# Crystal Lake a 'clear leader'

tal Lake continues to be a clear leader.

Despite the pandemic, the northwest suburban community of 40,000 continues to expand because of the city's welcoming approach to business. In the past year, the city has added Wisconsin-based Steinhafel's Furniture (which opened a 100,000 square-foot store), Binny's Beverage Depot, Pet Supplies Plus and Popeye's Louisiana Kitchen.

And more is on the way. Raising Cane's Chicken Fingers is opening a Crystal Lake location in the spring of 2021. It will be Raising Cane's 11th store in the Chicago area and first in McHenry County.

The city touts its high quality of life, a strong and supportive business community and a city government that works with business to get open—and remain in Crystal Lake.

"Businesses that locate here, stay here," says City of Crystal Lake Mayor Haig Haleblian. "We really work with business, and the community is very supportive of both locally grown businesses and those expanding to Crys-

City leaders point to a progressive attitude and a push for innovation. Quarry Cable Park, a 32-acre cable wake park with a lakefront tap and grille, fire pit, live music, is a prime ex-

"The city pushed me and my partner to create a business unlike any other in this region," says Pat McGinnis, co-owner of Quarry Cable Park & Grille. "We created an experience that draws people from all over the world."

1776, a farm-to-table restaurant, is another example of a business embracing innovation. Featuring locally sourced, gluten-free and allergy-friendly dishes.

The city's traditional downtown is anchored by the Raue Center, a 1,000-seat entertainment experience. More than 100 locally owned businesses are located in downtown Crystal Lake, including Crystal Lake Brewing (which features an on-site brewery and tasting room), Duke's Alehouse and Kitchen (an eco-conscious gastropub) and Reclaimed (which cre-

Located 35 miles from O'Hare International Airport, Crystal Lake is also easily accessible to Chicago via two Metra train stations. With 1,600 acres of parks and open space, 230-acre Crystal Lake, and Three Oaks Recreation Area, Crystal Lake attracts people looking for an active lifestyle and excellent quality of life. Elementary School District 47 and Community High School District 155 are two of the best public school systems in the region, and Crystal Lake is home to McHenry County College.

In March, the City worked closely with businesses to create an environment that helped businesses remain open in a safe manner. "We visited every restaurant, for example, to create a customized approach to surviving the pandemic," says Michelle Rentzsch, Community Development director. # Crystal Lake man charged with criminal trespass

Travis Howard also charged with criminal damage to property

On Thursday, Oct. 15, at approximately 3:45 a.m., it was reported to the Woodstock Police Department that a subject had forcefully and without permission entered a residence in the 2300 block of Aspen Lane in Woodstock. The caller advised that the subject, later identified as 34-year-old Crystal Lake resident Travis Howard, had barricaded himself inside the residence and refused to leave.

Upon arrival of WPD officers, it was learned that the male suspect had a previous dating relationship with the female victim who lived at the residence. They had ended their relationship approximately six weeks prior to this incident. He was not a resident of the victim's home.

The victim further advised that the suspect was texting her at approximately 1:30 a.m. requesting a ride after he was arrested for a separate incident outside the jurisdiction of Woodstock. Based on the text messages he was sending her, she believed he might attempt to come to her residence, so she decided to reside elsewhere



The suspect began to text her again at approximately 3:40 a.m. The texts he sent her included pictures from inside of her residence, which appeared to have been taken just prior to the reporting of this incident, so she notified the Woodstock Police Department for assistance.

Officers discovered a Travis Howard damaged window on the

exterior of the residence, which allowed access inside. After several unsuccessful attempts to make contact with the suspect inside of the residence, officers made entry into the residence with the permission of the victim. The suspect was located inside and was taken into custody without incident.

Howard was charged with Criminal Trespass to Residence (Class A Misdemeanor) and Criminal Damage to Property (Class A Misdemeanor).

