# **Monroe Clinic begins** reopening procedures

Officials at Monroe Clinic are slowly entering the recovery phase for COVID-19, including increased patient visits, so they are assuring patients, visitors and community members that they are taking every step possible to ensure care is delivered safely.

It is reopening in a phased approach, with precautions in place and a prioritized focus on patients whose appointments and procedures may have been delayed or impacted by COVID-19 regulations.

'Monroe Clinic and the communities we serve have done an incredible job of adhering to the Safer-at-Home order and adapting the other measures put in place to stop the spread of COVID-19, clinic President Jane Curran-Meuli said in a news release last week "At this time, we feel confident that we can begin to cautiously and slowly resume some services that had been stopped as a precaution against COVID-19. We will continue to monitor the situation on an ongoing basis and evaluate our care plans as we see how the virus spreads throughout our area.'

Monroe Clinic has safety precautions and infection control measures in place at all of its facilities in southern Wisconsin and northern Illinois to limit the risk of exposure and keep everyone safe. These include:

- Screening of all patients before their scheduled procedures
- Strict visitor policy to limit unnecessary traffic in facilities
- Entrance screening for all patients and visitors
- Universal use of appropriate personal protective equipment for
- Enhanced cleaning and disinfection processes at all locations
- Plexiglass barriers at check-in and registration to ensure appropriate distancing
- Realigned waiting room seating to ensure appropriate physical

And cloth masks or face coverings must be worn by all patients, visitors and staff members at Monroe Clinic facilities.

Scheduled patient visits and procedures have been evaluated on a case-by-case basis since early March as a proactive measure to minimize risks and ensure patient safety.

We will continue to review individual patient health histories and risk levels as we begin to increase the number of patients we're seeing at our facilities," said Dr. Darren Pipp, chief medical officer. 'Not seeking care, particularly for chronic illnesses and urgent or emergency conditions, could negatively impact your overall health and wellbeing. Our process will be cautious and methodical to ensure the safest approach to care for our patients.'

# Illinois Supreme Court allows circuits to design local reopening plans

Chief judges may implement their own plans beginning June 1

Illinois' 24 chief judges can decide when to reopen courthouses across the state to in-person proceedings, the state Supreme Court ordered May 20.

Each circuit is encouraged to continue holding remote hearings as frequently as possible, an extension of the highest court's previous guidance. But beginning June 1, and in consultation with local health departments, courthouses may hold jury trials, lawsuit arguments and other actions in a courtroom.

The Supreme Court's plan is independent of Gov. JB Pritzker's regional Restore Illinois plan and gives reopening authority to the head of Illinois' 24 judicial circuits. Schedules in each district should be flexible, according to the order and guidance from chief justices, because 'local conditions may change.'

"The court realizes that the health crisis is not over, but we must advance justice in a safe and organized manner," Chief Justice Anne Burke

Restrictions combat the COVID-19 pandemic and "significant levels of backlogged cases" present an obstacle for "most courts for the foreseeable future," the Supreme Court wrote in its guidance.

In a news release, the Supreme Court said, "each jurisdiction is uniquely positioned" to address those changes and other obstacles created by COVID-19.

That reopening process will be slow for many judicial jurisdictions, many courthouses immediately face challenges.

During the pandemic, the judicial branch of government has used technology not usually embraced by the courts.

'Whatever the new 'normal' brings, a silver lining for the judicial branch is the culture shift in the effective use of video conference and remote technology work capacity," the justices wrote in the guidance.

They suggest considering having judges and attorneys exchange "sensitive documents" exchange through

implemented to encrypted email, allowing electronic signatures on paperwork and ruling on certain matters without holding oral arguments.

Strategies proceedings should be made in consultation with local health departments, according to the guidance.

Officials may recommend foot traffic patterns to ensure social distancing, place tape on floors to indicate safe distances for court visitors to stand and evaluate where court personnel should be positioned. Judges should also limit how many people are in buildings at once.

The Supreme Court advised hand sanitizing stations and Plexiglas germ shields be in place throughout courthouses and that there be more frequent cleanings. Justices also ordered face coverings be mandatory and entry refused to those who refuse to wear one.

