pies, apple cakes and apple squares/bars. There is a \$2 fee per item, one entry per category. First-, second- and third-place contestants in each of the three categories will receive ribbons, with a special prize going to the grand champion.

In addition to an amateur category, professional pie bakers are invited to enter an apple pie in third annual "Apple of My Eye" contest. The winner receives a trophy, with the runner-up and third-place entrees earning ribbons. All baked goods entered should be in disposable containers or dishes marked with the contestant's name and phone number for pickup after judging. Entries will be divided and repackaged for sale that day.

All proceeds benefit the nonprofit McHenry County Historical Society.

Cider Fest

Visitors to the 44th annual Cider Fest will get an opportunity to step back in time with skilled artisans, a turn-

of-the-century cider press, children's activities, October music and vintage items for sale. Blacksmith Sam Johnson, flintknapper Richard Hamilton and broom maker Bob McCann will anchor this year's festival, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 3, at the McHenry County Historical Museum in Union. The museum will open to the public, although face coverings are required indoors.

Visitors also are welcome to tour the 1843 Gannon family and 1895 West Harmony one-room school.

Children's activities begin at 11:30 a.m. and continue throughout the afternoon. Charlie B & Friends plays Octoberfest music starting at 12:30 p.m. There also will be a mum sale, a white elephant sale, silent auction, food booths, hot cider and doughnuts, a selfie station and more. Fall Diddley craft show to be held Oct. 9-10

The Mental Health Resource League for McHenry County (MHRL) announced that its annual Fall Diddley craft show will be held the weekend of Oct. 9 and 10, at the Boone County Fairgrounds in Belvidere. MHRL expects that all CDC and health department guidelines will be followed in order to make the show as safe as possible for attendees and crafters. Although there are no current mask mandates for outdoor shows, Fall Diddley organizers strongly encourage that all crafters and attendees wear masks while attending the show.

Fall Diddley crafters will be set up in tents and buildings throughout the fairgrounds. The Fall Diddley show regularly includes over 300 crafters.

Although countless items are available from crafters, there is generally a focus on gift items focusing on the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays since the show takes place in October and close to the holidays.

The MHRL is a 100 percent volunteer run non-profit organization that holds two nationally-acclaimed craft shows (Fair Diddley in May on the Woodstock Square in Woodstock and Fall Diddley in October). One hundred percent (100 percent) of the net proceeds from these two shows are allocated to 16 McHenry County non-profit agencies that focus on the needs of individuals suffering from mental health related disorders.

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, both the fair and Fall Diddley shows were cancelled

in 2020 creating an enormous shortfall in funding for the 16 agencies that are supported by the MHRL. Several local foundations and anonymous donors stepped in late 2020 to help offset the funding deficit. Nearly \$162,000 was generously donated and ultimately allocated to the 16 non-profit agencies. Although the 2021 Fair Diddley show was cancelled due to the pandemic, the MHRL expects the 2021 Annual Fall Diddley show to be a huge success and well attended.

North stands strong and in front in NIC-10

The Lady Blue Thunder continues to exert control over the field in the NIC-10 as the final month of regular season gets set to begin.

This past week, Belvidere North secured its two-game lead over the next closest competitor when they knocked back Hononegah in two games.

The win dropped the Lady Indians to 8-2 and in second place, tied with Rockford Guilford in the loss column and holding a two game advantage over Rockford Boylan and nearest neighbor Belvidere.

A week earlier, Belvidere North damaged the Lady Bucs' thoughts of contention for the crown with a two games to none decision.

Rockford Auburn also suffered a similar fate after their get together last Tuesday. The Lady Blue Thunder rolled the Knights and started on its journey to a two-game lead and a double-digit conference win total.

Harlem played host to the Lady Blue Thunder on Tuesday, Sept. 28. Unfortunately details of that contest are unavailable at this time.

September matches close for Belvidere North on Thursday, Sept. 30. They will travel to Guilford and attempt to give the Lady Vikings its third or worse conference loss.

