# Timpe signs letter of intent for Central Michigan

# Dedication pays off for Stockton basketball star

Back in April, Stockton basketball standout Tiana Timpe made a decision that would spark the beginning of a new chapter in her basketball career. Just over seven months ago, Timpe made her verbal announcement to play basketball for the Central Michigan University Chippewas. She took that one step further Nov. 11, when she put pen to paper, inking her letter of intent to make CMU her future home and turning her into Stockton's first ever Division 1 girls basketball player.

The senior had multiple options on where to take her career to the next level, but Timpe and her family felt that CMU was the perfect fit for her.

"We knew it was the right place when we were driving up for a visit and we saw Blackhawk Road; Highway 20 goes right into Mount Pleasant, maroon and gold colors, and the mascot is a Native American," said Timpe's father and coach, Tim Timpe. "So, it just seemed like a good fit, right?"

He went on to explain why he believes his daughter will also be a tremendous fit for the Chippewas' roster and play style, saying, "It's a team that shoots a lot of threes, which all of you know, that's what Tiana likes to do.

"They run and gun, and shoot threes, it was a really good fit. Great coaches, great people that are there. We're really happy with her decision and I know she is too."

The Chippewas have been quite successful themselves. CMU has a five-year streak of 20-win seasons. Timpe will be in a position where she can come in and be a part of an already winning program, with eyes on being one of the best in the nation.

With success, however, comes lots of dedication and sacrifice. Both Timpe and her parents acknowledged the sacrifices they had made for each other in order to make this all possible.

"I want to thank my parents," Timpe said. "They deserve this as much as I do. It takes a lot of dedication from a kid, but it also takes a lot of dedication from the parents.

"If it wasn't for them, I wouldn't be signing this piece of paper."

Tim Timpe shared some emotional words when discussing his daughter's hard work, saying, "The countless hours she has put into this and the sacrifices she has made — her summers. The last six summers, she hasn't had any.

"Going to basketball tournaments, coming in the gym and shooting a lot, driving two and a half hours just to practice with her AAU team two nights a week, she has sacrificed a lot in her high school career to get to this point. It's paid off with a full ride scholarship from Central Michigan."

Jackie Timpe, Tiana's mother, added "As Tiana said, it's taken hours of driving to AAU, we have been across the United States for AAU. The dedication in the gym, not only my daughter but my husband, and it means the world to us."

The Timpe family recognizes that hard work pays off.

"I'm very excited," Timpe said.
"I've worked very hard for this and put a lot of time into this and now that it is all coming to an end it being worth it, just makes me feel so much better."

Timpe explained that Division 1 basketball has always been her dream.

"It makes me feel that dreams really do come true as long as you work hard," she said. "You hear that a lot, as long as you work hard your dreams will come true, but they actually do."

"We knew it's always been her dream to play Division 1," Tim Timpe said. "Ever since she was in fifth grade, she's been wanting to do it, and she has accomplished that here today. I couldn't be more proud of her."

Timpe and her father have shared

# Extension highlights need for radon testing

Northwest Illinois considered at higher risk for harmful gas

The University of Illinois -Extension is working to educate people on the high radon levels found in northwestern Illinois communities with a Nov. 30 Zoom program. "Radon: Why is it Still an Issue?" is set for 6 p.m. Nov. 30.

According to Stanley Solomon Jr., the extension educator for environmental and energy stewardship,

radon is an indoor pollutant. It has no color or odor and results from the decay of radium and uranium.

Still, radon is not a harmless natural gas; it plays a major role in causing lung cancer in nonsmokers and is the second leading cause for the disease behind smoking itself.

"It all goes back to the underground uranium

# Largest farms benefit from new congressional mandate

Who deserves farm payments? Farm payments should be reserved for family farms facing difficult times, but the government and tax-payers should not support checks without limit to the largest operations.

While enacting limits on farm payments, Congress and the U.S. Department of Agriculture have failed to close loopholes that enable the largest farms to maneuver around them.

