Vision-impaired voters have new vote-by-mail option


Visually impaired voters in Jo Da- return a marked hard copy to an viess County will be able to vote by mail without assistance in the 2020 election thanks to a system that allows them to use audio instructions to navigate and mark their ballots.

The system, known as Accessible Vote By Mail, is similar to the Illinois State Board of Elections' MOVE (Military and Overseas Voter Empowerment) process that allows overseas military personnel to receive a ballot electronically then

election authority for voting.

"With a record number of voters using vote-by-mail this year to avoid possible COVID exposure, it is especially important that visually impaired voters be allowed to vote by mail without assistance if they wish," County Clerk Angela Kaiser said in a news release. "The AVBM system has all the security features

Put your pumpkins to good use this fall

As Halloween approaches questions are raised about the future of that big ol' orange thing you and the kids carved, stuck a candle in and put out on the front stoop. You may ask yourself: How did it get here? What will I do with it now? How do I work this? Well, there's no need for stress. It's the same as it ever was and here are answers to some of those questions.

University of Illinois educator Stanley (Jay) Solomon said Jack-O'-Lantern-type pumpkins are usually grown in garden settings.

pumpkin grown by specialty farmers," he said. "We're seeing a number of operations that feature apple orchards or even pumpkin patches and corn mazes that also have a field of pumpkins and you can actually go out in the field and pick your own pump-

Solomon said the type of pumpkin used for food is also grown in fields, but using a different method of culti-

"They are a little more labor intensive than some crops," he said. They are a vegetable crop, so there is more

We also see a lot of that type of hand work or specialized equipment work involved with them. They are a vine crop so you need a clean area to start, but they put up a pretty good fight against the weeds once they get established. '

He said pumpkins are, for lack of a better term, temperamental.

'You need plenty of water, but not too much water at the wrong times," he explained. "Pumpkins can be a lot of work, but once you get them started, they will just keep on going and



Where's the science and data in governor's decision?

From the Kitchen



The not so skinny cook

We are now in what I call Indian summer. The leaves on the trees are iust beautiful. I can't remember in the last couple of years seeing the beauty in the trees. It has either been too dry or too wet; however, as the bears would say — everything must be just right. The fall weather continues to make us think of making good things. This week we feature some vegetables, two great main dishes and two good desserts.

Cheesy Corn Dip

There are a lot of corn dips out there; some are the tangy vinegar kind and some have sour cream and cheese. This recipe is the later. To enhance it, it features chiles, red peppers and bacon. All of these make a great combination for a fall appetizer.

4 T. unsalted butter

4½ C. fresh or thawed frozen corn kernels

1 medium red pepper, diced

1 can (4 oz.) chopped green chiles, drained

½ C. plus 2 T. chopped green onion, divided

1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, soft-

1½ C. sour cream

1 pkg. (8 oz.) mozzarella and provolone cheese blend

1 C. crumbled cooked bacon

1 t. seasoned salt

Tortilla chips

Preheat oven to 350. Spray a 9-by-13 baking dish with cooking spray. In a large skillet, melt butter over medium-high heat. Add corn; cook, stirring frequently, until corn is just tender, about five minutes. Stir in pepper, chiles and onion; cook until green onion begins to soften, two to three minutes. Reduce heat to low; stir in cream cheese until melted. Remove from heat. Stir in sour cream. cheese blend, bacon and seasoned salt. Spoon into prepared pan. Bake until hot and bubbly, about 25 minutes. Top with remaining 2 T. green onion. Let stand for 10 minutes; serve with chips.

Apricot Ginger Acorn Squash

I have told you many times that my favorite squash is acorn squash. Thanks to a great cooking friend who has a wonderful garden, I have had a few. She knows I like the smaller ones, so I get the "runts" from the crop. This tasty acorn squash has a little Asian flavoring with the soy sauce and ginger. Apricot and ginger go great together, so this is a good combination of all those flavors.

1 acorn squash

2 T. apricot preserves

11/2 t. reduced sodium soy sauce

11/2 t. ground ginger

1/4 t. pepper

Cut squash lengthwise in half; remove seeds. Place in a greased 11by-7 baking dish, cut side up. In a bowl, mix apricot preserves, butter, soy sauce, ginger and pepper. Spoon over squash. Bake at 350 covered for 45 minutes. Uncover and bake until tender, 15 to 20 minutes longer

Mediterranean Chicken

Try this recipe if you want another way to make chicken breasts. It features some Mediterranean favorites — tomatoes, artichokes and olives. Try this interesting take on plain chicken breasts.