October action commences at home in a meeting with early conference contender Freeport. The Lady Pretzels had won once and had lost six conference matches heading into this past week of play.

With a 1-6 mark they held a one game lead over Rockford East in the loss column and a two game edge over NIC-10 basement-setter Rockford Jefferson.

The Lady Bucs streaky style has helped them hold ground in fourth place in the talented NIC-10. Belvidere is tied with Boylan and still very much in the hunt for a

solid above .500 showing this season.

August action ended and September play carried Belvidere through the second week of the next to final month of the season having won four of five games.

They ran into Byron, which started a slight slide that included a follow-up loss to NUIC challenger Pearl City.

The rebound effect has allowed the Lady Bucs to have won back-to-back matches, twice, sandwiched between a modest three game losing streak.

With a record of 6-4, the next few games could help Belvidere attempt to slide up the standings, even though a track down of Belvidere North might be a little more difficult to accomplish.

Belvidere and Hononegah faced off on Tuesday, Sept. 28 and the Lady Bucs will travel to Machesney Park on Thursday for a showdown with Harlem.

October action involves back-to-back home games against Rockford Guilford on Tuesday, Oct. 5 followed by a Thursday, Oct. 7 meeting with Freeport.

Belvidere will travel to participate in weekend tournament games on Saturday, Oct. 9. The schedule will be quite active.

On the schedule for the Lady Bucs include the Dunlap Lady Eagles, from the northern edge of the Peoria region.

They will face Dixon, which is one of those teams in pursuit of a Big Northern Title and an overthrow of current conference leader Byron.

The Tournament closes with matches against Scales Mound at 3 p.m. followed by Geneseo at 9 p.m.

Rockford East helps usher in NIC-10 battles during the second week of October, which will also include a final warm-up ahead of a Thursday, Oct 19 rematch with undefeated Belvidere North.

Belvidere man runs his 100th marathon

Robert Pomykala completed his 100th marathon Sunday, Sept. 19, in the Fox Valley Marathon amid family and friends who turned out to witness this feat.

Pomykala started his marathon running journey at the Chicago Marathon one month after starting to run and the morning after the wedding of his twin, William, in 1993. Since then he has run marathons all over the US and even one in France. Many of these races have been run with his twin as well as with one of his students, Erin Randall.

Pomykala just recently retired from teaching at Maren-

go Community High School where he taught art, humanities and computers for over 25 years. He also served as a wrestling, cross country and soccer coach there. He is a graduate of NIU and got his master's at Rockford College.

Pomykala is running his 101st marathon the following weekend in Fargo, N.D. It was going to be his 100th until so many friends spoke up that they wanted to see him finish his 100th that he added the Fox Valley Marathon to his agenda because it is so close to him.

Pomykala had wanted to finish his 100th before

he retired in May of 2019 and the races were set until COVID-19 struck. He did, however run two marathons in the Conservation District Park near his home in Belvidere with only his dog, Stella, and myself as his support team.

Running while teaching full time was difficult to stay in shape. Training hours are just not always available. When he started in 1993 he was running about one or two a year, one in the spring and one in the fall. As he got older, and especially when his twin joined him, he began running multiple races in a year. He

has run them in rain and extreme heat, in costume (the one in France was a costume run), in the dark (The Screaming Pumpkin Run was done in a cemetery after dark), in one mile circles (Circular Logic Marathon) and he has run with his daughter, Anya (who was born, grew up, and started running marathons with her dad since he began running. This marathon ran over the Canadian border and back).

He has run the Chicago Marathon seven times, the Milwaukee Marathon six times, the Missoula Marathon

The Belvidere Fire Department would like to thank the community for supporting the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA) with our collection on Labor Day. We were able to raise a considerable amount of money. This money helps fund research and also send kids to MDA Camp.

We would also like to thank all of the off-duty firefighters and their family members for donating their time to collect and count the money raised.

We collected from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. People showed up around 9:30 a.m. and got their materials fire boot, sign-age, thank you stickers and headed out to their collection areas at the Oasis, the corners of State

Street and Logan Avenue; W. Locust and Appleton; N. State and Harrison. They stood their posts and gave 100 percent. We were delighted that the weather was wonderful this weekend; especially after the storms we stood through last year.