Most farm payment programs are subject to a maximum payment, and generally farms with an adjusted gross income of more than \$900,000 are ineligible.

But under USDA rules, many farms can claim multiple maximum payments for several individual family members involved in the operation.

Congress loosened restrictions in several ways in the 2018 farm bill, and the USDA recently released a rule codifying these changes.

The Center for Rural Affairs opposes these changes and urges Congress to act to rectify them.

One change expands the number of family members who can claim farm payments. Previously, direct

family members, such as parents, children and spouses involved in the operation could each claim a payment. Now, nephews, nieces and cousins can claim payments. While most family farms don't pursue payments for multiple family members, the few who do can now bring in millions of taxpayer dollars.

Another change is the removal of the payment limitation of \$125,000 from marketing assistance loans. Farmers can use excess commodity on hand as collateral to receive these types of loans when prices are low. And, when prices increase, they sell and pay off the loan.

The farm bill removed similar payment caps from other farm payment programs, such as loan deficiency payments and marketing loan gains. Other support programs lost their payment caps as well.

The not so skinny cook

We went from the frying pan into the fire. One day it was in the 80s, and the next night we are down to the 20s wind chill. The weather people said it was coming, and it is November. This week's recipes continue with some tummy warmers, some great sides and two decadent holiday desserts. Enjoy cooking and eating this week. Using the oven is a great way to warm up the house!

#### Autumn Apple Fruit Salad

I am used to eating apple salad with apples, celery and chopped pecans with a mayo dressing. This apple salad has a lot of fruit in it; the fall part of the salad would be the cranberries, but the use of grapes and oranges makes it extra tasty. You could also use one-half chopped apples and one-half chopped pears. Enjoy this fall salad with pork dishes.

3 large Gala apples, chopped

2 t. lemon juice

2 C. red grapes, halved

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. chopped pecans

½ C. dried cranberries

1 can (16 oz.) mandarin oranges, drained well

1 C. vanilla Greek yogurt

3 T. mayonnaise

½ C. brown sugar, packed

1 t. cinnamon.

In a large bowl, combine apples and lemon juice. Toss to coat well. Add grapes, pecans, cranberries and oranges and toss to combine.

In a medium bowl, whisk together yogurt, mayo, brown sugar and cinnamon; pour over fruit. Stir gently and refrigerate for an hour before

½ C. cherry tomatoes 2 T. olive oil, divided

Salt and pepper to taste

2 sliced green onions, white parts tender, 30 to 45 minutes.

1 minced garlic clove

2 T. flour

2/3 C. milk

½ t. Dijon mustard

½ t. salt

Pinch of cavenne

1/3 C. shredded cheddar

1 lb. zucchini seeded and cut into match stick pieces

4 slices bacon, cooked and crum-

Toss cherry tomatoes with olive oil, salt and pepper. Roast on a preheated baking sheet at 425 until softened, about 10 minutes. Set aside. Meanwhile, melt butter in a skillet over medium heat. Add green onions and garlic and cook for one minute. Add flour and stir for 30 seconds. Add the milk, mustard, salt and cayenne and whisk until thickened, about two minutes. Off the heat, whisk in the cheddar cheese and set aside. Sauté the zucchini in olive oil over medium-high heat until softened, two to three minutes. Season with salt and pepper. Add to the cheese sauce and cook, tossing until coated. Top with the tomatoes and cooked bacon. For additional garnish chop some green onions and sprinkle across dish.

### **Vegetable Beef Soup with** Cabbage

When the weather decided to kick us into November, soup sounded really good. This soup is easy and fast. A.J.'s Meat Market has great beef stew meat. Sometimes I leave out the potatoes and just have the other vegetables and cabbage. If you aren't a cabbage lover, you can omit the cabbage too. As I have said before, I always use the broth with less sodium so that I can season it myself.

