The not so skinny cook

As I write this, we have one last warm day. The wind is still whipping things around, but it brought warm air. Thanksgiving is coming, and I know that many celebrations will be different this year. This week's recipes can be used for the holiday or used as leftovers. Enjoy cooking for whomever you will be with during this unique Thanksgiving 2020.

Lake Charles Dip

Italian Salad Dressing (dry) gives this dip its wonderful flavor. It is easy to prepare, so enjoy this savory dip as an appetizer for the holidays.

- 1 C. sour cream
- 2 T. mayonnaise
- 1 T. Italian salad dressing mix
- ½ C. thinly chopped avocado
- 1 t. lemon juice

1/3 C. finely chopped seeded to-

In a small bowl, combine the sour cream, mayo and dressing mix. Toss avocado in lemon juice: stir into sour cream mixture. Stir in tomato. Refrigerate at least one hour. Serve with vegetables and crispy crackers.

Hot Spinach Salad

When I was a kid with an undeveloped palate, my mother tried to get me to eat spinach. It was always cooked and looked like dead seaweed. I went to my friend, Virginia Dyra's home for a Kentucky Derby Party. I was introduced to entirely different spinach. If you have been reading my column for a very long time, you know that Virginia was a frequent contributor to my column in the early days. She was a wonderful cook. She introduced me to hot spinach salad. I have been a convert to spinach in a salad ever since. I also have come to like spinach in dips and casseroles. I still hold the line on plain cooked spinach as a vegetable side! Try this great salad for

a lighter side instead of a Jell-O salad or a plain green salad.

- 1 t. salt
- 1 t. garlic powder
- ½ t. dried basil
- ¼ t. paprika
- 2/3 C. olive oil divided
- 4 C. bread cubes
- 4 strips bacon, diced
- ³/₄ C. thinly sliced red onion
- 1/4 C. cider vinegar
- 3 T. honey
- 1 t. Dijon mustard
- Salt and black pepper to taste
- 8 oz. fresh spinach
- 5 hard boiled eggs, quartered (optional)

Combine salt, garlic powder, basil and paprika in a small bowl. Heat 1/3 C. oil in a nonstick skillet over medium high heat. Add bread: sauté until golden, about five minutes, stirring often. Toss croutons with seasonings while still warm.

Cook bacon in a nonstick skillet until crisp; transfer to a paper-towel lined plate. Drain all but Î T. of drippings from skillet, then return skillet to medium-high heat.

Sauté onion in drippings until crisp-tender, about two minutes. Stir in vinegar, honey, and Dijon; season with salt and pepper. Simmer dressing until slightly reduced, about one minute. Off heat, whisk remaining 1/3 C. oil. Toss spinach, bacon, croutons and eggs with dressing.

Apple and Sausage Dressing

An old-fashioned way to make dressing was to include apples; this dressing uses both apples and nuts. If you don't want to use green onions, use a yellow sweet onion instead. Enjoy this different side with your turkey or use it as side with roasts and chicken.

- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) ground mild pork sausage
- 5 T. unsalted butter
- 2½ C. shopped green onions, white
 - 2 C. chopped celery
 - 2 Fuji apples, cored and diced
- ½ C. chopped pecans
- 2 T. finely chopped fresh sage or 2 t. dried sage

10 C. bread cubes (it is good to use 5 C. regular bread cubes and 5 C. cornbread cubes)

2 eggs, lightly beaten

Preheat the oven to 350. Spray an 11-by-8 baking dish with cooking spray. Heat a large nonstick skillet over medium high heat. Add sausage and cook until browned and crumbly. Remove sausage using a slotted spoon, reserving drippings in skillet. Melt butter with drippings in skillet over medium heat. Add onions and celery; cook, stirring occasionally until tender, about 10 minutes. Stir in apples, pecans, sage and pepper; cook until apples are tender, about five minutes.

In a large bowl, stir together sausage-apple mixture, bread, broth, and eggs until well combined. Pour mixture into prepared pan. Bake until golden brown and firm to the touch, about 45 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes before serving.

TLC (Thanksgiving Leftover Casserole)

Turkey, stuffing and vegetables come together into a casserole that can be made out of leftovers. You could make it and put it in the freezer for a quick dinner meal.