The longterm plan includes restoring and reconnecting hundreds of acres of oak savannas and woodlands on McHenry County Conservation District sites. That would require a passiveaggressive pathology on steroids and shameless hypocrisy rivaling the irenic protestations of Islamofascist nutball savages.

Actually, I know how some people that pretend to be Christians do that.

Generally speaking with no evidence to the contrary, Democrats have no perceptible morality and Republicans have no practical spine. I am convinced too many

baaaaaaah-baaaaaaaahing Democrats and Republicans would vote for satanos itself if that lying, deceiving, damning and beastial murderer were their party's nominee.

Christians have one primary identity.

Christian.

I'll never forget when he said, "I never thought much about abortion until one day after heart surgery on a newborn to save her life when I went down a few floors in the hospital and saw trash baskets filled with the body parts of the unborn. It seemed tragically ironic, hypocritical and barbaric to be saving babies on one floor and slaughtering them on another.

Then there's my involvement with Special Olympians. About 15 years ago when she was headed home to Jesus in a victory over death with a life cut short by cancer, I promised Muffet Flott that I would be Bill's guardian after the rest of the family joined her in heaven. With the support of my wife and sons, I agreed. In the years since that covenant, I have learned so much about the rainbowcolored diversity and beauty of God from Special Olympians. I have experienced more Christianity among Special Olympians than any other secular or religious organization. Tragically and aggravatingly, I also

know God knows you know there are people running for political offices that would have ended the lives of those predestined Special Olympians in the womb if they had the chance because they would have been considered inconvenient, require patience. Cost too much money, judged burdensome or some other from-the-pit-of-hell rationalization bringing Nazis to mind.

Unless anyone can prove by the example of Jesus, explanations of Holy Scripture, or enlightenment of the Holy Spirit who never contradicts Jesus by the book that God doesn't want us to respect, protect, and advocate the sanctity of all human life from womb to tomb, I don't see how anyone who claims to be a follower of Jesus could ever vote for an abortionist which is an ugly-in-itself euphemism for baby killer.

We're supposed to enflesh the example of Jesus in our lives if we have enthroned Him in our heads, hearts and guts as personal Lord and Savior.

Paul put it this way in Peterson's translation-paraphrase of Romans 12:2: "Don't become so well-adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking. Recognize what He wants from you, and quickly respond to it. Unlike the culture around you, always dragging you down to its level of immaturity, God brings the best out of you, develops well-formed maturity in you."

Simply, to be a Christian is to think then act Christianly.

Christians are not animals. We don't reflex mindlessly.

We are at the highest order of creation – imago Dei – which allows us to reflect on situations with people and things, reflect not reflex with Jesus as our focus and filter and then act accordingly.

Paul explained, "So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things above, where Christ is...Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things" (Colossians 3:1-2).

Again, I like how Peterson translates and paraphrases Paul: "So if you're serious about living this new resurrection life with Christ, act like it...See things from His perspective."

When it comes to Nov. 3, we must shed our idolatries, temptations and lusts and pledge allegiance to God for the welfare of our country: "If my people, who bear My name, humble themselves, pray and seek My face, and turn from their evil ways, then I will hear from heaven, forgive their sin, and then heal their land" (2 Chronicles 7:14).

The message of redemption from Genesis through Revelation is clear and categorical: "Return to God and God will restore you. If so, so. If not, not."

I think of my buddy Cliff Mansley who blurted out just before a big vote on something distinguishing authentic Christians by the book from posers whose "faith" is only coincidental to Jesus by the book, "Vote for Jesus!"

That's the issue before Christians on November 3.

Will we vote Christianly or will we vote like pagans?

Let me put it another way. When you enter that voting booth, will you be a woman or man of God?

A woman/man of God is someone who belongs to God and seeks to please God in all things at all times in all places with all people.

A woman/man of God doesn't wear those proverbially different hats for different situations as in sometimes Christian when somewhere with some people that aren't women/men of God.

Being a woman/man of God isn't a part-time job.

