Highland board moves forward in transition for new president

At its meeting May 7, the Highland Community College Board of Trustees voted unanimously to direct the chairman to enter into contract negotiations with Chris Kuberski, current executive vice president, for the president/ executive officer role at the institution.

Current President Tim Hood is retiring June 30. Trustees have reviewed options for determining Hood's successor at open board meetings since February. The trustees reviewed letters from faculty and staff, organizational structure, Highland's strategic plan and national search

Ultimately, the board determined to start the search process with Kuberski because she met the qualifications and has demonstrated her ability to help HCC progress toward meeting its strategic plan.

'Highland has had success with internal promotions for the last two presidents," Board of Trustees Chairman Jim Endress said in a news release. "Chris is a solid leader and continues to display Highland's mission and values. We know she can handle the challenges ahead as we move forward from the pandemic."

The Board of Trustees has used the same critical review process as with any external candidate, including an interview committee with members representing the faculty, staff, HCC Foundation, student body

'Chris is the best candidate for the job with her background in instruction and administration," Endress said. "We have seen first-hand her solid leadership with the college since she joined in 2015.'

Endress intends to complete contract negotiations for board approval at the regular board meeting on May 21, which was originally scheduled for May 26.

The Stephenson Soil and Water Conservation District established a scholarship to help outstanding students complete their education at any accredited college or university.

S.T.A.R. initiative reaches 83,000 acres

Agricultural conservation program ready for more growth in 2020 season

More and more farmers and landowners are using the free S.T.A.R. tool to improve their operations and better protect their land and our environment for the long term.

The S.T.A.R. initiative, short for Saving Tomorrow's Agriculture Resources, is an innovative conservation program in Illinois and several other states that helps farmers and landowners track how well they are caring for our soil and water while producing their crops, via the free, handy S.T.A.R. field evaluation tool.

S.T.A.R. was created by the Champaign County Soil and Water Conservation District in 2017 to meet the agricultural goals in the state's nutrient loss reduction strategy plan.

That plan, developed by the state's Department of Agriculture and Environmental Protection Agency, lays out a comprehensive suite of best management practices for reducing nutrient loads from wastewater treatment plants and urban and agricultural run-off. Similar strategies have been developed by 11 other states in the Mississippi River Basin since

- In 2019, 214 participants used S.T.A.R. on 1,175 fields for a total of 83,592 acres in Illinois.
- About 90 percent of 5-star fields were planted under no-till or strip till management and planted a winter hardy cover crop.
- · And farmers and landowners in 70 Illinois counties and four other states are now using S.T.A.R.

Eric Rademacher, who farms in Gifford, Ill., has used the S.T.A.R. tool since 2017.

"S.T.A.R.'s a way to confirm some of the practices we are implementing and see the other options out there. It's great to have a standardized ranking of where you line up," Rademacher said in a news release.

S.T.A.R. participants complete a field form that is scored by a local reviewer, usually the SWCD office, which then assigns points for everything from the cover crops used on acreage, to the kinds of fertilizer used for nutrient management at different points before and during the growing season, to various possible conservation practices used on that field to prevent run-off into nearby water sources.

S.T.A.R. uses a science committee of university researchers and other experts to ensure the field forms accurately represent nutrient loss reduction and how those affect the natural resources of the state. Fields are then ranked on the 5-star scale, and participants can receive a sign for their fields to identify their S.T.A.R. designation.

The program touts several key benefits for more participation: decreasing nutrient loss from the soil, improving water quality, helping farmers show their stewardship, increasing farm resilience and positioning farms for future market opportunities.

"Our experience with S.T.A.R. farmers is they never realized how easy it can be to prevent runoff and protect our water supplies, and how important it is to take the extra time to plan for and execute a sustainable farming strategy on their acreage," said Bruce Henrikson, S.T.A.R. program coordinator through CCSWCD.

We hope to show more farmers that conservation practices are not a luxury for farms with economic means, but a natural, necessary investment in the health of our soil, our water and our state," Henrikson said.

S.T.A.R. is encouraging interested farmers to prepare to enroll their acreage in the 2020 program as planting time arrives. Participating is free and as simple as completing a field form at www.starfreetool.com.