1½ lbs. beef stew meat, cut into 1-inch pieces

1 cube beef bouillon

2 C. beef broth

1 onion, chopped finely

1/4 t. pepper

1 bay leaf

2 potatoes, peeled and cubed

2 celery ribs, sliced

1 large carrot, sliced

4 C. cabbage

1 (8 oz.) can tomato sauce

Salt to taste

Cook and stir stew meat in large saucepan over medium heat until browned on all sides. Drain any excess grease. Stir beef bouillon into beef broth in a bowl until dissolved; pour over stew meat. Add onion, pepper and bay leaf; cover and simmer until stew meat is very tender. Add

potatoes, cabbage, celery and carrot; cover and simmer until potatoes are

Stir tomato sauce and salt into stew; simmer, uncovered until tomato sauce is fully incorporated and flavors have blended, 15 to 20 minutes.

#### **Kielbasa and Cabbage**

Sausage and cabbage are a great fall favorite. Since we are continuing with the cabbage theme from the soup in the recipe above, this cabbage pairs with Kielbasa sausage. Kielbasa is a type of smoked sausage, usually only lightly smoked. It is highly flavorful in its own right, and especially so when mixed with a variety of dishes. For instance, people who prefer milder flavors like to use it in sausage dishes. It is also commonly served in combination with sauerkraut. Enjoy this easy fall dish.

6 slices bacon

1 C. chopped onion

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. water

1 T. sugar

1 T. caraway seeds

2 t. minced garlic

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> t. crushed red pepper

1/4 t. seasoning salt

1 to 11/2 lb. cabbage, cored and cut into 6 wedges

1 pkg. (14 oz.) Polish kielbasa, cut into ½-inch slices

Cook bacon in a very large skillet over medium heat, turning once until crisp. Transfer to paper towels, reserving drippings in skillet. Crumble the bacon when cool. Stir in onion, water, sugar, caraway seeds, garlic, crushed red pepper and seasoning salt into drippings in skillet. Add cabbage; cook, covered, stirring occasionally, over medium heat for 10 minutes. Arrange kielbasa over cabbage in skillet; continue cooking, covered, until cabbage is tender and sausage is heated through, about 10 minutes more. Sprinkle with crumbled bacon to serve.

### Pumpkin Spice Cake

I have made pumpkin bars for years, and I have always wondered if you could make the bars in a cake pan. I finally found a recipe that did just that. There are some differences in the cake and my bar recipe. I use cinnamon and pie spice and a lot less powdered sugar for the frosting. Try making this cake for any place you need a cake.

1 C. unsalted butter, softened

2 C. sugar

4 large eggs 1 can (15 oz.) pumpkin

1 t. vanilla 3½ C. flour

2 t. baking soda

2 t. pumpkin pie spice

1 t. baking powder

1 t. salt

½ C. chopped pecans

Frosting:

1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened

½ C. butter, softened

2 t. vanilla ½ t. salt

6 C. powdered sugar

Garnish: chopped pecans and pumpkin pie spice


Preheat oven to 350. Spray a 9-by-13 pan with baking spray with flour.

Cake: In a large bowl, beat butter and sugar with a mixer at medium speed until fluffy, three to four minutes, stopping to scrape sides of bowl. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in pumpkin and vanilla.

In another large bowl, whisk together flour, baking soda, pie spice, baking powder, and salt. With mixer on low speed, gradually add flour mixture to butter mixture, beating

# **USDA** forecasts increased corn, soybean production in state

Corn production in Illinois is cent from 2019. forecasted to be up 18 percent this year from 2019, and soybean production is expected to be up 12 percent, according to the Illinois Crop Production report released recently by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service.

According to the report:

• Corn: The planted area is estimated at 11.4 million acres, up 9 percent from last year. Harvested area, forecast at 11.2 million acres, is up 10 percent from 2019.

Based on Nov. 1 conditions, the Illinois corn yield is forecast at 195 bushels per acre, down five bushels from last month but up 14 bushels from 2019. Production is forecast at 2.18 billion bushels, up 18 percent from last year's production.