This is a firefighter tradition that has been going on over 60 years. We take pride in set-

ting this day aside each year to support the MDA. They have made great strides over the past couple of years and medications are im-pacting children's lives.

MDA Camp is near and dear to my heart. I have volunteered as a camp counselor for the past three years and will continue this as long as they will have me. My wife also donates a week of her summer with me at camp as a member of the medical staff. She is becoming a regular at camp each year.

These kids that we are collecting for need our help and so do their families. Camp is completely paid for by MDA so it doesn't create a financial burden on the families. For some families this is the only time that they are able to take time for themselves because normally taking care of a child with MDA can be a full time job. Belvidere Fire always ranks in the top 10 in the whole state of Illinois for money collected per member. This is a proud tradition that we will carry on into the future.

Some firefighters collected on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, but the largest group was out collecting on Monday. Some of the ladies associated with the fire department have been volunteering their time for almost as many years as their men have been firefighters.

MDA is the largest source of funding for neuromuscular disease research outside of the federal government.

Research supported by MDA is directly linked to life-changing therapies across multiple neuromuscular diseases.

MDA is currently funding more than 170 grants with a total commitment of more than \$48 million.

In the last several years, four drugs have been approved by the FDA that can trace their origins to MDA funding. To date, only a handful of therapies have been approved to treat neuromuscular diseases.

Belvidere honors Martinez family on 100th year of being residents

It has been 100 years since Manuel and Alejandra Martinez established their home in Belvidere and, as such, they unknowingly became the first Latino members of the community.

Given that, Mayor Clint Morris has signed a proclamation setting aside Sept. 20, 2021, as Manuel and Alejandra Martinez Day in the city. He read from the proclamation at the Sept. 20 city council meeting in front of numerous representatives of the family.

The proclamation reads, in part:

"Manuel and Alejandra Martinez thrived in the box-car community in Belvidere, working for the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad, where he retired after 30-plus years ...

"Manuel and Alejandra Martinez provided for their 15 bilingual and bicultural children ...

"Becoming homeowners at 807 McKinley Ave. in Belvidere, thus establishing roots and becoming the first Latino family in the community and schools ...

"The city of Belvidere celebrates and recognizes the 100-year Latino legacy of Manuel and Alejandra Martinez ..." by recognizing the historic occasion and proclaiming Sept. 20, 2021, as Manuel and Alejandra Martinez Day.

The mayor's reading was greeted by a round of applause from among council, staff and representatives of the family who were in the audience.

And in response, a spokeswoman for the family said this was an important day for the family and for the Latino community.

U of I Extension offers Food Certified Food Protection Manager Class

The University of Illinois Extension will offer the Certified Food Protection Manager Course, formally known as the Food Service Sanitation Manager Course (FSSMC). This two-part class is an American National Standards Institute (ANSI) accredited course, which meets the Illinois Department of Public Health's Food Service Sanitation Code requirements.

During this two-day class, participants will gain knowledge about principles and recommendations of the FDA Food Code focused on food safety and contamination,

employee health and hygiene, safe food handling practices, cleaning and sanitizing, and HACCP.