# Vote-by-mail expansion headed for governor's signature after Senate passage

## Bill also allows curbside voting, makes Election Day a state holiday this year

A major expansion of voting acis headed to the desk of Gov. JB Pritzker after the Illinois Senate overwhelmingly passed the measure

After more than an hour of floor debate, the upper chamber passed Senate Bill 1863 by a 37-19 party-line vote. Three Democrats—Jacqueline Collins, of Chicago, Robert Martwick, of Chicago, and Pat Mc-Guire, of Crest Hill—did not vote. The bill, which Pritzker has said he supports, expands mail-in voting for the Nov. 3 general election in anticipation of social distancing and other restrictions related to the COVID-19

pandemic that will make in-person of local election officials. voting more challenging.

The bill requires Illinois' local cess for the 2020 general election election offices, by Aug. 1, to mail or email vote-by-mail ballot applications to any voter who cast a ballot in 2018, 2019 or 2020, as well as voters who registered or changed addresses after the March primary.

Bill proponents estimate 4.8 million people will receive applications. The bill also states that by Sept. 15, the secretary of state must send a notice to people who received an application but have not yet re-

Completed ballots would be returned via mail or in new "collection sites," that would consist of boxes

As for voting in person, the bill would allow local election authorities to implement curbside voting, in which voters can drive up, be handed a ballot and fill it out in their cars.

SB 1863 would also expands the existing Election Day a state holiday for state employees to include public schools and universities, but only for the 2020 election.

The collection site and curbside provisions are optional for local clerks. They would also have the option to facilitate early-voting hours for people with certain health con-

Among the issues that Republican senators raised to state Sen. Julie placed in locations at the discretion Morrison D-Lake Forest, the bill's

lead Senate sponsor, were costs, input from county clerks, the security of collection sites and ballot applications being sent automatically and in some cases by email.

State Sen. Paul Schimpf, R-Waterloo, took issue with a provision that allows citizens as young as 16 to be election judges. Morrison said that is to make up for an expected decrease in elderly judges, many of whom did not show up during the March primary because of safety concerns.

'We lost a great number of experienced election judges who are retired and older people who quite simply have a great deal of hesitation now in performing those election duties that they've enjoyed for so many years," Morrison said. She added it is also an "excellent way for us to engage the younger generation in our government."

Schimpf also argued the bill creates a system with "significant" costs that are unnecessary given that Illinois already allows any citizen to vote by mail. He added it would also place a "significant burden" on local election authorities, whom he also argued have not been able to offer enough input.

The Illinois State Board of Elections filed a fiscal note saying that if the bill's provisions are fully implemented by every local election authority, it would eat up every dollar of the more than \$16.7 million the state will receive from the federal CARES Act for elections.

House sponsor Rep. Kelly Burke, D-Evergreen Park, however, said during floor debate on May 21 that ISBE's estimate is "extremely generous" because she does not expect vember's general election.

Voting on legislation has been different for the Senate during this week's special session as lawmakers practice social distancing. Senators have had to come to the floor in groups of 10 to vote, a process that takes slightly longer.

Pritzker threw his support behind SB 1863 on May 21, saying during his daily briefing that it balances voting access with available resources.

"I'm very much in favor of making sure that everybody gets a ballot who is eligible to vote and then returns that ballot," he said.

The measure passed the House of Representatives 72-43 on May 21 after a nearly three-hour debate that featured Republicans grilling Burke. Multiple GOP representatives expressed their concerns over the collection box system, for example, which Rep. Lindsay Parkhurst, R-Kankakee, argued could lead to voter fraud.

"There's not enough checks and balances, there's not enough security, there's not enough integrity to this ballot-harvesting drop-box system," she said.

To address security concerns related to the optional collection sites, Senators passed House Bill 2238 on Friday before debating SB 1863. That trailer bill would, among other things, require collection boxes to be locked and opened only by election authorities. It also requires ISBE to establish additional guidelines.

The trailer bill will need to be passed by the House in order to go to the governor's desk.

SB 1863 applies to only this No-

# Telehealth expansion package passes Illinois House, heads to Senate

Bills extend executive order, ease application process for some public insurance

A pair of health care bills expanding telehealth resources during the COVID-19 pandemic passed the Illinois House of Representatives on Saturday – with one passing the Senate and the other not being taken up as lawmakers wrapped up their emergency special session.