A woman/man of God, as Paul wrote to Timothy, runs away from people that dishonor the WORD enfleshed in Jesus, explained in the Bible, and enlightened by the Holy Spirit who never contradicts Jesus by the book and runs toward people that pray and labor to honor Him in all things at all times in all places with all people: "But you, man of God, flee – run away and reject – from unwholesome passions and ignorant disputes and false teachings/teachers

and the unGodly and pursue – run toward and embrace – righteousness, Godliness, faith, love, endurance, and gentleness. Fight the good fight of the faith" (Read 1-2 Timothy).

In short, think and act Christianly. Unlike some people who leave their Christianity behind after the benediction and act like everybody else when they get back to their jobs, school, family, friends, and politics, a woman/man of God hears and heeds the apostle: "Whatever you do, in word or in deed do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him" (Colossians 3:17).

A woman/man of God doesn't have one foot in the boat and one foot on the dock. They are all in for Jesus! They walk on water with Him!

A woman/man of God has only one Master and it's not Caesar.

A woman/man of God prays, lives, votes, and everything else "in the name of Jesus" because, as that little phrase with eternal consequences means, Christians know they belong to Jesus and are beholden to Jesus by confession (what they say), conduct (what they do), countenance (how they appear), checkbook (how they manage what God has entrusted to them), and chums (who they hang out with).

Again and again and again until it sinks in, Paul was emphatic about God's expectation for a woman/man of God: "So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that above, where Christ is...Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things" (Colossians 3:1-2).

A woman/man of God has heaven on her/his mind.

A woman/man of God is praying and laboring for their lives and family and country and all of the below to honor God and have heavenly priorities with Jesus as the Master and Bible as the manual.

Jesus was blunt: "Seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be provided for you" (Matthew 6:33).

A woman/man of God always puts God first in themselves and family and country and all of the below.

### Ordinances aimed at jump-starting housing projects denied by city

After recommending approval of an ordinance that would eliminate four impact fees on residential development, the Committee of the Whole took on discussing a development agreement with Howlett Companies, tied to construction of 16 townhouse duplexes known as River Bend West.

Mayor Mike Chamberlain called for a motion from the committee to forward the ordinance to city council for additional conversation. He got one from Alderman Daniel Arevalo, seconded by Alderman Matt Fleury.

Discussion followed with Alderman Ric Brereton saying there were two questions in the air at that point. "Would it be nice to have some apartments there?" he asked, referring to the location of the River Bend West townhouses. "That's 'yes' or 'no.' The other question was does the city want to pay for it?"

Alderman Dan Snow said he was not a big fan of - no offense cherry picking and not a fan at all of tax abatements. "That to me is a nowhere deal," he said. Then he introduced his idea of an ordinance focusing on commercial and retail. reducing permit fees for brand new

construction by half, good until have things here. But if I want a Jan. 1, 2024, which he offered as a motion in the final moments of the meeting.

Chamberlain reminded aldermen of what he said a couple of weeks ago about the development agreement with Howlett Companies. "This is a proposal and it's up to the city council to tailor that proposal to what's appropriate in their minds, for their constituents, and for the city. Nothing is set in concrete; this is for discussion."

At that point Snow said he would like to hear from some other aldermen, as "only three of us are

Alderman Marsha Freeman said her position was "no" on all of what was being discussed.

No to supplement

"I don't believe we need to supplement this," she said of the townhouse development. "All you're doing is making this developer and Realtors rich, on the backs of taxpayers.'

She continued, "I would tell Growth Dimensions - and I know they're all about industrial - but I see Belvidere turning into an industrial park. I think we should be

"You can tell me all day that we

new pair of shoes, or I want to buy a new outfit, I gotta go to Rockford. If you want growth, you need quality of life for your residents, which is retail and commercial. That's all I have to say."

To that, the mayor said, "I'll bite my tongue.

