Lena agencies work together to overcome effects of COVID-19

The news has been filled with stories about the Covid-19 pandemic. There is, however, an underlying story which is being overlooked. It's a story that affects all of us. The story is not simply about the deadly virus, it's the story of how the pandemic affects our community. In Lena, American Legion Post 577 has had to put a hold on plans and scheduled events. Renovations to the building's interior have come to a standstill. Both Julia Moore and Karen Sirgany have been involved with the American Legion for several years. Moore said, "We were having remodeling done in the hall. Now, before the new flooring could be finished, things had to stop. The contractors work is not considered an essential business. Also, many of the contractor's employees are concerned about going into other people's homes or businesses. We don't know where our plans will be going until about the middle of April."

"Sirgany said, "Things here in Lena are stable. In Freeport, the Senior Resource Center (SRC) may not be open to the public, but its operations haven't been shut down." Sirgany, who has been involved with the SRC as well as the Legion said, "The services that the Center provides are very important. Things may be difficult right now, but the Center staff is working hard to help Seniors during this difficult time."

Because of the social distancing and sheltering in place mandates that have been put into effect statewide, the SRC has been closed to the public. This means that events such as health fairs, informational programs and onsite services, not considered essential, have been cancelled until further notice. An example of this would be the AARP sponsored tax preparation program.

Sonja Shoemaker, SRC Executive Director said, "Things are very diffi-

cult right now, so we just have to take a different approach to each problem. For instance, with limited office space, we've instituted a plan to stagger the start times of staff. Some staff members can work from home.

"Some of our greatest concerns are issues such as making sure that seniors will continue to have caregivers come to their homes where needed in a way that is safe for the caregiver as well as the patient. Pretzel City Transit is still operating and in compliance with state directives. We want to be sure that seniors can visit their doctor's office, buy groceries and get their prescription medicines. Paying their bills or just getting cash can be a problem under the current circumstances.

"I'm confident that we're going to get through this. We have an amazing staff. When this is behind us, all of us will be better because of it."

The Lena Food Pantry continues to operate on its regular schedule. Larry Buchenwau who has been a volunteer for some time said, "We will be open as usual, every Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m."

"We've seen a large increase in the number of people coming in. The first Saturday was busier than usual. The second Saturday was the busiest we have ever been. We're doing our best to make sure that no one will ever be turned away because we can't help.

"We've been helping those that call but can't get here. For instance, we pick up lists from the residents at the Lena Seniors Building and drop off a bag of groceries for them. We're going to help everyone that calls on us."

How to protect yourself against coronavirus when pumping gas

Despite social distancing and shuttered venues—moves designed to staunch the spread of the novel coronavirus—some essential workers still need to commute in their cars, and many others need to drive to workplaces for food, medicine, and other supplies and services.

For many, that means the occasional trip to the gas station is inevitable, as is touching the pump handle and payment keypad. Pump handles and credit card keypads, which are high-touch areas, could have the virus present, which experts say can stay alive for hours or even days on hard surfaces.

Your best protection overall is to wash your hands properly on a regular basis and to refrain from touching your face with unwashed hands. But there are a few things you can do that will help you stay safe when you have to pump gas.

CR's auto experts suggest several ways to approach this task.

- Consider carrying some disposable nitrile or latex gloves in your car to use when gripping the pump handle. Short of that, you can try to use paper towels that are sometimes available at the pump or have some with you to cover your hands when you grip the handle.

- Do the same to isolate yourself from the keypad when entering payment information.

- Invert the gloves and throw them away, and also any paper towels you might have used. Use hand sanitizer to make sure your hands are clean after you're done and before you get back into your car.

- Cleaning your hands after you're done seems like the quickest, easiest precaution. But some drivers might want to have disinfectant wipes handy for wiping down the gas pump handle and the payment keypad before pumping.

"This process ensures that I'm not inadvertently transferring the virus from a high-touch surface like a gas pump to my vehicle's door handle, and from there into the interior," says Gabriel Shenhar, associate director of CR's auto test program.