Senate Bills 671 and 1864 cleared the House unanimously on Saturday evening, 112-0 and 113-0, respectively. SB 1864 then passed the Senate, 50-3, with a trio of Republicans in dissent. SB 671 did not come up for a Senate vote before lawmakers adjourned.

The initiatives respond to health care needs brought on by the COVID-19 crisis, chiefly the increased need for affordable and accessible telehealth services as social distancing guidelines and other restrictions have kept people in their homes.

SB 671 extends an executive order issued in March by Gov. JB Pritzker requiring public and private insurers to cover in-network telehealth services as if they had happened in a doctor's office. That order also restricts the fees that insurers can charge for telehealth.

The bill extends the order's provisions until the end of the year. In floor debate Saturday afternoon, Rep. Mary Flowers, D-Chicago, argued SB 671 should include language giving a patient the option to be seen in person, such as in an emergency room, if he or she feels it is medically necessary.

House sponsor Rep. Deb Conroy, D-Villa Park, said that in Phase 3 of Illinois' reopening plan —expected to take effect May 29 — many doctor's offices are likely to reopen to in-person care.

An earlier version of SB 1864 had similar language until lawmakers removed it Saturday evening that would have required health insurers to cover the costs of all in-network telehealth services during the pandemic. Those services would also have been exempt in most cases from cost-sharing measures like copayments or deductibles.

language removed would have qualified "substance use disorder professionals and clinicians" as health care professionals under Telehealth Act during COVID-19.

The version of SB 1864 headed to Pritzker's desk, however, loosens certain regulations for the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services, the state's Medicaid agency, during the COVID-19 public health emergency.

That includes making it easier for people to prove eligibility for the federal Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) and the similar state program, All Kids. It also allows applicants to submit applications over the phone in lieu of a physical signature.

SB 1864 also calls for two state agencies to study how state government can help people who lack health insurance.

The bill instructs the Illinois Department of Insurance and IDHFS to study how "to make health insurance more affordable for low-income and middle-income residents." The bill cites that 835,000 Illinoisans are uninsured.

The departments would have to submit their findings — which would also collect data on the geography, race and ethnicity of the uninsured - by the end of February 2021. The report would inform Pritzker and the Legislature of the "design, costs, benefits and implementation" of possible state options.

The bill also establishes a state task force on kidney disease prevention that would "develop a plan to raise awareness about early detection, promote health equity and reduce the burden of kidney disease through the state" by the end of next

The three Senate Republicans who opposed SB 1864 were Sens. Chuck Weaver of Peoria, Dan McConchie of Hawthorn Woods and Sue Rezin of Morris.

# House puts final stamp on graduated tax language

Pamphlet will be sent to all households with arguments for, against

The language of the graduated income tax ballot measure was finalized after the House joined the Senate in approving it Friday.

It will read: "The proposed

amendment grants the State authority to impose higher income tax rates how the federal government and a majority of other states do it.

The amendment would remove the portion of the Revenue Article of the Illinois Constitution that is sometimes referred to as the "flat tax," that requires all taxes on income to be at the same rate. The amendment does not itself change tax rates. It gives the State the ability to impose higher tax rates on those with higher income levels and lower income tax rates on those with middle or lower income levels.

proposed amendment should become a part of the Illinois Constitution." Voters will be asked to vote yes

to approve it or no to oppose. A majority of those voting in the Nov. 3 general election or three-fifths of those voting on the question will be needed for the measure to become enshrined in Illinois' Constitution.

If it passes, a rate structure already approved by the General Assembly will become law on Jan. 1, 2021, and



# From Lena's Kitchen



The not so skinny cook

I guess we are in Week 9 (if you started with the first week in April). I think some things will be relaxing after the end of May. I am lucky enough to have help with my groceries and with other areas, so I basically have been inside. I don't think I will know how to act once I am "sprung."

This week we have some seasonal spring recipes.

The first one is an appetizer using Vidalia onions, a sweet variety from Georgia.

There are only specific counties that by Georgia law — backed up by the USDA — that can legally use the Vidalia onion name. Even though there are areas of Georgia that grow just as good a sweet onion as a Vidalia, they cannot put that name on

The onions are popular in late spring and early summer before it gets too hot. If you like the taste of sweet onions, this onion dip will be a treat for you. Even though it says use Vidalia onion, any sweet onion will do. Just don't tell the people in the Vidalia onion counties.