Paper field forms also are available for download from the site; 2020 field forms will be available starting July 1 through next February.

How will we heal agri-food system? State must find a way to overcome ingrained barriers,

self-interests to accelerate its future

In the midst of a global health crisis, the agri-food sector is pressing forward determined to do what it does best — feed the world. After all, empty grocery store shelves don't simply restock themselves.

COVID-19, however, is rapidly exposing our food system's susceptibilities and disconnects. Could this pandemic catalyze a rethinking and transformation of the current centralized model? With an outsized stake in the outcome, Illinois would be wise to consider.

Under normal circumstances, the modern-day food system operates with efficiency via a "just enough, just in time" lean inventory model supported by a global trade system. By design, it provides a diverse array of abundant, low-cost food and agriculture-derived products sourced around the world and catered to consumer demands.

Illinois plays an influential role in this globally integrated system. Our fertile farmland and geographic location have transformed the state into a critical production, logistics and transshipment point of food, feed, fuel and fiber.

We rank in the top 5 nationally in the production of soy, corn and hogs and are a leader in agricultural and processed food exports.

Chicago and its environs are home to leading businesses driving global commodity trading, food processing and manufacturing, food distribution and retail and supporting services.

Accolades aside, COVID-19 quickly has illustrated our reliance on a centralized supply chain. When one segment breaks, disastrous feedbacks occur. Illinois' top commodities are seeing a rapid tailspin in market prices. Our dairy producers are being forced to dump thousands of gallons of milk a day. For beef and pork, where meat processing is heavily consolidated, the shuttering of facilities amid

virus outbreaks present farmers throughout the state with limited options.

Meanwhile, as unemployment and hunger rise, food banks cite scarcities and inadequate capacity.

Apart from the pandemic, other systemic challenges have long infected Illinois' agri-food sector. The state imports 96 percent of its fresh fruit and vegetables. Sectorfacing businesses continually face an uphill battle in securing a robust workforce. Degraded and underinvested infrastructure is crippling capacity to store and transport products. Rural communities lack broadband in an era dependent on digital connectivity.

When COVID-19 subsides, the challenges and inequities it caused and revealed will not simply

The pressure to return to business as usual must be abandoned in pursuit of a different kind of approach that emphasizes resilience, sustainability and equitability across the value chain.

In the era of COVID-19, Illinois must avoid "business as usual," form unconventional partnerships and accelerate efforts to develop a more resilient, sustainable and equitable food system.

The world is quickly evolving to a new norm, and the complexity of problems it faces will continue to emerge with ever-increasing intensity. Sustaining the future of Illinois' vibrant agri-food economy is contingent upon adapting our food system to meet modern needs.

To achieve this, transformative collaboration will be required. Individuals and businesses will need to form unconventional partnerships to iteratively generate new ideas, innovations and processes that address the most pressing challenges of our time.


We already have seen some notable examples. The Chicago Park District teamed up with the Illinois Soybean Association and Indigenous Energy to produce

hand sanitizer. The Integrated Bioprocessing Research Laboratory at the University of Illinois is doing the same for Chicago-area hospitals. Illinois Farm Bureau and its county affiliates are securing donations to support food pantries across the state. A coalition of Chicagobased corporations supported by The Chicago Community Trust is working to identify food distribution challenges and meet them with local solutions. Regional food system champions, including the Chicago Food Policy Action Council, Fresh Taste and the Illinois Stewardship Alliance, are working together to mitigate local market disruptions.

These types of novel collaborations need to be sustained and enhanced going forward. In the near-term, efforts must continue to concentrate on ensuring health safety, food supply and continuity across the supply chain. In the long-term, we need cross-sector engagement to re-imagine our food system with focus on reducing supply chain complexities, inefficiencies and inequalities inherent in its current design.

No one individual or entity is equipped with the resources to navigate these turbulent times. Given the scale of its agri-food sector, Illinois must find the fortitude to overcome ingrained barriers and self-interests to accelerate its future. Healing the fissures COVID-19 is amplifying will require radical collaboration. Only in a meaningful partnership will Illinois foster the capacity to create the resilient food system needed in today's disruptive landscape.

