

### Pritzker hails infrastructure bill as 'job creation plan the likes of which our state has never seen'

Democratic Gov. J.B. Pritzker joined a bipartisan group of lawmakers, business leaders and labor representatives in Springfield Friday as he signed a package of bills enacting a \$45 billion statewide infrastructure plan in one of four stops on a tour of Illinois.

Pritzker stood in front of the state capital's historic Lincoln Depot as he defended a 19-cent per-gallon increase to the state's motor fuel tax while highlighting the economic and employment benefits of the massive construction plan.

He said the six-year capital plan could create 540,000 jobs while investing in roads, bridges, railways, universities, early childhood centers, a state crime lab and veterans homes, among others.

"With these investments, we're

creating and supporting hundreds of thousands of new jobs in our state," Pritzker said. "This is more than an infrastructure plan. This is a job creation plan the likes of which our state has never seen."

House Bill 62, the infrastructure plan dubbed by Pritzker as "Rebuild Illinois," allocates \$33.2 billion for transportation, including \$11 billion for the Illinois Department of Transportation's multi-year plan and \$14 billion for other road and bridge projects. It also includes \$4.7 billion for mass transit, \$1 billion for passenger rail and millions for ports, aeronautics and other projects.

Higher education will see \$2.9 billion in infrastructure spending while K-12 and early childhood education will see a combined \$526 million.

State Sen. Andy Manar, a Democrat from downstate Bunker Hill, co-chaired a series of statewide committee hearings leading up to the passage of the bill. He said those meetings showed the need for an infrastructure plan.

"Every community that we heard from — both urban and rural, conservative and liberal - every single community told us their story of crumbling infrastructure and told us in very clear terms that it was time for us to act," he said.

Pritzker said all of Illinois will benefit from the plan as he defended a portion that dedicates about \$6 million to each Democratic state senator for projects in their districts, compared to \$3 million for each Republican senator. Democrats and Republicans in the House would each see about half those amounts respectively.

"The fact is that a majority of the funding in the infrastructure bill goes to downstate Illinois," Pritzker said. "Universities around the state are mostly, almost entirely, in districts represented by Republicans. And that's where hundreds of millions of dollars, in fact billions when you add getting distributed I think very fairly across the state.'

Pritzker also touted a statewide expansion of broadband internet infrastructure which will receive \$420 million in funding.

'When big swaths of our state have no high speed internet, we miss the opportunity for new businesses and jobs in areas of the state that badly need it," he said.

The plan additionally allocates \$4.4 billion to deferred maintenance at state facilities and \$1 billion on environment and conservation projects for hazardous waste, sewer and park projects among others. Health care and human services will see \$465 million in funding for affordable housing, hospitals, health centers and other grant programs.

Another \$1.8 billion is allocated to various "community and economic development" projects such as education and scientific facilities and projects in economically depressed areas. Another \$50 million provided by the funding bill will be set aside for bicycle path projects.

Mark Denzler, president of the Illinois Manufacturer's Association, touted career and technical education measures such as a pre-apprenticeship program that will receive \$25 million in funding to "help address the skills gap and workforce challenges facing manufacturers across Illinois."

Revenues for the capital plan come from a pair of bills — Senate Bills 690 and 1939 — one raising the motor fuel tax and transportation-related vehicle fees, the other enacting a massive expansion of gambling in

The gaming bill — which allows for six new casinos, expansion of gambling at racetracks, added video gaming machines, higher taxes and maximum bets on video gaming machines and the legalization of sports gambling — is expected to generate at least \$350 million annually at full implementation and will support vertical capital debt service.

Upfront revenues from license fees would fund "pay as you go" projects. Other revenue would be generated by a \$1 per-pack increase to the state's cigarette tax and a new tax on electronic cigarettes.

Senate Bill 1939 doubles the motor fuel tax to 38 cents to generate \$1.3 billion in annual new revenue; increases title fees from \$95 to \$150 for regular titles and from \$95 to

\$250 for mobile homes; and increases annual registration fees from \$101 to \$151. Electric vehicle registration fees will increase from \$34 every two years to \$251 annually.

The title and registration fee increases are expected to generate \$529 million in new annual state revenue.

