EVERYDAY MYSTERIES

Question: Why do I see my breath when it's cold outside?

Answer: Cold air causes the warm moisture in our breath to condense into tiny droplets of water that appear like a small, misty cloud.

Many people think seeing your breath has everything to do with temperature, but the spectacle has just as much to do with the amount of moisture in the atmosphere.

Because our bodies contain nearly 70% water, the air in our lungs is almost completely saturated with water vapor (water in gas form) and is the same temperature as our bodies (98.60F). Cold air cannot hold as much moisture as warm air. So when one exhales a warm, saturated breath

on a cold day the cold air rapidly lowers the temperature of our breath, whereupon the combination briefly reaches dew point. At dew point, air can no longer hold water vapor; when air is cooled beyond dew point water vapor turns to liquid form, the physical process known as condensation. It is this liquid form of your breath — minuscule droplets of water — that creates the fleeting, misty cloud we see when breathing in cold weather.

Seeing your breath requires just the right combination of temperature and humidity. Though it is pretty common to see your breath in cold weather (usually below 45oF), the next time you have fun making breath clouds, you'll know it's because of the exact science of atmospheric moisture and temperature.

Question: Why do geese fly in a V?


Answer: Energy conservation and visual assurance.

Why do geese fly in a V? Because it would be too hard to fly in an S! Just kidding. Scientists have determined that the V-shaped formation that geese use when migrating serves two important purposes:

First, it conserves their energy. Each bird flies slightly above the bird in front of him, resulting in a reduction of wind resistance. The birds take turns being in the front, falling back when they get tired. In this way, the geese can fly for a

long time before they must stop for rest. The authors of a 2001 Nature article stated that pelicans that fly alone beat their wings more frequently and have higher heart rates than those that fly in formation. It follows that birds that fly in formation glide more often and reduce energy expenditure (Weimerskirch, 2001).

The second benefit to the V formation is that it is easy to keep track of every bird in the group. Flying in formation may assist with the communication and coordination within the group. Fighter pilots often use this formation for the same reason.

Question: What causes flowers to have different colors?

Answer: Anthocyanins and carotenoids... plus some other things.

Flowers come in all shapes and sizes, but what makes them truly stand apart from each other is their vibrant colors. These colors are made up of pigments and, generally speaking, the fewer the pigments, the lighter the color. The most common pigments in flowers come in the form of anthocyanins. These pigments range in color from white to red to blue to yellow to purple and even black and brown. A different kind of pigment class is made up of the carotenoids. Carotenoids are responsible for some yellows, oranges, and reds. (These little guys are what cause the brilliant colors of autumn leaves!) While many flowers get their colors from either anthocyanins or carotenoids, there are some that can get their colors from a combination of both.

Anthocyanins and carotenoids are the main sources of flower coloration, but there are other factors that can affect how colors present them-

selves. The amount of light flowers receive while they grow, the temperature of the environment around them, even the pH level of the soil in which they grow can affect their coloration. Another factor is stress from the environment. This stress can include a drought or a flood or even a lack of nutrition in the soil, all of which can dampen the color-

ation of flowers. And then, of course, there is the visual that the eye and brain form together: humans can, for the most part, view all colors in the visible spectrum, BUT every human perceives color differently, so a red rose may appear more vibrant to one person while it appears more muted to another. Beauty (and color!) is in the eye of the beholder.



FHN provides mobile testing for COVID

ing testing for COVID-19 (the novel Coronavirus) and confusion at some employers as to when they should expect their employees to be tested, FHN is now providing drive-through mobile testing.

Due to the limited number of tests available nationwide at this time, this testing is by appointment only and must be scheduled in advance: individuals without appointments who arrive at the site will be asked to return only if an appointment has been scheduled through the testing scheduling number 815-599-6412., which will be open at 8 a.m. Thursday, March 19.

