# Benton-Shullsburg-Scales Mound Football vs Black Hawk-Warren

Two local teams have made the move North and joined Wisconsin football for the 2019 season. Scales Mound joined an already long running co-op in the Benton-Shullsburg Knights. Warren made the move North and joined one of Wisconsin's most successful football programs in the Black Hawk Warriors. Both teams compete in the same conference, the Six Rivers Conference.

Despite the game consisting of mostly Wisconsin athletes, it was played as Warren's Homecoming game, so the matchup took place in Meridian Park. The Black Hawk Warrior football team dominated last season and ended up taking home the

Division 7 State Championship trophy from 2018. An already impressive team picked up more athletes when Warren joined and the success from recent years had carried itself into 2019. Black Hawk lost the state championship in 2017.

While the success story hasn't been quite the same for what was the Benton-Shullsburg team, they still have had some recent success finishing 2018 with an 8-4 record.

So despite these two teams making the move North, they still found themselves competing with each other, just in a different State and a different conference.

The Homecoming game was expected to be Black Hawk-Warren's toughest competition thus far in

2019, as each team came in with perfect 4-0 records.

It started out as a defensive battle as the Knights began with the ball. The Knights had some momentum quickly as Kaelen Shetler took the second play from scrimmage for a fifteen yard run. Soon after the Knights had a huge play called back for holding which eventually stalled the drive and forced them to punt.

The Benton-Shullsburg-Scales Mound defense proved strong as well, as they forced a Warriors punt as well. The teams went back and forth for the rest of the quarter as they went into second quarter still tied at 0-0.

Near the end of the quarter, the Warriors began what would be a

long, time consuming drive. Black Hawk-Warren began with the ball at the 3:55 mark in the first quarter. They held onto it until the 7:26 mark in the second quarter when Cayden Milz plunged in for a four yard touchdown run. The drive took seventeen plays and took almost nine minutes off the clock. The Warriors would miss the two point conversion, leaving them with a 6-0 lead.

The score would remain at that six point advantage for Blackhawk-Warren until halftime.

The second half started with the Warriors getting the ball, but the Knights defense made a big play, getting an interception to give their offense the ball back. The Knights offense had struggled all game,

however, as they hadn't gotten a first down since their first drive of the game. Once again they were forced to punt which set up a big return for Jaylen Rufenacht. Being set up in great field position, Black Hawk-Warren were able to expand their lead with a 1 yard touchdown run near the end of the third. A half back pass for the two point conversion pushed their lead to 14-0.

The Knights offensive struggles continued as they ended the third quarter by throwing an interception, which set up another Warriors touchdown. This time coming through the air as Ethan Williams found Brady Hagen in the endzone for a 39 yard touchdown pass.

Benton-Shullsburg-Scales Mound did manage to find some momentum in the fourth quarter. Brandon Hoppman managed to bust out for a big run to put the Knights all the way into the red zone. Hoppman eventually finished the job, scampering in for a five yard touchdown run to give the Knights their first score of the game. Black Hawk quickly responded, however, as Rufenacht took the ball into the endzone to push their lead to 27-6.

The Warriors finished things off late in the fourth when Lucas Milz ran into the endzone. Despite the tough first half, the Warriors pulled off an impressive 33-6 victory over Benton-Shullsburg-Scales Mound for the Warren Homecoming.

Rufenacht led the way with 117 yards rushing and another 17 yards receiving

The Black Hawk-Warren Warriors continue their season and stay perfect on Friday when they face off with the River Ridge Timberwolves. This is not the River Ridge from Hanover, but from Patch Grove, Wisconsin

The Knights will look to bounce back this Friday when they face off with Northwestern.








# Lena Yard of the Month

# Plant your native garden this fall

planting native plants in your garden this spring, don't worry, you still have time to get them in the ground in the fall.

"Growing native plants is a great way to benefit the environment, wildlife, and bring some interesting and beautiful plants to your garden, says Gemini Bhalsod, University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator. "Fall is a great time to plant and establish native gardens because the weed pressure is lower than in the spring.