Whichever method you prefer, our best advice is to be prepared ahead of time because washing your hands properly with soap and water at a gas station is not always an easy or feasible option.

John Eichberger, executive director of the nonprofit Fuels Institute, says gas station owners and operators are doing what they can to combat the spread of COVID-19 by cleaning their facilities more often. But that might not be enough assurance for some motorists.

"If consumers are really worried

about touching a gas pump handle, they can do what they do when they go to a grocery store and wipe down surfaces with disinfectant wipes when they need to touch something," Eichberger says.

Although it's not entirely clear how long the coronavirus lives once attached to a surface like a door handle, Eike Steinmann, a virologist at Ruhr-Universität Bochum in Germany who has studied the lifespan of viruses on various surfaces, says they probably won't last more than a few days. Stephen Thomas, M.D., chief of infectious diseases and director of global health at Upstate Medical University in Syracuse, N.Y., says that bacteria and viruses exist everywhere in the natural environment, and that—again—your best defense is frequent, vigorous hand-washing.

Coronaviruses are surrounded by a protective envelope that helps them attach to and infect other cells. The friction from scrubbing is enough to break down the virus's coating, Thomas says.

And as you would after any trip outside your home during this unusual time, remember to wash your hands before touching anything at home. The CDC recommends washing your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, and failing that, using an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

Monroe Clinic is offering a free virtual evaluation for anyone who is concerned they may be experiencing symptoms of, or may have been exposed to, Coronavirus (COVID-19).

Anyone who lives in Wisconsin or Illinois is eligible for the free evaluation, by going to www.ssmhealth.com/covid19

The evaluation begins with a se-

ries of questions regarding a patient's symptoms and exposure. Following the visit, the patient will be connected with a Monroe Clinic or Dean Medical Group provider to review a care plan, if needed. Response time will be dependent on volumes. If testing is recommended, patients will be sent to the nearest testing facility.

These proactive steps ensure the continued safety of our patients, visitors, physicians, staff and communities. We are working with local and state health authorities as well as the Centers for Disease Control to actively monitor the situation and ensure we have the most up-to-date information.

First COVID-19 patient hospitalized at FHN Memorial Hospital

FHN is confirming the hospitalization of its first patient testing positive for COVID-19 (novel coronavirus) at FHN Memorial Hospital. The patient, in their 50s, had a positive COVID-19 test result reported on March 25. Previously, the patient had been quarantined at home after experiencing symptoms earlier in the week. This is the second confirmed case of COVID-19 in Stephenson County. Specific information related to this patient will not be shared due to federal patient privacy laws (HIPAA).

The Stephenson County Health Department and FHN have been expecting this and have been working

diligently to be ready for it. FHN has been anticipating a positive COVID-19 patient within the hospital setting and has prepared extensively. The safety of FHN patients, providers and staff, and the community are the utmost priority throughout this pandemic.

FHN has been closely collaborating with the Stephenson County Health Department to ensure the plan of care for patients in and outside of the hospital are in alignment with recommendations from the Illinois Department of Health (IDPH) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Current precautions are in place at

FHN to reduce the spread of the virus, which is highly contagious, including visitor restrictions at all FHN locations, rescheduling of non-critical treatments/procedures, and internal infection control processes for all staff and providers.

Except in emergency cases, individuals who think they may have COVID-19 or who believe they have been in contact with someone who has been diagnosed with or is under evaluation for the disease should STAY HOME and CALL their healthcare

provider or FHN for further direction.

Symptoms of COVID-19 include fever, cough, difficulty breathing or shortness of breath, and confirmed additional risks such as other health conditions or travel to areas with widespread infections - for more information on symptoms and risk factors, visit www.fhn.org/coronavirus. Do not go to the Emergency Department at FHN Memorial Hospital, FHN/Physicians Immediate Care Urgent Care Clinic, or any FHN provider office without calling first

and receiving instruction as to how to proceed.

