# **New CTE instructor shares** passion, knowledge

Professional photographer attended academy while in high school

Sometimes we are given the chance to not only recognize good, but also repay the good received.

Nicole Koester, the new graphic communications instructor at the Jo Daviess Carroll Career Technical Education Academy in Elizabeth, was given just that opportunity and she jumped at the chance.

"I was subbing at the CTE for about two years before the job opened up and I kind of fell in love with it," Koester said. "I had attended the CTE when I was a junior and senior at Stockton High School and I always thought if there would ever be an opportunity to give back to the community, the CTE would be the first place I would look."

Koester is the photographer/owner of Orange Anchor Photography of Galena and she holds a bachelor's degree in graphic design and interactive media from the University of Dubuque.

"While I was growing up I always had an interest in the arts, but there were always naysayers telling me I couldn't make a career as an artist or a photographer or anything in the creative field, so now my priority is pushing my students to understand they can absolutely succeed at doing what they love," Koester said. "As a result, my curriculum is kind of all over the board. Obviously, we work in the area of digital photography and that is definitely where my heart is as I do photography professionally.

"We also touch on the different Adobe programs, including Photoshop, InDesign and Illustrator. We do web design and typography and even enter the fine arts area with acrylics and watercolors.'

She said her course is focused on what her students are interested in

"I've traveled all over the world and graphic design," she said. "I want them to know

# County farm elections begin soon

**WEDNESDAY, OCT. 21, 2020** 

The presidential election might be dominating headlines, but another election is set to begin soon in Jo Daviess County.

The 2020 Farm Service Agency county committee elections begin Nov. 2, when ballots will be mailed to eligible voters. The deadline to return the ballots to local FSA offices, or to be postmarked, is Dec. 7.

The election is for FSA Local Administrative Area No. 3, which includes the townships of Berreman, Elizabeth, Hanover, Derinda, Pleasant Valley and Woodbine.

'This is the only remaining grassroots level representation at the local level by a federal agency," according to news release from Cory Cassens, Jo Daviess County FSA executive director. "The locally elected committees shoulder primary responsibility for making national farm programs fit the needs and situations faced by local farmers.

They bring local expertise and knowledge to USDA's daily delivery of programs and services.'

To be an eligible voter, farmers must participate or cooperate in a FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm, may also be eligible to vote, according to a USDA news

The not so skinny cook

We had the big freeze last weekend, so basically most of the flowers and gardens are done. If you were like me, you had most of it cleared away before the weather turned. What was nice about the way the frost came was that we had a few days to prepare for it.

The trees are losing leaves at a fast rate, but they were beautiful before the wind. I had a chance to go for a drive in Wisconsin two weeks ago, and the colors were beautiful. This fall weather was a nice thing considering all the other challenges we have faced and will continue to face. Recipes this week will continue to feature some of the fall vegetables

### **Tomato Juice Cocktail**

Ilene Lamm sent this great tomato cocktail that is easy to make and great to drink. I like to sprinkle celery seed on my tomato juice as well as a little pepper. If you have some of the not-so-nice looking tomatoes left, this would be a great way to use them up. Enjoy this tomato juice cocktail with a stalk of celery or a dill spear. Thanks, Ilene, for sharing this great drink recipe.

12 medium tomatoes

½ C. water

1 slice onion

3 sprigs fresh parsley

1 t. salt

1/4 t. paprika

1/4 t. sugar

In a pan over medium-high heat, oring the tomatoes and water to a

boil. Add onion, lettuce and parsley and simmer for one half hour. Strain mixture into a bowl. Add salt, paprika and sugar and stir to combine. Chill for at least two hours. Serve over ice or just plain. Garnish with celery stalk, dill spear or parsley.