Illinois tops single-day COVID-19 test record

Illinois continues to increase its COVID-19 testing capacity, setting a one-day record on Friday with more than 20,000 tests completed in the state during the previous 24 hours.

The Illinois Department of Public Health reported on Friday that 20,671 tests for COVID-19 were completed the previous day, bringing the state's total to 399,741, which is about 3 percent of Illinois' population.

"Illinois has made important and measurable progress in growing our daily test numbers, today for the first time exceeding 20,000 tests," Gov. JB Pritzker said at his daily COVID-19 briefing in Chicago.

The governor said Illinois had 244 public testing sites, up from 177 just a week earlier. Those sites include seven state-run, drive-thru sites, "which are now collectively taking over 3,000 specimens per day." He said three new drive-thru sites would be set up this week.

Pritzker also said as of May 6 that Illinois ranked second among the 10 most populous states in tests completed per capita in the past week, and it ranked fifth out of all 50 states in total tests completed since COVID-19 came to America.

"Even if we're one of the best states in the nation on testing, we know it's not enough to be where we need to be on a longer time frame," the governor said.

Pritzker said the state is expecting a shipment of 620,000 testing swabs and 465,000 vials of viral transport medium, or VTM, to arrive from the federal government by the end of May.

He said the first shipment was initially due the first week of May but was expected on Sunday. Pritzker, often a critic of the federal response, said the materials are "an important part of our further testing growth."

"Testing is fundamental to our ability to reopen the economy while controlling the spread of the virus," he said. "That's what it takes to keep the public safe."

Accompanying Pritzker at Friday's briefing was Dr. Aaron Rossi, CEO

of Reditus Laboratories in Pekin, which has been heavily involved in the ramping up of COVID-19 testing in Illinois.

Reditus operates a 24/7 private lab processing up to 4,000 coronavirus tests from drive-thru locations as well as Heartland Health in Peoria. Rossi said the company has hired 75 employees in the last few weeks to help with testing.

"Our goal is to continue to support the governor to reopen the state by providing access to testing to the best of our efforts, and to get life back to what we remembered before and trying to open the state up as quickly as possible," Rossi said.

IDPH on Friday also reported 2,887 new cases of COVID-19, making for a 14-percent positivity rate for the tests completed in the previous 24 hours, the lowest recorded since March.

One of the contingencies for a region to move to the next phase of the state's reopening plan is for it to have a positivity rate below 20 percent for 14 straight days.

The state also announced 130 more COVID-19-related deaths.

While Friday was the first time that four consecutive days had seen more than 100 deaths, IDPH Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike said that does not necessarily indicate a trend.

"If you look at our averages per week, we definitely have hit a peak of deaths, maybe two weeks, maybe a week ago," she said at the briefing. "So I don't think overall this is one of our heaviest weeks, even though there may have been a cluster of deaths that were reported that seem high four days in a row."

At that point there had been 73,760 total COVID-19 cases in the state that resulted in 3,241 deaths.

Pope County, in far southern Illinois, reported its first case of the disease on Friday. Only four of Illinois' 102 counties had yet to report a case.

As of midnight, 4,750 people in Illinois were hospitalized with COVID-19, while 1,222 (about 25 percent) of them were in an intensive care unit. Of those, 727 were on ventilators.

Text line providing support during COVID-19 pandemic

The Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) is reminding state residents about the Illinois Helpline, a resource for residents who need emotional support or quick answers to questions during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Illinoisans can text "talk" to 55-2020 (or "hablar" for Spanish) for the Call4Calm service, or text their questions about services provided by IDHS in communities across the state.

The text line is free of charge and designed to support residents who have questions about services or who are experiencing stress.

In addition to the Call4Calm service, the text number can help Illinoisans find help and guidance on other critical issues during the pandemic. Residents can text keywords such as unemployment," "food" or "shelter" to 55-2020 to receive additional information in response.

"We wanted to remind Illinoisans they can text 55-2020 for a listening ear and support for hardships they may currently be experiencing," said Grace Hou, Secretary of IDHS. "People who need help are not alone during this unprecedented challenge. We are here for you and can answer many questions you may have about available services."

