IHSA moves forward with winter basketball

Officials with the Illinois High School Association decided Oct. 28 to continue with the prep basketball season as scheduled, just a day after Gov. JB Pritzker announced the Illinois Department of Public Health had changed basketball's COVID-19 risk level from medium

Public health officials made the risk announcement in light of the rising number of virus cases of late. however, IHSA officials said they don't believe basketball has become more dangerous just because of the increased number of cases.

"The board has not been presented any causal evidence that rising COVID-19 cases make basketball more dangerous to play by the IDPH or any other health organization nationally or internationally," an IHSA news release said.

The girls and boys basketball season is scheduled for November through February, with practices to begin Nov. 16.

IHSA officials noted that bordering states held both "medium" and "high-risk" fall sports with low rates of COVID-19 incidents. Recently, the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health published a study that found that the case rate per 100,000 student athletes was actually lower than the case rate for all 14- to 17-vear-olds in Wisconsin. According to the results, no sports showed a higher incident rate than the average for 14- to 17-year-olds in the

IHSA officials also cited student mental health as a key factor in their decision. Many Illinois athletes have looked to some of the bordering states or have joined up with AAU and other non-IHSA athletic teams in order to play the sport

IHSA officials said students would be better protected playing in the high school setting, stating

Student-athletes around the world have often used sports as an escape from the pressures of daily life. The IHSA emphasized the importance of allowing teens to participate and compete, saying, "We fear for the mental health of students who attempt to traverse a long winter with no athletic outlet available."

They are not completely disregarding the IDPH's announcement, however. The SMAC offered additional guidelines in order to increase social distancing and limit the risks of virus spread in basketball. All players involved in games must wear a mask, and players will be socially distanced on the benches. Two game balls must be sanitized and set aside prior to each game, as well as sanitized during quarter breaks and timeouts.

Although individual school districts may opt not to allow basketball this winter, the IHSA decision leaves options open for districts, officials said.

We feel for those in that situation. However, we have also learned that we cannot continue to look down the road to a season that may never come."

In related news, IHSA officials announced that the high school wrestling season will be postponed until the "summer season," which is scheduled for April 19 through June

Board members also voted to approve the IHSA's winter sport guidance for all low-risk sports. Lowrisk sports include boys swimming diving, cheerleading, dance, boys and girls bowling and girls gymnastics. These sports are set to take place from Nov. 16 through Feb. 13. Spectator and group gatherings for these sports will be further reviewed by the board later this

School districts asking more of critical' substitute teachers

Pandemic brings technology, staffing challenges

This school year is especially trying, but a cadre of substitute educators is rising to the occasion.

Lena-Winslow Community Unit School District #202 Superintendent Tom Chiles said his district is in "full go" mode with in-person attendance.

"We are all attendance and we get out about 35 minutes early every day," Chiles said. "Other than that we have about 8 or 9 percent of our students who choose to do remote learning. We've also had a handful of students that have had to stay home for one reason or another, but we are 'full go' primarily.'

The district hasn't seen a spike in the need for substitute teachers at

with less than half of their normal substitute teacher pool.

There have been occasions where a staff member had to have been quarantined," Chiles said. "They will be out for 10 days or two weeks or whatever it is.

"So, something that might have been a day or two absence, or no miss at all because of a minor illness becomes more because now they've got to sit out just because they've been around someone who had something, so they get quarantined for two full weeks, and the length of absences has changed the nature of our substitute process."

Chiles spoke to the training and certification required of substi-

this point, but officials are working tute teachers working in the Lena-Winslow School District.

"We occasionally advertise for substitute teachers and the Regional Office of Education maintains a list we can work from when necessary," he said. "If you want to be a substitute and you have a bachelor's degree, you could go apply for a substitute license at the regional office. They would do your background check and then you would include in your paperwork the school districts where you would be willing to work.

He said most of their substitutes are regulars at the district and know how most of the systems work.

The not so skinny cook

Halloween has come and gone; it was another one of those holidays that had to have a different spin. I made bags and delivered them; I didn't turn the light on so that everyone could be safe. It was a weird way to celebrate what is usually one of the most fun evenings of the year. As we have been saying since March, 'Wait until next year!'

It continues to be on the cooler side, so tummy-warming recipes are what are featured this week.