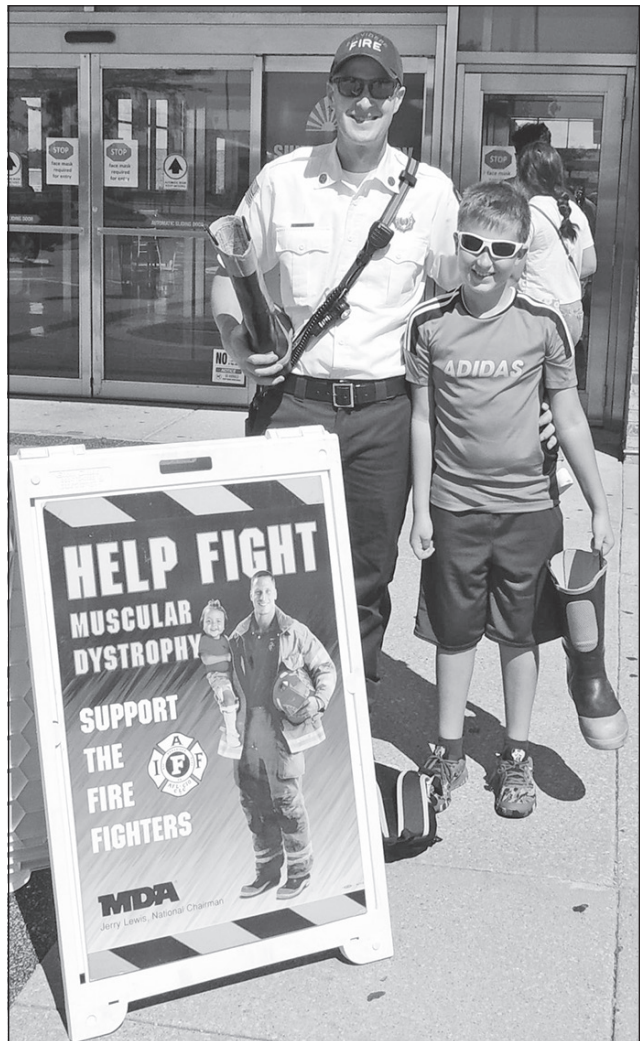

Supreme Court eviction order extended to coincide with governor's moratorium

Stay on judgments for 'covered persons' is set to expire Oct. 3

The Illinois Supreme Court has extended its order limiting judgments in certain eviction cases to Oct. 3, putting it in line with the governor's latest executive order.

The only thing changed in the Supreme Court order was the date it is set to expire, from Sept. 18 to Oct. 3. It still prevents dispositive motions, trials on the merits or judgments in residential eviction proceedings against a "covered person." Eviction cases can otherwise proceed as normal.

Covered persons include

those who expect to earn less than \$99,000 individually or \$198,000 in a joint filing household, if they've experienced financial hardships due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The tenant must also certify they are making "best efforts to make timely partial payments that are as close to the full payment" as "circumstances permit."

An eviction case can be exempt from the order if the landlord can prove they shared the necessary documentation with the tenant but did not receive proof that the tenant qualified as a covered person. Landlords can also

seek a judgment if a rental aid application has been denied or if the tenant refused to apply for one.

In a news release, the court said the extension will allow more renters to apply for aid through a court-based rental assistance program which launched earlier this month and received \$60 million in funding.

That program would allow a tenant to receive up to 12 months of past-due rent and three months in future rent, provided they can prove a loss of income due to COVID-19.

The Supreme Court has re-

quired that any summons in an eviction case must be accompanied by a form informing the tenant and landlord of the court-based program. It includes information on the program, what documentation is needed and the web address for the court-based aid, ilrpp.ihda.org. The Illinois Housing Development Authority call center can be reached at 866-454-3571.

The governor's order, which he extended Sept. 17, prevents law enforcement from enforcing an eviction of a covered person.

Assistance may also still be available in certain areas

through the Illinois Department of Human Services and the IHDA, the two state agencies overseeing disbursement of federal funding, at www.illinoisrentalassistance.org/providers.

In a statement, Pritzker's office noted Illinois paid out more than \$230 million in federal funds in 2020 and has made more than \$500 million available this year for rental assistance programs.

"While the eviction moratorium has kept families suffering hardship from losing their homes during the pandemic, these programs and additional resources will ensure families have a roof over their heads while they regain their financial footing into the future," Alex Hanns, a Pritzker spokesperson, said in an email.

"As we continue with the planned sunset of the eviction moratorium in coordination with the court system,

the Illinois Housing Development Authority will continue to review the pipeline of completed applications, and the Illinois Department of Human Services will continue to accept applications for additional rental assistance until funding runs out," he added.

