The impact on the decision by the Stockton Village Board will mean increased funding for the right to offer video gaming machines to residents and travelers. Businesses which were operating with six machines, as example, were paying \$15 per machine, netting the Village a little under a hundred dollars per location. Now, with the decision being made to change how much each machine will be worth to operate, the revenue per location could bring in the Village of Stockton close to \$1,500 per location.

Some business owners have expressed interest as to why the increase was necessary. Others say since it has occurred, what does that mean for the community.

Linda Gonnerman was. The end result is the dollars that have been received by the Village of Stockton can be put to use on infrastructure improvements. Loans, such as those offered through agencies such as the IEPA or USDA, often involve long term commitments, in exchange for much more relaxed interest charges correlating.

For the past year and more, finding the dollars that have been offered through the State of Illinois and the United States Federal Government has been a focused duty of Board Members and others reporting to municipal leaders. Because of the age of many of the roads and underlying water transfer systems in the Village of Stockton hundreds of thousands to millions of dollars will have to be spent over the next decade and beyond to improve things.

Citizen contributions such as tax-assessed support is just one stream of revenue for the Village of Stockton. With the amount of work that has to be done to stabilize the base of the community and in an effort to build up to the surface with new walkways and through ways, more money has to be found.

Filing for forgivable grants and low-interest loans are just a couple of the paths Village Officials have been following in order to better prepare the community for decades of needed and constant improve-

# Durbin: Lock and dam upgrades a 'game changer' for Illinois farmers

If farming is a school of patience, then securing federal funding for the agriculture industry is, too.

Just ask U.S. Sen. Dick Durbin, who joined other Illinois legislators in finally harvesting their own 15-year infrastructure crop, yielding \$829 million from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act to upgrade a pair of locks and dams on the upper Mississippi River.

"It's about time," Durbin said during a news conference from inside the lockhouse at the Peoria Lock and Dam on the Illinois River. "Today, it's the river. Tomorrow it's the highways. The day after, it's the bridges. You're going to hear a lot more about this.

In total, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will spend more than \$1.3 billion starting in fiscal year 2022 to upgrade inland waterway systems across Illinois.

A majority of those funds (\$732 million) will be used to build a new 1,200-foot lock chamber just north of the confluence of the Mississippi and Illinois rivers, while \$97.1 million will cover a new fish passage at Lock and Dam 22.

Another \$50 million in various repairs will be split by Locks and Dams 11, 13, 14, 15, 17, 20 and 21, according to Corps plans.

Facilities along the Illinois River will also undergo \$83 million in improve-

Dresden, LaGrange, Lockport, Marseilles, Peoria and Starved Rock locks and dams.

"The monumental infrastructure package that we passed on to the Biden administration is what is making this happen," U.S. Rep. Cheri Bustos, D-East Moline, said during the January news conference. "You have to go back to the Eisenhower administration to see this kind of investment."

"We decided as a delegation to fight for, see if we could bring money in for locks and dams in the state of Illinois and in the Midwest,' Durbin said. "And we frankly weren't getting anywhere."

The hang-up, Durbin said, was that cost-benefit ratio calculations to invest in locks and dams weren't appetizing enough — more tax dollars would be spent than economic

So, Durbin and Bustos tied investments infrastructure with ecosystem restorations through the Navigation Ecosystem Sustainability Program-and it worked.

ments, including repairs to the water infrastructure, howev- Larger locks mean barges carrying corn and soybeans can move up and down the river faster, getting products to market more quickly and reducing transportation costs,

they said. "We've had record yields in corn and soybeans, so we've got to make sure that we have efficient ways to get these to market," Bustos said, noting how a modern 15-barge tow transports the equivalent of 950 bushels of corn.

When a barge approaches the current 600-foot chamber at Lock and Dam 25, it must decouple, a process that takes two to three hours. With the 1,200-foot chamber, a barge can pass in 30 to 45 minutes.