The motion on the floor at the Sept. 28 meeting, to send the development agreement to council for discussion, failed, 8-2. Then Alderman Snow's motion for reducing permit fees by half, for the next three years, failed, 6-4.

Referring to the Snow proposal, concerning the reduction in permit fees for developers, Freeman asked how much those permits cost?

The city's director of buildings, Kip Countryman, responded that was based on the cost of construction. "For Mr. Howlett's townhouses, that would be about \$2,000 per unit." He added that Belvidere's permit fees had not been increased since 2006.

Howlett Companies owner Tom Howlett said at a previous meeting that without the requested incentives, the township development would not proceed. He also said the project represented a \$4-million investment.

*To the Electors of the State of Illinois:* 

The Illinois Constitution establishes a structure for government and laws. There are three ways to initiate change to the Illinois Constitution: (1) a constitutional convention may propose changes to any part; (2) the General Assembly may propose changes to any part; or (3) a petition initiative may propose amendments limited to structural and procedural subjects contained in the Legislative Article. The people of Illinois must approve any changes to the Constitution before they become effective. The purpose of this document is to inform you of proposed changes to the Illinois Constitution and provide you with a brief explanation and a summary of the arguments in favor of and in opposition to the proposed amendment. Proposed changes in the existing constitutional amendment are indicated by underscoring all new matter and by crossing with a line all matter which is to be deleted.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SECTION 3 OF ARTICLE IX OF THE ILLINOIS CONSTITUTION ARTICLE IX – REVENUE

#### **SECTION 3. LIMITATIONS ON INCOME TAXATION**

(a) The General Assembly shall provide by law for the rate or rates of any tax on or measured by income imposed by the State. A tax on or measured by income shall be at a non-graduated rate. At any one time there may be no more than one such tax imposed by the State for State purposes on individuals and one such tax so imposed on corporations. In any such tax imposed upon corporations the highest rate shall not exceed the highest rate imposed on individuals by more than a ratio of 8 to 5.

(b) Laws imposing taxes on or measured by income may adopt by reference provisions of the laws and regulations of the United States, as they then exist or thereafter may be changed, for the purpose of arriving at the amount of income upon which the tax is imposed.

#### **EXPLANATION**

The proposed amendment grants the State authority to impose higher income tax rates on higher income levels, which is how the federal government and a majority of other states do it. The amendment would remove the portion of the Revenue Article of the Illinois Constitution that is sometimes referred to as the "flat tax," that requires all taxes on income to be at the same rate. The amendment does not itself change tax rates. It gives the State the ability to impose higher tax rates on those with higher income levels and lower tax rates on those with middle or lower income levels. You are asked to decide whether the proposed amendment should become a part of the Illinois Constitution.

#### ARGUMENTS IN FAVOR OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Illinois' current tax system unfairly benefits millionaires and billionaires and this amendment will set things right for middle-class and working people. Currently, it is unfair that billionaires pay the same

Voting "yes" on the amendment means that the State will enact a new tax structure where only those making above \$250,000 a year will see their taxes go up. This amendment is simply upgrading Illinois' old tax system to a graduated system which is how the federal government and the majority of other states do it.

This Amendment Would Make Illinois' Tax System Fair.

Approval of this amendment would enact a fair system that allows the state to tax wealthy people at higher rates and lower income people at lower rates, replacing Illinois' current unfair tax system, in which wealthy people pay the exact same tax rate as lower and middle income people.

Illinois' current tax system unfairly benefits millionaires and billionaires, and approval of this amendment will set things right for the middle class and working people.

This amendment will help small business owners by creating a stable economic environment for their businesses to thrive.

While others try to mislead you, under the current tax system in Illinois, policymakers already have the authority to set any tax rate and to change tax rates at their will. The current system forces policymakers to charge the same tax rate to everyone, regardless of how much money they make. If this amendment passes, the State will have the ability to tax higher income earners at a different rate. In fact, upon passage of this Amendment, a new tax structure will go into effect where 97% of taxpayers will pay the same or less, while only those making more than \$250,000 a year will see a tax

This amendment does not tax retirement income.