While the gas tax hike had a strong bipartisan roll call in each chamber of the General Assembly and Pritzker said the increase will fund projects that will help drivers save money on vehicle maintenance, not everyone was on board with the change.

State Rep. David McSweeney, a Barrington Hills Republican, said in a statement the governor's signature on the plan marked "a bad day for Illinois.

"Doubling the gas tax and increasing vehicle registration fees will hurt Illinois' low income and middle income families and kill jobs that have been created by small businesses,"







# FROM LENA'S KITCHEN



The not so skinny cook

Last week I mentioned that I haven't had the air conditioning on this summer; that changed later in the week. The heat and humidity are good for the corn and beans to grow, but hard on the electric bill! I think that summer has really begun. This week's recipes are designed to make you have great picnics. There is a little something for everyone.

The first recipe is for a bacon and

tomato dip. It is easy to make; however it is better made ahead of time. You can use it after two hours in the refrigerator, but it is better overnight. The flavors really meld together. Enjoy it with vegetables, crackers, or bagel chips.

#### **Bacon Tomato Dip**

4 oz. cream cheese, softened

1 C. sour cream

1/3 C. mayonnaise

6 slices bacon, cooked and crum-

4 green onions, thinly sliced

½ C. shredded cheddar cheese 1 tomato, seeded and diced

½ t. pepper

Stir together cream cheese, sour cream, and mayo in a bowl. Reserving 1 T. of crumbled bacon and 1 T. green onions, stir in cheddar, onions, tomato, pepper and bacon. Chill, covered at least 2 hours (overnight is best). Scatter with reserved bacon and onions. If you like, scatter

some more shredded cheese on the top also. Bring the dip out of the refrigerator a half hour before serving to soften enough to dip. Serve with vegetables, crackers, and bagel chips.

My mother had a good overnight slaw recipe and used it at some large dinners she helped with. She chopped some celery in addition to the celery seed. Enjoy this easy slaw recipe that you can make the day ahead.

#### **Overnight Slaw**

1 medium head cabbage, shredded 3 mild white onions, thinly sliced

2 large carrots, shredded

½ C. vinegar

½ C. sugar

1 t. ground mustard

1 t. celery seed

1 t. salt

1/8 t. pepper

½ C. canola oil

In a large bowl, combine cabbage,

onions, and carrots; set aside. In a saucepan, combine vinegar, sugar, mustard, celery seed, salt and pepper; bring to a boil, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Remove from the heat and stir in oil. Pour over the cabbage mixture. Cool to room temperature. Cover and refrigerate overnight; stir several times before serving.

Are you looking for a festive holiday Jell-O? This recipe makes a beautiful molded salad. If you can't find the white cranberry juice drink, you could use the cranberry raspberry drink.

#### Red, White, and Blue Berry Delight

½ C. sugar

2 envelopes unflavored gelatin

4 C. white cranberry-peach juice drink, divided

1 T. lemon juice

2 C. fresh strawberries, halved

2 C. fresh blueberries

½ C. heavy whipping cream 1 T. sugar

½ t. vanilla

In a saucepan, combine sugar and gelatin. Add 1 cup juice; cook and stir over low heat until gelatin is dissolved about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in lemon juice and remaining juice. Place strawberries in an 8 cup ring mold coated with cooking spray; add 2 cups gelatin mixture. Refrigerate until set but not firm, about 30 minutes. Set aside remaining gelatin mixture. Stir blueberries into remaining gelatin mixture and spoon over strawberry layer. Refrigerate overnight; unmold on a plate. In a bowl, beat cream until it begins to thicken. Add sugar and vanilla; beat until stiff peaks form. Serve with gelatin.

### Managing very late planting-Illinois crop scientist answers critical questions

With less than half the corn crop even though we know heavy equipand less than a fourth of the soybean crop planted by June 1 this year, Illinois farmers are facing some difficult decisions. Emerson Nafziger, of the Department of Crop Sciences at the University of Illinois, answers critical

#### O: How serious is the problem?

A: The entire state of Illinois received above-normal rainfall in May, ranging from 1 to 2 inches above normal in the southeastern edge of the state to as much as 8 inches above normal in northwestern Illinois. Some areas had some planting days early, but there have been no wider windows across the whole region to get the crop planted.