FHN has implemented an on-line screening tool at www.fhn.org for individuals to check themselves for symptoms of COVID-19 as well as a hotline for mobile testing of COVID-19 where callers are screened to determine their risk level and appointments for the testing are scheduled if appropriate. Individuals can NOT be tested at the mobile location without an appointment. The hotline number is 815-599-6412.

Community help for FHN during COVID-19 pandemic

FHN has received many offers of assistance from the community related to responding to the spread of COVID-19 (novel coronavirus). These are greatly appreciated! Here are ways you can help.

Financial contributions may be made to the COVID-19 Response Fund at the FHN Foundation, where they will be used for the greatest need during the pandemic.

If you are interested in sewing masks, an approved pattern is posted on the FHN website. It is a simple pattern called the Deaconess (in 1924, FHN was known for a while as the Evangelical Deaconess Hospital). The masks will be laundered at

the hospital and then kept here until IDPH (Illinois Department of Health) approves the use of homemade masks in healthcare settings. At that point, FHN will keep some and the rest will be made available for area nursing homes and other care providers. Homemade masks may be dropped off at the hospital (see below). JoAnn Fabrics has launched a national effort through all of their stores, including Freeport, for people wishing to sew masks and they are putting together kits for that purpose. The store in Freeport will be asking that the Deaconess pattern be used. Masks made through their program can be returned to the Freeport store, which will deliver

them to FHN.

Other donations, including hand sanitizer, commercially made masks, and any other items potentially useful for healthcare may be left inside the north entrance to the hospital (Stephenson Street). Donors can pull through the circle drive there and leave their items in the large boxes just inside the first automatically opening door from 8 am to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Homemade masks may also be left in these boxes.

Northwestern Illinois Community Action Agency PY20 LIHEAP and Weatherization Assistance Programs

Northwestern Illinois Community Action Agency has funding from the Department of Commerce & Economic Opportunity (DCEO) to assist residents of Jo Daviess and Stephenson Counties with home heating utility costs through the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), and Weatherization Programs.

PY20 LIHEAP application taking has been extended to June 30, 2020.

If you have not applied for LIHEAP assistance during this program year, which began October 1, 2019, or your application was denied, you may call the office for more information on applying for assistance.

If you have received LIHEAP assistance but now have a disconnect notice on your gas and/or electric bill, or your propane tank is at 20% or below, you may be eligible for additional assistance. Please call the office for information about assistance.

Eligible households may call 800-883-1111 or 815-232-3141 from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. for information and how to apply for assistance.

Income Guidelines: To qualify, a household must have a 30 day gross income at or below 150% of the federal poverty level shown below for 30 days prior to and including the application date.

1 person household - \$1,561	2 person household - \$2,114
3 person household - \$2,666	4 person household - \$3,219

Add \$553 for each additional person in the household

**** The following documents will be required to apply for assistance. ****

- Social Security Cards for all members of the household.
- Proof of all gross income for all household members for 30 days including the application date including pay check stubs, SSA/SSI/SSD current benefit letters, pension/retirement statements, child support, unemployment reports, TANF/AABD/Township GA assistance notices, self employment reports, and proof of zero income.
- Complete current heat and electric bills and also disconnect notices received.
- Medical Card from Illinois Department of Human Services.
- Copy of current lease or rent receipt.
- Proof of Homeownership (Title for Mobile Homes) and tax bill are required for weatherization assistance.

Illinois reports surge in new COVID-19 cases, deaths

Governor: Peak in cases expected 'sometime in April'

Illinois officials on Sunday announced the largest one-day jump in confirmed novel coronavirus cases and deaths in the state yet. But public and private labs' per-day testing ability is also higher than it has ever been.

The Department of Public Health identified 1,105 new cases and 18 deaths, putting the state totals at 4,596 case in 47 counties and 65 related deaths.

Gov. JB Pritzker said "we have weeks to go" before Illinois reaches a peak in new COVID-19 cases, expected "sometime in April." One of his priorities, he added, is to increase the state's testing ability.

Five days ago, three state labs, four commercial facilities and 15 hospital labs processed 2,000 tests per day. The governor said that capacity is up to 4,000 daily with a goal of hitting 10,000 daily in the next 10 days.