# **Buttermilk Herb Corn** Muffins

I made some chili last weekend, and I love to eat it with corn bread. These corn muffins are really moist and make a great addition to any

5 T. oil, divided

1 C. plain yellow cornmeal

1 C. flour

1 T. sugar

1 T. chopped fresh sage or 1 t. dried sage

1 T. chopped fresh chives

2 t. baking powder

1 t. kosher salt

1/8 t. red pepper flakes

1 C. buttermilk

1 egg

Preheat oven to 425. Spoon ½ t. oil into each cup of a 12-cup muffin pan. Place pan in oven until oil is very hot, about five minutes. In a medium bowl, whisk together cornmeal, flour, sugar, sage, chives, baking powder, salt and red pepper. In a small bowl, whisk together buttermilk, egg and remaining 3 T. oil. Stir buttermilk mixture into cornmeal mixture until moistened. Spoon batter into hot muffin cups, filling about two-thirds full. Bake until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean, about 13 minutes; serve warm with butter

# **Bacon and Cider Brussels Sprouts**

Since Brussels sprouts continue to be the "in" vegetable, this recipe is a good one for people who have never had this vegetable or for those who tried them and were not impressed. These Brussels sprouts are tender and flavorful. Try these, and you might like them.

5 slices good bacon, chopped

4 T. unsalted butter, cut into pieces and divided

3 T. olive oil

21/2 lbs. Brussels sprouts, trimmed and halved

2 t. kosher salt, divided

2 t. pepper, divided ½ C. chicken broth

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. apple cider vinegar

½ C. chopped toasted pecans

In a 12-inch cast-iron skillet, cook bacon over medium heat until crisp, about 10 minutes. Remove bacon and let drain on paper towels; pour

In the same skillet, melt 2 T. butter with oil over medium-high heat. Add half of Brussels sprouts, cut side down; cook, without stirring for two minutes. Stir in 1 t. salt and 1 t. pepper; cook for two minutes. Remove from skillet. Repeat procedure with remaining 2 T. butter, remaining Brussels sprouts, remaining 1 t. salt and remaining teaspoon of pepper. Return all Brussels sprouts to skillet. Add broth and vinegar, partially cover and cook until tender, about three minutes. Top with bacon and pecans and serve immediately.

## Chicken and Dressing Casserole

The weather is getting colder, and our food is getting heartier. This casserole fills the bill for a great week night's supper. It has meat, vegetables and starch in one dish. I think you could substitute turkey for the chicken if you wanted to.

2 T. unsalted butter

11/2 C. frozen vegetable seasoning blend, thawed

½ C. thinly sliced onion, chopped

1/4 C. flour

2½ C. chicken broth

1 t. salt

1 t. poultry seasoning

1 t. chopped fresh thyme

½ t. pepper

6 C. 2-inch-cubed cornbread

3 C., shredded cooked chicken

1 lb. fresh asparagus, blanched and cut into 2-inch pieces

2 large eggs, lightly beaten

Preheat oven to 375. Spray a 2½ qt. baking dish with cooking spray. In a large deep skillet, melt butter over medium-high heat. Add seasoning blend and onion; cook, stirring occasionally, until most of the liquid is

evaporated and vegetables are lightly browned, about five minutes. Sprinkle with flour; whisk in broth, salt, poultry seasoning, thyme and pepper. Bring to a boil, whisking frequently. Reduce heat to medium-low; simmer, whisking frequently, until thickened, about two minutes. Remove from heat: let cool for 10 minutes.

In a large bowl, stir together cornbread, chicken, asparagus, eggs and vegetable mixture until well combined. Spoon mixture into prepared pan, and cover with foil. Bake for 25 minutes. Uncover and bake until center is set and casserole is heated through, about 15 minutes more. Garnish with fresh chopped parsley.

# **Cheesy Turkey Sausage Stuffed Peppers**

I have had a great response from people about the stuffed pepper recipes in the column. I hope you are ready for one more. This one uses ground turkey sausage. I think you can substitute regular sausage if you wanted to. This one also has barley instead of rice for an interesting taste. If you don't have ricotta, you can substitute cottage cheese because both are creamy.

4 large bell peppers, halved lengthwise and seeded

3 T. olive oil, divided

1/3 t. kosher salt

1 lb. ground turkey sausage

2 C. marinara sauce

2 C. pearl barley, cooked according to pkg. directions

2/3 C. ricotta cheese or cottage cheese

2 T. chopped fresh basil

1 C. finely shredded mozzarella

Preheat oven to 400. In a 9-by-13 casserole dish sprayed with cooking spray, place bell pepper halves cut side up. Drizzle with 1 T. oil and sprinkle with salt. Bake for 12 min-

In a large skillet, heat remaining 2 T. oil over medium-high heat. Add sausage and cook until lightly browned, five to six minutes. Stir in marinara sauce; remove from heat. Fold in barley, ricotta and basil. Divide mixture among peppers. Top with mozzarella. Bake until peppers are tender, about 15 minutes. Let stand for five minutes before serving. Garnish with chopped fresh parsley.

