



Aggravated vehicular hijacking and aggravated battery arrests made

Illinois State Police (ISP) District 15 Investigations arrested and charged Mark X.

Malone, a 43-year-old male of Rockford with one count of Aggravated Battery (Class 3 Felony) and Juwan M. Williams, a 19-year-old male also of Rockford with two counts of Aggravated Battery and one count of Vehicular Hijacking (Class 1 Felony).

On July 3, 2021, at approximately 6:58 a.m., ISP District 15 Patrol Troopers responded to a reported aggravated vehicular hijacking and hit-andrun traffic crash at the Belvidere Oasis on Interstate 90

westbound at milepost 24.2 in Boone County. Upon the Troopers' arrival, they learned the victim was battered and the suspects took his vehicle. The victim, a 60-year-old male of Elgin sustained minor

the area in the victim's vehicle, they were involved in a hit-and-run traffic crash with an unoccupied parked vehicle. There were no injuries

A thorough investigation ensued, and ISP District 15 Agents were able to identify Malone and Williams as the suspects. On Aug. 20, the Boone County State's Attorney's Office approved one count of Aggravated Battery against Malone and Williams, and arrest warrants were granted for both suspects. On Sept. 1, ISP Agents took Wilcident. On Sept. 14, a Boone County Grand Jury indicted Williams on an additional count of Aggravated Battery and one count of Vehicular Hijacking (Class 1 Felony). On Oct. 6, Malone was taken into custody by ISP Agents without incident. Malone and Williams were both transported to the Boone County Jail where they remain in custody. Bond was set at \$100,000, 10 percent to apply for Malone and Williams. No further information is available at this

Remember that old parlor game where players tried to relate any actor to one particular actor? You know ... that skinny dancing guy? It was based on the six degrees of separation concept that asserts that any two people on Earth are only six or fewer links apart. Well, in this Bizarre Belvidere article, the connection is going to be between General Allen C. Fuller and six historical sites in town. So, join me as we play Six Degrees to Allen Fuller.

First, a little background on General Allen C. Fuller. Fuller was born in 1823 in Farmington, Connecticut, the second son in a family of six sons and three daughters. His father, Lucius, heard of the riches to be had in the west so moved the family to Illinois in 1846. Lucius Fuller settled his family in Belvidere while Allen Fuller was finishing his law studies. Once settled in Belvidere Lucius became one of the early postmasters and served as a county judge. By late 1846, Allen Fuller had completed his law studies and was admitted to

the Supreme Court. In November of 1846, he followed his family to Belvidere and set up law practice. Allen C. Fuller would remain in Belvidere for the rest of his life and serve as Adjutant General in the Civil War. He would sit on the boards of Belvidere's largest companies, organize two local banks, serve in the House of Representatives, be chosen as Speaker of the House, and serve two terms in the Senate, introducing railroad reform bills and setting up state charitable organizations. An influential figure throughout Ilinois, General Allen C. Fuller also has connection to many of Belvidere's historical buildings. Let's take a look at six of them, which you likely see every day as you drive about Belvidere.

1. First and most prominent

is the Boone County Courthouse at 601 North Main St. Built in 1855, our courthouse is the second oldest in the state of Illinois. The courthouses of surrounding cities at that time were primarily wood structures. One dissatisfied critic stated that Rockford's courthouse looked like a saloon, Woodstock's like an old country barn, with Geneva's the worst of all.

Determined to present a more solid and professional looking structure, the Building Committee of the Boone County Board hired a builder named John Higby to construct it. Higby put in a solid foundation and brick walls up to four feet, but began to grumble that the cost of the project was too much for what he was paid and walked away from the contract. With a partial building in place and an already substantial outlay of cash, it was too late for the board to abandon the building. "Al" Fuller, an upcoming young lawyer/banker, was appointed by the board to oversee the rest of the construction. With his systematic attention to detail, Fuller had the courthouse completed by the end of the year, providing Belvidere with one of the best-looking courthouses west of Chicago. Additional costs were incurred,

2. Second is the City Hall building, today known at the south side of the Belvidere Fire Station, 123 S. State St.. Built in 1884, Belvidere's historic City Hall cost around \$10,000 for its construction with the building lot donated by Samuel Longcor. General Fuller, however, donated large sums of money to furnish the second-floor interior, which consisted of city chambers, an engineer's office, and the original Ida Public Library, established with another donation of \$5,000 from Fuller. These furnishings included wine-colored plush curtains throughout the building, polished wood floors, stained glass windows, hand-carved walnut tables and shelves in both quarters, plus ornate chandeliers. It is interesting to note, however, that for all its grandeur, the city hall building was not connected to sewer services nor did it have furnace heat until 1897. In addition, a third story addition to the building was proposed in 1899 to expand the library but was deemed too costly and impractical. A new fire station was built next door in 1917 in matching style and the two buildings were eventually joined to form the Belvidere Fire Station.

3. The next four degrees of General Allen Fuller were sadly established after his passing. At his death, General Fuller's estate was estimated at one million dollars. In today's moneys that would amount to a staggering \$32 million. Most of his estate went to his only surviving child, Katherine (Kitty) Fuller Rhinehart. However, Fuller carefully planned out his vision of Belvidere's future and left funds to many organizations in town, which were earmarked for that vision. One of those lucky recipients was Perry School on West Perry St. General Fuller was a big believer in education, especially early education, and often lamented the lack of early learning for children.