"That marker is significant because it's the number of tests per day that the scientists and experts tell us that we need to get a truly holistic understanding of the virus in each of our 102 counties," Pritzker said. "... This 10,000-a-day marker will give us the data to run a more mathematically significant model that offers us improved insight into how well our interventions are working."

Dr. Ngozi Ezike, director of the Illinois Department of Public Health, said additional testing will help

health professionals "better understand" the extent of COVID-19's spread.

Lab technicians so far have examined 28,000 tests statewide.

"Ultimately, my goal is to reach a large enough testing capacity where we're able to test everyone who needs a test on a regular basis," Pritzker said. "... Every day we aren't hitting 10,000 tests or more is another day that we're not able to get answers that help us get past this current crisis."

He called the federal government's lack of action in February a "profound failing" and "foundational mistake" that state officials had to correct. Although President Donald Trump's administration moved to

upgrade its testing response, "we still have far to go," Pritzker said.

And while Illinois awaits the additional tests federal officials promised — which "may never be fulfilled," the governor said — state leaders are taking other actions to address testing capacity.

"More testing available across the board will better inform the amount of virus we are seeing in the community, where we can take that information and identify specific concerted efforts to decrease the risk in those high-risk areas," Ezike said, "ultimately with the goal of limiting infection, limiting spread and ultimately limiting lives lost."

Two executives from Abbott Laboratories, a medical devices company based in Illinois, "expressed their real dedication" to help the state acquire five-minute rapid COVID-19 tests, Pritzker said. And once other materials needed to process tests are acquired, a third shift of technicians will be added to all three of Illinois' laboratories.

There are also five drive-thru facilities now — three federal Health and Human Services ones; in Bolingbrook, Northlake and Joliet; and two operated by the Illinois National Guard, in McLean County and Harwood Heights.

Testing priority dictates symptomatic first responders, health care workers, seniors and those with underlying conditions receive one first at those sites, which are permitted by federal guidelines to run only 250 tests per day.

"Of course, we can't just test — we have to treat," Pritzker said. "And in order to treat people, we have to increase hospital bed capacity."

The governor said he will provide additional updates about how his administration is doing that, as well as its progress acquiring personal protective equipment such as gloves, gowns and masks, in the coming days.

He did say, though, that Illinois

is "acquiring millions of units" of equipment, most of it shared with facilities running through supplies quickly.

The 18 newly-reported deaths linked to the novel coronavirus were in Cook, DuPage, Kane, Kendall, LaSalle and St. Clair counties.

Bond, Knox, Menard and Montgomery counties had their first confirmed COVID-19 cases.

Trump approves Illinois major disaster declaration

FEMA announced that federal emergency aid has been made available for the state of Illinois to supplement the state, tribes and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic beginning on Jan. 20, 2020 and continuing.

The President's action makes federal funding available for Crisis Counseling for affected individuals in all areas of the state of Illinois.

Federal funding is also available to state, tribal, and eligible local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis for emergency protective measures (Category B), including direct federal assistance under Public Assistance, for all areas affected by COVID-19 at a federal cost share of 75 percent.

Steven W. Johnson has been named as the Federal Coordinating Officer for federal recovery operations in the affected area. Additional designations may be made at a later date if requested by the state and warranted by the results of further assessments.

Cannabis dispensaries take steps to keep customers, staff safe

As part of their ongoing commitment to putting customer health and safety first, members of the Cannabis Business Association of Illinois are taking important precautions and protections as the coronavirus pandemic unfolds.

The state of Illinois has allowed cannabis dispensaries to take orders from medical patients on the curbs or in the parking lots of their facilities to reduce human contact between customers and staff. Guidance from the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation allows dispensaries until March 30 to take orders for medical patients — who may have compromised immune systems — directly outside the facility.

Dispensaries also have been advised to regularly disinfect surfaces touched by patients, keep customers six feet from each other and to separate lines for medical and recreational products.