# **Green Tomato Crisp**

If you cleaned off the garden and saved some of the green tomatoes, you could make this recipe that is quite different than regular green tomatoes. This is a dessert crisp using

green tomatoes. Enjoy this different way of using us those green tomatoes.

1 C. sugar, divided

½ C. flour

½ C. firmly packed light brown sugar

½ C. old-fashioned oats

21/2 t. apple pie spice, divided

1 t. kosher salt

6 T. cold unsalted butter, cubed

2 T. cornstarch

21/2 lbs. green tomatoes, cut into 1-inch pieces, seeded

2 T. fresh orange juice

In a small bowl, stir together ½ C. sugar, flour, brown sugar, oats, 1/2 t. pie spice and salt. Using a fork, cut in cold butter until mixture is crumbly. Squeeze mixture into clumps; refrig-

In a small bowl, whisk together cornstarch, remaining 1/2 C. sugar and remaining 2 t. pie spice. In a 9-by-13 baking dish, stir together tomatoes, orange juice and sugar mixture until well combined. Let stand at room temperature, stirring occasionally, for one hour.

Preheat oven to 350. Sprinkle oat mixture onto tomato mixture. Bake until top is golden brown and filling is bubbly, 35 to 40 minutes. Let cool on wire rack for at least 30 minutes. Serve with ice cream.

# Fresh Pumpkin Pie

When I mentioned my pumpkin predicament, Barb Wire was one of the first to contact me and talk about making pumpkin pie filling from pie pumpkins. She shared her experience which is all good and gave us all a great way to use the bountiful pie pumpkins that are around this year. Remember, using pie pumpkins works best. Barb also sent a way to make a calorie-friendly pumpkin pie. Thanks, Barb, for your contributions to cooking in northwestern Illinois.

Pumpkin Puree Wash the pumpkin, cut it in half,

scoop out the seeds (you can toast the seeds and eat them) and slice the pumpkin into wedges. Cut off the rind. Place all pieces (cut up wedges into 1 inch pieces) into a pan with a small amount of water. Bring to a boil and let it cook for about 15 minutes. Turn down the heat unit and continue to cook for about 10 to .15 minutes. Check the pumpkin to see if it is soft and then using a meat tenderizer stomp the pumpkin into mush or you can use a whisk to smooth out the lumps. Let cool and store. This is homemade Libby's pumpkin puree.







In the meantime, the doctors urge people to protect themselves and their loved ones from influenza by getting a flu shot. Taking care of one's general health and avoiding illnesses like colds and flu can help to keep the immune system strong and better prepared to fight off viruses like COVID-19, according to an FHN news release.

Following the now-familiar precautions against the spread of COVID-19 are still important, and will remain so until a vaccine is widely available, Gridley said. "Keep washing your hands, wearing masks and staying away from large gatherings, and keeping high-touch surfaces wiped down to help keep your family safe," Gridley said.

# What to know about the graduated tax amendment

A look at the amendment language, proposed rates, and arguments for and against

One of the major questions Illinois voters will answer on Nov. 3 will be on the ballot statewide — whether to amend the state's constitution to allow for a graduated rate income tax.

Strictly speaking, the amendment removes a provision from the Illinois Constitution that requires any income tax to be levied at a flat rate on any level of income — the current rate is 4.95 percent. Passage of the amendment would allow lawmakers to apply different tax rates on varying levels of income. Of the 42 states that have an income tax, 32 and Washington, D.C., have a graduated rate structure, while Illinois is one of nine that impose a flat tax.

While the amendment itself does not set any tax rates, legislation already passed by lawmakers and signed by the governor would take effect in January if the amendment passes. The rates created by that legislation would apply to six tax brackets, ranging from 4.75 percent on income up to \$10,000 to 7.99 percent on all income for individual filers making more than \$750,000.

Here's a look the amendment, the accompanying rate legislation, some of the arguments being made and who is funding the advertising campaigns for and against it.

