Annual count yields 42 species of birds

sponsored a Big Bird Day at Apple Creek Arboretum, Prairie and Woods near Apple River on May 9.

Master birder Terrence Ingram documented 42 different species of birds from dawn to dusk. Only a single bird of many species was seen or heard, including a redtailed hawk, barred owl, greathomed owl, common flicker, whitebreasted nuthatch, orchard oriole, indigo bunting and vesper and field sparrows.

He was not able to document some common birds, such as turkey, pheasant, wood duck, bluebird, kingbird, hairy and pileated woodpeckers, tufted titmouse, white-throated and swamp sparrows flycatchers, vireos

Some of these were seen the day before or day after Big Bird Day.

Ingram started this event several

The Eagle Nature Foundation years ago to document the loss of birds due to agricultural spraying in the area.

> "Our modem agricultural practices of clearing the landscape and constantly spraying the poisons has got to stop if we are to have any bird life survive," Ingram said in a news release. "Without the birds, we are going to be facing problems with all of the insects that can adapt to these farm practices."

Republicans push for revisions to Restore Illinois plan

But governor says he's unlikely to make changes

Republicans in the Illinois General Assembly said May 14 that when lawmakers return to the Capitol this week that they intend to push for changes to Gov. JB Pritzker's plan for reopening the economy, a plan he dubbed Restore

"I have heard members from both caucuses suggest this plan should be vetted and revised,' Senate Minority Leader Bill Brady, of Bloomington, said in a letter to Senate President Don Harmon, D-Oak Park, he released to the

"I also believe this should be done in a public setting, which can be undertaken using available technology and social-distancing protocols when we convene in Springfield," Brady added.

State Se. Brian Stewart, R-Freeport, said legislative leaders

must schedule a public hearing on certain benchmarks for infection able to reopen to the public, with the plan.

"We have a number of issues that need action by lawmakers like a state budget for the upcoming fiscal year - that should have been allowed several weeks of study with input from all lawmakers and Illinois residents," Stewart said in a news release. "We now are being told that we have to make these decisions in three days with information that is being controlled by a governor and legislative leaders from Chicago.

"We can hope for the best, but we must have sufficient time to study the plans, and all lawmakers must be allowed some say in the drafting of these plans," Stewart added.

Pritzker's plan divides the state into four broad regions and allows for the gradual reopening of businesses and public activities in offices, retail establishments,

rates and hospital capacity over a 28-day period.

The final, full reopening phase would occur only after a COVID-19 vaccine or treatment is widely available, something that could take one year or more.

As of May 1, all of Illinois was in the second phase of that plan, which allows nonessential retail stores to accept online and telephone orders for pick-up or delivery. It also allows hospitals to resume performing elective surgeries and procedures.

According to the Illinois Department of Public Health, as of May 14, all four regions of the state were on course to move into Phase 3 of the plan by May 29, the earliest date any region could enter the next

In that phase, manufacturing, five phases if they meet and sustain barbershops and salons would be

mandatory capacity limits and other safety precautions. Gatherings of 10 or fewer people will be allowed, although face coverings and socialdistancing requirements remain in place.

Only in Phase 4 would restaurants and bars be allowed to reopen with capacity limits. Child care and schools could resume operations under IDPH guidelines, nonessential travel would be allowed and public gatherings of up to 50 people would be permitted.

But during a video news conference on May 14, a group of House Republicans argued that Pritzker's plan is still too restrictive and that progress toward a full reopening is too slow.

"One of the problems I have going from 3 to 4 is, when you open up the businesses in 3, you have no child care for them," said Rep. Mike Murphy, a Springfield Republican. "I think this whole plan needs to be re-evaluated. I don't see how these businesses can open up in Phase 3 without viable child care. I also question why restaurants, once again, are part of Phase 4 where in many other states, they're already opening. We have over 30 counties that border states with restaurants open right now."

Avery Bourne, R-Morrisonville, said she thinks the arrangements of the four regions is "arbitrary" and that three of the four regions – all except the northeast region, including Chicago, should already be in Phase 3.

"We're asking for this to be more targeted, certainly following guidelines to make sure people are safe," she said. "And we're leaving out of this conversation the folks who are lumped in with that northeastern group, that they are well under the numbers that they would have to be to move forward into phase three, but because they're lumped in with Cook County, they are being artificially held back when that's not necessary.'

