserole

4 T. unsalted butter, divided 1½ lbs. beef tenderloin tips, cubed 1 T. Montreal steak seasoning

½ t. salt

1 pkg. (8 oz.) sliced fresh mush-rooms

1 small yellow onion, thinly sliced 2 cloves garlic, minced

11/2 C. heavy whipping cream

4 oz. cream cheese, cubed

1 pkg. (8 oz.) wide egg noodles, cooked according to package directions and drained

2 T. chopped fresh parsley

¹/₄ C. finely grated Parmesan cheese

Pre heat the oven to 350. Spray a 9 x 13 baking dish with cooking spray. In a large saucepan, heat 2 tablespoons butter over medium-high heat. Add beef, steak seasoning, and salt; cook until browned, about 8 minutes. Remove beef using a slotted spoon. Add mushrooms and remaining butter to pan; cook until browned, about 6 minutes. Add onion and garlic and cook until tender, about 4 minutes. Whisk in cream and cream cheese until smooth. Remove from heat; stir in beef, cooked pasta, and parsley; Pour mixture into prepared dish; sprinkle with Parmesan. Bake until bubbly and golden brown, about 25 minutes.

Asparagus has been at a good price in the grocery stores of late. This sauté is very much like a stir fry. Enjoy this great beef with asparagus dish.

Asparagus Beef Sauté

1 lb. sirloin steak, cut into 3 to 4 inch cubes

½ t. salt

¼ t. pepper

1 T. canola oil

2 garlic cloves, minced

1green onion, sliced

¹/₄ C. butter, cubed

1 lb. fresh asparagus, trimmed and cut into 2 inch pieces

½ lb. fresh mushrooms

2 T. reduced sodium soy sauce

1½ t. lemon juice

Toss beef with salt and pepper. In a large skillet, heat oil over medium high heat; sauté beef 2 minutes. Add garlic and onion, cook and stir until beef is browned, 2 to 3 minutes. Remove from pan.

In the same skillet, heat butter

over medium-high heat; sauté asparagus and mushrooms until asparagus is crisp-tender. Add beef, soy sauce and lemon juice; heat through, tossing to combine. Serve with rice.

This rhubarb recipe is a little different in that it slightly resembles rolls and it also resembles an upside down cake if you flip it out after baking. Bisquick is an easy way to make crust, and it doesn't involve yeast. Enjoy this tasty rhubarb dessert.

Rhubarb Cranberry Roll Ups

1 C. plus 2 T. sugar ½ C. cranberry juice

4 C. sliced fresh or frozen rhubarb, thawed

2½ C. Bisquick

¹/₄ C. plus ² T. packed brown sugar

½ t. nutmeg

¼ t. cinnamon

½ C. milk

2 C. IIIIK

1 T. vegetable oil 3 T. butter, softened

Preheat the oven to 425. Generously grease a 2-quart round baking pan. Stir together 1 cup white sugar and the cranberry juice in a saucepan. Bring to a boil; boil gently uncovered, stirring occasionally until slightly thickened, about 4 minutes. Remove from heat. Sprinkle 2 cups rhubarb in prepared baking pan.

In a large bowl, stir together the Bisquick, 2 tablespoons of brown sugar, nutmeg, and cinnamon. Stir in milk and oil until a soft dough forms. Roll dough into a 10 inch square on a floured surface; spread with butter. Top evenly with remaining 2 cups of rhubarb and sprinkle with remaining brown sugar. Starting