His will contained the gift of \$5,000, or \$162,000 in today's dollars, to Perry School for the establishment of a kindergarten. An annex was added to the side of the historic structure for

1905 the Allen C. Fuller Kindergarten of Perry School held its grand opening. For many years, the kindergarten classes of Perry School paid annual visits to Belvidere Cemetery to lay flowers on his grave in a show of gratitude.

4. Now a wealthy heiress, Katherine was determined to follow in her father's philanthropic footsteps by contributing to the expansion of the Ida Public Library. The library itself, established in the city hall with a donation from Fuller and named after his deceased daughter, was running out of space. Belvidere was growing rapidly and the general public flocked to the free public library in an age when television, computers, cellphones, and Google were not yet invented. As previously mentioned,

the city had thought about adding a third story but determined such an addition may not be safe. A new plan had been devised to add on to the side of the city hall. Recall that the fire station had not yet been built by this time and the land next door was available. However, recent flooding of the unpredictable Kishwaukee River had brought an influx of water into the ground floor of city hall, an event that would be damaging to a library located on the ground floor of an expansion. Katherine Rhinehart, hearing of the plans, quickly offered to give the city \$20,000 for a new library building, provided she could choose the lot. Katherine had already selected and purchased a lot on North State St. for her own family home and in her persistent way of looking out for her family, wanted the library to be closer to the soon to be constructed home. Katherine purchased the abandoned stone home of Simon Bassett at 320 N. State, just a couple of blocks kitty corner from her new lot. However, the county suddenly billed the estate thousands of dollars in back taxes for her father's agricultural properties, so an incensed Katherine withdrew the cash offer but still contributed the lot to the building project.

The library board, with Katherine as chair of the finance committee, appealed to the Andrew Carnegie Founbrary opened its doors in 1912. Katherine Rhinehart remained on the board of the library until her death in 1927, serving on the finance committee, selecting books for the library, and donating annual funds for library operations. Today, the original front portion of the library is almost exactly the same as the day it was built to Carnegie specifications. A massive, framed portrait of Ida Fuller Hovey, originally donated by General Fuller to the city hall library location at its 1885 grand opening, still hangs on the library's north wall.

5. Next up is the stately home Katherine Rhinehart built at 605 North State St. in 1906. Katherine suffered a great deal of family loss in her life; her brother Frank died when she was 7, her mother Nancy when she was 14, brother Will died when she was 20, her sister Ida in 1883 just when Katherine's first son was born, and that baby son, Allen, died at the age of 3. Katherine was understandably obsessed with keeping her remaining two children close after these tragic family losses. She wanted to create a cultured and safe environment for Ida and Frank, especially since they were now in the teenage years typically filled with desires to flee home

and see the world. The magnificent mansion she built provided a large and comfortable library, a grand staircase for theatrical adventures, and a magnificent third floor gallery for dances, plays, and all manner of guest rooms to accommodate the friends of her teenaged children. Although son Frank eventually married and moved a couple of houses down, daughter Ida remained at home until Katherine's death in 1927. Afterwards, perhaps resentful of the years spent tied to her mother's apron strings or perhaps from loneliness, Ida married Reverend John Scambler and sold the home along with most of its contents to Hugh Funderburg, another great contributor to Belvidere's progress. Today, thanks to a generous donation by the Funderburg descendants, the stately home, now forever known as The Funderburg Home, is owned by the dation for the funds and the Boone County Historical Mu-tion game.

6. Last on the degrees list is the massive Apollo Theater at 104 N. State St. Katherine's son, Frank, developed a love of the theater and acting in school, starring in many school productions and professing a desire to work in big city theaters after college. By 1917, the Derthick Opera House on N. State had caught fire and burned to the ground. Determined to keep Frank close to home, Katherine purchased and cleared the Opera House

She formed the Belvidere Company, with son Frank in charge, to oversee the building of a brand-new structure named the Apollo Theater. Katherine continued to contribute funds to the Belvidere Company while son Frank managed the theater and starred in various productions. The theater flourished, drawing large crowds, until Frank's untimely death at age 38 in 1926. After Katherine died in 1927, the theater passed into various managements, ownerships, and stockholders over the years. Today, the Apollo still operates as a concert venue. The original interior curtains and furnishings are long gone, but the beautiful brick exterior is nearly the same as the day it was built.

These are just six degrees in which General Allen Fuller influenced the development of our community. His reach extended far and wide and includes the establishment of the very first Boone County Fair, the co-founding of the University of Illinois at Urbana, the construction of many of the brick storefronts still remaining in downtown Belvidere, and of course, his courageous leadership of our troops in the Civil War. Fuller's influence reminds us that one person can make a difference in their community, a difference that can stretch through generations.

I hope you enjoyed this historic Belvidere version of the Six Degrees game. Although much of Belvidere's history has changed and some buildings have not withstood the test of time, it's marvelous to see we have not lost all of our golden days of yesteryear. We are all winners in the preserva-