When Pritzker announced the Restore Illinois plan on May 5, he said the four regions were drawn around the state's 11 emergency medical service regions. He said the groupings were based on each

region's hospital capacity and ability to coordinate emergency

Asked again about the design of the four regions, Pritzker said during his daily briefing in Chicago on May 14 that a more narrowly tailored regional system would not

"Let me start with the fact that people who live in one area don't necessarily stay in that one area the entire time," he said. "They travel outside of the county that they're in or the city that they're in, an immediate area, and they do that frequently. And so we had to account for that.'

Meanwhile, county sheriffs and other local officials in parts of the state have begun saying they will no longer enforce Pritzker's orders.


Pritzker so far has ruled out the possibility of using the Illinois State Police or other law enforcement agencies to enforce his orders, but he has suggested that local governments that refuse to enforce the orders risk losing state and federal funding in the future and that bars, restaurants and other businesses that defy the order could have their licenses revoked.

He also had strong words for the county sheriffs and other local officials who have said they will not enforce the orders.

"I would suggest that towns and leaders, elected leaders, do your job. Lead," he said. "Be the person that they elected, who is supposed to be protecting your community. Don't fall prey to the rhetoric that's out there that says, 'Oh, let's just open up. This virus doesn't affect anybody like me.' You're wrong.'

That prompted a sharp reply from the Illinois Sheriffs Association, which issued a statement May 14 blasting Pritzker's remarks. "Illinois sheriffs have been

elected by their local citizens to keep their communities safe, a trust that every sheriff and sworn law enforcement officer holds dear," the statement read. "It is outrageous that the governor is threatening retaliation against these leaders and the men and women of their offices. He is insulting heroic police officers, corrections officers and local voters.

Lawmakers to return to Springfield on May 20-22

State budget among top items to be considered

Illinois lawmakers will return to Springfield from today through Friday — the first time in more than two months — to take up a state budget and other critical matters while following strict social distancing and public safety guidelines during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Before returning to the capital, lawmakers are being asked to sign a pledge stipulating they will be tested for COVID-19, regardless of whether they have symptoms or have been previously infected. They also will be required to wear face coverings, undergo temperature checks on session days, travel alone and stay in separate hotel rooms, follow social distancing guidelines and avoid extracurricular

The House will meet in the Bank of Springfield Center, a convention center a few blocks from the Statehouse. The Senate plans to meet in the Senate chamber of the Capitol.

The Illinois State Police will provide security at the BoS Center, and all people entering the building will be required to pass through a metal detector to prevent weapons from being carried into the facility.

All people also will be required to wear face coverings and submit to a touchless temperature check. Anyone with a temperature of more than 100 degrees will be required to leave.

The House also recommended lawmakers and staff who are at risk of serious illness from COVID-19 people over age 65 or with pre-existing conditions – consider not traveling to Springfield for the special session.

Senate President Don Harmon, D-Oak Park, said in a statement that the upper chamber was working on the logistics of how it will meet, but he said senators are ready to get to work.

"Time and again the Illinois Senate has shown its members can work together to solve problems and produce results for the people of this great state," Harmon said. "That cooperative spirit of bipartisan achievement is needed now more than ever. This global pandemic has decimated our state and local economies regardless of political affiliation. From far- flung living rooms, kitchen tables and home offices, senators have been working together while apart to figure out what we can and need to do now.

Lawmakers have not met since March 5. They were scheduled to

be off the week of March 9-13 to campaign in advance of the March 17 primary. They also were scheduled to take a two-week spring break April 6-17. All other session days since then were canceled due to the COVID-19

Lawmakers have been meeting remotely in informal working groups during the shutdown, mainly to gather information they will need when they return to session, but those working groups were not authorized to draft legislation or hear testimony on bills.

expected to focus on passing a state budget in light of a severe drop in revenues that has resulted from the closure of nonessential businesses, a statewide stay-at-home order and the delay in the state's tax filing deadline.

Newly revised estimates from the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability, or CoGFA, project that total revenues for the current fiscal year, which ends June 30, will be about \$2.2 billion lower than the previous estimate released in March. Net income taxes are expected to be \$1.7 billion lower than the March estimate.