• Soybeans: The planted area is estimated at 10.3 million acres, up 4 percent from last year. Harvested area, forecast at 10.25 million acres, is up 4 percent from 2019.

Based on Nov. 1 conditions, the Illinois soybean yield is forecast at 58 bushels per acre, up four bushels from 2019. Production is forecast at 595 million bushels, up 12 per-

Nationally, corn production for grain is forecast at 14.5 billion bushels, down 1 percent from the previous forecast but up 7 percent from 2019. Based on conditions as of Nov. 1, yields are expected to average 175.8 bushels per harvested acre, down 2.6 bushels from the previous forecast but up 8.3 bushels from last vear.

Area harvested for grain is forecast at 82.5 million acres, unchanged from the previous forecast, but up 1 percent from the previous year.

U.S. soybean production for beans is forecast at 4.17 billion bushels, down 2 percent from the previous forecast but up 17 percent from last year. Based on conditions as of Nov. 1, yields are expected to average 50.7 bushels per harvested acre, down 1.2 bushels from the previous forecast but up 3.3 bushels from 2019.

The area harvested for beans in the United States is forecast at 82.3 million acres, unchanged from the previous forecast but up 10 percent from 2019.

just until combined. Fold in pecans. with baking spray with flour. Spread batter into prepared pan. Bake until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean, about 45 minutes, covering with foil halfway through baking to prevent excess browning. Let cool completely in pan on a wire

Frosting: In a large bowl, beat cream cheese and butter with a mixer at medium speed until smooth and creamy, about two minutes, stopping to scrape sides of bowl. Beat in vanilla and salt. Gradually add powdered sugar, beating at low speed until smooth, stopping to scrape bowl. Spread onto cake. Garnish with pecans and pie spice.

#### **Pecan Pie Cheesecake** Bars

These bars are really scrumptious. They take a lot of ingredients and some time, but they melt in your mouth and feed a lot more than one pecan pie. You can buy graham cracker crumbs at most grocery stores. If you don't use them fast enough, put them in the freezer, and they will keep for months. There is a caramel with sea salt ice cream topping that would go great on these bars.

2 C. graham cracker crumbs

2/3 C. plus 2 T. unsalted butter, melted, cooled slightly and divided

4 pkg. (8 oz. each) cream cheese, softened

3/4 C. sugar 1/4 C. flour

6 eggs, divided

1 T. plus ½ t. vanilla, divided

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. firmly packed brown sugar

½ C. light corn syrup

1/4 t. salt

21/2 C. coarsely chopped pecans Caramel sauce for serving

Preheat the oven to 350. Line a 9-by-13 pan with foil, letting excess extend over sides of pan. Spray foil

In a medium bowl, stir together graham cracker crumbs and 1/3 plus 2 T. melted butter; press mixture into bottom of prepared pan. Bake for eight minutes. Remove from oven, and let cool completely on a wire rack. Leave oven on.

In a large bowl, beat cream cheese with a mixer at medium speed until smooth. In a small bowl, whisk together sugar and flour; gradually add sugar mixture to cream cheese, beating just until combined. Add 3 eggs, one at a time, beating just until combined after each addition. Beat in 1 T. vanilla. Spread mixture onto prepared crust. Bake until filling is set and slightly puffed around the edges, about 25 minutes. Let cool on a wire rack for five minutes. Leave oven on.

In a medium bowl, whisk together remaining 3 eggs; whisk in brown sugar, corn syrup, salt and remaining 1/3 C. melted butter and remaining ½ t, vanilla until smooth. Stir in pecans. Gently pour mixture onto cheesecake layer. Bake until top is set, 35 to 40 minutes. Let cool completely in pan on a wire rack. Loosely cover, and refrigerate until cold, about four hours or overnight. Using excess foil as handles, remove from pan and cut into bars. Serve with caramel sauce. Refrigerate bars in an airtight container for up to three days.