## The amendment

Specifically, Article 9, Section 3 of the Illinois Constitution would be amended if the ballot question passes. The new language would read:

"The General Assembly shall provide by law for the rate or rates of any tax on or measured by income imposed by the State. In any such tax imposed upon corporations the highest rate shall not exceed the highest rate imposed on individuals by more than a ratio of 8 to 5.

That would replace the current language, which states:

"A tax on or measured by income shall be at a non-graduated rate. At any one time there may be no more than one such tax imposed by the State for State purposes on individuals and one such tax so imposed on corporations. In any such tax imposed upon corporations the rate shall not exceed the rate imposed on individuals by more than a ratio of 8

On the ballot, voters will see the question worded as follows:

"The proposed amendment grants the State authority to impose higher income tax rates on higher income levels, which is how the federal government and a majority of other states do it. The amendment would remove the portion of the Revenue Article of the Illinois Constitution that is sometimes referred to as the 'flat tax,' that requires all taxes on income to be at the same rate. The amendment does not itself change tax rates. It gives the State the ability to impose higher tax rates on those with higher income levels and lower income tax rates on those with middle or lower income levels. You are

motivation for a student."

influenced her career choices.

"If we're going to talk locally I have to say Bill Delp," Koester said. "He was 'The Man' for photography back in the day when I was in high school. I was always interested in heading down to Manny's and seeing the photo displays he had there in the restaurant.

"I was also influenced by colleagues that I met along the way. I lived in Seattle for three years and did a mentorship under Jordan Zoph, who is a pretty significant photographer in the Northwest. He is younger than me, but he is a phenomenal artist. A lot of the people that have influenced me are folks I worked with along the way that inspired me with their artwork and the way they chose to run their businesses.

Koester spoke briefly about the tools she feels are necessary for students to succeed.

"In my curriculum the Adobe programs are a must-have and all of my students actually have their own Adobe IDs, so they are able to utilize those programs not only in the classroom, but at home as well," Koester said. "A DSL camera is another thing that is definitely important for my classroom. I have run into a little bit of a problem with those students that are fully remote and don't ever come into our actual classroom, so I have to kind of tweak things to do cell phone photography, which is not optimum, but these are difficult times and we do what we have to do.

She said she is keeping an eye to the future.

"I would hope to keep on keeping She said other photographers have on as I am right now and also continue teaching my craft to the students at the CTE," Koester said. "This is my first year there, but it is one of the most rewarding things I've ever done in my life. I feel at home at the CTE and I love being able to give back to the community.

"Community over competition is one of my mottos. Obviously, the market is oversaturated with photographers, but when people come to me with questions I share immediately to help them out. I would love to see my students pursue photography if that's what they want to do. I'm always an open book and I feel like knowledge should be universal. I'm totally OK with sharing with the world."

# Farmers stressed as virus outbreak drags on and on

Technology troubles, mental health issues complicate operations

By Mary Hookham CORRESPONDENT

Many farmers believe in being eternal optimists. Technology woes, mental health issues and fluctuating commodity prices have optimists feeling saddened this year. But farmers are looking to the future for hope, better prices and fewer sources of stress

"We have to remember that farmers and agribusinesses are no different than any other business with people and families concerned over the virus itself," said Ben Huber, certified crop adviser with Insight FS of Monroe, Wisconsin.

Technological difficulties have been central to the struggles of farmers during this year's coronavirus outbreak. Even though the lack of high-speed internet service is an ongoing issue for farmers, it has been highlighted this year.

"Many farms do not have access to the internet speed or the technology to effectively communicate electronically through services like Teams or Zoom," Huber said. Mental health concerns also have been heightened by the virus outbreak. Jeff Ditzenberger of Argyle, Wisconsin, operates a mental health non-profit called TUGS (Talking, Understanding, Growing, Supporting). He said the virus is in farmers' faces every day all day and it's beginning to wear on them.

"There's no escape from the virus and its effects," he said. "It's what consumes everything that's going on these days and it's a lot to handle."

Farmers always have had to deal with pressure from consumers to do better on their farms, treat their animals well, produce products that are safe and healthy to eat and help educate the public. That pressure results in anger, hatred and animosity.