Revenues for the upcoming fiscal year, which begins July 1, are expected to be \$4.7 billion lower than previously estimated.

The state has the ability to borrow money from other funds to shore up the general revenue fund. Officials also will be watching closely to see if the U.S. Congress approves any federal aid for states.

Despite the falloff in revenue, Gov. JB Pritzker has said he wants lawmakers to pass a COVID-19 financial relief bill that will specifically

target small businesses that have been unable to access federal relief funds.

"Obviously, as I've said for some time now, we have real challenges with the loss of revenue because of COVID-19," Pritzker said during his daily briefing March 13 in Chicago, "so we need to rely upon the federal government and its support for all the states in order for us to provide the services that people need, in order to pay for the education that our kids need and for us to support our businesses and our families in the wake of this curve as we're dealing with this COVID-19 crisis.'

Meanwhile, many legislative Republicans have been calling for weeks to reconvene the session, arguing the governor has no legal authority to extend the disaster declaration beyond the original 30day time frame, and they hope to put the governor's authority up for a vote.

"I am pleased the governor and Democratic leaders have heeded our calls to return to the people's Capitol to address the critical issues facing our state during these unprecedented times," Senate Minority Leader Bill Brady, of Bloomington, said in a statement. "It is vital the Legislature be a part of the decision-making process when it comes to maintaining the public's health, reopening our state, moving our economy forward and overcoming a graduated income tax that would negatively impact Illinois families.'

House Minority Leader Jim Durkin, of Western Springs, also issued a statement welcoming a special session.

"After two months of inaction, it is about time we get back to the job we were elected to do," he said.

The not so skinny cook

I guess we are in Week 8 if you started with the first week in April.

The first recipe in last week's column was a pasta salad made with peas. One of my friends pointed out that something didn't make sense. Have you ever forgotten a comma? That is what I did. I know that the whipping cream sort of threw people off, but the recipe does use whipping cream and Parmesan cheese. These two will thicken a bit after bringing to a boil.

Sorry I forgot to put the comma between cream (for whipping cream) and cheese (for Parmesan).

I am repeating the recipe so you have the right directions to a spring

Spring Pea Pasta

2 T. olive oil

4 cloves, garlic minced

½ t. crushed red pepper

1½ C. fresh or thawed frozen peas

1 C. whipping cream

1 C. shredded Parmesan cheese, olus more for garnish

2 T. unsalted butter 1/2 lb. elbow macaroni, cooked according to package directions

1 lemon, zested and juiced

¼ t. salt

In a large skillet, heat oil, garlic and red pepper over medium heal; cook until fragrant, 2 to 3 minutes. Stir in peas, cream, cheese and butter and bring to a low boil. Cook until peas are tender and sauce is slightly

thickened, about 5 minutes. Remove You can freeze the one you aren't Add pork chops and cook until a from heat and stir in pasta, lemon zest and juice and salt. Garnish with the Parmesan.

Green Salad

This green salad can be made with several kinds of greens. You can substitute Napa cabbage for the spinach or bok choy also. If you have pine nuts, you can use them for the sunflower seeds. I would stick with the sunflower kernels because pine nuts are really expensive; you also need to keep pine nuts in the freezer because they go bad really fast.

1 bag baby spinach or 1 head bok choy, finely chopped

2 bunches green onions, thinly sliced

2 pkg. (3 oz. each) ramen noodles, broken

¹/₄ C. slivered almonds

1 T. sunflower kernels

¹/₄ C. butter

Dressing

1/3 C. to ½ C. sugar (use your discretion on how sweet you want the sweet and sour dressing)

½ C. canola oil

2 T. cider vinegar

1 T. soy sauce

In a large bowl, combine greens and green onions; set aside. Save the seasoning packet from ramen noodles for another use. In a large skillet, sauté the noodles, almonds and sunflower kernels in the butter until browned, about 7 minutes. Remove from the heat; cool mixture to room temperature. Add to greens and onion mixture.

In a jar with a tight-fitting lid, combine the dressing ingredients and shake well. Just before serving, drizzle over salad and toss to coat.

in the next few weeks. If you don't want any spice, you can leave the jalapeno peppers off the top.