#### **Baked Vidalia Onion Dip**

1 C. chopped Vidalia onions

1 C. shredded cheddar cheese

1 garlic clove, minced

Dash hot pepper sauce

Combine all ingredients in a bowl. Place in 1-pint casserole dish sprayed 25 minutes. Serve with pita chips or

#### **Best Rosy Rhubarb Salad**

This recipe is for a Jell-O salad that features rhubarb. It claims to be the best rhubarb Jell-O salad; however, there may be others who disagree. I think a really pretty glass bowl would make this salad look elegant.

3 C. sliced fresh or frozen rhubarb (1-inch pieces)

1 T. sugar

1 pkg. (3 oz.) raspberry gelatin

1 C. unsweetened pineapple juice

1 C. sliced peeled apples

1 C. diced celery

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. chopped pecans

In a medium saucepan, cook and stir rhubarb and sugar over mediumlow heat until rhubarb is soft and tender, 5 to 7 minutes. Remove from the heat; add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Stir in pineapple and lemon juices. Chill until partially set.

Stir in apples, celery and pecans. Pour into a 4½ C. mold or glass bowl coated with cooking spray. Chill several hours or overnight. Place on plate upside down. Flip mold or bowl and you will have molded salad.

#### **Asparagus with Sesame**

If you like roasted asparagus, this recipe is for you. It is simple and will make a great side dish for anyone who loves asparagus.

12 fresh asparagus spears

½ t. salt

2 t. butter

2 t. lemon juice

11/2 t. sesame seeds, toasted

Place asparagus in a skillet, sprinkle with salt. Add ½ inch water; bring to a boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer until crisp tender, about 4 minutes. Meanwhile, melt butter and add lemon juice; add to sesame seeds. Drain asparagus and drizzle with the butter mixture.

Barbecue Baked Bean Casserole

Memorial Day was the first unofficial day of summer. We can safely be with one of our favorite picnic foods if we pick baked beans. This unique barbecue bean recipe features shredded pork as well as the traditional bacon. The topping is unique because it uses crumbled cornbread. Try this unique baked bean recipe.

2 T. extra-virgin olive oil

1½ C. chopped onion

1 medium green pepper, chopped

2 lbs. shredded pork

1 can (28 oz.) baked beans

3 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled

1 C. barbecue sauce

2 T. tomato paste

1 T. Worcestershire sauce

2 C. crumbled cornbread

Preheat the oven to 350. Spray a 9-by-13-inch baking dish with cooking spray. In a skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Add onion and green pepper; cook, stirring occasionally until vegetables are just tender, 4 to 5 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in pork, beans, cooked and crumbled bacon, barbecue sauce, tomato paste and Worcestershire until combined.

Spoon into prepared baking dish. Loosely cover with foil. Bake for 30 minutes. Top with cornbread. Bake, uncovered, until lightly browned, about 10 minutes. Let stand for 15 minutes before serving.

#### King Ranch **Chicken Casserole**

This unique and tasty casserole will make a great dinner entrée. It can use rotisserie chicken for the chopped chicken to make it even easier. The layering of the corn tortillas makes for an interesting presentation. Enjoy this casserole with a salad and some tasty cornbread.

2 T. olive oil

1 medium green pepper, diced

1 C. chopped onion

3 cloves garlic, minced

5 C. chopped chicken

1 can cream of chicken soup

1 can (19 oz.) diced tomatoes, drained

2 T. chopped fresh cilantro

1 pkg. (16 oz.) taco-size corn tortillas

1 pkg. shredded Mexican cheese blend

Preheat oven to 350. Spray a 9-by-13-inch baking dish with cooking spray. In a large skillet, heat oil over medium-low heat. Add pepper, onion and garlic; cook, stirring occasionally, until onion begins to turn translucent, 3 to 4 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in chicken, soup, tomatoes and cilantro until combined.

Tear or, using a pizza cutter, cut half of tortillas into strips; cover bottom of prepared pan with two layers of tortillas. Spread half of chicken mixture onto tortillas. Top with half of cheese.

Repeat layers with remaining tortillas, chicken mixture and cheese. Spray a large piece of foil with cooking spray; cover casserole with foil, spray side down.

Bake for 30 minutes. Uncover and bake until cheese is lightly browned, about 5 minutes more. Garnish with cilantro, if desired. Let stand for 20 minutes before serving.