Once a resident texts "talk" to the helpline, within 24 hours they will receive a call from a counselor

employed by a local community mental health center to provide support. Calls are anonymous.

Since Gov. Pritzker announced Call4Calm on April 11, nearly 2,000 individuals have texted the helpline. There are 62 community mental health centers supporting the Call4Calm service.

In addition to their training as mental health professionals, every counselor has received additional resources, including tips for parenting during the Stayat-Home order, materials for individuals experiencing or at risk of violence at home, and other suggestions for reducing stress and coping with social isolation, loneliness, fear, and other emotions related to the current situation.

The Division of Mental Health at IDHS continues to monitor potential sources of information and further training for counselors and will share updated resources and guidance for everyone who provides emotional support calls in order to offer the best service possible.

The Illinois Helpline also includes direct links to suicide prevention phone and text lines, as well as domestic violence phone and text lines. The Illinois Helpline is not a crisis line. If you or someone else needs immediate assistance, call 9-1-1.

The not so skinny cook

I guess we are in Week 7 if you started with the first week in April. Mother's Day has come and gone, and we are racing toward the middle of the month. This week's recipes are again a medley of things for spring cooking. If you are looking for some unique rhubarb dishes, I have some

The first recipe in this salute to spring is a pasta salad made with peas. You can substitute small shells for the macaroni if you want a different pasta shape. Enjoy this pasta and

Spring Pea Pasta

2 T. olive oil

4 cloves, garlic minced

1/4 t. crushed red pepper

11/2 C. fresh or thawed frozen peas

1 C. whipping cream

1 C. shredded Parmesan cheese, olus more for garnish

2 T. unsalted butter

½ lb. elbow macaroni, cooked ac-

cording to package directions

1 lemon, zested and juiced

¼ t. salt

In a large skillet, heat oil, garlic and red pepper over medium heal; cook until fragrant, 2 to 3 minutes. Stir in peas, cream cheese and butter and bring to a low boil. Cook until peas are tender and sauce is slightly thickened, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in pasta, lemon zest and juice and salt. Garnish with

Rhubarb Chutney

Chutney is used mostly as a condiment to pork, chicken or turkey. It is also a good side. If you are using frozen rhubarb, measure the amount you need and then let it thaw in a colander to get rid of excess moisture. If you have never had chutney, you might want to give it a try.

¹/₄ C. sugar 1/3 C. cider vinegar

1 T. minced garlic 3/4 t. ground ginger

½ t. ground cumin

½ t. cinnamon

1/4 t. red pepper flakes

1/8 t. cloves

4 C. coarsely chopped fresh or frozen rhubarb, thawed

½ C. chopped red onion

½ C. golden raisins

1 t. red food coloring (optional) In a large saucepan, combine the sugar, vinegar, garlic, ginger, cumin, cinnamon, red pepper flakes and cloves. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat, simmer, uncovered until sugar is dissolved, about 2 minutes.

Add the rhubarb, onion and raisins. Cook and stir over medium heat until the rhubarb is tender and mixture is slightly thickened, 5 to 10 minutes. Stir in red food coloring if desired. Cool completely. Store in the refrigerator.

Chunky Rhubarb Applesauce

Adding rhubarb to applesauce is good way to make rhubarb into something other than a sweet/tart dessert. You can keep it in the refrigerator for a couple of weeks.

1 lb. rhubarb, trimmed and cut into ½ inch chunks

2 lbs. tart apples, peeled and cut into 1/2 inch chunks

½ to 1 C. sugar

1/4 t. cinnamon

1/8 t. nutmeg

Place rhubarb, apples and sugar to taste in a large saucepan. Cover and simmer until fruit is tender, about 40 minutes. Stir in cinnamon and nutmeg. Serve warm or cold.

Zesty Beef Fajitas

These fajitas are a great weeknight dinner. They do require a little planning ahead because of marinating the steak. You can make the marinated steak the night before, refrigerate and then put everything together pretty quickly.