"Then you compound all that with the debate over wearing a mask, and how you're a jerk if you don't wear a mask and you're a hero if you do," Ditzenberger said. "I remind people that we're all humans at the end of the day. Nobody wants to die or give

asked to decide whether the proposed amendment should become a part of the Illinois Constitution."

They'll be able to vote "yes" or 'no," and the amendment has two paths to passage. If it receives 60 percent of the vote from those voting on the question, it passes. But if it fails to reach the 60 percent threshold for those voting on the question but still musters "yes" votes from more than half of those voting in the election, it would still pass.

#### The rate structure

The proposal to put the amendment question on the ballot was approved with support from only Democrats, as was Senate Bill 687, the accompanying legislation to set graduated rates beginning in January 2021, should the amendment pass. Again, the current rate is 4.95 percent on any taxable income.

The new rate structure would create six tax brackets, with rates applying to margins of taxable income instead of every penny of an earner's income, except for those in the top bracket. The rates would be:

- 4.75 percent on single or joint filers' first \$10,000 of taxable income
- 4.9 percent on single or joint filers' income from over \$10,000 to
- 4.95 percent on single or joint filers' income from over \$100,000 to
- 7.75 percent on a single filer's income from over \$250,000 to \$350,000 and joint filers' from over \$250,000 to \$500,000
  - 7.85 percent on a single fil-

er's income from over \$350,000 to bers in the General Assembly and \$750,000 and joint filers' from over \$350,000 to \$1 million

• Once a single filer exceeds \$750,000 or joint filers exceed \$1 million, the top rate of 7.99 percent will apply at a flat rate to every penny of income. For all other earners, the previous brackets apply.

Those rates effectively mean anyone earning \$250,000 or less will pay the same or lower income tax rates under the graduated structure, while those earning above that amount would pay higher rates.

The measure also raises the corporate tax rate to 7.99 percent from percent and does not change the corporate property replacement tax of 1.5 to 2.5 percent which already exists in current law.

It also raises the property tax credit from 5 percent to 6 percent, and creates a \$100 per-child tax credit for joint filers earning less than \$60,000 annually and single filers earning less than \$40,000 annually. The tax credit would decrease by \$5 per child for every \$2,000 of income a filer has above those amounts.

In estimates released before the COVID-19 pandemic, the governor's office said the graduated tax is expected to bring in about \$1.2 billion for the current fiscal year as it would be in place for only part of it, and \$3.4 billion once it is in place for

Neither the amendment nor the accompanying legislation would change the level of authority lawmakers have to raise tax rates. A simple majority vote from both chama signature from the governor is all that is needed to raise rates currently. and that would remain the case with the passage of the amendment.

#### The fiscal picture

For proponents of the measure, the amendment and the rates approved are all about raising more revenue without increasing rates on middle-income earners or making drastic budget cuts to state services, education and public safety.

Pritzker frequently notes he inherited a government "hollowed out" by budget cuts from previous administrations and a two-year state budget impasse during which the state spent roughly \$5 billion more than it took in each year, driving a backlog of unpaid bills up to \$16 billion.

Pritzker has estimated the budget shortfall for the current fiscal year at \$6.2 billion, as the COVID-19 pandemic has blown a hole in state finances. Without the graduated tax, which would be in effect for only half of the fiscal year, the shortfall could reach \$7.4 billion, he said in

To fill that gap, the governor has left open the option of borrowing billions from the federal government and has lobbied for greater aid to states in another federal stimulus

But even before the pandemic, Pritzker pegged Illinois' structural, year-after-year budget deficit at \$3.2 billion, and he has framed the graduated tax debate as a choice between 15 percent across-the-board cuts to state government, a 20 percent flat tax hike or passage of the graduated

On Sept. 24, Lt. Gov. Juliana Stratton said lawmakers "will be forced to consider raising income taxes on all Illinois residents by at least 20 percent, regardless of their level of income" if the graduated income tax fails. That would push the current tax rate to about 6 percent, and would require a simple majority vote in a Legislature dominated by Democrats with or without the passage of the amendment.

But opponents argue that without spending reforms, particularly to unfunded state pension obligations which exceed \$137 billion, voters should not consider sending the state more revenue. They also note both graduated tax measures are devoid of any meaningful immediate property tax reforms. Property taxes are levied and collected locally, not by the state, and they fund such things as schools, local governments, fire departments and libraries.