#### Honey Rhubarb Chicken

I had several rhubarb and meat selections sent to me. Last week pork was featured; this week it is chicken. The recipe says to use a fryer, but I would use leg and thigh pieces if you didn't want to use a whole fryer. If you use a whole chicken, I would cut out the backbone and not use the neck and back, bony pieces. Enjoy chicken a different way. 11/4 C. flour

1 T. poultry seasoning

1 egg 1 C. milk

1 fryer (3 to 4 lbs.) chicken, cut up <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. canola oil

Sauce:

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. cornstarch





134 C. cold water, divided

½ C. packed brown sugar

½ C. ĥoney

3 T. soy sauce

11/2 C. chopped fresh or frozen rhubarb

2 T. shopped onion

2 garlic cloves, peeled

Preheat the oven to 400. Combine flour and poultry seasoning in a bowl. In another bowl, whisk the egg and milk. Dip chicken one piece at a time in flour mixture and then in egg mixture; coat again with flour mixture. In a large skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Brown chicken on both sides. Place in a greased 9-by-13-inch baking dish

Sauce: Combine the cornstarch and 11/2 C. cold water in a large saucepan until smooth; stir in the brown sugar, honey and soy sauce. Pulse the rhubarb, onion, garlic and remaining 1/4 cup of water in a food processor until blended. Stir into cornstarch mixture. Bring to a boil over medium high heat; cook and stir until thickened, 2 to 3 minutes. Pour over chicken. Bake, uncovered, until a thermometer in a thigh reads 170, 35 to 40 minutes.

#### Strawberry-Rhubarb **Upside-Down Cake**

This recipe is a take-off on pineapple upside down cake. It is easy because it uses a cake mix. You could use a white cake mix if you would rather. Just be sure you have a large enough platter (or a sheet pan would work, too) when you are doing the upside down part.

5 C. sliced fresh or frozen rhubarb, thawed and drained

1 pkg. (6 oz.) strawberry Jell-O ½ C. sugar

2 C. miniature marshmallows

1 pkg. yellow cake mix

Whipped topping

Place the rhubarb in a greased 9-by-13-inch pan. Sprinkle with the gelatin, sugar and marshmallows. Prepare cake mix according to package directions; pour batter over marshmallows. Bake at 350 until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, 40 to 45 minutes. Cool for 10 minutes. Invert cake onto a large platter. Serve with whipped topping if desired.

#### **Bumbleberry Pie**



would replace the current flat tax.

Passage of the measure is a top priority of Gov. JB Pritzker, who has already pledged millions of his own fortune to push for its approval by voters. His budget team estimates the approved rates will bring in more than \$1 billion in additional state revenue next fiscal year and more than \$3 billion when it is implemented for a full fiscal year.

During debate in the House, Rep. Tom Demmer, R-Dixon, argued that Democrats, by noting the graduated structure is "how the federal government and a majority of other states do it," are essentially including an argument for the measure in what should be an unbiased description.

Rep. Emanuel "Chris" Welch, a Hillside Democrat, argued that the statement is factual.

"There's selectively included facts in this explanation," Demmer said,

asking why the explanation doesn't include information about Illinois' overall tax burden. "When we talk about selectively including facts, we get into the territory of arguments."

The text for a pamphlet, which will, by law, be sent to "every mailing address in the state, addressed to the attention of the postal patron,"

was also finalized. That pamphlet will contain the description of the measure, as well as arguments for and arguments against.

The arguments against were prepared by Republicans, and the arguments for by Democrats.

# Small business grant program extended

The Jo Daviess County Board has extended the Small Business Stabilization Grant

Program, with applications for round two being accepted until 4 p.m. June 12.

The purpose of the \$250,000 program is to help small businesses deemed nonessential pursuant to Gov. JB Pritzker's Stay-at-Home executive order to remain viable during and after the COVID-19

On May 20, the county board awarded grants to 23 Jo Daviess County small businesses totaling \$40,214.

The program is intended to help these businesses pay expenses not covered by the federal government's Paycheck Protection Program or other sources of state or federal COVID-19 relief funding.