The Federal Government and Most States Use the Graduated Tax System Proposed in this Amendment, Not the Unfair System Currently Used in Illinois.

Illinois is among a minority of states that do not utilize graduated tax rates because the Illinois Constitution requires a "flat tax" that penalizes middle-class and working people and benefits higher

A majority of states and the federal government already use the kind of graduated income tax system proposed in this amendment to ensure that wealthy people pay their fair share of taxes. Nearby states including Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio, and Wisconsin are among the majority of states that have graduated tax systems.

Illinois' Current Income Tax System Relies on Taxes from Middle and Lower Income Earners, While a Graduated System Would Lower that Burden and Fund Critical Programs such as Education and Human Services.

While some states have fair tax rates in which the highest income earners pay the highest tax rate, Illinois' "flat tax" rate continues to rely unfairly on taxes from middle and lower income earners. Under Illinois' "flat tax" structure, a nurse making \$50,000 per year pays the same tax rate as an executive making \$4 million per year. A graduated tax rate would have the executive pay more. Because of the way our current tax system is set up, the bottom fifth of Illinois taxpayers (those making below \$21,800) contribute 14.4% of their income to state and local taxes, compared to 7.4% for the top 1 percent of Illinois taxpayers.

If this Amendment passes, the State has already enacted a new graduated tax structure where 97% of taxpayers will pay the same or less.

Under the new tax structure, only the top 3% of Illinois income earners would pay more in income taxes. Everyone who makes \$250,000 or less a year would pay the same or less.

Over 95% of small businesses earn \$250,000 or less a year in profits, and their owners will not see a tax increase under the new tax structure.

This change will generate additional revenue each year that can help address Illinois' budget deficit and fund critical programs, including the State's education system, public safety, and social services like mental health and substance abuse treatment and domestic violence shelters.

After the COVID-19 Pandemic, We Need to Do All We Can to Help the Economy and Middle-Class and Working People.

Working people and essential workers like nurses, first responders, and grocery store clerks should not pay the same tax rate as the wealthy. Nurses making \$50,000 a year should not pay the same tax rate as an executive making \$4,000,000 a year.

Having wealthy people pay more would reduce the burden on working families. This is money that middle and lower income people need for housing, groceries, medicine, and essentials.

When the wealthiest people pay more, middle and lower income earners can pay less while the State funds critical services that our essential workers rely on.

#### ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT

- 1) The Amendment gives the Legislature power to increase taxes on any group of taxpayers with no limits and no accountability and without any requirement to use the additional revenue to fund essential needs such as healthcare, education, or public safety.
- Taxes and spending are out of control. The Legislature should not be allowed to keep raising taxes until they get their spending under control. 2)
- In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, now is the worst possible time for a massive tax increase.

The Amendment gives the Legislature power to increase taxes on any group of taxpayers with no limits and no accountability and without any requirement to use the additional revenue to fund essential needs such as healthcare, education, or public safety. The proposed amendment would give the Legislature unlimited new authority to increase income tax rates on any group of taxpayers at will, including low-income and middle-income families and small

business owners. There would be no limit on the number of tax brackets that could be created and no limit on how high tax rates could be increased on individual taxpayers. In addition, this proposed change will pave the way for a tax on retirement income.

Nothing in the amendment requires the Legislature to do anything to control spending. Nor does it require funds to be spent on essential needs such as healthcare, education, or public safety. It would simply give the Legislature a blank check to spend billions of dollars however they want, with no accountability.

Taxes and spending are out of control. The Legislature should not be allowed to keep raising taxes until they get their spending under control.

Illinois already has some of the highest property taxes and sales taxes in the nation. And the Legislature has increased Illinois income tax rates twice in the past decade to try to deal with the out-ofcontrol spending in Springfield.