½ t. lime zest

1/3 C. fresh limejuice

¹/₄ C. pineapple juice 4 T. olive oil, divided

2 T. Worcestershire sauce

1 T. minced garlic

3 t. salt, divided

2 t. ground cumin

2 t. paprika

1/4 t. crushed red pepper

1 flank steak (2 to 3 lb.) 1 pkg. small fajita flour tortillas

1 medium white onion, sliced

1 medium red onion, sliced

1 large green pepper, sliced

1 large red pepper sliced

3 limes, halves

In a large, shallow dish, whisk together lime zest and juice, pineapple uice, 3 T. oil, Worcestershire, garlic, 2 t. salt, cumin, paprika and crushed red pepper. Add the steak, turning to coat. Cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours or overnight.

Remove steak from dish, discarding marinade. Pat the steak dry. Refrigerate for 30 minutes. Heat a 10inch cast iron skillet over high heat. Add tortillas to skillet one at a time and cook, turning occasionally, until lightly browned.

Wrap tortillas in foil to keep warm. Add steak to skillet; cook for 3 minutes per side for medium-rare or until your degree of doneness. Remove from heat. Cover with foil and let stand for 5 minutes. Thinly slice steak against the grain.

In a large bowl, toss together onions, bell peppers, remaining tablespoon of oil and remaining teaspoon of salt. Cook in the same skillet over medium heat until caramelized, 2 to 3 minutes. Place lime halves, cut side down in skillet; cook until browned, 1 to 2 minutes.

Serve steak and vegetables with warm tortillas and charred limes. Top with your choice of any of these: guacamole, sour cream, salsa, fresh cilantro leaves and shredded Cheddar cheese.

Cheesy Chicken and Rice Casserole

Preheat oven to 350. Microwave

House Republicans slam Pritzker's reopening plan

Minority leader wants Legislature to return to resolve issues

By Ben Orner CAPITOL NEWS ILLINOIS

Republican members of the Illinois House of Representatives on May 6 criticized Gov. JB Pritzker's multi-phase plan to reopen Illinois by region, saying it does not act quickly enough to respond to the economic hardship caused by his stay-at-home

order.
"We all know that the stay-athome order was the right thing to do to stop the spread of the virus and protect our health care," said Deputy House Minority Leader Rep. Dan Brady, of Bloomington.

"Unfortunately, the governor's plan fails to recognize that local officials throughout the state want the same thing he does: a safe return from the pandemic," Brady said. "Instead of offering any semblance of local authority to the people who are on the ground in the community, it continues to be a decree by one person.'

In the "Restore Illinois" plan that Pritzker unveiled May 5, state health officials will look at certain data metrics including hospital capacity and testing availability in four regions of the state in order to move each respective region through phases of

The regions are based on group-

ings of the state's 11 medical dis- Phase 5, the final stage, is a full retricts: northeast, north central, central and southern. The entire state is in Phase 2, which includes mandatory face coverings and allows non-essential stores open to just delivery and curbside pickup.

Phase 3 includes reopening non-essential stores, barbershops, offices and more with capacity limits. Pritzker said Tuesday the earliest a region will be allowed to advance to Phase 3 would be May 29.

"The science can't precisely tell us which region should be grouped with another region or how small or how large those regions should be,' argued Deputy Minority Leader Rep. Tom Demmer, of Dixon. "The science can't definitively tell us when it's safe to move from one step to

"And when we have that level of complexity, we need to have input from a wide variety of stakeholders to try to make the best decisions possible," Demmer added. "We also have to consider the very real impact this is having on economies, on livelihoods and on people's lives all across the state of Illinois.

Phase 4 includes allowing up to 50 people in stores and restaurants, but Pritzker said May 5 the earliest that could happen is the end of June.

opening of the state, but it relies on a widely available treatment or a vaccine, which are likely monthsor even a year—away. Republicans argue that closed businesses cannot wait that long.

"Quite frankly this will force bankruptcy and the permanent closure of large and small restaurants throughout the state of Illinois," said House Minority Leader Jim Durkin, of Western Springs. "This plan does not work.'

Durkin said business owners have been contacting him at a "rapid pace" since the reopening announcement, "all with the same feeling of despair and devastation.'

'Our state cannot survive this way. Businesses, the employers, cannot survive this," he said.