The maximum is \$5,000 for one month of qualifying expenses. The board has authorized funding of this grant program through the Economic Development Investment Fund of the

To be eligible for the SBSG program, a business (profit or nonprofit) must meet certain criteria, including:

• Must be deemed a non-essential business under the Stay-at-Home order or a restaurant that is limited to serving food for consumption off-

- Must operate out of a brick-and-mortar location with the exception of bed and breakfast, homebased salon and spa/barbershop, home-based day care and the business is not able to pay rent, mortgage or utilities;
- Must meet the definition of small business defined as a one that employs less than 12 fulltime employees or the equivalent weekly hours of 12 full-time employees;
- Must be legally capable of entering into a binding contract;
- Must remain open for one year after the grant
- If a business qualified for the federal PPP, the owner must have applied for a loan and been denied in writing;
- Any business that has applied for the PPP and has not yet received notice of award is eligible to apply for the SBSG program.

A question and answer webinar via Zoom will be held on Thursday, June 4, at 3 p.m.

# Stockton Board of Education moving forward on several fronts

A report from the Building and Grounds Committee was one of the items addressed at the regular Board of Education meeting for Stockton Community Unit School District No. 206 on May 18.

Committee members reported during the virtual meeting that they had walked the perimeter of the high school and middle school and raised concerns about drainage issues and needing to remove shrubs on the

north side of the high school.

They also discussed possible places to store the portable bleachers. Currently the bleachers and soccer nets have been moved to the tennis courts above the middle school.

Among the informational items presented were Superintendent/ Elementary School Principal Colleen Fox discussing the Merchant Services online portal and high school Principal Casey Downey talking about possibly using an outside agency for fall and winter activities programs, while district technology director Gary Baglin presented his fiscal year 2021 budget.

Among the new business items the board took action on were:

- Extending the math series for grades 6-8 for six years
- Approving technology budget with lease buyout for the 2020-2021 school year
- Moving forward with College Now at Highland Community College for the 2021-2022 school
- · Approving the rerouting of drainage west of the middle school, replacing pipe and catch basins and regrading and installing roof drains at the middle school
- OK'ing sports medicine contract with Monroe Clinic for 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school years

After returning to open session, the board also approved numerous personnel comings and goings, including the hiring of John Hammann as athletic director and Matt Leitzen as high school physical education teacher and head football coach.

will like this recipe. It calls for decorating the top with pieces of piecrust cut out with cookie cutters. I put a second crust on the pie because I am not into doing cookie cutters in any way. The decorative pieces look great, but the plain crust makes the pie taste the same!

1 ½ C. flour

1 t. salt

1 t. sugar

1 C. cold butter <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. cold water

#### Filling:

1 medium tart apple, peeled and diced

- 1 C. diced fresh or frozen rhubarb, thawed
- 1 C. fresh or frozen raspberries, thawed and drained
- 1 C. fresh or frozen blueberries, thawed and drained
- 1 C. sliced fresh or frozen strawberries, thawed and drained

1 C. sugar ½ C. flour 1 T. lemon juice

In a small bowl, combine flour, salt

and sugar. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Gradually add water, tossing with a fork until a ball forms. Cover and refrigerate 1 hour or until easy to handle. Preheat oven to 400. On a lightly floured surface, roll out half of the dough to fit a 9-inch pie plate. Transfer crust to pie plate. Trim to ½ inch beyond edge of plate.

In a large bowl, combine the filling ingredients; pour into the crust. Roll out the remaining dough; cut out decorative shapes with a cookie cutter.

Place over filling. Roll the bottom crust carefully under and use a fork to finish the crust. Place foil around crust. Bake 20 minutes at 400. Reduce the heat to 350; remove foil.

Bake 40 to 45 minutes or until crust is golden brown and filling is bubbly. Cool on a wire rack.

## Lawmakers pass budget package to close out special session the backs of people who would lose including federal funds, is slated to Economic Security Act, or CARES Friday that the federal money comes

### GOP: Budget balanced 'on a wing and a prayer'

The Illinois Senate early Sunday morning passed a budget package authorizing \$42.8 billion in general revenue spending next year, although much of that remains tentative depending on the progression of the COVID-19 pandemic and potential congressional action that could send more financial aid to states. The House approved the budget bill late Saturday night.

The budget deal was worked out largely out of public view over the past two and a half months as lawmakers worked remotely in various informal "working groups," and it continued to undergo changes in recent days in advance of the House debate.