To help dispensaries further keep patients and customers protected, CBAI has developed a resource packet of guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The materials outline standards for proper handwashing, what items in the dispensary should be cleaned and disinfected regularly, encouraging staff and customers to stay home if they're sick, and more.

CBAI has encouraged its dispensary members to share the guidance with patients, customers, vendors and employees in their facilities. Some dispensaries are doing their part by limiting sales to medical patients only or limiting hours of recreational sales to ensure medical patients have access to the medicine they need.

CBAI Executive Director Pamela Althoff said these moves are part

of a larger, ongoing collaboration between the cannabis industry and Gov. Pritzker's Administration to ensure patients and customers have a successful, safe and valuable experience.

"For many months now, we have worked closely with the Administration to ensure patients are our first priority, and their health and safety is paramount," Althoff said.

"These are concerning, uncertain times for everyone in Illinois and around the world as we deal with this pandemic. We appreciate the constant, productive communication with the Governor and his team as we work to meet the extraordinary demand for adult use cannabis product in Illinois and keep providing the precious medical supply to our patients. We will continue to work to keep everyone safe and healthy in our facilities, and to build out our infrastructure and supply to meet the growing demand in Illinois."

Holy week alone: A cross we bear

Under the threat of COVID-19 spreading, Bishop Malloy and Pope Francis cancel public Holy Week services

As orders from the federal and state governments changed almost daily, Bishop David Malloy of the Rockford Diocese, changed his guidance to parishes to comply. Both he and Pope Francis have cancelled public Holy Week services.

In a letter he sent March 20 to priests of the diocese he explained changes through Holy Week. It reads, in part:

I write to you once more given more guidance that has come to us about how to respond to the Coronavirus outbreak and its rapid spread.

At this time, health authorities have announced the need for a strict limit of ten persons maximum for any gathering. ...

Given this guidance, all parish churches are to adhere to this limit at all times. ... Please note, as previously indicated, the distribution of holy Communion and the administration of the sacrament of the sick should be only for emergency situations at this time following the guidance of the health authorities. That means any other efforts, including proposals for communion for people in cars should not be utilized.

Please observe that directive

strictly and ask your faithful to make a spiritual union at this time when physical participation is not possible.

As noted previously, no public Masses on weekdays or Sundays are to be celebrated until further notice. While priests are to celebrate Mass privately daily, especially in the current situation of great spiritual need, this must be done without the presence of the faithful for the time being. Do not gather an informal group for a private Mass as we seek to limit the spread of the virus.

In addition, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments has today issued instructions for celebration of Holy Week. ... Please note that the Congregation stresses that the celebrations should take place only in the cathedral or parish churches, not in rectory chapels or other venues. Given this guidance, the Diocese of Rockford will respond as follows

The Chrism Mass: The Chrism Mass for the Diocese of Rockford will be celebrated as originally scheduled on Holy Thursday at 11 a.m. from St. Peter Cathedral Parish. I will celebrate this Mass along with Msgr. Glenn Nelson as Vicar Gener-

al.

The Mass will be live-streamed without the presence of other faithful or priests except for the cathedral rector and masters of ceremonies. ... The oils will be blessed and held for subsequent distribution when possible.

Holy Thursday: I will celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper again with Msgr. Nelson, Father (Stephen) St. Jules and masters of ceremonies. It will be live-streamed from the cathedral at 7 p.m.

Priests are given the faculty to celebrate this Mass in the parish church without the presence of the faithful. That condition is to be observed.

I would urge where possible that your faithful be given the opportunity to follow the liturgy by some element of live-streaming. Only one Mass is to be celebrated by all the priests of the parish.

Good Friday: Under the same conditions outlined above, I will celebrate the Good Friday liturgy at St. Peter Cathedral at 2 p.m. without the faithful being present. Priests should do the same at the time chosen for the

FROM LENA'S KITCHEN



The not so skinny cook

Week two or three (have you ever noticed how when you don't go out, every day is the same?) of our enforced isolation has everyone trying to figure out something to do. Isn't it funny that we look for things to do when we can't be mobile? I continue to do some cooking; I have been trying to make an old favorite chocolate cookie recipe, but I just can't seem to get it done. I have been going through some old recipes, and I also have been looking at new ones. You will get the benefit of my cleaning up some boxes.