Callers will be screened, which means asking questions about any current symptoms, recent travel, and interactions with others, as well as determining if callers may be at higher risk for complications from COVID-19 as outlined below. Answers to these screening questions will determine if callers meet testing criteria and will provide direction for the next course of action, which may include testing at FHN's mobile location.

People with fever and/or signs of lower respiratory illness such as cough or shortness of breath (not symptoms of a typical cold or upper respiratory condition) and meet any of the below

Any person, including healthcare workers, who has had close contact with a laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 patient within 14 days of symptom onset

A history of travel from affected geographic areas within 14 days of symptom onset (currently China, South Korea, Iran, Italy, parts of Europe, and Japan)

The individual is from a congregate living or healthcare facility (staff and/ or patient/resident) with clusters of infection not due to influenza and suspected to be due to COVID-19

The patient is at higher risk for complications from COVID-19 and for whom rapid test results are more likely to impact clinical care/outcomes (adults age 65 years and older, people with chronic medical conditions and/ or an immunocompromised state that may put them at higher risk for poor outcomes

Other persons who have been evaluated by a medical professional and are deemed high priority, including hospitalized patients with unexplained pneumonia.

The COVID-19 test is a nasopharyngeal specimen swab, sometimes referred to as an NP swab or test. A long swab is inserted deep into the nasal

cavity, often around 3 inches beyond attention should contact their healthwhere the nose attaches to the rest of the head, until the patient coughs.

FHN's mobile test site is in the parking lot of the FHN Specialty Care Harlem Avenue, 25 North Harlem Avenue (enter from Harlem Avenue) just north of FHN Memorial Hospital. Patients arriving for testing must present a photo ID upon arrival to confirm their appointment.

While there is currently no treatment for COVID-19, people who are mildly ill can be safe at home. While at home, as much as possible, they should stay in a specific room if living with others and away from other people who may visit.

For municipal leaders and community organizers across the state, 2019 flooding presented a host of challenges that tested the capabilities of their emergency response systems and the plans that support them. According to the NOAA National Centers for Environmental Information, this was the fifth consecutive year that the U.S. experienced ten or more extreme weather events where the economic impact of each exceeded 1 billion dollars. With a disproportionate number of those events impacting the Midwest region, it seems clear that time spent preparing for weather-related disasters improves a community's ability to respond and recover from adverse events.

Municipal employees and community organizers interested in learning how to support families, businesses, and local organizations during weather- and climate-related events are invited to attend Preparing for Extreme Weather a webinar to be held at 12 p.m. Thursday, March 26. Illinois State Climatologist Trent Ford will discuss the science and impacts of climate change as they relate to water in Illinois, and Sally McConkey, Illinois State Water Survey engineer and hydrologist, will explain where to find floodplain information and how to interpret a floodplain map. Time to prune your raspberry and blackberry plants

pruned for the season, homeowners should look to prune raspberry and blackberry plants in the next couple

Your first step in pruning these is to know that brambles produce primocanes and floricanes. "A primocane would be a cane that grew in summer of 2019 that will then be called a floricane in spring 2020", states Grant McCarty, Local Foods and Small Farms Educator. "These floricanes will produce your fruit this summer. When we talk about pruning in the spring, you are removing the canes the produced fruit last sum-

For pruning purposes, you need to know the type of bramble you have. Blackberry pruning will consist of pruning out canes that produced fruit last summer. Then, you'll cut your main canes back to 3-4 feet. Next, side branches of the blackberry canes will be pruned to 12 inches with 5-6

Raspberry plants are a different story, "You have three types: Everbearing, Summer Red, and Black/ Purple Raspberry. Each of these will be pruned slightly different. However, the first step is to remove canes that produced raspberries last summer." McCarty continues.

For summer red raspberry, you'll prune back this year's floricanes to 5 feet. If you have summer black/purple raspberry, these can be pruned 3



times a year. From this year's floricanes, cut side branches to 8-10 inches in length and then months later, do a summer tipping when canes are 24-30 inches in height. This summer tipping involves removing 2-3 inches of new shoots at the top of the floricane.