- 4 C. seasoned stuffing cubes
- 4 C. cubed cooked turkey
- 2 celery ribs, finely chopped
- 1 C. frozen peas
- 1 C. fresh or frozen cranberries
- ½ C. chopped sweet onion
- 1/4 C. flour
- 4 eggs
- 3 C. 2% milk
- 1 can (8 ½ oz.) cream style corn
- ½ t. salt
- ½ t. pepper
- 2 T. butter

1/3 C. chopped pecans

Preheat the oven to 350. Layer first six ingredients in a greased 9-by-13 baking dish. Whisk flour, eggs and milk in a separate bowl until smooth. Add corn, salt and pepper; mix well. Pour over top and let stand 15 minutes. Dot with butter and sprinkle with pecans.

Cover and bake 35 minutes. Uncover and bake 30 to 35 minutes more or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean.

Turkey Tarragon Noodle Soup

Leftover turkey makes this soup a cold night warm up. You can cook the turkey carcass and make stock or use prepared chicken or turkey stock.

- 6 C. broth (chicken or turkey)
- 2 medium carrots, thinly sliced
- 1 celery rib, thinly sliced
- 2 T. lemon juice
- 1 bay leaf

½ t. salt

- ½ t. pepper
- 3 C. uncooked egg noodles
- 3 C. coarsely chopped cooked tur-

2 t. dried tarragon

In a large pot, combine the first seven ingredients; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer until vegetables are tender, eight to 10 minutes. Return to a boil, add noodles. Cook until noodles are tender, five to six minutes longer. Stir in turkey and tarragon. Heat the mixture through. Discard bay leaf. Serve with crusty bread.

Cranberry Swirl Bundt Cake

This cake is beautiful on a cake stand, and it tastes pretty darn good

1½ C. butter, softened

- 1 C. sour cream
- 3 C. sugar
- 1 T. orange zest
- 1½ t. vanilla, divided
- 5 large room-temperature eggs
- 1 egg yolk 3¹/₄ C. flour
- 1 t. apple pie spice
- ½ t. baking soda
- 1/5 t. salt

½ C. Whole Berry Cranberry Sauce (recipe below)

11/4 C. powdered sugar

6 T. heavy whipping cream

Preheat oven to 325. In a large bowl, beat butter and sour cream with a mixer at medium speed until combined. Gradually add sugar, beating until fluffy, three to four minutes, stopping to scrape sides of the bowl. Add zest and 1 t. vanilla, beating until combined. Add eggs and egg yolk, one at a time, beating well after each

In another bowl, whisk together flour, pie spice, baking soda and salt. Add flour mixture to butter mixture, beating at low speed just until combined. In a medium bowl, stir together 2 C. batter and ½ C. Whole Berry Cranberry Sauce until combined.

Spray a 12- to 15-cup Bundt pan with baking spray with flour. Spread 3 C. plain batter into prepared pan. Top with cranberry batter. Spread remaining plain batter on top. Run a knife through the batters to swirl slightly. Gently tap pan on counter three to four times to release air bubbles. Bake until a wooden pick inserted near center comes out clean, about 1 hour and 15 minutes, covering with foil halfway through baking to prevent excessive browning. Let cool in pan for 15 minutes. Invert cake onto a wire rack and cool completely. Place cake on cake stand or large serving plate.

In a small bowl, whisk together powdered sugar, cream and 1/2 t. vanilla until smooth. Drizzle onto cooled cake. Store cake in an airtight container for up to three days.

Whole Berry Cranberry Sauce

Kitchen Hint: Serve leftover sauce with pork chops, on turkey sandwiches or as a topping for ice cream. 1 pkg. (12 oz.) fresh or frozen

cranberries 34 C. plus 2 T. firmly packed brown

½ C. fresh orange juice

sugar

½ t. minced fresh ginger

¼ t. vanilla

In a medium saucepan, bring cranberries, brown sugar, orange juice, ¹/₄ C. water and ginger to a boil over medium-high heat. Reduce heat and simmer, stirring occasionally, until berries burst and sauce is thickened, 25 to 30 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in vanilla and let cool completely. Refrigerate in an airtight container for up to five days.



Small Business Saturday, the Saturday after Thanksgiving, was created 10 years ago in response to another crisis, the Great Recession. The goal was to get people to bypass the national chains on the first weekend of the shopping season and support locally owned stores and restaurants.

And it worked. Last year, Americans spent a record \$19.6 billion on Small Business Saturday, according to a survey from American Express and my association, the National Federation of Independent Business.