This first recipe is for a great appetizer if you like the taste of sun dried tomatoes and roasted red peppers. I have come to appreciate them in my old age. I make a dip from roasted sweet peppers that uses a Robert Rothchild dip that I can't find anymore, so I am always looking for a dip that uses them. This one uses both the sun dried tomatoes and roasted peppers. Enjoy this spread with crackers or pita chips.

Sun Dried Tomato Spread

2 pkgs. (8 oz. each) cream cheese, softened
2 C. mayonnaise
¾ C. finely chopped onion
4 garlic cloves, minced
1 jar (7 oz.) oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes, drained and chopped
2/3 C. chopped roasted sweet red peppers
2 C. shredded mozzarella cheese
2 C. shredded Italian Cheese blend
1 C. shredded Parmesan cheese, divided

In a large bowl, combine the cream cheese, mayo, onion and garlic until blended. Stir in tomatoes and red peppers. Stir in mozzarella and Italian cheeses and ¾ C. Parmesan cheese. Transfer to a greased 9 x 13 baking dish. Sprinkle with the remaining Parmesan cheese. Bake uncovered at 350 for 18 to 22 minutes or until edges are bubbly and lightly browned. Serve with crackers.

I had made this Asian slaw a lot a few years ago. You know when a recipe makes the rounds, and then you make it for a while. I think we get tired of it, and a new recipe comes along. I found this old recipe, and decided to give it a try again. There are several variations, and I probably will share one of them with you again.

Crunchy Asian Slaw

2 (3 oz. each) pkgs. Chicken flavor ramen noodles
1 bag (6 oz.) slivered almonds
2 T. sesame seeds
2/3 C. canola oil
1/3 C. sugar
6 T. white vinegar
½ t. salt

2 large heads Napa cabbage or bok choy, torn into pieces
6 green onions, sliced

Preheat oven to broil. Reserve ramen seasoning packets; crumble ramen noodles onto a rimmed baking sheet; add almonds and sesame seeds. Broil for 2 minutes, being careful not to burn seeds. Let cool.

In a large bowl, whisk together oil, sugar, vinegar, salt, and both packets of ramen seasonings until well combined. Stir in cabbage, green onion, and toasted ramen mixture until well combined.

I have two Lenten meals in the next two recipes. I put these away, and then I sometimes forget about them. As Lent winds down, and meatless Fridays fade away, you might like to keep these around for any season. The first is for stuffed pasta shells. If you can't find ricotta or don't like the taste of it, you can substitute the cream cheese. If you are a meat lover, you can always brown some hamburger or ground pork and add it to the dish.

Stuffed Pasta Shells

4 C. shredded mozzarella cheese
1 carton (15 oz.) ricotta cheese or an 8 oz. block of cream cheese
1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen chopped spinach, thawed and squeezed dry
1 pkg. (12 oz.) jumbo pasta shells, cooked and drained

¾ C. spaghetti sauce
Grated parmesan cheese
Preheat oven to 350. Combine cheeses and spinach; stuff into shells. Arrange shells in a greased 9 x 13 pan. Pour spaghetti sauce over the shells. Cover and bake until heated through, about 30 minutes. Sprinkle with grated Parmesan cheese after baking.

My mother used to make salmon patties. Instead of salmon these patties use tuna in the pouch. You could substitute the pouch tuna with canned tuna if you want. These would be great with mashed potatoes and old fashioned milk gravy.