2 C. uncooked elbow macaroni

2 lbs. ground beef

1 large onion, chopped

2 garlic cloves, minced 2 cans (14½ oz. each) diced

tomatoes, undrained

1 can (16 oz.) kidney beans, rinsed and drained

1 can (4 oz.) tomato paste

1 can (4 oz.) green chilies, drained

1½ t. salt

1 t. chili powder

½ t. ground cumin

½ t. pepper

2 C. Monterey Jack cheese

2 jalapeno peppers, seeded and chopped

Cook macaroni according to package directions. In a large saucepan, cook beef and onion over medium heat, crumbling beef, until meat is no longer pink. Add garlic; cook 1 minute longer. Drain. Stir in tomatoes, kidney beans, tomato paste, chilies, salt, chili powder, cumin and pepper. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer uncovered for 10 minutes.

Drain macaroni and stir into beef mixture. Preheat the oven to 375. Transfer macaroni mixture into 2 greased 2-quart baking dishes. Top with cheese and jalapeños. Cover and bake at 375 for 30 minutes. Uncover and bake until bubbly and heated through, about 10 minutes longer. Serve one casserole. Cool the second casserole and cover it and freeze up to three months.

Pork Chops with Rhubarb

I have a lot of rhubarb recipes this season; some of them are more traditional than others. Paring the rhubarb with the pork is a unique flavor. The sauce is very much like the chutney from last week.

1 T. flour

Salt and pepper to taste

2 bone-in pork loin chops (1/2 to 3/4 inches thick)

2 T. butter

½ lb. fresh or frozen rhubarb, chopped

1 T. honey

1/8 t. cinnamon

11/2 t. minced fresh parsley

In a shallow dish, combine the flour, salt and pepper; add pork chops and turn to coat. In a skillet, melt butter over medium heat.

going to eat for a meal sometime thermometer reads 145, about 4 to 5 minutes on each side. Remove and keep warm. Add the rhubarb, honey and cinnamon to the skillet; cook until rhubarb is tender, about 5 minutes. Serve sauce over pork chops. Sprinkle with parsley.

Rhubarb Crumble

Going along with our spring rhubarb theme, this desert will tickle your fruit taste buds. It has apples, strawberries and rhubarb in it. Enjoy this nice dessert that is made in a small pan. You won't have to eat it forever.

3 C. fresh or frozen rhubarb, cut into ½- inch pieces

1 C. diced, peeled apples

½ to 1 C. strawberries 1/3 C. sugar

½ t. cinnamon

½ C. flour

1 t. baking powder ½ t. salt

4 T. cold butter

2/3 C. packed brown sugar

2/3 C. quick cooking oats

Combine the rhubarb, apples and

strawberries; spoon into a greased 8-inch square baking dish. Combine sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle over rhubarb mixture. Set aside. In a bowl, combine flour, baking

powder and salt. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in brown sugar and oats. Sprinkle over rhubarb mixture. Bake at 350 until lightly browned, about 40 to 50 minutes. Serve warm or cold with a scoop of ice cream.

Pistachio Torte

Someone sent me this oldfashioned recipe; actually I think it was from the 1970s, and I don't think of that as old! It is a layer dessert so you have to plan ahead. It also uses pistachio pudding, which may be hard to find. I know I have seen it at Cub Foods and at Sullivan's.

Base:

2 C. flour

2 sticks cubed, cold butter

½ C. chopped pecans

Topping:

1 pkg. 8 oz. cream cheese 1½ C. powdered sugar

1 carton (8 oz.) frozen whipped, topping, thawed and divided

2 (3.3 oz. each) boxes pistachio pudding

2 C. milk

Preheat oven to 350. In a medium bowl, use two forks to combine flour and butter until dough resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in pecans. Pour into a 9-by-13-inch baking dish, and use your hands or the bottom of a drinking glass to press crumbs into a smooth crust along the bottom. Bake 18 to 20 minutes or until lightly toasted. Remove from oven and let cool to room temperature.

In a medium bowl, beat cream cheese on medium speed until smooth. Scrape the bowl and add powdered sugar and beat until combined. Fold in 1 cup of whipped topping. Carefully spread cream cheese mixture over prepared crust and smooth with a spatula.

In a medium bowl, beat together pistachio pudding and milk for 2 minutes on high speed. Spread pudding mixture evenly over cream cheese layer. Spread remaining whipped topping mixture over pudding. Chill in the fridge 1 hour before serving.