Fall can also be a great time to plant native seeds, since many Illinois native plants require a cold, moist winter to germinate in the

Before planting, Bhalsod says, it is important to scout for the right spot in your landscape. "Whether the area is sunny or shady, or the soil is moist or dry, there are so many options for native plants to put in your

Gardeners should think about the sun/shade pattern in planting sites. Does the spot get morning or afternoon sun, full-day sun, or is it mostly in the shade? Also think about the sun during different times of the year; the area under a large tree might be full-sun in the spring, but shady after the tree gets its summer leaves. Also consider whether the area tends to retain water after a rain event or drains quickly. Finally, think about the view. Is the garden against a wall, where the tall plants will have to go in the back, or can the garden bed be viewed from all

After you have asked yourself these questions and taken a good inventory of your site, now comes the fun part: picking plants for that area! Some of Bhalsod's favorites

If you missed the window for for full sun are blue false indigo (Baptisia australis), purple prairie clover (Dalea purpurea), and bee balm (Monarda fistulosa). Be sure to include a mix of colors and bloom times so vou can ensure blooms throughout the whole growing season. Visit your local Extension office for suggestions for and information about plants that work well for your

After choosing your plants and making a map of the garden bed, it's time to prep the site, Bhalsod says. First, you will need to kill off the existing vegetation before planting. "One of the best ways to kill off existing weeds or turf is to smother them," she says. You can do this by renting a sod cutter and removing grass completely or by layering wet cardboard or newspaper on the area

the cardboard down to prevent light from penetrating. A downside is that you have to wait a few months for the grass to die off. If you don't have the time, put soil and mulch directly on top of the cardboard or newspaper and plant. If you take this approach, be sure to plant small transplants and keep them well watered.

For any fall plantings, it is important to water regularly throughout the fall so plants develop the deep root system they need to survive the winter. Ideally, plant in September to allow enough time for root development. But don't expect blooms right away; it could take a year or two for flowers to form.

Follow these steps and you will be on your way to a well-thought-out and organized native garden this fall.



# Social use of marijuana could be topic for follow-up legislation

Some of the lead negotiators of the law to legalize adult-use marijuana in Illinois are seeking to provide clarity on a provision that gives local municipalities control over which facilities, if any, would be authorized to allow cannabis consumption.

The topic is at the top of the discussion list for potential follow-up legislation, commonly referred to as a trailer bill, which could be heard when the General Assembly returns for veto session in late October, the original bill's Senate sponsor said.

That senator is Heather Steans, a Chicago Democrat who said it is "certainly not the intent" of House Bill 1438, the bill which legalized adult-use marijuana, to allow consumption at public places such as

"If we need any clarification to make that crystal clear, we will do that," Steans said during a phone interview. "We know we'll be doing something along those lines, most

While the bill prohibits "smoking cannabis in any place where smoking is prohibited under the Smoke Free Illinois Act," mitigating language appears in Section 55-25 of the more than 600-page bill.

It reads: "A unit of local government ... may regulate the on-premises consumption of cannabis at or in a cannabis business establishment within its jurisdiction in a manner consistent with this Act. A cannabis business establishment or other entity authorized or permitted by a unit of local government to allow on-site consumption shall not be deemed a public place within the meaning of the Smoke Free Illinois Act.'

That language means local municipalities have the right to exempt certain facilities from the Smoke Free Illinois Act, which otherwise bans smoking in virtually all public

Deputy Gov. Christian Mitchell, who was one of the leading forces in Gov. J.B. Pritzker's administration

in negotiating the bill, said the local control over social use language was put in place to prevent "de facto prohibition" of cannabis consumption for apartment dwellers who, if their landlord banned consumption, would conceivably have no place to legally partake.

"We wanted to leave room in the bill for locals to deal with social consumption as they saw fit," Mitchell said in a phone interview. "I think the concern from a lot of folks was that, especially in poor areas, areas with more rental housing which are going to be disproportionately people of color, for example, if that housing, by the legal power of the landlord, bans the ability to consume cannabis on premises, you can end up with a de facto prohibition for some of those folks.

While the bill clearly defines a cannabis business establishment as any licensed "cultivation center, craft grower, processing organization, dispensing organization, or transporting organization," exactly which other entities a local government can exempt from the Smoke Free Illinois Act is not clearly defined.

Mitchell said discussions of public use generally revolved around the establishment of facilities similar to hookah bars or cigar lounges, which have legal exemptions in the Smoke Free Illinois Act to allow for tobacco consumption on their premises.

"That's the context in which I've seen it contemplated. The restaurant context isn't one that came up," he said. "But I imagine with the Smoke Free Illinois Act, that would probably be more problematic.'

Sen. Jason Barickman, a Bloomington Republican who supported the bill, recalled discussions of allowing social consumption at private clubs or licensed cannabis facilities, but not public facilities such as restaurants.

"There's a separate prohibition that is blanketed throughout the law which says that use and consumption cannot occur in public or in public places," he said in a phone interview.

'So if you're operating a restaurant, that's a public place, and the law would prohibit that.'

Steans said she remembered discussions of allowing cannabis use at certain licensed facilities as well, but trailer bill discussions could add some clarity to the matter.