# **FHN** offers medication education program to local groups

The FHN Family Counseling Cen-use, sharing prescriptions or using ter has received funding through the Illinois Department of Human Services to implement Generation Rx, a national educational initiative to promote safe medication practices in an effort to prevent the misuse of prescription drugs. The local team is scheduling free educational programs through the end of June.

The Generation Rx program is offered through a partnership between the Cardinal Health Foundation and the Ohio State University College of Pharmacy. The curriculum includes hands-on activities that focus on teaching teens safe medication practices, as well as techniques for turning down the invitation to misuse.

Studies show that the average age a young adult begins to mishandle prescription drugs — through overprescription drugs to "manage" life - is in his or her early 20s, so this program aims to reach teens with good information and prevent mis-



# Farm assistance deadline nears

Officials at the U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency remind farmers and ranchers that the deadline to apply for the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program 2 (CFAP 2) is Dec. 11. The program provides direct relief to producers who continue to face market disruptions and associated costs because of COVID-19.

CFAP 2 will provide up to \$14 billion to eligible producers of certain row crops, livestock, dairy, specialty crops, aquaculture and more. All eligible commodities, payment rates and calculations can be found on farmers.gov/cfap. CFAP 2 is a separate program from CFAP 1 and interested producers must complete a new application to be eligible for payment for CFAP 2.

Customers seeking one-on-one support with the CFAP 2 application process can call 877-508-8364 to speak directly with a USDA employee ready to offer general assistance. This is a recommended first step before a producer engages the team at the FSA county office.

#### **Application options**

Producers have several options for applying to the CFAP 2 program by the December 11 deadline:

- 1. Using an online portal at farmers.gov/cfap. This allows producers with secure USDA login credentials, known as eAuthentication, to certify eligible commodities online, digitally sign applications and submit directly to the local USDA Service Center
- 2. Completing the application form using the CFAP 2 application generator and payment calculator found at farmers.gov/cfap. This Excel workbook allows customers to input information specific to their operation to determine estimated payments and populate the applica-

tion form, which can be printed, then signed and submitted to their local USDA Service Center.

3. Downloading the AD-3117 application form from farmers.gov/cfap and manually completing the form to submit to the local USDA Service Center by mail, electronically, or by hand delivery to an office drop box. In some limited cases, the office may be open for in-person business by appointment. Visit farmers.gov/coronavirus/service-center-status to check the status of your local office.

USDA Service Centers can also work with producers to complete and securely transmit digitally signed applications. Producers who are interested in digitally signing their applications should notify their local FSA office when calling to discuss the CFAP 2 application process. More information is available online at farmers.gov/mydocs.

Producers of commodities with payments based on acreage will use acreage and yield information provided by FSA through the annual acreage reporting process. Producers have the option to complete their application by working directly with their local FSA office or online through the CFAP 2 application portal.

All other eligibility forms, such as those related to adjusted gross income and payment information, can be downloaded from farmers.gov/cfap/apply. For existing FSA customers, including those who participated in CFAP 1, these documents are likely already on file.

As of Nov. 9, FSA has paid more than \$9.5 billion with more than 576,000 applications for CFAP 2. This builds upon more than \$10.3 billion paid through CFAP 1.

#### Rooted in agriculture

concentrations and depths," Solomon said.

Higher concentrations can be found when uranium is trapped near the surface or when soil structures have "significant fractures (that) create pathways for soil gases to rise easily," Solomon said.

About 55 percent of northwestern Illinois homes have radon levels over the recommended action level, which is four picoCuries per liter, according to an Extension news release.

At four pCi/L, some sort of action to reduce the radon levels is recommended.

Lena, for example, has had 44 homes professionally tested for radon levels. Of those homes, 23

or 52 percent — tested for more than the recommended level of 4 pCi/L.

Because communities in northwestern Illinois are seeing alarming numbers, Extension officials are looking to educate people about the gas and also encourage more testing.