During his daily COVID-19 briefing May 6 in Chicago, Pritzker said he considers the opinions of Republican legislators in his decision-mak-

"I have talked to the leaders on the Republican side, many Republican legislators. I'm frequently reaching out, listening to them. I take a lot of notes, and I've done a lot of the things that they've asked along the way," he said.

Republicans acknowledged that Pritzker's latest extension of the stay-at-home order included multiple revisions that Republicans had suggested, including opening state parks and garden centers and allowing elective surgeries to resume.

Employment insecurity

Small business owners and employees face an uncertain near future, Republicans said, especially as many are still not able to access unemployment benefits through the Illinois Department of Employment

"These people are facing a tremendous stress and (are) really un-

sure about how they're going to make necessary payments for their rent, their food, their mortgage, their medicine," said Rep. Ryan Spain, R-Peoria.

Rep. Avery Bourne, R-Morrisonville, said one constituent told her she called IDES 157 times before finally getting through.

"This is really a broken, broken system," Bourne said.

Despite frustrations, Durkin stressed that "The executive order right now is the law of Illinois. And I would not encourage anybody to break the law" by reopening their business Spain added, however, "If we're waiting to open some things until the end of June or the end of July, I think it will continue to be difficult to ask all of our constituents and local communities to continue to comply."

Lena church appeals ruling upholding state's stay-at-home order

By Peter Hancock CAPITOL NEWS ILLINOIS

Attorneys for a northwest Illinois church said May 4 that they have appealed a federal judge's ruling that upheld Gov. JB Pritzker's stay-athome order as it applies to worship services.

The announcement came one day after U.S. District Judge John Z. Lee ruled against a petition by Beloved Church in Lena and its pastor, Stephen Cassell, to block the order, saying the public interest in preventing the spread of COVID-19 outweighed their First Amendment right to hold a public service with large numbers of people.

"Gov. Pritzker's arbitrary 10-person limit applies only to churches but not to the many other businesses open in Illinois today, from liquor stores to lawyers to pet groomers," Peter Breen, vice president and senior counsel for the Thomas More Society, which represents the church, said in a statement late on May 4.

"Our Constitution requires that churches receive at least equal treatment as any secular enterprise,' Breen added. "Pritzker's latest threat of jail for people of faith is outrageous, and we will seek immediate relief from the court of appeals to defend our clients."

In his ruling May 3, Lee acknowledged that freedom of religion is a fundamental right, "(b)ut even the foundational rights secured by the First Amendment are not without limits; they are subject to restriction if necessary to further compelling government interests and, certainly, the prevention of mass infections and deaths qualifies," Lee wrote. "After all, without life, there can be no liberty or pursuit of happiness.

The judge noted that more than 60,000 Americans had died from COVID-19, "more than the number of people who perished during the 9/11 terrorist attacks, Pearl Harbor and the Battle of Gettysburg combined."

The suit was filed on April 30 against Pritzker, Stephenson County Sheriff David Snyders, Lena Police Chief Steve Schaible and Craig Beintema, administrator of the Stephenson County Department of Public Health.

It sought to permanently block enforcement of Pritzker's latest, revised stay-at-home order, which went into effect May 1 and extends through May 30.

Under that revised order, churches may hold public services in groups of 10 or fewer as long as they follow social distancing requirements. Despite that, the church reportedly held its regular service on May 3.

WREX-TV reported that a public relations firm representing the church said churchgoers were provided hand sanitizer and family units were spaced 6 feet apart.

As of May 4, according to the state's COVID-19 website, there had been 63 cases of the disease in Stephenson County — it was up to 84 by May 8, but still no reported

The Beloved Church case was just one legal challenge seeking to overturn the stay-at-home order. Republican Reps. Darren Bailey, of Xenia, and John Cabello, Machesney Park, are both challenging the order in state courts.

A circuit court judge in Clay County recently ruled in favor of Bailey's complaint that the order violated his civil rights. But while that case was being appealed, Bailey asked that the order be vacated and the case returned to circuit court, where he planned to file an amended complaint.

Cabello's suit challenges the legality of the order as a whole and is seeking to have it overturned statewide. A hearing in that case was scheduled for May 14 in Winnebago

Meetings postponed