Elegant Green Beans

It is getting closer to the holidays; we may not have large family gatherings, but we probably will be cooking some special dishes. Side dishes will be featured throughout the months of November and December. The first one is for an extra special way to make the traditional green bean casserole.

1 can (8 oz.) sliced water chestnuts, drained

1 small onion, chopped

1 jar (4 ½ oz.) sliced mushrooms, drained

6 T. butter, divided

1/4 C. flour

½ C. chicken broth

1 t. sov sauce

1/8 t. hot pepper sauce

Dash of salt

1 pkg. (16 oz.) frozen French style green beans, thawed

1/3 C. shredded cheddar cheese

1 C. French-fried onion rings

Preheat oven to 350. In a small skillet, sauté water chestnuts, onion and mushrooms in 2 T. butter until the onion is crisp-tender, four to five minutes; set aside.

In a large skillet, melt remaining 4 T. butter; stir in flour until smooth. Stir in milk, broth, soy sauce, pepper sauce and salt. Bring to a boil; cook and stir until thickened, about two minutes. Remove from heat; stir in green beans and cheese. Spoon half of the bean mixture into a greased 1½-quart baking dish. Layer with water chestnut mixture and remaining bean mixture. Bake, uncovered, 45 minutes. Top with French-fried onions. Bake until heated through, about five minutes.

Mashed Cauliflower with Parmesan

Everyone is on a cauliflower kick these days. You can find lots of cauliflower crusts for pizza, mashed cauliflower and cauliflower and some other vegetable. This recipe is for a traditional mashed cauliflower that takes the place of mashed potatoes and is great with gravy.

1 large head cauliflower (about 21/2 lbs.), broken into florets

1 C. shredded Parmesan cheese, divided

1/3 C. heavy whipping cream or half-and-half cream

Place 1 inch water and the cauliflower in a large saucepan; bring to a boil over high heat. Cook, covered, until very soft, 10 to 12 minutes. Drain. Mash cauliflower to desired consistency. Stir in ½ C. cheese, cream, butter and pepper. Sprinkle with remaining ½ C. cheese. Garnish with chopped parsley if desired.

Pasta E'Fagioli

As the weather gets colder, soup seems a great way to get supper on the table, have company in, or even have a bowl by yourself. This soup is one of those knock-off soups from famous restaurants. This one is from the soup and sandwich menu at Olive Garden. My friend, Lee, has been making this for years. Yes, it tastes like you are eating at Olive Garden. Just serve some breadsticks and a salad and serve with shredded Parmesan just like at the restaurant.

11/2 t. oil

1 lb. ground sirloin

½ C. onion, chopped

³/₄ C. carrots, slivered

³/₄ C. celery, diced

2 cans (24 oz.) canned tomatoes,

1 can white kidney beans (you can use cannelloni beans or northern beans) drained

1 can red kidney beans, drained

3 (14 oz.) cans beef stock

1½ t. oregano

1¼ t. pepper

2-3 t. fresh parsley

3/4 t. Tabasco

1 jar (24 oz.) spaghetti sauce

1 C. pasta (Ditalini or small shells) Sauté beef in oil in a large pot until beef starts to brown. Add onions, carrots, celery and tomatoes and simmer for about 20 minutes. Drain and rinse beans and add to the pot. Also add the beef stock, oregano, pepper, Tabasco and spaghetti sauce. Simmer until celery and carrots are tender - for about an hour. Cook and drain pastas; add the pasta the last Parmesan cheese sprinkled on each

Chicken Tetrazzini with Spaghetti Squash

People are always asking me for dishes to use spaghetti squash. This one has lots of good things in it to make it tasty. If you don't want to mess around with the spaghetti squash, you can substitute 8 ounces of spaghetti for the squash. Once again, to save time, you can use the rotisserie chicken. If you want a quick cornbread fix, Sullivan's Grocery has an 8-by-8 pan of cornbread in their bakery.