The Everbearing raspberry plants can produce twice a season which will dictate how you prune them. For summer and fall yields, thin out this year's floricanes to 5 inches between. These will produce fruit in early summer. This summer, newly grown primocanes may then produce fruit in the fall before overwintering, thinning out next spring, and producing again in the summer to start the cycle over again. For just fall raspberries, mow all canes down this spring. You'll have primocanes develop this summer and produce fall fruit.

"Many homeowners have bramble patches that are messes," McCarty states. "Your first step in remediating them is to prune out the old canes. From there, create a trellis/support to keep them in place. With few disease problems, these brambles will produce in most year and provide you with a great summer crop".

Stephenson County Extension welcomes International Visitor Leadership participants



The not so skinny cook

It certainly has been an interesting week. We are all homebound and having to do a lot of cooking. This week's recipes feature some interesting choices for you. There is a great slaw, a Lenten soup, an old standby and two desserts.

This cabbage features cabbage and peppers. You can buy the tricolor mini sweet peppers in the grocery store. If you can't find them, you can use a yellow and red pepper cut into small pieces or matchsticks. The

marinade is white wine vinegar and oil with various spices. It is a great dish to make ahead.

Marinated Cabbage and **Bell Pepper Slaw**

7 C. thinly sliced green cabbage ½ (8 oz. pkg.) tricolor mini sweet peppers, stemmed, cored and sliced

½ C. thinly sliced celery

½ C. thinly sliced sweet onion

¹/₄ C. sugar

1/4 C. white wine vinegar

1/4 C. oil

1 t. salt 1/4 t. mustard seed

½ t. pepper

1/4 t. crushed red pepper

In a large bowl, combine cabbage, peppers, celery, and onion. In a small saucepan, bring sugar, vinegar, and all remaining ingredients to a boil over medium-high heat, stirring until sugar dissolves. Pour mixture onto vegetables, and stir until well combined. Cover and refrigerate for 12 hours. Drain slaw well, and stir

If you need a healthy Lenten soup, this soup will fill the bill. It features black beans which are really good for you. If you don't want the heat from the jalapeno, omit it. If you can't find the tomatoes with peppers and onions, you can substitute tomatoes and garlic or just diced tomatoes. Enjoy this great meatless meal with crusty bread.

Black Bean Soup

3 cans (15 oz. each) black beans, rinsed and drained, divided

3 ribs celery with leaves, chopped

1 large onion, chopped

4 garlic cloves, minced

1 jalapeno pepper, seeded and chopped

1 red pepper, chopped

2 T. olive oil

1 bay leaf

3 t. ground cumin

11/2 t. ground coriander

¼ t. pepper

1 t. hot sauce

2 cans (14½ oz. each) vegetable

1 can (14½ oz.) diced tomatoes with green peppers and onions, undrained

½ C. sour cream ¼ C. chopped green onions

1 t. lime juice

In a small bowl, mash one can black beans; set aside. In a large saucepan, sautée the celery, onion, red pepper, and jalapeno in oil until tender. Add garlic; cook 1 minute more. Stir in the broth, tomatoes, cumin, coriander, hot sauce, pepper, bay leaf, mashed black beans, and remaining whole beans. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for 15 minutes. Discard bay leaf. Stir in lime juice. Garnish each serving with 1 T. sour cream and 1½ t. green onions.

Country fried steak is a Southern staple in a lot of houses. It has made its way to the North, and it is a great meal with the mashed potatoes that follow. If you don't have a cast iron skillet, you can use a Dutch oven or a heavy skillet. Enjoy this old fashioned staple with the mashed potatoes that follow.