"We want to make sure that everyone is on the same page and that the law reads exactly the way we want it to," she said.

Steans, Mitchell and Barickman

were in general agreement that "the law is the law," and any other language involved in a trailer bill would be mostly technical in nature. For Mitchell, that means "not relitigating" issues already decided in the initial passage of the bill.

The deputy governor added industry concerns regarding advanced licenses for some existing medicinal marijuana dispensaries were clearly addressed in existing legislation. Mitchell also said concerns raised by municipalities regarding the enforcement of home-grown marijuana plants, which medicinal patients are legally allowed to possess, were also unlikely to be addressed in a trailer

"What we have said to everyone is that the trailer bill for veto is going to be highly technical stuff that needs to change in order to ensure a smooth roll into January 1, (2020). It is not a forum to relitigate issues on which folks lost out negotiations," he said.

### Pritzker names 2020 census co-coordinators

Gov. J.B. Pritzker's office announced the appointment of two census co-coordinators Monday, a position created by an executive order he signed in June to maximize participation in the 2020 U.S. Census.

State officials say up to two congressional seats and more than \$1 billion in federal funding are at stake in Illinois if the complete population is not counted in 2020. That's why

the General Assembly allocated \$29 million in state funding to an outreach effort that will be led by the newly created Census Office within the Illinois Department of Human

Pritzker announced the co-coordinators of that office will be Marishonta Wilkerson, who has been serving in the role since August after more than two years as assistant counsel to Democratic Illinois House Speaker Michael Madigan, and Oswaldo Alvarez, who has more than 10 years of program implementation experience in the nonprofit sector.

"The 2020 census will determine if Illinois gets our fair share of federal resources and representation, and these outstanding leaders will be committed to ensuring a complete and accurate count," Pritzker, a Democrat, said in a news release Monday. "With a \$29 million investment and a new Census Office, the state of Illinois will fight against the fear tactics coming from the federal government and make known that we're proud to be home to vibrant, thriving communities of all backgrounds."

At the June signing of the Executive Order 10, which created the Census Office, Lt. Gov. Juliana Stratton said Illinois could lose \$120 million annually for each 1 percent of the population that is undercounted about \$1.2 billion over the 10-year period between each census.

Illinois' outreach effort will center on partnerships with community groups that are already working to promote census turnout. The deadline for those groups to apply for grants was Friday, Sept. 13.

According to the Census Office's September report, \$20 million has

Northwestern Illinois Community Action Agency has funding from the Department of Commerce & Economic Opportunity (DCEO) to assist residents of Jo Daviess and Stephenson Counties with home heating utility costs (gas, propane, electric) through the Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP) and Weatherization Programs.

LIHEAP clients with ComEd and/or Nicor Gas as utility providers may have the option of choosing between the traditional Direct Vendor (DVP) one-time payment or the Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP). The choices will be explained to clients during their application visit. PIPP applications will be taken until Dec. 31, 2019 or until funding is exhausted. LIHEAP applications will be taken until May 31, 2020 or until funding is exhausted.

Beginning Monday, Oct. 1, 2019, income eligible seniors (age 60 and older) and people receiving disability benefits may call to schedule an appointment to apply for assistance.

Starting Nov. 1, 2019, income eligible households without home energy service (are disconnected or have a disconnect notice from their primary and/or secondary heating utility) and families with children age 5 and under may also call to schedule an appointment to apply.

Starting Dec. 2, 2019, all other income eligible households may call to schedule an appointment to apply.

Eligible households may call 800-883-1111 or 815-232-3141 from 8:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. to schedule an appointment to apply for assistance at one of the following locations.







# ROM LENA'S KITCH



The not so skinny cook

We have been enjoying some sunshine; however, as I write this column, I heard the weather report say we could have some rain. Hopefully the prediction is wrong. We need the fields and gardens to dry up, so that we will be able to have some things to harvest. This week we continue to offer some good fall dishes.

I know that for some people tomatoes are coming to an end; if you still have some, this recipe is a good one. You can use it as a side, or you can use it as a meal with some crusty

### **BLT Pasta Salad**

5 T. balsamic vinaigrette dressing,

8 oz. bacon, cooked and crumbled 2 pints grape tomatoes, halved

8 oz. mozzarella cheese, cubed ½ head iceberg lettuce, chopped

Cook pasta according to package directions. Drain. Place in a large bowl and toss with 1 tablespoon of dressing. Add bacon, tomatoes, cheese and lettuce to the bowl. Toss with remaining 1/4 cup dressing. Chill

an hour before serving. This recipe is a good one to keep around for this winter when you need to have a meal put together ahead of time or quickly. If you brown the hamburger the night before, it is really easy to put together. McCormick makes a really good Montreal steak season. I use it on most of my steaks that I broil. You can get it at most grocery stores. If you use the refrigerated pie crusts, you can put this dish together in just a little time. It uses only one of the pie crusts, so you can whip together a pumpkin pie for dessert!