1 large spaghetti squash, halved lengthwise and seeded

1 C. water

½ C. unsalted butter

1 C. diced yellow onion

2 t. minced garlic 1/3 C. flour

1 T. chopped fresh thyme

½ t. salt

¼ t. pepper

1 C. chicken broth

1 C. heavy whipping cream

3 C. shredded cooked chicken

2 C. shredded mild Cheddar cheese, divided

11/4 C. halved cherry or grape tomatoes, divided

3 C. cubed cornbread, divided

Preheat oven to 350. Spray a 3-quart baking dish with cooking spray. In a large microwave-safe dish, place squash halves cut side down; add 1 C. water. Cover with plastic wrap, leaving one corner vented. Cook on high until tender, about 10 minutes. Carefully remove squash from pan; let cool enough to handle, cut side up. Scrape squash flesh into strands with a fork.

In a large skillet, melt butter over medium heat. Add onion and garlic; cook, stirring occasionally, until tender, about three minutes. Stir in flour, thyme, salt and pepper; cook, stirring constantly, for two minutes. Whisk in broth and cream; cook, stirring frequently, until thickened, about five minutes. Stir in squash, chicken, 1 C. cheese and 1 C. tomatoes. Gently fold in 2 C. cornbread. Pour mixture into prepared pan. Top with remaining 1 C. cheese, remaining 1/4 C. tomatoes, and remaining 1 C. cornbread. Bake until hot and bubbly, 35 to 45 minutes. Garnish with thyme if desired.

Upside-Down Orange Cranberry Cake

November and December usually brings out dessert combinations that we don't really have any other time of the year. This small cake marries oranges and cranberries into a tasty cake. We are used to the traditional pineapple upside down cake in the spring and early summer. This delicious fall classic uses the fruits of the fall as a great way to start November. It is a tasty dessert to serve because there usually aren't any leftovers.

1½ C. self-rising flour

³/₄ C. sugar

½ C. plain yellow cornmeal

½ C. olive oil

½ C. low-fat buttermilk

2 eggs

1½ t. orange zest

3 small oranges, peeled and cut into rings

½ C. firmly packed light brown sugar

1/4 C. unsalted butter, melted

3/4 C. fresh or thawed frozen cran-

Preheat the oven to 350. Spray a 9-inch round cake pan with baking spray with flour. Line bottom of pan with parchment paper. In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar and cornmeal. In a small bowl, whisk together oil, buttermilk, eggs, and orange zest. Stir buttermilk mixture into flour mixture just until combined. Blot orange slices with paper towels to absorb excess liquid.

In the prepared pan, sprinkle brown sugar; drizzle with melted butter. Place orange slices and cranberries in pan. Pour batter on top of fruit. Gently tap pan on counter twice to release air bubbles. Bake until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean, about 40 minutes. Let cool in pan for 10 minutes. Invert cake onto a serving platter; let cool slightly before serving.



An Emergency Furnace Assistance Program is available for LIHEAP households of Stephenson and Jo Daviess Counties who are homeowners and whose existing heating systems are not functioning or have been red-tagged by their utility.

The purpose of the LIHEAP Furnace program is to restore heat to the household and is available from July 27, 2020 through April 30, 2021 or until funds have been exhausted.

All income eligible homeowners may apply for emergency furnace assistance.

To qualify for the LIHEAP Emergency Furnace Program, the household must first apply for and be approved for LIHEAP assistance.

The household must have active service with both primary and secondary heating utilities. Households and disconnected utilities are not eligible for this assistance.

In addition to LIHEAP documents, the following homeownership documentation must be provided:

1. Copy of real estate tax bill

- Copy of warranty deed, contract for deed, or quit claim deed (all of these must be stamped and registered with the county clerk)

Preheat oven to 350. Grease bot-

tom of a 9-by-13 pan. Combine pumpkin, evaporated milk, eggs, sugar, cinnamon and salt in a large bowl. Pour mixture into the prepared baking pan. Sprinkle dry cake mix evenly over pumpkin mixture. Top with pecans. Drizzle melted butter over pecans. Bake 50 to 55

minutes until golden brown. Cool, then refrigerate. Serve chilled, topped with whipped topping.



Gum disease can strike at any age

Periodontal disease, often referred to as "gum disease," is a serious bacterial infection that can destroy the gum and supporting structures of your teeth. Many people hold the mistaken belief that periodontal disease only occurs in adults. The disturbing truth is that many children and adolescents in the United States are affected by some form of periodontal disease, which can range from mild to severe.