The funds come from the federal government, which means applicants must be under certain income limits as defined by the U.S. Treasury. Those earning 80 percent of the area median income or less are eligible. That threshold differs based on the county, ranging from \$35,700 in Alexander County to \$52,200 in Cook County. It goes up about \$5,000-\$6,000 for each additional person in the household.

Popular renovation projects during the pandemic

Spending so much time at home during the pandemic led many homeowners to spruce up their homes. According to HomeAdvisor's 2021 State of Home Spending report, spending on home improvements increased by an average of \$745 per household in 2020.

2. Bathroom renovations: Real estate professionals routinely report how much prospective buyers love updated bathrooms, so it's no surprise that roughly 31 percent of

homeowners who took part in the HomeAdvisor report indicated they renovated their bathrooms in 2020.

3. Flooring: Floors took on a lot of extra traffic during the pandemic, so it shouldn't be too surprising that flooring projects were popular in 2020. More than one-fourth of participants told HomeAdvisor their homes were updated with a new floor during the pandemic.

4. Landscaping: With nowhere else to go to escape the daily grind in 2020, many homeowners took to their yards. Twenty-four percent of those homeowners reported making their backyard retreats more appealing by repairing or upgrading the landscaping outside their homes.

Restaurant closures and social distancing guidelines led many people to dine in more often than they otherwise would, and just under 23 percent of homeowners reported renovating their kitchens in 2020.

As the world gradually emerges from the pandemic, many homeowners who caught the renovation bug while in quarantine also will be emerging with what feels like an entirely new home.

Boone County Local Emergency Planning Committee Lunch & Learn

The Boone County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) sponsored a Lunch & Learn event designed to improve community awareness of potential emergencies. The lunch was held at the Community Building Complex of Boone County, 111 W. First St., on Tuesday, Sept. 14, at 11:30 a.m. Local first responders shared some details of the response to a recent chemical fire in Rockton as well as how residents can be prepared for a large-scale emergency like this.

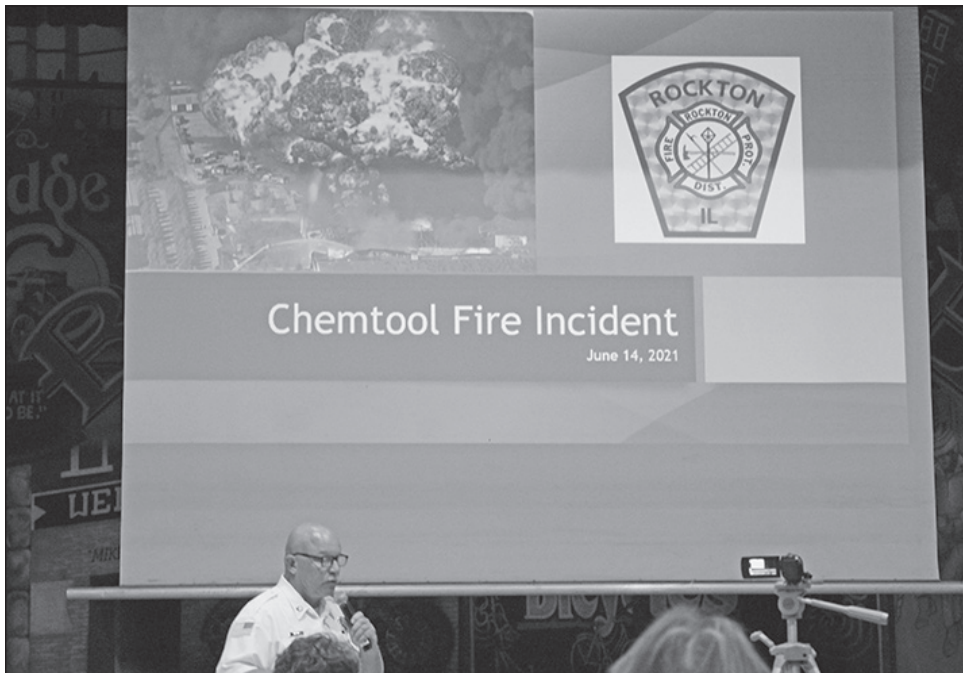
Following a boxed lunch, Lee Revels, LEPC chairperson, introduced all the speakers for the event and acknowledged the Belvidere firefighters and police in attendance. She then turned the microphone over to Boone County EMA (Emergency Management Agency) coordinator Dan Zaccard.