Unemployment numbers continue to climb

The U.S. saw nearly 3 million more unemployment claims the week ending May 9, including another 72,993 in Illinois, according to the U.S. Department of Labor.

The 2.98 million nationwide in the week pushed the jobless claims in the first two months of the novel coronavirus pandemic to more than 36 million. The unprecedented number of claims made for a national unemployment rate of 15.7 percent the week ending

In Illinois, the number of new claims on the week was 1,483 less than the week prior. The number of new claims each week has gone down since a peak of 201,041 during the week of April 4.

The Illinois Department of Employment Security said in a news release it has now processed 1,076,461 claims for regular unemployment benefits from March

Continued claims reached 756,441 in the state last week, which was the final period before contractors and self-employed persons were able to file for special federal pandemic unemployment assistance in Illinois.

"While the number of initial claims for regular benefits has plateaued in the last two weeks, IDES will experience an increase in overall claims processed when the federal pandemic unemployment assistance claims data becomes available Thursday, May 21," according to the department's news release.

Gov. JB Pritzker said last week more than 50,000 applications had been filed through the state's new pandemic unemployment assistance system.

"It is working reasonably well," he said of the new portal in his Tuesday daily briefing, calling the new system "a more robust system than the existing one for regular unemployment."

Pritzker said the existing system was "built on a 10-year-old platform not expecting to take the kind of size of applications that have come in for regular unemployment.'

Reports of long wait times and an inability to reach employment offices over the phone persist amid the unprecedented inflow of new claims.

We have many thousands of calls that come in each day, thousands get answered and responded to. And people get processed over the phone as well," Pritzker said in his May 13

The state has expanded call center capacity and Pritzker said online applications are the best way to get an application through the system.

"I realize that it is difficult when you can't file, if there's some problem with your filing online, and it requires perhaps an arbitration or some other intervention that it does have a personal discussion with somebody," Pritzker said May 13. 'We're working very hard; we've just spun up this outside call center to add on top of the internal IDES capability. And we're getting to them as fast as possible again with an unprecedented number of filings, it is difficult."

IDES said in the news release it has processed 33,729 Pandemic



"Our system is so efficient and streamlined that everything moves at the same flow," says Travis Meteer, a University of Illinois- Extension commercial agriculture educator. "But when you have a kink, all of a sudden, that flow stops."

Processing

Meat processing plants are considered critical infrastructure plants are and have remained open. But with several commercial packing plants in Illinois closed or working at a reduced capacity, thousands of cattle and pigs are waiting to be processed.

Small-scale regional processors are still operating, but most are booked

Cases of COVID-19 in the workforce have forced plants to close to follow CDC recommendations for cleaning and inspections, and some staff are simply not reporting for shifts out of fear of getting sick

"The price of meat is going up, but the price (farmers) are receiving is going down," Meteer said.

to COVID-19. Those who can find a buyer are taking losses of \$216 to \$146 per animal.

Illinois-Extension commercial agriculture educator Teresa Steckler has heard as high as \$700.

Production

Livestock managers can use different feeding strategies to hold animals at a certain weight or slow gains until processing plants are

"With packing plants closed, fat steers are sitting in the feedlot with nowhere to go," Steckler said. "So, you have to keep feeding them."

Holding and feeding market-ready animals incurs extra costs producers may not be prepared for.

At Southern Illinois' Dixon Springs Agricultural Center, where Steckler works, recent dry falls and cool, wet springs have reduced the quality of the local hay supply.

"Some of these guys are finding that their supply of feedstuff is

And as shoppers' food budgets shrink, they are buying less expensive cuts, such as hamburger over prime cuts, resulting in less profit for

Dale Hadden runs a grain and cattle farm with his family in Jacksonville and serves on the Cass-Morgan County Farm Bureau board.

"There's not a place to market our

calves, so we continue to hold them with grass and hay and get them to weights a little heavier than usual," Hadden said. He's also looking ahead to

September when he'll be selling most of his 280-head herd.

"If this doesn't turn around, that's going to have a huge impact on how I generate any income.'