### **Cheeseburger Pot Pie**

1 T. olive oil

1 lb. hamburger 1 small onion, thinly sliced

2 cloves garlic, minced

1 T. Montreal steak seasoning

1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. ketchup

1 T. Dijon mustard

½ C. shredded sharp Cheddar cheese

2 T. chopped fresh parsley

½ pkg. refrigerated piecrusts, room temperature

1 T. unsalted butter, melted

1 t. sesame seeds

Preheat the oven to 425. In a medium saucepan, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add hamburger, onion, garlic, and steak seasoning; cook, stirring occasionally, until browned and crumbly, about 8 minutes. Add tomato sauce, ketchup,

Bring to a simmer; cook until slightly thickened, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in cheese and parsley. Spoon mixture into a 9-inch pie plate. On a lightly floured surface, unroll piecrust. Carefully place on filling. Fold edges under, and crimp as desired. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle with sesame seeds. Make s slit in center as an air vent. Bake until crust is golden brown, 15 to '8 minutes. Let stand for 10 minutes before serving.

This casserole is also any easy one. You can use the rotisserie chicken for the cooked chicken. The ranch dressing gives it a little zip, and the cream cheese makes it nice and creamy. Sullivan's has the good Amish noodles that taste almost homemade.

### **Creamy Ranch Chicken Noodle Casserole**

2 oz. wide egg noodles

4 T. unsalted butter

1 C. diced onions

1 C. sliced carrots

1 C. sliced celery

1/4 C. flour

1 pkg. powdered ranch dressing

4 C. chicken broth

1 C. half and half

4 oz. cream cheese, cubed and softened

2 C. chopped cooked chicken

3 C. shredded sharp Cheddar

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. chopped fresh parsley Topping:

2 C. oyster crackers, crushed

1 C. shredded Parmesan

3 T. unsalted butter, melted

2 T. minced fresh parsley

Preheat oven to 350. Coat a 9 x 13 baking dish with nonstick spray. Blanch noodles in a pot of boiling salted water, 1 minute; drain, rinse with cold water and drain again. Melt butter in same pot over medium. Add onions, carrots, and celery; sweat, covered, until vegetables soften, 5 minutes. Add flour and ranch packet; cook for 2 minutes. Stir in broth, half and half, and cream cheese; bring to a boil, and reduce heat; simmer until thick, about 2 to 3 minutes. Stir in noodles, chicken, cheddar and parsley; season with salt and pepper. Transfer noodle mixture to prepared dish. Topping: Combine crackers, Parmesan, butter, and parsley; season with salt and pepper. Sprinkle topping over casserole and bake until bubbly, 25 to 30 minutes. Let casserole rest 5 to 10 minutes before serving.

### **Apple Sheet Cake**

3/4 C. unsalted butter, softened

2 C. sugar

3 large eggs; room temperature

1 t. vanilla

3 C. flour

2 t. baking powder

1 t. cinnamon

½ t. baking soda

1 C. whole buttermilk, room tem-

2 C. chopped unpeeled Honeycrisp apples

### Frosting:

1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened

½ C. unsalted butter

½ t. orange zest

½ t. vanilla

¼ t. salt 4 C. powdered sugar

Preheat the oven to 325. Lightly spray a 9 x 13 baking pan with cooking spray. Line the pan with parchment paper, letting excess extend over sides of pan. Cake: In a large mixing bowl, beat butter and sugar at a medium speed until fluffy, 3 to 4 minutes, stopping to scrape sides of bowl. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in vanilla. In a medium bowl whisk together the flour, baking powder, salt, cinnamon and baking soda. With mixer on low speed, gradually add the flour mixture to butter mixture, alternating with buttermilk, beginning and ending with flour mixture, beating just until combined after each addition. Gently fold in apples. Spread batter into the prepared pan. Bake until a wooden pick inserted in the center, comes out clean, 40 to 45 minutes. Let cool completely in pan on a wire rack.

Frosting: In a large bowl, beat cream cheese, butter, zest, vanilla, and salt with a mixer at medium speed until smooth. Gradually add powdered sugar, beating until smooth. Increase mixer speed to high, and beat until fluffy, about 1 minute. Spread frosting onto cooled cake. Garnish with apple slices and cinnamon, if desired. Cover and re-

I have started having requests for fruit and nut breads. This one is unusual because it adds nuts to pumpkin, and we are getting into pumpkin season. You can substitute almonds for hazelnuts if you don't like hazelnuts, and hazelnuts are hard to find. I guess the name would have to be changed to Almond Cake Pumpkin Bread. We wouldn't want anyone to feel confused with hazelnuts in the name and not a one in the recipe!