There are some local areas where no radon testing has been done, the release said.

"The effort is to encourage more radon testing of homes. Every home has the potential to have elevated radon levels," Solomon said. "The only way to know is by testing,'

Testing can be done professionally or with a home kit, available at health departments in Stephenson, Jo Daviess and

Carroll counties, or at some hardware stores.

In Stephenson county, kits cost

Craig Beintema, health administrator with Stephenson County's Health Department, said testing is important for northwestern Illinois residents because "northwest Illinois (is) considered a higher risk due to the subsurface and the age of homes.

The subsurface is the rock beneath the soil.

Solomon, like Beintema, recommends at-home test kits, but adds that professional testing is just as important and should be done before adding any sort of professional mitigation system.

In addition, radon testing should be done every three years.

Should a home test positive for more than the recommended action level of four pCi/L, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency recommends visiting the IEMA website at www.2.illinois.gov or calling the IEMA nuclear and radiation safety program at 800-782-7860 or 217-782-2700.

# Pritzker extends eviction moratorium, driver facilities to close

# COVID-19 cases set records

By Jerry Nowicki CAPITOL NEWS ILLINOIS

As the state once again reported a one-day high for COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations, Gov. JB Pritzker announced Nov. 13 he would extend a temporary ban on evictions and Secretary of State Jesse White announced he would be closing driver services facilities.

At his COVID-19, Pritzker said this iteration of the eviction ban will aim at excluding "tenants who may have been taking advantage of the eviction moratorium but who are in fact able to make their monthly rent payments.'

He said the new eviction moratorium will apply only to renters who have earned no more than \$99,000 in annual income or \$198,000 as joint filers for this calendar year.

The governor said renters will be required to submit a declaration form to their landlord certifying that they are unable to pay their rent due to the substantial loss of income or an increase in out-of-pocket expenses stemming from the pandemic.

This new order also clarifies that enforcement of pre-pandemic eviction orders can indeed move forward if there are serious health or safety concerns," he said.

The state's rolling seven-day average COVID-19 case positivity rate increased to 13.2 percent Nov. 13 as the state reported a record 15,415 new confirmed and probable cases of the disease out of 106,540 test results reported over the previous 24 hours.

That topped the previous one-day case count record, set the day before, by more than 2,700. As of Nov. 13, 96 of the state's 102 counties were at a warning level for COVID-19 spread as hospitalizations once again set new highs.

The rising COVID-19 spread led the secretary of state's office to once again shut down Drivers Services Facilities, at least from Nov. 17 to Dec. 7, as the state has encouraged all Illinoisans to stay at home except for essential doctor visits, grocery trips, COVID-19 tests or work or schooling for the next three weeks.

White's office encouraged all to use the secretary of state online services and announced that expiration dates for driver's licenses and ID cards will be extended until June 1, 2021. The extension includes those who have February, March, April and May 2021 expiration dates, as expired driver's licenses and ID cards will remain valid until June 1, 2021.

In a news release, White said 19 Commercial Driver License facilities will remain open for driving tests scheduled by appointment by calling 217-785-3013. Seven Drivers





# Take action to increase your cybersecurity

Officials at the Federal Emergency Management Agency Region 5 office are urging citizens to get the resources they need to be safe online.

"Protecting against potential cyberattacks should be a part of everyone's overall disaster preparedness plan," said Kevin M. Sligh, acting regional administrator, FEMA Region 5. "Take the time now to set up the proper controls in your online life whether at home, work or school — to keep you, your family and your information safe and secure."

"Cybersecurity starts with each of us, and is everyone's responsibility," said Alex Joves, regional director, Cybersecurity & Infrastructure Security Agency Region 5. "Cyber self-defense basics can go a long way to keeping you and your data out of the hands of bad actors.

