





Public Notice Number KPM:16010601.docx is hereby given by Illinois EPA, Division of Water Pollution Control, Permit Section, 1021 North Grand Avenue East, Post Office Box 19276, Springfield, Illinois 62794-9276 (herein Agency) that a draft National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit Number IL0048313 has been prepared under 40 CFR 124.6(d) for Exelon Generation Company, LLC, 4300 Winfield Road, Warrenville, Illinois 60555-5701 for discharge into Rock River, Woodland Creek, and an Unnamed Tributary to the Rock River from the Exelon Generation Company, LLC, Byron Nuclear Generation Station, 4450 North German Church Road, Byron, Illinois 61010 (Ogle County).

The applicant is engaged in operating a nuclear power station with a nuclear fueled steam electric generating facility. Two pressurized water nuclear fission reactors provide steam to turbine generators with a maximum generating capacity of 2240 MW (net). All comments received by the Agency not later than 30 days from the date of this publication shall be considered in making the final decision regarding permit issuance.

If written comments and/or requests indicate a significant degree of public interest in the draft permit, the permitting authority may, at its discretion, hold a public hearing. Public notice will be given 30 days before any public hearing. 371748