The primary cause of periodontal disease at any age is poor oral hygiene. Where periodontal disease tends to be a chronic condition in adults, children and adolescents are more likely to experience aggressive periodontitis.

Most children have the mildest form known as gingivitis. Since this stage is generally not painful, it is important that you recognize the most common symptoms of gingivitis and report these

to your child's dentist. These include dark red or purple, gingival bleeding, red, enlarged gums and bleeding while brushing or flossing. If left untreated, more advanced signs include loose or separating teeth and a change in bite and jaw alignment.

In addition to poor oral hygiene, the following factors can increase the risk for periodontal disease in childhood and adolescence: clenching and grinding teeth, mouth breathing, crowded teeth, poor diet, autoimmune and systemic disease (such as diabetes and leukemia), poor diet, hormonal changes in the body (such as puberty, menstruation, pregnancy and oral contraceptives use), smoking, vaping and using smokeless tobacco products, certain medications and genetic predis-

It is critical to know that some of the symptoms of periodontal disease can be the result of systemic disease. Overgrowth of gum tissues that may appear

oral ulcers and petechiae (small dots of blood that look like a skin rash), accompanied by swollen lymph glands, fatigue and sudden weight loss can be seen in acute and chronic leukemias. Gingivitis, periodontitis, xerostomia (dry mouth) and oral candida (yeast) infections can indicate undiagnosed diabetes or poorly controlled diabetes.

"However, a unique challenge this into remote classes," Teske said. "We vear compared to other years is that they are likely to have at least one student that is remote learning," Chiles said. "So, they have to know how to start a Google Meet or Zoom or whatever platform the teacher is using, and our other teachers really step up and assist our substitutes in getting the hang of that stuff."

Substitute teachers are invaluable, he said.

"I think sometimes people don't realize, but we don't function here without our substitutes," Chiles said. "In a lot of ways they're every bit as critical as our full-time people, and if we didn't have people to substitute for us, I'm not 100 percent sure what we would do."

A smaller pool of subs

Warren Community Unit School District #205 Superintendent Shawn Teske said his district generally operates in person.

"We offer in-person classes and we have some students that have opted

do simultaneously teach remote with the in-person classes, but the majority of our students attend class in person.

He said finding the necessary substitute teachers and paraprofessionals has been an issue for the district over the years.

The difference for us is that due to COVID-19, a large pool of our substitutes has asked us not to call them for the first semester," Teske said. "A lot of these individuals are retired, some of them are a little elderly, and it wasn't worth it for them to be in an environment where there are more people, so they've opted to stay home. Those decisions made our substitute pool even smaller."

He said in addition to the safety concerns it can be difficult for anyone to come into a situation where they are teaching in-person and remote classes simultaneously.

"For the remote parts, using Google Meets which is similar to Zoom, can be difficult, so what we've actually done is to try to bring some of our

non-certified staff into the classroom to assist with the technology part of things rather than put extra responsibilities on our substitutes," he said. "We try to make the transition process as easy as possible.'

Teske said substitute teachers' responsibilities can vary from leading class meetings, to giving instruction online, to small group or individual support and more.

They're ... involved with helping us deliver instruction and curriculum to the students," he said. "The way we have it set up is they basically teach a classroom and we just put a camera on the educator, so the remote students receive the same education as those students attending a class in

He said he cannot speak for all of his substitutes when it comes to their comfort level teaching in both the remote and in-person situations.


"I do believe that stepping out of the house during a pandemic and stepping into this kind of environment could be a reason why a substitute teacher would not feel as comfortable as they have in the past," Teske said. "It makes their job more challenging. Some of our substitutes are more tech savvy than others and for those that aren't really quite that text savvy, we try to make accommodations with the students and parents."

Regardless of tech skills and availability, Teske said his district simply could not survive without the contributions made by its substitute teach-

"No teacher is trained to teach in a pandemic," he said. "In a matter of months our world has been flipped upside down and we've all been rolling with the punches. The substitutes are moving in and out of different classrooms in different school districts and trying to teach in a different way.

"A lot of them are retired educators that taught 30-plus years in an entirely different system; their flexibility is desperately needed and they're doing a great job. We are thankful for the substitutes we have and we're always looking for more.'