Officials offer the following tips:

- Use strong passwords that are 12 characters or longer. Use upper and lowercase letters, numbers and special characters. Use a password manager.
- Use a stronger authentication such as a PIN or password that only you would know. Consider using a separate device that can receive a code or uses a biometric scan (e.g. fingerprint scanner).
  - Watch for suspicious activity that asks you to

do something right away, offers something that sounds too good to be true or needs your personal information. Think before you click.

- Check your account statements and credit reports regularly.
  - Use secure Internet communications.
- Use sites that use HTTPS if you will access or provide any personal information. Do not use sites with invalid certificates. Use a Virtual Private Network (VPN) that creates a secure connection.
- Use antivirus solutions, malware and firewalls to block threats.
- Regularly back up your files in an encrypted file or encrypted file storage device.
- Limit the personal information you share online. Change privacy settings and do not use location features.
- Protect your home network by changing the administrative and WiFi passwords regularly. When configuring your router, choose the WiFi Protected Access 2 (WPA2) Advanced Encryption Standard (AES) setting, which is the strongest encryption



# Judge's decision clears way for revamped marijuana dispensary licensing

A Sangamon County court on Thursday denied a restraining order requested by cannabis dispensary license finalists in an attempt to stop the state from rescoring the applications of losing applicants.

In early September, Gov. JB Pritzker's administration revealed after months of delays due to the COVID-19 pandemic that just 21 firms out of over 900 applicants qualified for the first round of 75 "social equity licenses" for marijuana dispensaries. These licenses were earmarked for dispensaries expected to improve the economic conditions of communities harmed by the war on

Later that month, Pritzker an-

nounced that rejected marijuana applications and adding new finalists dispensary applicants would have another chance to amend their submissions before the licenses were awarded.

Some firms originally selected as finalists criticized the governor for the decision, accusing him of caving to political pressure. Three firms sued the administration in an attempt to stop the re-evaluation, first appealing to the state Supreme Court, then to a lower court once that request was denied.

That lawsuit was dealt a blow Thursday after Sangamon County Judge Adam Giganti denied a temporary restraining order that would have prevented the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation from grading amended to the 75-license lottery.

The three firms named as plaintiffs in the lawsuit - SB IL LLC, Vertical Management LLC and GRI Holdings LLC - argued for the injunction on the grounds that changing the process after winners were already announced was unfair and that allowing losing firms to resubmit their applications would cause the three groups "irreparable harm."

In the court's 17-page opinion, Giganti wrote the plaintiffs failed to demonstrate how Pritzker's administration giving losing firms a second chance would cause irreparable harm, and that "the public interest favors allowing (IDFPR's) administrative process, including its announced supplemental process, to proceed."

drive-thru services for license plate sticker transactions only, with more information at cyberdriveillinois.com.

Illinois Department of Public Health Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike warned that regions 1-6 of the state's COVID-19 mitigation plan — which covers areas not including or immediately adjacent to Cook County — are all past their peak hospitalization numbers of the first wave of the pandemic, and the other areas are nearing those peaks.

"If someone has a heart attack tomorrow, that person is also going to want to have a bed in a hospital, and whether it's a COVID person in that

Services Facilities will be offering bed or a flu person in that bed, that heart attack victim needs to have some care too and we need to make sure that going into these coming months, that everyone's going to have a bed to be cared for," she said, noting that some hospitals are already canceling elective procedures to dedicate the staff and hospital beds for more dire needs.

"The situation we face now is increasingly dangerous for health care workers and hospital systems especially in every part of our state," Pritzker said. "More Illinoisans are in the hospital battling COVID-19 now than we saw at our highest average in the

And, increasingly, we have regions at risk for potential ICU bed shortages and staffing shortages, as our case rates continue to rise.'

"If we want to be able to go out to eat, to finally have that wedding that's been postponed since the spring, to visit family and friends, we need to stay home now to be able to achieve that later," Ezike said. "And the only way we can begin to get back to normal is to reverse the trend to decrease the number of people getting infected every day."