“Community members often don’t know what hazards exist in their community and what they should do when different emergencies occur,” he said. “If it’s a fire, the first thing you have to do is call 9-1-1, then get outside to a pre-planned rally point so you can make sure everyone in your family is safe. Many people have extra supplies—food and water—at home, but are you prepared if you are stranded in your car or truck? Do you have a blanket or needed supplies in your vehicle?”

When Zaccard finished his brief presentation, Captain Kyle Hill of the Rockford Fire Department asked if everyone had an emergency plan. If anything went awry, do you have a Plan B and a Plan C? He discussed the RFD Haz-Mat team and the importance of the fire department knowing the layout of a business, what chemicals are being used and where they are stored.

“It’s not because we are nosy, it’s so that we are prepared in case of emergency.”

When Hill completed his brief presentation, Rockton Fire Chief Kirk Wilson began discussing the Chem Tool fire on Monday, June 14. “This is the first time I have spoken of this incident publicly,” he said. “We are still waiting on

post-incident reports. There were a lot of agencies involved. It was a volatile situation but everyone was evacuated safely.

“The fire was caused by human error. An outside contractor was using a scissors lift to access the elevated heat transfer piping network when the lift hit an overhead, high-pressure mineral oil pipe which ruptured and the oil came pouring out. On the opposite side of the building, trucks were being loaded so the loading dock doors were all open with wind blowing through and fanning the flames.

“Our firefighters spotted the source of the flames quickly but the fire was already too advanced and the area was too dangerous. We pulled the fire crews out and began fighting the fire from outside. I activated our MABAS system to bring in help from surrounding agencies. Storage barrels were exploding out of the building projectiles were being thrown all over the area. Brush fires were starting all over town and we had exhausted all of our cards. I activated the MABAS system again to call for help from further away and all our sources were activated. This was the largest MABAS deployment in Illinois history.”

Agencies in Illinois and

Wisconsin that responded to the MABAS call were: three divisions of Wisconsin MABAS, 26 Illinois MABAS divisions, Strike Teams covered the community and Tasks Force deployed to the scene. 167 Fire Departments became involved in the incident including over 350 firefighters. The incident lasted for five days.

Additional resources that came to the aid of the Rockton Fire Department for the Chem Tool incident were: Illinois and Federal Environmental Protection Agency, Illinois Emergency Management Agency, Illinois National Guard, Dept. of Natural Resources, Occupational Safety & Health Administration, Illinois State Fire Marshal, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, Local and County Law Enforcement, Winnebago County Health Dept., US Fire Pump/Industrial Fire-fighting Co. from Holden, Louisiana, and HEPACO Environmental Inc./Clean Harbors.

“We knew we were losing to the fire and turned our attention to the people of the town. We had to deal with product runoff and environmental contamination. We had to evacuate everyone within a mile radius and they were out of their homes for four days. The Chem Tool fire chief was

on site on Tuesday.

“I knew we had to keep the public informed so I did nine press conferences. I did my best to show we were making good decisions and keeping everyone safe. I got a lot of questions about why we were letting the fire burn for four days. It was the best way to get rid of the mineral oil based product. The Rock River flowed only 300 yards away.

“While we had some absorbent booms, we certainly did not have enough to deal with the entire incident. HEPACO Environmental had the booms but they had to drive 13 hours to get them here. We set out booms at the site and HEPACO dug trenches to prevent runoff. We put booms by the hydro plant. We put booms downriver. Environmental agencies are still testing the Rock River. HEPACO also brought in 50 huge storage tanks and pumped the ruined product into the tanks for disposal.”

“The mission of any local planning committee is to help educate the people who live and work in that area so that when an emergency occurs residents know what to do to keep themselves, their families, and their coworkers safe,” added Lee Revels, Boone County LEPC chairperson.