Consumption

Dairy: In the U.S., 60 percent of butter goes to restaurants. When schools and restaurants closed to slow the spread of the virus, the sales of food-service dairy products plummeted and there were suddenly too many cows producing too much

Hadden said dairy manufacturing facilities are set up with lines to package milk into jugs for grocery stores, cartons for schools or bags for food service. Dairy has a short window for processing and there are only so many gallons that can be held.

'They're dumping it because the processors don't have demand for those products," Hadden said.

Pork: The Illinois pork industry contributes an estimated \$13.8 billion to the state's economy, according to the Illinois Pork Producers Association.





Toni Dunker is a price risk manager with Advance Trading in Quincy. She works with hog farmers to sell pigs for the best price once they reach market weight, starting around 260 pounds. As of April 28, plants they ship hogs to were working at a 60 percent capacity.

"That hog continues to grow every day, and once it gets past a certain size, they can no longer process it,' Dunker said. "It's too big for the equipment."

Hog producers have a tight timeline to maintain productivity and safety for their animals. They cannot be held like cattle, leaving some producers with no other option but to euthanize animals.

Holding market-ready swine also means there are fewer places to raise piglets, reducing the future supply, Dunker said.

Eggs: University of Illinois animal sciences professor Ken Koelkebeck specializes in poultry production. With 6 million laying hens, Illinois is considered a small commercial egg

Wholesale egg prices jumped trucked to Iowa or Indiana. from 94 cents to \$3.01 a dozen from March to April. The demand for consumer eggs has skyrocketed with people cooking and baking at home more, causing grocery stores to limit shopper's purchases.

There also has been a disruption in the supply of cartons," Koelkebeck said. "Demand was so high and there's only two or three companies that make these cartons. They couldn't keep up."

Egg plants are highly automated and need fewer workers, so they haven't had issues with shutdowns like pork and beef plants.

With dozen-sized cartons in short supply, eggs are stockpiled at plants on 30-count flats, which usually go to restaurants. Now, some eggs may be sold in generic, unlabeled cartons.

Poultry: Some states have culled flocks of laying hens because of the lack of demand of eggs from the service industry.

Illinois does not have any poultry commercial processing plants, so chickens and turkeys are

Illinois farmers raise 5 million turkeys a year under contracts with companies. They have scaled back by 15 percent.

"It's more of a market disruption rather than completely shutting down," Koelkebeck said.

He expects as pork and beef products become less available, consumers will buy more poultry, so producers will raise more birds.

Euthanizing livestock

Euthanizing livestock is a worstcase scenario for farmers.

"These are hard decisions for producers to make," Meteer said. That's a farmer's nightmare; to euthanize an animal they put care and money and time into and not see it turned into a food product that nourishes someone.'

Farmers are spending more money to feed and care for animals, with no guarantee they can sell, and at what price. If an animal continues to gain weight, it also can increase risk of lameness. Meteer said.

Includes

Dunker said daily conversations with swine producers have changed from how many pigs will be heading to processing plants to how many loads have been canceled.

"It's such a challenging time for farmers emotionally, because their focus is to make sure that pig, from the time it's born to the time it leaves, is healthy and vibrant."

Now, they must consider the unimaginable.

Hadden said cattle farmers have options with calves, but for fullgrown cattle already on feedlots, producers are calling processors as far away as Colorado.

What's next?

Beef and pork suppliers have a backlog of frozen product that is making its way onto shelves, but there may not be as much variety as in the past. Some stores are limiting meat and egg purchases to prevent stockpiling.

Illinois has the third most farmers markets in the nation, most of which are opening this month with new regulations in place.

Shoppers can find locally produced meats there or even purchase a side of beef directly from a local butcher.

"It gives us a nice market to move some of our animals," said Hadden, whose direct sales have already doubled this year.

Consumers have called wanting to buy freezer beef because they can't find it at the store, and they're willing to wait for it to be processed locally.

'Is that pragmatic for the entire U.S.? No, but for people in more rural areas, it is," Steckler said.

For some, this may be a chance to try plant-based meals, grow a victory garden, invest in a communitysupported agriculture subscription or raise backyard chickens.



Illinois department tasked with the state's economic development launched a program May 12 providing grant funding construction to local governments for capital projects.

"The priority is adding some stimulus to the economy right now, taking advantage of the construction season and making improvements to infrastructure, which is in constant need of modernizing.