We need to try to keep the momentum going.

Small business owners are doing everything they can to get through this, but it won't be easy. NFIB surveyed its members nationwide last month and found that 19 percent of them think they'll have to close in seven months to a year unless the local economy improves; 15 percent said three to six months, while 3 percent warned they might be able to last only a month or two.

And when we asked how long they thought their businesses could survive under current economic conditions, 19% said seven months to a year, while 15% said three to

six months and 3% said they might have to close in a month or two.

We can't afford to let that hap-

Small business is the heart and soul of Illinois' economy, accounting for 99.6 percent of all businesses in the state and a net increase of 20,410 jobs statewide in 2019, according to the Small Business Administration.

We need small businesses, and small businesses need us.

NFIB is asking Congress to approve additional financial assistance for small businesses, but there are little things you and I can do that can make a big difference.

We can shop local and shop small — in person, by phone, or online — and take advantage of local delivery or curbside pickup.

We can also buy gift cards for local businesses. Supporting them now helps them stay in business so we can use the cards later.

Supporting local shops and restaurants throughout the holiday season and beyond will lessen the financial impact this outbreak is having on our communities. Small business is the engine that drives our economy, so when we help small businesses, we help every-

Bad breath could be a sign of a medical issue

Talking to someone with bad breath is never a pleasant experience. While we all may experience bad breath once in a while, knowing someone with chronic bad breath may put you in to a socially awkward situation. Telling them will almost undoubtedly leave them embarrassed and there is the very real possibility they may be seriously offended and/or angry.

The important thing to keep in mind is that, while chronic bad breath is most likely caused by poor oral hygiene, it can be the sign of an underlying med-

breath, there are a couple of ways to check. You can lick the back of your palm at the wrist, using the whole tongue as far back as you can tolerate. Wait about twenty seconds, or until it is almost dry, and then smell it. You can also check by cupping your hands over your nose and mouth, then blow out strongly through your mouth.

When you do not brush and floss regularly, food that remains on and in chronic bad breath and a strange taste between your teeth will decompose, leaving an unpleasant smell. At the

same time, the bacteria that is normally found in your oral cavity can mix with this food and release foul-smelling gases or volatile sulfur compounds. The same is true if you wear dentures and do not remove food that accumulates on the edges or clasps.

Consuming strong-smelling foods like garlic, horseradish, tuna, onions and liquor or tobacco use can intensify the effect. Not removing plaque can lead to decay and gum disease. In fact, in your mouth is indicative of gum dis-

When brushing, be sure to clean the also contains disease-fighting compotongue as far back as you can tolerate, as this is where most of the bacteria that causes bad breath is found.

If you have chronic bad breath, share this with your dentist. The first step is to diagnose the cause. He or she will review your medical history, including any medications that you take. Many medications and medical conditions can lead to insufficient saliva production. Saliva plays a significant role in maintaining oral and overall health. It not only helps to mechanically wash food from your teeth and gums, but it

nents that protect you from infections. It also provides your teeth with calcium, fluoride and phosphate ions to strengthen your teeth against decay.

Dry mouth (xerostomia) also occurs when you continuously breathe through your mouth. As the number of cases and deaths from the COVID-19 virus exponentially rise, it is critical to wear masks to protect both ourselves and our loved ones. You should be aware that there is a tendency to breathe through your mouth when you wear a mask, which can lead to dry mouth. Therefore, you need to keep yourself well hydrated to support your salivary flow, which in turn will help you fight infections such as COVID.

I cannot emphasize enough how crucial maintaining oral health aids your body to maintain overall health.

Other medical causes of chronic bad breath include kidney and liver disease, gastroesophageal reflux and diabetes. It is important that you do not use mouthwash to cover up bad breath without discovering the cause.

If there are no oral health issues involved, you will be referred to your physician for a medical diagnosis. For xerostomia, your dentist may prescribe a mouthwash or other products with xylitol, which works to prevent bacterial infection, decay and periodontal

Midwest governors urge residents to limit contact over holidays

By Peter Hancock CAPITOL NEWS ILLINOIS

A bipartisan group of governors from seven Midwestern states, including Illinois Gov. JB Pritzker, issued a joint plea last week for residents of their states to take precautions against the spread of COVID-19 over the upcoming holiday weekend, even if that means avoiding travel and family get-togethers.