"A short break from rain the last few days of May has allowed some planting, but many fields remain wet, some have water standing, and there is no expectation that things will dry up soon to allow widespread planting," Nafziger says.

#### Q: Won't driving on soils that are still wet compact the soil so badly that yields will suffer?

A: In April, there's no reward for the risk of planting into wet soils yields from planting in late April are as high as those from planting in early

'That's no longer the case in late May or early June, when every day of delay costs yield. We don't want to get stuck in the field or plant where seedbed soil is too wet to crumble, but it makes sense to start planting ment will cause compaction. While the formation of a physical barrier to root growth isn't desirable, compaction can actually help water to move from deeper in the soil to the roots," Nafziger says.

#### Q: Should we "open up" soils by tilling them when they're wet so that the surface dries out faster?

A: The capillary rise of water from deeper layers to the surface is disrupted by surface tillage, and that means slower water movement to the surface and faster drying of the surface soil. That also means that deeper layers stay wetter. Claypan soils in south-central Illinois already have a compacted zone, so driving on them to open up the soil may do little damage. Although it may make soils look drier on the surface, Nafziger notes, tillage of already-tilled or deep soils is unlikely to be beneficial.

#### Q: How do I decide whether to take prevented planting or to plant the crop even if it's late?

A: Nafziger says a recent paper from Iowa State reported yield losses of about 25% (55 bushels) for corn planted June 10, 40% (88 bushels) on June 20, and 61% (133 bushels) on June 30. Therefore, planting corn on the last insurable date (June 25) would be expected to produce about half the normal yield. "There is some anecdotal evidence that yields could exceed those numbers, but for now that's the best guess we have," Nafziger says.

for soybean than for corn when planting later in June: Soybean yields may reach 50% of early-planted yields by early July in south-central and southern Illinois. Yields of soybeans planted in late June or later in central and northern Illinois are strongly affected by growing-season weather, and so are expected to vary widely. Soybeans planted after mid- or late June in northern Illinois may not mature before frost.

#### Q: Should I change corn hybrids or soybean varieties to ones with earlier maturity?

A: Maybe, says Nafziger. According to predictions based on growing degree days (GDD) left in the season after a given planting date, some hybrids, especially in northern Illinois, might need to be exchanged for shorter-maturing ones. "Because planting a hybrid late usually lowers its GDD requirement, it might still be safe to plant normal-maturity hybrids in central and southern Illinois, if planting can be done before mid-June," he

Because soybean flowering responds to photoperiod, varieties across the range of commonly-used maturities will flower at about the same time if planted in the second half of June. Therefore, Nafziger says, there is little need to change soybean varieties. However, he adds, north of I-80 in Illinois, producers should plant varieties no later than MG 2.8 or 2.9 if planting is delayed past mid-June.

"If July temperatures are normal, this might prove to be unnecessary, but cool weather (especially nights) in July could delay flowering to late July, and that could substantially delay maturity and push seed filling into

Yield declines should be less steep less favorable conditions," he says.

#### Q: What do we do about nitrogen fertilizer for corn?

A: "This is one of the really tough challenges, with such a wet May following a wet fall with limited nitrogen application and limited ability to apply nitrogen this spring," Nafziger says. For fields that have been very wet, it's likely that some of the nitrogen applied last fall or in early spring has moved down in the soil, and some may have left the field in tile drainage water. If soils dry in June, this movement will slow, and as plants begin to grow and take up nitrogen, some nitrogen may move back to the roots from deeper in the soil.

"We should wait until we see crop color and growth before deciding to add additional nitrogen, if the full amount has already been applied," he says. According to the nitrogen rate calculator, corn following soybean should be supplied with about 180 lb nitrogen per acre in southern and central Illinois, and about 170 lb nitrogen per acre in northern Illinois (soil organic matter provides the rest). If nitrogen still needs to be applied to the crop, these rates should be used, taking care to apply fertilizer properly to avoid loss and crop injury.

If June ends up being as wet as May, producers may want to go back with another 30 to 50 lb nitrogen in the two or three weeks before tasseling, especially if growth and yield potential are good. "The crop itself is a better indicator of its nitrogen status than soil or tissue samples," Nafziger says. "Having the crop take on a dark green color in mid-vegetative stages tends to indicate that it doesn't need more nitrogen.'