Those in favor of the amendment argue the added revenue could make it easier to fully fund the evidence-based funding formula for K-12 schools, which — years down the line, they say — could alleviate property tax pressures by shifting funding responsibility from local taxes to the state.

But opponents are skeptical of what the added revenues would be used for, as the amendment and accompanying legislation contain no guarantees and the state's pension burden continues to increase.

Opponents also point out that Illinois' combined total tax burden -including state and local sales taxes, income taxes, property taxes and others — is the highest in the country, according to the personal finance website Wallethub. The graduated tax would only add to that, they say, claiming that it might drive high-earning residents from the state. Pritzker has said it is middle-income earners who have thus far been more likely to leave the state because, he says, the tax burden is "unfairly" distributed.

Proponents of the amendment, including Pritzker, cite a breakdown which shows the bottom 20 percent of Illinois earners pay 14.4 percent of their total income to state and local taxes, while the top 1 percent of earners pay 7.4 percent of their income

in taxes. That's according to a report by the left-leaning Washington D.C.based Institute on Taxation and Economic Policy.

#### Other arguments

Opposition, led in large part by the Illinois Chamber of Commerce, has centered on what the tax would do to businesses and what lawmakers might do in the future if voters give them the opportunity to levy taxes on portions of the electorate at any one time, rather than on every taxpayer at

They also point out the added revenues would not cover state budget deficits amid the pandemic and would require further tax hikes in the future, which could mean adjusting the brackets to raise rates on middle-income earners.

The idea, according to much of the advertising against the amendment, is that giving Springfield politicians the authority to raise taxes on just a small group of taxpayers at any one time makes it easier politically to raise taxes, even though the simple majority vote threshold remains unchanged.

Opposition groups also point to June comments from Treasurer Michael Frerichs, a Democrat who has no role in setting tax rates, who said it was "worth a discussion" to consider taxing retirement income on certain brackets.

While the graduated tax would make it possible to implement taxes on high-earning retirees without taxing all retirees, Pritzker has said he and Democrats in the General Assembly oppose taxing any retirement income, and the idea remains widely unpopular in Illinois.

AARP held a news conference earlier this month noting added revenue from the graduated tax could make lawmakers less likely to tax retirement income in order to fill budget gaps. But opponents continue to point to Frerichs' comments, although the treasurer has since said he does not support a retirement tax.

While those against the measure say the increase to the corporate tax rate will hit job creators hard at a time when the pandemic is already making it difficult, proponents note that businesses structured as passthrough entities - such as S corporations, sole proprietors and others who claim business income on personal taxes – will see taxes decrease if they earn less than \$250,000 annually in taxable income.

Opponents also take issue with the amendment's removal of language which states "there may be no more than one such tax imposed by the State for State purposes on individuals and one such tax so imposed on corporations," claiming the removal of the language allows for tax bills such as "education surcharges" or other such fees on top of the regular

Those in favor of the bill, however, say the prohibition on levying multiple income taxes was simply a companion to the requirement for a single flat tax rate.

# Census count cut off as Illinois officials worry over response rate

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled the Trump administration could shorten the U.S. Census count on Oct. 13, just hours after the Illinois government committed an additional \$1 million to

The Trump administration originally tried to shorten the end date of the census to Sept. 30, but federal courts mandated the administration keep the count going until Oct. 31, the extended deadline originally set by the federal government in response to the coronavirus pandemic. However, following the 7-1 SCOTUS ruling, the U.S. Census Bureau announced it was ending the count at 5 a.m. Oct. 16 in Illinois.

The Census Bureau accepted phone responses and paper forms postmarked by Oct. 15.

Gov. JB Pritzker tweeted about the ruling shortly after its announcement, calling the decision "wrong" and saying it could lead to "an undercount in communities that can least afford it, perpetuating generations of disinvestment that make our nation weaker."

Enumeration, or the total rate of households being counted in the census, is currently at 99.9 percent for the U.S. and Illinois, according to the Census Bureau. However, census outreach advocates say that the self-response is a more reliable measure for an accurate

"It's not an exact science," said Anita Banerji, director of the Democracy Initiative at Forefront, which conducts census outreach in Illinois.