Country Steak and Gravy

2½ C. plus 2½ T. flour, divided

2 C. buttermilk

1 egg

½ t. onion powder

34 t. salt, divided

1/4 t. garlic powder

¼ t. pepper

4 (4 oz.) sirloin cubed steaks

1 C. oil

1 can (14 oz.) beef broth

Place ½ C. flour in a shallow dish. In a medium bowl, whisk together buttermilk and egg. In another medium bowl, whisk together 2 C. flour, onion powder, ¼ t. salt, garlic powder and pepper. Dredge steaks in plain flour, shaking off excess. Dip in buttermilk mixture, letting excess drip off. Dredge steaks in flour mixture, shaking off excess

In a 12-inch cast iron skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add steaks; cook until browned, 3 to 4 minutes per side. Remove steaks from skillet, and keep warm. Pour off oil in skillet

In a small bowl, whisk together broth, remaining 21/2 T. flour and remaining ¼ t. salt until smooth. Pour into skillet, and bring to a boil; cook, stirring constantly until thickened, 2 to 3 minutes. Serve immediately with steaks.

Garlic Ranch Mashed Potatoes

2 lbs. Yukon gold potatoes, peeled and cubed

4 cloves garlic, minced

1/3 C plus 3 T. half-and-half divided

3 T. butter, melted

1 pkg. (1 oz.) ranch seasoning mix

In a large saucepan, bring potatoes, garlic and enough water to cover to a boil over medium-high heat. Reduce heat, cover, and simmer until potatoes are tender, 12 to 15 minutes. Drain well. Transfer potatoes to a large bowl, and 1/3 C. half-andhalf, melted butter and ranch seasoning. Beat with a mixer at medium speed until light and fluffy. Beat in remaining half-and-half until desired

consistency is reached. Garnish with chives or parsley.

These carrot cake cookies are yummy (of course they have cream cheese frosting!). They are moist and will not last long. They are a great cookie to have around for Eas-

Carrot Cake Cookies

34 C. plus 2 T. unsalted butter, softened

1 C. sugar

1/4 C. firmly packed brown sugar

1 t. vanilla

2 large eggs

21/4 C. flour 2 t. cinnamon

1 t. salt

½ t. baking soda

½ t. ground ginger

1/4 t. ground nutmeg

2 C. shredded carrots

Cream Cheese Frosting

6 oz. cream cheese, softened

6 T. unsalted butter, softened

1½ t. vanilla

3 C. powdered sugar

Preheat oven to 350. Line baking sheets with parchment paper. In a large bowl, beat butter, sugars, and vanilla with a mixer at medium speed until fluffy, 3 to 4 minutes, stopping to scrape sides of bowl. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition.

In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, cinnamon, salt, baking soda, ginger, and nutmeg. With mixer on low speed, gradually add flour mixture to butter mixture, beating until combined. Stir in carrots. Using a 11/2 T. scoop, scoop dough and place at least 2 inches apart onto prepared pans. Bake until browned, about 13 minutes. Let cool on pans for 5 minutes. Remove from pans and cool completely on wire racks,

Frosting: in a large bowl, beat cream cheese, butter, and vanilla with a mixer at medium speed until combined. Gradually add powdered sugar, beating until smooth. Spread frosting onto cooled cookies. Top with pecans. Store in an airtight container for up to 2 days. Store in a cool place.

Since we had a traditional southern old fashioned fried steak dinner, these old fashioned cookies will go great. They do not make a large batch; some people think one ginger cookie is enough. Have a walk back in time with these cookies.

The evaluation begins with a series of questions regarding a patient's symptoms and exposure. Following the visit, the patient will be connected with a Monroe Clinic or Dean Medical Group provider to review a care plan, if needed. Response time will be dependent on volumes. If testing is recommended, patients will be sent to the nearest testing facility.

These proactive steps ensure the continued safety of our patients, visitors, physicians, staff and communities. We are working with local and state health authorities as well as the Centers for Disease Control to actively monitor the situation and ensure we have the most up-to-date information.