# 'Hats off! The flag is passing by!'

I grew up in a small town in the Midwest where the streets were lined with elm trees whose branches arched over these streets. There were rectangular yellow signs along the streets near schools and playgrounds that announced, "In Belvidere we love our children. Drive Safely."

In my seventh-grade English class more than 60 years ago, our teacher told us that we were to learn 40 or so poems by heart which we would remember later in life and be thankful we knew. These ranged from Tennyson's majestic, "The splendor falls on castle walls and snowy summits old in story" to Edgar Guest's simple, "I have to live with myself and so, I want to be fit for myself to know."

The one I am remembering now is Henry Holcomb Bennett's "The Flag Goes By." After 60 years, I still know most of the poem by heart. The poem begins, "Hats off! Along the street there comes a blare of bugles a ruffle of drums. A flash of color beneath the sky. Hats off! The flag is passing by."

She was right. Although laid down in my brain more than six decades ago, the words still connect and lead to a glisten in my eye.

I remember the exact day I first saw our flag go by. July 4, 1952. It was at a Fourth of July parade down the main street of Belvidere. Led by the color guard with the American flag waving in the middle, the veterans from World War II marched by. We took off our hats to the flag and them. They were so much younger than I am now. Now, nearly all of them are dead, but I can still see their young faces looking straight ahead.

Belvidere was a small town. Those who returned to march in this parade personally knew all those who did not. The wives, mothers, children, and fathers of all those who did not return lined the street. I now imagine that somewhere along that route a child went up to one of the soldiers, saluted him, and gave him a small flag to carry with him in the parade so that the memory of his or her father would also be marching in that parade. If this didn't happen in reality, it did happen in spirit.

These men were our heroes, not statues in parks, not Washington, not Jefferson, not even Lincoln. They were what we aspired to be. Five months later the general who led some of them to liberate Europe was elected President of the United States. My parents were proud to vote in that election although they did not vote for Eisenhower. They were Democrats. My father was a line worker and the union representative in a local factory that made bottle caps. My mother worked as a shipping clerk in the basement of JCPenney, earning minimum wage.

Bennett's poem goes on to say, "But more than a flag is passing by. There were "sea fights and land fights grim and great ... Cheers of victory on dying lips." There was "Equal justice, right and law, stately honor and reverend awe."

The question I now ask myself is what is passing me by when the flag goes by?

Is our flag the symbol of our material might or of our moral courage and compassion?

Is our flag the symbol of the past wars fought for freedom or for the wars we will be willing to fight in the future for our freedom and those of people around the world?

Is our flag the symbol of what we have been or of what we strive to become?

Is our flag a symbol to not only to make us feel proud but also humble? The flag and our elections define America. In our elections each person casts one vote to decide what direction our country should go. Everyone should have one vote. Every vote should be counted. The power of our country is transferred to those whom the majority of our country so decide but also with compassion for those whose choices were not elected.

The flag and our ballot like our country are one and inseparable. Each is more than a symbol of the other. Each is the other. When I receive my ballot for this coming election, I am receiving a piece of the flag. Voting is my homage to the flag and our country. Before I mark my ballot, I remind myself that more than a flag is passing by. "Equal justice, right, and law. Stately honor and reverend awe."

# More than 2 million mail-in ballots requested in Illinois

More than 2 million Illinois voters have requested vote-by-mail ballots and more than 26,000 such ballots have already been returned, according to the Illinois State Board of Elections.

That means about a quarter of the state's registered voters had requested vote-by-mail ballots as of Sept. 30.

ISBE reported that 2,077,594 ballots were requested, with 26,872 returned and 55,751 persons having voted early.

The number continues to grow as public health guidance advises against congregating in indoor places due to concerns about the spread of COVID-19. Earlier this year, state lawmakers passed a law requiring election authorities to send applications for vote-by-mail ballots to registered voters who voted in recent elections.

Applications must be sent back to the election authority to receive a

mail-in ballot. Many of the applications have already been distributed to voters, and vote-by-mail and early voting periods began last week.