Comforting Tuna Patties

2 T. butter
3 T. flour
1 C. evaporated milk
1 pouch (6.4) light tuna in water
1/3 C. plus ½ C. dry bread crumbs, divided
1 green onion, finely chopped
2 T. lemon juice
½ t. salt
¼ t. pepper
Oil for frying

In a small saucepan, melt butter over medium heat. Stir in flour until smooth; gradually whisk in milk. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly; cook and stir until thickened, 2 to 3 minutes. Remove from heat. Transfer to a small bowl; cool. Stir in tuna to white sauce, add 1/3 C. bread crumbs, green onion, lemon juice, salt and pepper. Refrigerate, covered, for at least 30 minutes. Place the remaining ½ C. dry bread crumbs in a shallow bowl. Drop ½ C. tuna mixture into the crumbs. Gently coat and shape into a ½ inch thick patty. Repeat. In a large skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Add tuna patties in batches; cook until golden brown, 2 to 3 minutes on each side. Drain on

paper towels.

If you are looking for a quick dessert, this angel food cake uses a store bought cake that you dress up a little bit. You can use chocolate sprinkles or flavored sprinkles; you pick your favorite. If you don't want to slice the cake into layers, (it looks great on a pedestal cake stand) you can cut slices and pour the topping on each slice and decorate with raspberries, strawberries, or blueberries.

Birthday Angel Food Cake

1 pg. (3.3 oz) White Chocolate Instant Pudding
1 C. cold milk
1 tub (8 oz.) Cool Whip
1 C. sprinkles
1 C. fresh raspberries divided
1 prepared angel food cake (10 inch) cut horizontally into 3 layers

Beat pudding mix and milk in large bowl with whisk for 1 minute. Fold in ½ tub of Cool Whip and sprinkles. Add ½ cup raspberries and fold gently. Stack cake layers on a plate, spreading pudding mixture between layers. Run spatula around side of cake to smooth edges of filling. Top with remaining Cool Whip and raspberries.

This last recipe is a great one for Easter. It does require some work, and it uses an old fashioned cooked frosting. One of my friends (I think in her boredom) made a home made angel food cake with Seven Minute Frosting. Both my mother and grandmother used to make this frosting. This is not the traditional Seven Minute Frosting, but it is made very much like it. You are also to use the gel food coloring because you have a little more control over how much you use. You could color some coconut green and put that on the top with the green sprinkles. These cupcakes take a little time, but they are worth

it in the end.

Green Velvet Cupcakes

1 C. cake flour
2 t. unsweetened cocoa powder
½ t. baking soda
¼ t. salt
¾ C. sugar
½ C. milk
½ C. canola oil
1 egg
1 T. white vinegar
1 t. vanilla
½ t. green gel food coloring

Frosting:

2 oz. white chocolate chopped
3 large egg whites, room temperature
¼ C. sugar
¼ t. salt
Pinch of cream of tartar
2 sticks unsalted butter, cut into pieces, at room temperature
1 t. vanilla
Green sprinkles for decorating

Cupcakes: Preheat the oven to

350. Line a 12 C. muffin pan with paper liners. Sift the cake flour, cocoa powder, baking soda and salt into a large bowl. Whisk the sugar, milk, oil, egg, vinegar and vanilla in a separate large bowl. Whisk in the flour mixture until smooth. Add the green food coloring and stir until combined. Divide the batter among the prepared muffin cups, filling them three quarters of the way. Bake until a toothpick inserted into the centers comes out clean, about 15 minutes. Let cool slightly in the pan, then remove to a rack to cool completely.

Frosting: Put the white chocolate in a small heatproof bowl set over a saucepan of simmering water (do not let bowl touch the water). Cook, stirring, until melted; remove the bowl from the pan and let cool slightly. Reserve the pan of simmering water. Whisk the egg whites,

Red Cross faces serious threat to available blood supply

The American Red Cross now faces a severe blood shortage due to an unprecedented number of blood drive cancellations in response to the coronavirus outbreak. Healthy individuals are needed now to donate to help patients counting on lifesaving blood.

Individuals can schedule an appointment to give blood with the Red Cross by visiting RedCrossBlood.org, using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, calling 1-800-RED-CROSS or enabling the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device.