¹/₄ C. flour

3/4 t. black pepper, divided

1/4 t. salt

2 lbs. boneless skinless chicken breasts, halved crosswise and flattened to 1/2 inch thickness

3 T. olive oil

1 can (15 oz.) chicken broth

1 can (14 oz.) quartered artichoke hearts, drained

1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce

can (4 oz.) sliced black olives

1 box (10 oz.) brown rice

1 t. lemon zest

1 t. fresh lemon juice

1 pkg. (12 oz.) frozen green beans, cooked according to package directions and drained

In a resealable plastic bag, combine flour, ½ t. pepper and salt. Add chicken; seal bag, and shake to coat. In a large skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add chicken; cook until browned, three to four minutes per side. Remove from skillet.

In the same skillet, stir together broth, artichoke hearts, tomato sauce and olives. Return chicken to skillet, and bring to a boil. Reduce heat, and simmer until slightly thickened and an instant-read thermometer inserted in thickest portion of chicken registers 165, about 20 minutes. Prepare rice according to matoes, cilantro and green onions.

Beef Quesadilla Casserole

These quesadillas are easy to make and tasty too. For those of you who think I have too many chicken recipes, this dish is for you. It is a colorful dish because of the red and vellow peppers and the green chiles. Remember if you aren't a cilantro lover, use fresh parsley.

2 lbs. ground beef

2 T. olive oil

1 large onion, thinly sliced

1 large red pepper, thinly sliced

1 large yellow pepper, thinly sliced

1 T. minced fresh garlic

1 can (28 oz.) crushed tomatoes

2 (4.5 oz.) cans chopped green

1 T. ground cumin

21/4 t. salt

2 t. chili powder

1 t. garlic powder

8 (8 inch) flour tortillas, divided

4 C. shredded sharp Cheddar cheese, divided

Halved grape tomatoes, fresh cilantro, chopped green onions

Preheat oven to 350. Spray a 9-by-13 baking dish with cooking spray. In a large skillet, cook beef over medium-high heat, stirring occasionally, until browned, about 10 minutes. Drain and transfer to a large bowl. In the same skillet, heat olive oil over medium-high heat. Add yellow onion, peppers and garlic. Cook, stirring frequently, until tender, eight to nine minutes. Remove from heat. Stir crushed tomatoes, chiles, cumin. salt, chili powder and garlic powder into beef.

Place four tortillas in bottom of prepared pan, overlapping as needed to fit. Top with half of onion mixture, half of beef mixture and 2 C. cheese. Repeat layers. Bake until hot and bubbly, about 30 minutes. Let stand for 10 minutes; serve with grape to-

This bar cookie is really easy to make and doesn't require many ingredients. The biggest challenge is finding the spice cake mix. I think carrot cake mix, spice cake mix and pumpkin are the new things in short supply. Maybe it is because so many of us are cooking at home more and trying new things.

1 pkg. Betty Crocker spice cake

1 tub (8 oz.) Cool Whip, thawed

1 C. deluxe salted mixed nuts, coarsely chopped

1 C. dried cranberries

2 oz. Baker's white chocolate, broken into small pieces

Preheat oven to 350. Line a 9-by-

13 pan with foil, leaving ends of foil hanging over sides of pan; spray with cooking spray. Beat cake mix, Cool Whip and egg in large bowl with mixer until blended. (Batter will be thick.) Stir in nuts and cranberries. Spread batter onto bottom of prepared pan. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean; cool completely. The leading cause of farm-related deaths in Illinois is tractor rollover accidents, which account for more than 30 percent of farm-related deaths. ROPS help protect farmers and family members from being crushed in the event of a tractor turnover or rollover.

Jo Daviess County Farm Bureau members who purchase a ROPS could receive a reimbursement of \$250. To receive the \$250, members would need to bring in their paid invoice to the Farm Bureau office in Elizabeth. Customers would be responsible for the cost, freight and installation.

If you have been thinking about putting a ROPS on one of your tractors, now is the time.

Go behind the cookbooks


Free Zoom lecture focuses on Betty Crocker

refrigerated one. The caramel takes apple pie to a whole new level. I like the mixing of the two kinds of apples

Pie crust for a two-crust pie

5 large Golden Delicious apples 3 large Granny Smith apples

2 T. fresh lemon juice

2 T. sugar, divided 3 T. cornstarch

1/4 t. cinnamon

1/8 t. grated nutmeg

Caramel

1 C. sugar

½ C. unsalted butter ½ C. heavy cream

1 t. vanilla

½ t. sea salt

Peel, core and slice apples onequarter-inch thick; transfer to large bowl and toss with lemon juice and 1 T. sugar. Let sit, tossing occasionally, at least 30 minutes and up to two

Prepare caramel in a small saucepan by cooking sugar and ¼ C. water on low, stirring occasionally, until dissolved, about six minutes. Add butter and slowly bring to a boil, then simmer, stirring occasionally, until deep golden brown, 15 to 25 minutes. Remove from heat and add cream (be careful because it will

make your own pie crust or use the bubble up.) Whisk in vanilla and sea salt. Set aside.