One key to making the budget work is a plan to borrow up to \$5 billion from the Federal Reserve's Municipal Liquidity Facility program. That program allows the central bank to purchase certain short-term debt from states to help them make up for the loss of revenue they've seen since the pandemic forced them to close large parts of their economy.

It also authorizes another \$1.5 billion in borrowing between the general revenue fund and various other state funds in order to maintain cash flow throughout the year.

House Majority Leader Gregory Harris, D-Chicago, said that by borrowing from the Fed, Illinois will be able to keep state spending for the fiscal year that begins July 1 largely at the same level as this year's spending.

"If we're going to balance the budget, I would rather not do it on

their jobs if we were to cut money to our schools, cut money to our first responders," he said. "I don't want thousands more people out of work."

Lawmakers expect to pay back the Federal Reserve loan with federal funds they expect Congress to approve in the next stimulus package for states. But Congress has not yet authorized such a package and there is sharp disagreement between congressional Republicans and Democrats over what that plan should look like.

Both chambers of the Illinois Legislature passed a separate bill authorizing that borrowing Friday

'What we've heard today is a budget that is balanced only on a wing and a prayer," said Republican Rep. Tom Demmer, of Dixon, the House GOP's chief budget negotiator.

During the Senate debate that began after midnight, Sen. Dale Righter, R-Mattoon, said the Legislature is "gambling" with its budget plan.

The spending plan for the upcoming fiscal year is spelled out in Senate Bill 264. According to an analysis of the package that was circulating among lawmakers Saturday, it essentially calls for flat funding for most state programs, including K-12 schools, which will see no increase in their evidence-based funding over their current levels, although they will not see any decrease either.

Funding for state universities also is held flat at current-year levels, as is funding for the Monetary Aid Program, or MAP grants, and AIM HIGH grants.

A few state agencies are slated for increases in the new budget, including the Illinois Department of Public Health, the agency coordinating much of the state's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Its total budget,

grow 144 percent, to more than \$1.6 billion.

Included in that figure is \$416 million in federal funds for testing and services provided by local health departments.

The Department on Aging, which would see an additional \$58 million in order to raise wages for adult care providers, transportation and homemaker service providers to \$14

The Department of Children and Family Services is also slated for a 20-percent increase in general revenue funding, or about \$170 million, to provide rate increases for foster care providers, to hire 123 investigative staff and to address caseload growth.

During debate in both chambers, Republicans urged delaying any action on a budget until the state has a better estimate of how much revenue it will receive in the coming year, as well as how much federal aid will be available, but Democrats did not entertain that suggestion.

The 68-44 vote in the House to pass the budget bill appeared to fall largely along party lines, with Republicans arguing it relied too heavily on borrowing and not enough on fiscal restraint. It passed the Senate, 37-19.

#### **CARES Act funding**

The budget package actually consists of two bills – an appropriations bill, Senate Bill 264, which authorizes spending by various state agencies; and a "budget implementation" bill, or "BIMP," in legislative lingo, House Bill 64, that enables various agencies to carry out the budget.

The implementation bill sets up a number of new funds within state government that can receive and distribute money from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief and

Act, a \$2.2 trillion federal relief program that Congress approved earlier this year.

The state expects to receive about \$3.3 billion through that program. Harris said that money is being earmarked for direct aid to the state's health care industry to help hospitals, nursing homes, mental health centers and other care providers absorb the cost they've incurred for dealing with the pandemic.

He said another \$1.8 billion is earmarked for the Illinois Emergency Management Agency, and it gives Gov. JB Pritzker authority to decide how it is spent.

That part especially infuriated Republicans who have complained about Pritzker governing by executive authority, and about the General Assembly not exercising its oversight

But Sen. Andy Manar, D-Bunker Hill, the Senate Democrats' lead negotiator, said in an interview with significant strings attached and that it can be spent only for specific purposes, and therefore Pritzker will be restrained by federal rules.

But the implementation bill also gives the governor additional discretionary authority over the spending of state funds throughout the budget. Normally governors are allowed to shift up to 2 percent of an appropriation from one purpose to another, but this year's bill expands that to 8 percent, something that angered many Republicans.

It also sets up a legislative oversight committee to monitor all executive spending in the budget as well as how CARES Act money distributed to local governments is spent.

The implementation bill passed the Senate, 33-19. It later passed the House, 62-47.