### **Hazelnut Cake Pumpkin Bread**

5 C. flour

2½ C. sugar

4 t. baking soda

1¾ t. cinnamon

1½ t. salt

3/4 t. ginger

3/4 t. cardamom

2 eggs, room temperature

1 can (29 oz.) solid-pack pumpkin

1 C. 2% milk

1 C. canola oil

1 t. vanilla

2 C. chopped hazelnuts

2 C. chopped dates

Preheat oven to 350; in a large bowl, whisk the first 7 ingredients. In a stand mixer; beat eggs, pumpkin, milk, oil, and vanilla until blended. Beat in flour mixture just until moistened. Fold in hazelnuts and dates.

Transfer to 3 greased loaf pans. Bake until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, 50 to 55 minutes. Cool in pans 10 minutes before removing to wire racks to cool. Freeze option: wrap loaves in foil and then freeze. To use: thaw at room temperature.

been allocated for the initial grants, while \$9 million will be reserved for an additional round of grants to "address identified needs and communications and marketing efforts."

According to the report, the Census Office anticipates awarding a grant to at least one regional intermediary in each of 12 regions identified by the office. The intermediaries will coordinate outreach efforts and provide "subawards" to "subgrantees" that will conduct census outreach efforts in their communities.

The hardest-to-count communities will be prioritized for the grants. The U.S. Census Bureau deems an area hard to count if the self-response rate in the 2010 decennial census was 73

Illinois is using 18 variables associated with low census response, including housing, income, household language and internet access, to determine where the millions in grant funding will be distributed.

The largest grant distributions will go to organizations operating in Chicago, with a minimum allotment of \$5 million and a maximum of \$8.9 million. The Suburban Cook County region will receive between \$2.1 million and \$3.5 million, and the collar county region will receive between \$1.8 million and \$2.2 million.

Other regions include: Central Illinois (\$400,000-\$600,000), Northeast Central (\$500,000-\$695,000), North Central (\$500,000-\$650,000), Northern (\$750,000-\$920,000) Northwest (\$350,000-\$475,000), Southeast Central (\$290,000-\$400,000), Southern (\$600,000-\$700,000), Southwest Central (\$530,000-\$660,000), and West Central (\$250,000-\$300,000).

Anita Banerji, director of the De-

mocracy Initiative of the nonprofit organization Forefront, which participates in census outreach, said the key to ensuring an accurate count is building trust in hard-to-count communities. In a July interview with Capitol News Illinois, she stressed that any information a person puts on census forms is confidential.

"There will be a lot of misinformation and disinformation out there in the year ahead," she said. "The advocates will have to be working smarter and harder to ensure that all residents across the state have accurate information, they feel safe and protected, and understand why it's necessary to self-report."

One of the reasons self-reporting is necessary, Banerji said, is because census data helps determine a number of demographic figures that could affect business interest on top of federal and state government funding.

"You can't be that thoughtful or that intentional about where these new roads or new hospitals or these kinds of (English as a second language) classes need to go if you don't have accurate data," she said. "So it behooves all of us to participate in this national civic engagement, civic duty, so that we can be providing a better future."

In Monday's release, IDHS Secretary Grace Hou said Illinois is "well on its way to ensuring a complete and



Jo Daviess County Farm Bureau offering \$250 towards R.O.P.S. Purchase. The Jo Daviess County Farm Bureau would like to offer funds to reimburse farmers for purchasing **ROPS** (Rollover Protective Structures.) Fifty-five percent of farm tractors in Illinois do not have a cab or ROPS (Rollover Protection Structure.) Only 1 in 5 victims will survive a tractor rollover accident. The leading cause of farm related deaths in Illinois is tractor rollover accidents. They account for more than 30% of farm related deaths. ROPS members from being crushed in the event of a tractor turnover or rollover. Safety Chairman, Dan Robbe, states that "Safety is a priority of the farm bureau, and we would like to encourage our members to install ROPS on their tractors". Jo Daviess County Farm Bureau members who purchase a ROPS could receive a reimbursement of \$250 towards the purchase of a ROPS (Six rebates are available). To receive the \$250, members would need to bring in their paid invoice to the Farm Bureau office in Elizabeth. Customers would be responsible for the cost, freight, and installation which are available through the dealer. If you have been thinking about putting a ROPS on one of your tractors – now is the time!