According to Banerji, multiple factors and situations can affect enumera-

tion tallies conducted by census agents. People living in nursing homes, college campuses and prisons can skew totals. The coronavirus has displaced families and killed thousands in Illinois over the course of the census count.

'Getting to that 99 percent when you think about all the different challenges we've had, it's not an exact number,' Banerji said. "So for all intents and purposes, we as advocates focus on the self-response number because we know that to be more of a tried and true num-

Illinois' self-response rate sat at 71.2 percent as of Oct. 13, the seventh highest in the nation, and the state is the most populous in the top 10 for self-response. In 2010, the state's self-response rate was 70.5 percent.

In a release distributed before the SCOTUS ruling, the Pritzker administration announced it had spent an additional \$1 million through the Illinois Department of Human Services for "census-related media outreach in communities of color across the state" to encourage more households to fill out self-response forms for the census.

According to that release, "many underserved and marginalized neighborhoods and cities are hovering between a 40-50 percent participation rate," which puts hundreds of millions of federal dollars at stake over the next 10 years. Funds that could go toward programs to assist those traditionally underserved and marginalized communities in Illinois that aren't getting counted.

somebody else a disease or be more people are willing and able called a murderer.'

He said it's important to be available to family, friends and neighbors when those people are going through a crisis or simply need a listening ear. Most people just want to hear that everything will be all right, and that's what the agricultural world wants to hear most right now he said.

"Hope is a pretty important, powerful thing, and man ... we need a

lot of it right now," he said.

Ditzenberger said he is thankful

to discuss their mental health issues. When so many factors play into mental well-being for farmers, it's tough to work through all those issues while also operating a farm and keeping up with family.

"I think the bright spot in all this is that we are finally getting about 2 percent of the population to talk about mental health," he said. "Previously it was 1 percent, and to me, that's really important.'

He suggests people simply be kind to each other. This year, he recommends people be more accepting and understanding of people with different views on hot-button issues such as wearing masks, politics and racial justice issues.

"If you want to make a difference, be the difference," he said. "Sometimes in order to be the difference, all you need to do is be

#### An eye on prices

Commodity prices have experienced extremes this year as a result of the virus outbreak. Although they're rebounding some over the last few weeks, farmers have struggled with the unknown of what's happening next and how to cope with the fallout of the price swings.

"Markets often fall as fast or faster than they rise," Huber said. "The price uncertainty and volatility is a real challenge in ag in any year, but the pandemic really threw commodities into a tailspin. It's very difficult to run any business when your gross revenue level can fluctuate like that."

Mike Wenger, dairy and crop farmer south of Brodhead, Wisconsin, said late in 2019, farmers were excited for a good year ahead because of higher prices. But when the virus outbreak happened, the good prices fell.

"The bank always wants to know a farm's cash flow for the upcoming year but they won't tell us their

best guess on a milk price," he said. "If we estimate too low, the farm doesn't cash flow and if we estimate too high, it looks good but is unrealistic. This happens every year but was certainly more extreme this year."

Like many farmers, Wenger is grateful for the coronavirus relief programs from the federal government but said he does not want to rely on financial aid from the government. He believes each year will be different; perhaps next year, there won't be any aid at all, he

Brodhead-area cash crop farmer Roger Markham has been monitoring the Chicago Board of Trade daily since 1973. As a former hog farmer and current crop farmer, he puts stock in knowing and understanding the value of the markets.

"If you're not doing a good job with your marketing plan, you're forced to think about how much that sucks for you," Markham said.

The virus outbreak gave farmers opportunities to make money in the market because when people were forced to stay home, the markets fell, he said. Farmers could sell sooner than planned and pick up some extra money per bushel on commodities like corn, beans and

"Back when I started farming in 1958, my dad said in order to be successful, I had to remember two things: family and I sell whatever I raise, and if I do a good job selling, I'll be a successful farmer," he said.

Huber said farmers are always working to be better at managing price risk. But many of those helpful management tools can be expensive or limiting.

"In the future, I see farmers with the ability to manage market risk, being the people able to better withstand the volatility in the market," he said. "How that risk is managed will be different in almost every operation."