Preheat the oven to 400. Place bottom crust in a 9-inch pie plate, carefully fitting it in the plate. In a bowl, combine cornstarch, cinnamon, nutmeg and remaining 2 T. of sugar. Add to apples and toss to combine. Mound apples in prepared crust, packing in tightly along with any juices in the bowl. Spoon ½ C. caramel over the top. Save remaining for serving.

Lay top crust over filling. Trim edge of dough, leaving 1-inch overhang. Fold top crust under bottom crust to create thicker crust to seal; crimp as desired. Refrigerate 10 minutes. Place pie on baking sheet, brush with beaten egg and sprinkle with sugar and pinch of salt. Cut slits in top and bake until beginning to brown, 20 to 25 minutes. Reduce oven temp to 350 and bake until fruit is tender and crust is golden brown, 40 to 45 minutes more, covering with foil if crust becomes too dark. Transfer to wire rack and let cool at least 2.5 hours. Serve warm or at room temp with remaining caramel.

Final thoughts

Solomon said that while Hallow- Body scrub een is widely recognized as prime time for marketing pumpkins, the season often extends to the Thanksgiving and even Christmas holidays when they are used for decorations.

"I have gathered that there is a pretty good market for the smaller, more decorative gourd type ones,' he said.

So, let's look at some of the more unusual decorative uses for that big (or not so big) orange gourd.

First, a word about the benefits. Pumpkins are packed with antioxidants and disease-fighting vitamins. They owe their bright orange color to beta-carotene, a pro-vitamin that's converted to vitamin A in the body and is essential for eye health. Research suggests it might also help prevent heart disease.

One cup provides about three grams of fiber and 49 calories. Don't overlook the seeds, either: one ounce provides a strong dose of protein, magnesium, potassium and

Facial mask

Not in the habit of smearing orange squash across your face?

"Power to the pumpkin," celebrity esthetician Scott-Vincent Borba writes in his book, "Cooking Your Way to Gorgeous." "Pumpkin is excellent for skin clarity ... and works wonders on the skin." He's partial to an anti-aging and clarifying pumpkin-lettuce facial: Wash and dry some iceberg lettuce leaves, then place them in the freezer until they're ice cold. Slather condensed milk on your face, followed by canned pumpkin, and then press the lettuce leaves onto your face until it's covered. Leave it on for 15 to 30

Now that your face is glowing, share the love with the rest of your body. It's as easy as mixing leftover pumpkin puree with coconut milk and cinnamon. Or follow Borba's "Cooking Your Way to Gorgeous" advice and mix pumpkin and papaya with kaolin clay, smear it over your skin and leave until dry. Remove by flushing the skin with cold water.

Stuffed pumpkins

Yup, you can turn your pumpkin into a crock pot. Cut off the top, clear away the seeds and filling, and then bake the pumpkin for 20 or 30 minutes, or until the flesh is soft. Then stuff it - with a casserole, with soup, with sausage or cornbread. The Internet is loaded with recipes, and I suggest Google searching for "Savory Stuffed Pumpkin with Sausage and Gruyère."

Decorative vase

Your pumpkin can double as a vase. Cut off the top, carve out the center and then place a container filled with water inside - along with a bouquet of your favorite flowers. Or, try a floating pumpkin candle or pumpkin air freshener.

Bird feeder

Your pumpkin also can get a second life by being used as a bird feeder. To craft this natural feeder, scoop out the inside of a small to medium pumpkin. Poke small holes all around the outside of the pumpkin, fill it with birdseed and then use rope or twine to hang the feeder in your yard or even on a porch or balcony. The birds will enjoy a treat and you'll enjoy some bird watching.

When you're finally done using your pumpkins, extension officials remind you to compost the handy orange gourds instead of putting them

of regular voting by mail while adding audio navigation of the ballot for an independent voting experience."

Users of AVBM must apply for a regular mail ballot and then request an accessible vote-by-mail ballot from the county clerk's office by phone at 815-777-0161, email at elections@jodaviess.org or in person at 330 N. Bench St., Galena. Voters using AVBM will receive the standard secure return envelope that is sent to vote-by-mail applicants but will not receive a paper ballot.

Instead, they will receive a unique PIN and a link to access their ballot electronically from the Illinois State Board of Elections, which is administering the AVBM program.

After following audio directions to navigate and mark the ballot electronically, an AVBM voters prints the ballot and returns it to the election authority in the secure vote-by-mail

envelope.

"Accessible Vote By Mail gives blind and visually impaired voters the same secure and COVID-free voting method that already has been chosen by more than 1.5 million voters statewide," said Jordan Homer, the Illinois State Board of Elections' Americans with Disability Act coordinator. "While visually impaired voters still can cast a regular mail ballot with assistance if they wish, AVBM technology allows them to do so independently.

Vote-by-mail ballots are being mailed now. Although applications for mail ballots can be submitted through Oct. 29, voters are encouraged to apply now to allow sufficient time for delivery and return of ballots. Mail ballots must be postmarked no later than Nov. 3. Properly postmarked ballots that arrive through