As the coronavirus pandemic has grown here in the U.S., blood drive cancellations have grown at an alarming rate. To date, nearly 2,700 Red Cross blood drives have been canceled across the country due to concerns about congregating at workplaces, college campuses and schools amidst the coronavirus outbreak. These cancellations have resulted in some 86,000 fewer blood donations. More than 80% of the blood the Red Cross collects comes

from drives held at locations of this type.

Here in the Illinois Region, 65 blood drives have been canceled, resulting in 2,230 fewer blood donations. The Red Cross is adding appointment slots at donation centers and expanding capacity at many community blood drives across the country over the next few weeks to ensure ample opportunities for donors to give.

Volunteer donors are the only source of blood for those in need

The Red Cross expects the number of cancellations to continue to increase, which is causing heightened concern for blood collection organizations and hospitals across the country. This blood shortage could impact patients who need surgery, victims of car accidents and other emergencies, or patients suffering from cancer.

"I am looking at the refrigerator that contains only one day's supply of blood for the hospital," said Dr. Robertson Davenport, director of

transfusion medicine at Michigan Medicine in Ann Arbor. "The hospital is full. There are patients who need blood and cannot wait."

"In our experience, the American public comes together to support those in need during times of shortage and that support is needed now more than ever during this unprecedented public health crisis," said Chris Hrouda, president, Red Cross Biomedical Services. "Unfortunately, when people stop donating blood, it forces doctors to make hard choices about patient care, which is why we need those who are healthy and well to roll up a sleeve and give the gift of life."

The Red Cross is committed to blood drive safety

"We know that people want to help, but they may be hesitant to visit a blood drive during this time. We want to assure the public that blood donation is a safe process, and we have put additional precautions in place at our blood drives and donation centers to protect all who come

out,” said Hrouda.

The Red Cross has implemented new measures to ensure blood drives and donation centers are even safer for our donors and staff, including:

- Checking the temperature of staff and donors before entering a drive to make sure they are healthy.
- Providing hand sanitizer for use before the drive, as well as throughout the donation process.
- Spacing beds, where possible, to follow social distancing practices between blood donors.
- Increasing enhanced disinfecting of surfaces and equipment.

At each blood drive and donation center, Red Cross employees already follow thorough safety protocols to help prevent the spread of any type of infection, including:

- Wearing gloves and changing gloves with each donor.
- Routinely wiping down donor-touched areas.
- Using sterile collection sets for every donation.
- Preparing the arm for donation with an aseptic scrub.

There is no data or evidence that this coronavirus can be transmitted by blood transfusion, and there have been no reported cases of transfusion transmission for any respiratory vi-

rus including this coronavirus worldwide.

“Volunteer donors are the unsung heroes for patients in need of life-saving blood transfusions. If you are healthy, feeling well and eligible to give, please schedule an appointment to give now,” added Hrouda.

Blood donation process

To donate blood, individuals need to bring a blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification that are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also must meet certain height and weight requirements.

Donors can also save up to 15 minutes at the blood drive by completing a RapidPass®. With RapidPass®, donors complete the pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of donation, from a mobile device or computer. To complete a RapidPass®, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood.org/RapidPass or use the Red Cross Blood Donor App

sugar, salt, and cream of tartar in a large heatproof bowl set over the pan of simmering water (again, do not let bowl touch the water.) Cook, whisking until the sugar dissolves and the mixture registers 130 on a candy thermometer, 3 to 5 minutes. Remove the bowl from the pan; beat with a mixer on high speed until stiff peaks form, 1 to 2 minutes.. Reduce the mixer speed to medium and beat until the bowl is no longer warm, 1 to 2 more minutes Increase the mixer speed to medium high and continue beating, adding the butter one piece at a time, until thick and combined. The mixture might separate, but

keep beating and it will smooth out. Add the melted white chocolate and vanilla and continue beating until just combined. Transfer frosting to a resealable plastic bag and snip a corner. Pipe onto the cupcakes and decorate with green sprinkles.

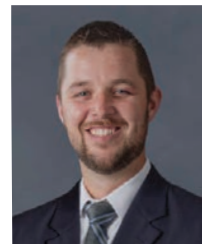