Q: Should we adjust seeding

#### rates or make other agronomic changes when planting this late?

A: Not for corn, Nafziger says, unless the initial target was to plant more than 38,000 to 40,000 seeds, in which case seeding rate should be lowered. For soybeans, the idea that narrow rows and higher seeding rates will help compensate for smaller plants hasn't been fully supported by research, but it certainly makes sense to avoid low stands and the potential for incomplete canopies during seed fill. "We should have 115,000 to 120,000 plants regardless of planting date, and we should plant to make sure stands are at least that high," he says.

#### Q: What about switching from corn to soybeans?

A: This is less an agronomic question than an economic one, involving crop insurance, current crop prices, and how much has already been invested in fields that were to be planted to corn. Nafziger says corn is the answer when considering corn prices relative to soybean prices; the fact that corn will not be planted as intended in some places (such as flooded river bottoms); and the fact that in some places in recent years corn planted in early June has yielded well. "It's not an automatic decision to switch to soybeans when planting late like it might have been a few decades ago," he notes.

#### Q: Is there any possibility that we could end up with good yields despite the start?

A: Trendline yields for corn and soybean in Illinois in 2019 are about 190 and 67 bushels per acre, respectively. "It's too much even for an optimist to hope that actual yields in 2019 will reach those levels, but if we get the best weather possible—no temperatures above normal and not too many days below normal—and no lack of soil moisture ever during the growing season, we might hope to see yields in the vicinity of 90% of those trendline yields. Even that is an audacious hope, but we haven't tested today's hybrids and varieties under such conditions in the past five years, and we can hope to be surprised at what they can do," Nafziger concludes.

9 x 13 baking dish. Cover and bake at 350 for 45 minutes. Sprinkle with remaining onions and bacon. Bake, uncovered, 5 to 10 minutes longer or until bubbly.

On the Fourth of July Holiday, many people have brats, burgers, and "dogs." I recently ran across some interesting recipes for hot dogs by their city names. I think that we have some pretty darn good hotdogs at Lena Maid Meats; this article said the best store brand hot dogs are Nathan's and Hebrew National hot dogs. You need to always use all beef hot dogs. You might want to try some of these variations on the hot dog. You will notice that the Chicago Style Hot Dogs have very special instructions, whereas the other cities are much simpler! You, of course, would start out with hot dogs and buns. You can use wheat buns, hoagie buns, brat buns, or pretzel buns. Here are some interesting ways to fix hot dogs.

**Hot Dogs** 

Chicago Style: If you have ever read anything about Chicago Style Hot Dogs, you know that there are certain ingredients that are "allowed" in this dog. In Chicago, you have to use Vienna Sausage all beef dogs. (If you live in Stephenson or Jo Daviess County, you are out of luck at the local grocery store.) You boil the hot dog and steam the bun (sesame seed

ions and bacon. Transfer to a greased buns are the best!). The dog goes in the bun, and then the ingredients are put on the dog in this order: yellow mustard, sweet green pickle relish, chopped onion, tomato wedges, dill pickle, sport peppers (any kind of pickled pepper will do)., and a sprinkling of celery salt. Under no circumstances do you ever put catsup on a Chicago Style Hot dog.

Philadelphia Hot Dogs: Cheze Whiz, sautéed peppers, onion, and mushrooms.

Detroit Hot Dogs: Warm Hormel No bean Chili; yellow mustard, diced onion, and shredded cheddar

Nashville Hot Dogs: Hot sauce, sprinkle cayenne pepper, spread mayo on the bun, 2 sliced pickles.

Tucson Hot Dogs: Spread mayo on the bun. Wrap the hot dog in bacon and bake until bacon is crispy turning once, sprinkle drained pinto beans, chopped tomatoes, diced onion, chopped avocado, jalapeno peppers chopped (remove seeds for less

Kansas City Hot Dogs: Melted Swiss cheese, sauerkraut, Thousand Island dressing spread on the bun.