"This Thanksgiving is going to look different than others have before, and it's because it has to," Michigan Gov. Gretchen Whitmer said during a virtual joint news conference. "I know that instead of hosting a big, in-person Thanksgiving like I usually do, I'm going to be setting up a Zoom call with my family members."

Whitmer was joined by Pritzker, Kentucky Gov. Andy Beshear, Wisconsin Gov. Tony Evers and Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz, all Democrats, in the news conference. Earlier, however, those governors were joined by Republican Govs. Eric Holcomb of Indiana and Mike DeWine of Ohio in

releasing a joint video on social media calling on residents throughout the region to take extra precautions this year.

All of those states, as well as others in the region, have seen some of the most rapid growth rates in the nation for COVID-19 infections and hospitalizations. And the news conference came on the same day Pritzker announced that Illinois would be placed under Tier 3 mitigations as of Nov. 20. Those mitigations include the closing of certain nonessential businesses and strict capacity limits in retail stores, fitness centers and some other establishments.

"As of our most current data, Illinois today is averaging more than 5,200 patients (per day) fighting COVID-19 in our hospitals – 400 more individuals than at our spring high," Pritzker said last week. "And this isn't just in Chicago or our other cities in Illinois. It's happening in our suburbs and our rural areas."

According to the Illinois Department of Public Health, as Nov. 15, the

most severe hospital resource shortage was in Region 7 of the state's mitigation plan, made up of Will and Kankakee counties, where only 12 percent of the region's hospital medical and surgical beds, and 16 percent of intensive care unit beds, remained available.

But many of the governors said they were less concerned about the availability of hospital beds than about hospital staff.

"Because every day that you have 3,000, 4,000, 5,000 cases, those include our health care workers too," Kentucky Gov. Beshear said. "And they're not getting it at the hospital. They're getting it in their communities. So, to make sure that we have enough people and enough staffing, we need people to do their part and to remember, if you don't want to mask and you go out in public, you may be infecting that health care worker that you or your family could later need."

Wisconsin Gov. Evers said his state is experiencing the same problem.

"Here, we are at capacity or very

close to it," he said. "But it is about the people that do the hard work. We have a severe shortage of people; we're stealing from other states. And, you know, we're stealing from the states around us, for God's sakes. And so the point is absolutely true. They're getting it from the community. We have to stop the community spread."

Minnesota Gov. Walz said the health care workforce in his state is likewise affected by community spread of the virus outside of hospital settings.

"One of the things is child care, and

schooling for these frontline workers, what they do with that," he said. "When we start to see that community spread, it has a cascading effect. And what do they do with their own children? What happens when their school goes to distance learning? And that's one of the challenges of looking at this much more holistically."

All five governors said they plan

to spend Thanksgiving at home with their own immediate families.

Thanksgiving meal cost down slightly, Farm Bureau reports

The annual American Farm Bureau Federation's Thanksgiving dinner cost survey shows a decrease of \$2.01 from last year.

The average cost of this year's feast for 10 is \$46.90, down from an average of \$48.91 in 2019.

"The average cost of this year's Thanksgiving dinner is the lowest since 2010," AFBF Chief Economist John Newton said in a news release. "Pricing whole turkeys as 'loss leaders' to entice shoppers and move product is a strategy we're seeing retailers use that's increasingly common the closer we get to the holiday.'

The turkey costs less than last year, at \$19.39 for a 16-pound bird. That's roughly \$1.21 per pound, down 7% from last year. The survey results show that retail turkey prices are the lowest since 2010.

The shopping list for Farm Bureau's informal survey includes turkey, stuffing, sweet potatoes, rolls with butter, peas, cranberries, a veggie tray, pumpkin pie with whipped cream and coffee and milk, all in quantities sufficient to serve a family of 10 with plenty for leftovers.

In addition to turkey, foods that showed slight price declines include

whipping cream and sweet potatoes. Foods showing modest increases this year included dinner rolls, cubed bread stuffing and pumpkin pie mix. After adjusting for inflation, the cost of this year's Thanksgiving dinner is \$18.01, down slightly from last year.

This year's national average cost was calculated using more than 230 surveys completed with pricing data from all 50 states.

Farm Bureau volunteer shoppers were encouraged to check prices online using grocery store apps and websites due to the pandemic. They looked for the best possible prices without taking advantage of special promotional coupons or purchase

The AFBF Thanksgiving dinner survey was first conducted in 1986.