Once the ballot is received, it must be sent back to the election authority to be counted. While the new law for the 2020 election allows an election authority to install drop boxes for the return of ballots, a spokesperson said only 54 of the state's 108 election jurisdictions have such a drop box.

Those who have requested mail ballots but change their minds and would like to vote in person instead have avenues to do so, according to ISBE spokesperson Matt Dietrich, who said there are safeguards in place to ensure no double voting occurs.

A voter who received a mail ballot but wishes to cast a ballot in person must surrender the ballot at an early voting location or polling place on Election Day and will be given a regular ballot.

A voter who does not surrender the ballot must cast a provisional ballot.

Provisional ballots are not counted until all the mail ballots have been processed and it is assured that the voter's ballot is not among them.

According to Dietrich, if someone has requested but not yet received their mail ballot and wants to vote in person, the voter can sign an affidavit at the polling place or early voting location attesting that they have not received a mail ballot. The voter will then be given a regular ballot.

"This happens most frequently with voters who request their mail ballot very late in the process and don't receive it as of Election Day, though a voter can do this anytime as long as they haven't received the ballot," he said.

Voters using this method are instructed to discard the mail ballot if it arrives, but if they do sign and return it for voting, they're committing vote fraud and are subject to Class 3 felony charges, Dietrich said.

Gov. JB Pritzker said he would feel



### When pumpkins thrive

If you have ever planted pumpkins, you may have been overwhelmed with pumpkins like Rebecca Estelle in the children's book, "Too Many Pumpkins" by Linda White. While her pumpkin problem was not her fault, in real life, deciding on how many pumpkin seeds to plant is a challenge. I always plant more than one seed per hill. Traditionally, a few seeds will not germinate. However, there are times when they all germinate; the weather is perfect; and the pumpkins take over. Depending on the pumpkin variety, one pumpkin vine will produce, on average, between two to five pumpkins. Three hills with three seeds each can produce up to 30 pumpkins. That is a lot of pumpkins for one family. Check out Too Many Pumpkins to

• The largest pumpkin pie was baked on Sept. 25, 2010, and weighed in at 3,699 pounds. It was 20 feet in diameter. The pie was made with 1,212 pounds of canned pumpkin, 233 dozen eggs, 109 gallons of evaporated milk, 525

pounds of sugar, 7 pounds of salt, 14.5 pounds of cinnamon, and 3 pounds of pumpkin pie spice.

Fall is in the air! Cooler days and chilly nights mean one thing... it's pumpkin season. Did you know that Illinois is the Pumpkin Capital of the World? Illinois farmers grow 90 to 95 percent of the pumpkins used for processing. Most of the processing takes place in Morton, Ill. - The Pumpkin Capital of the World. The counties of Tazewell, Mason, Wavne, Peoria, and Stark grow the majority of the pumpkins.

It's a great time of year to visit a local pumpkin farm, too. Most pumpkin patches grow both ornamental and pie pumpkins.

Carving is a great way to teach kids about the different parts of a pumpkin. Did you know that the lines on a pumpkin are called the ribs? The greater the number of ribs on a pumpkin, the more seeds that are inside. This fall when you are carving pumpkins let your kids or grandkids, guess how many seeds are inside before you open it. For the younger ones, divide the seeds into groups. It is a fun way to practice skip counting (10, 20, 30...). You will be surprised how high the kids will count.

We've had vote-by-mail in Illinois for some number of years," he said. "And so there's, I think, a reasonable high confidence level of people who have done it have done so successfully. We have not had situations of voter fraud in Illinois

caused by vote by mail."

All mail-in ballot requests must be received by Oct. 29 ahead of the Nov. 3 election, but officials recommend submitting requests earlier to ensure a ballot is received by Election Day.

Returned ballots must be postmarked by Nov. 3 and received by the local election office by Nov. 17 in order to be counted.