The following condiments also are good on dogs and burgers: Crisp Onion Relish: ½ C. sugar, 1/3 C. water, and 1/3 C. cider vinegar stirred together until dissolved. Pour over 4 thinly sliced sweet onions. Chill at least 3 hours. Drain and discard the liquid. Stir in 1 C. mayo and 1 t. celery seed. Double Hot Horseradish

Mustard: In a food processor, process 1/4 C. cider vinegar, ¼ C. ground mustard, 3 T. white wine vinegar, 2 T. mustard seed, 1 T. prepared horseradish, and 1½ t, honey until smooth. This cobbler would be a great summer dessert.

It uses lots of berries, and it tastes great over ice

#### Mixed Berry Cobbler

½ C. unsalted butter, melted

2 C. sliced fresh strawberries

1/4 C. strawberry jam, heated 2 C. flour

1½ C. sugar

2 t. baking powder

½ t. salt

½ t. cinnamon

1 1/3 C. whole milk

2 C. fresh blueberries

2 C. fresh blackberries 2 t. lemon zest

Vanilla ice cream

Preheat oven to 350. Pour melted butter into a 9 x 13 baking dish. In a small bowl, stir together strawberries and jam. Let stand until set, about 10 minutes; drain well. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour sugar, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. Add milk, whisking until smooth. Pour batter onto melted butter in dish. Top with strawberry mixture, blueberries, blackberries, and sprinkle with zest. Bake until golden brown, 50 to 55 minutes. Let cool for 30 minutes. Serve with ice cream.

### SOS+ Father Mike to share ministry of Pine Ridge Indian Reservation

On Thursday, July 11, at 2 p.m., at Stockton's Calvary UM Fellowship Hall, the SOS+ group will hear from Father Mike of Stockton's Holy Cross Catholic Church as he shares the calling and ministry of his parishioners in helping an Indian Reservation in South Dakota.

"A ministry and a journey with a people whose dream died at Wounded Knee", Father Mike and the parishioners of Holy Cross Catholic Church felt the calling to help out Pine Ridge Indian Reservation of Southwest South Dakota. It is a program vou won't want to miss. All seniors of Stockton and the surrounding area are invited to attend this interesting and most informative

program on the South Dakota Pine Ridge Indian Reservation.

Father Mike states that this is the poorest place in the United States. 87% to 90% of the people are unemployed and approximately 70% of youth drop out of school. Illnesses plague the native population of 40,000 and resources and assistance are few and far between for these people. Father Mike commented that food is often scarce, housing is woefully lacking with 30% of the homes without running water or electricity. 60% of the homes are infested with black mold and are greatly overcrowded with as many as 28 people

The annual income in the reserva-

tion is only \$3,500 with 97% of the people living below the poverty line. Suicide among the youth is very high, despair, domestic violence, alcoholism and drug use, poverty and hopelessness leaves the life expectancy for men at 47 years of age and for women 52 years of age. Infant mortality is 18%, 300 times worse than the national average.

These are a people that feel forgotten, broken, unimportant, and tested daily by despair, depression and hopelessness, seeing little but darkness on the horizon for themselves and for their children. "As Christians, we hear Jesus and we hear Him clearly," stated Father Mike.

Jesus asks the blind man in the

Gospel, "What can I do for you?" This is the question we must ask our brothers and sisters of Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, for they too are God's children and our brothers and our sisters. As Christians, Father Mike stated that we also are ever mindful of the words of Jesus, "What you did for one of the least of your brothers and sisters, you did for me." And we know well the consequences of not attending to our sisters and brothers of Pine Ridge Indian Reser-

Come and learn more about this tribe of people, their needs, and the many ways the Catholic church of Stockton has helped in feeding the hungry and clothing the needy and how, we too, can do our part in helping others.

Illinois are not suited to cover crop use as shortened growing seasons and harsh winters make proper establishment difficult. However, given the amount of prevented planting acres across Illinois in 2019, producers may be eager to give cover crops a try due to their proposed benefits including: additional forage, reduced erosion and nutrient loss, improved water holding capacity nutrient cycling, as well as pathogen and weed suppression.

There are a wide variety of cover crops out there, each with specific functions which may or may not benefit your operation. For example, tillage radish has been used to alleviate compaction while cereal rye is known for ease of establishment and nutrient scavenging. Howevown unique challenges; specialized equipment, residual herbicides, and successful termination prior to cash crop planting may be obstacles to overcome for successful integration into your cropping system.