"The economic impact is a game changer for our farmers, (who are) more competitive now in the world than they've ever had to be," Durbin said. "They're going to get a boost and an opportunity in that re-





To be eligible to apply, individuals must be residents of



## City of Freeport responds to Furst-McNess relocation

After 114 years headquartered in Freeport, Furst-Mc-Company Ness has announced it will relocate its corporate headquarters to Rockford, Illinois by Sept. 1. This announcement comes after the formerly family-controlled company was sold in 2021 to a subsidiary of Easy Bio, an agriculturally based multi-national headquartered in Seoul, South Korea.

In McNess' announcement, the company cited "proximity to Chicago and air transportation, and advantages in recruiting talent in and near



larger metropolitan areas" as primary reasons for the move. Mark Poeschl, Furst-McNess President and CEO, indicated that all 35 Freeport-based employees are expected to remain with the company following the relocation, either by remote work or commuting to the Rockford location.

When we consider how the tooth fairy legend developed throughout the world, we also have to take into consideration that the concept of humans and their relationships to fairies,

particularly in a monetary exchange, have long been part of European and British folklore. Over time and across cultures we wound up with the concept of burying the teeth under a pillow where a fairy could sneak in while the child was sleeping and pay a tooth fee for the treasure. The form she took, whether fairy, mouse, or rabbit, depended on the culture and who was telling the story.

In America, a visit from the Tooth Fairy is a highly anticipated event for millions of children. National Tooth Fairy Day is a holiday observed annually on both Feb. 28 and Aug. 22. It was created as a way to recognize this little legend which makes losing those first teeth something to celebrate rather than fear. The Tooth Fairy legend not only brings smiles to the faces of children throughout the world but offers an opportunity for parents to teach their children how to take care of their permanent teeth, which must last for the rest of their lives. It is celebrated twice a year to remind them that they need to get their teeth examined and cleaned every six months.

The not so skinny cook

It is hard to believe we are in the last full week of February. We continue with the up and down temperatures. The snow seems to go south of us, and that is good for driving and walking. We have some interesting recipes for this week that should make dealing with winter weather easier.

## Endive, Romaine, and Orange Salad for Two

This recipe is for two people, but you can easily double or triple it for more. If you are not an endive lover, you can substitute Arugula or a red leaf lettuce. You can substitute rice wine vinegar or red wine vinegar for the sherry vinegar.

- 3 T. extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 T. fresh orange juice
- 4 t. sherry vinegar
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1 t. black pepper

## Sausage and Kale Lentil Stew

This hearty soup is a great winter favorite. I like lentils in soups, so this recipe is delicious to me. If you want to substitute spinach for kale, the soup will be tasty too.

1 lb. bulk pork sausage

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. baby carrots, chopped small onion, finely chopped

4 garlic cloves, minced

4 plum tomatoes, halved <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. roasted sweet red pep-

pers 1 C. dried lentils, rinsed

2 cans (14 1/2 oz. each) vegetable broth

1 bay leaf

 $\frac{1}{2}$  t. ground cumin

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> t. pepper

2 C. coarsely chopped fresh kale

In a Dutch oven, cook the sausage, carrots, and onion over medium-high heat 8-10 minutes or until sausage is no longer pink, breaking up sausage into crumbles. Stir in the garlic; cook two minutes longer. Drain.

Place the tomatoes and red peppers in a food processor; process until finely chopped. Add to sausage mixture; stir in lentils, broth, and seasonings. Bring to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer, covered, 20 minutes stirring occasionally. Stir in kale; cook 10 to 15 minutes longer or until lentils and kale are tender. Remove the bay leaf before serving.

## **Chicken Divan**

Chicken Divan is one of those retro recipes I mentioned a couple of weeks ago. It started as a chicken breast recipe with broccoli and a sauce; today it is usually a casserole made with soups, cooked chicken, rice, and broccoli.

1/4 C. plus 1 T. butter, divided

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> C. flour

1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. half-and-half cream 1/2 C. water

2 cans condensed cream of chicken soup, undiluted

2 pkgs. (10 oz. each) frozen cut or chopped broccoli, thawed

1 C. cooked rice

3 to 4 C. cooked chicken 2 C. shredded cheddar cheese

1 C. soft breadcrumbs

Parsley for garnish

In a small saucepan, melt 1/4 C. butter. Add flour, stirring until blended. Stir in the cream and water: cook and stir until thickened and bubbly. Cook and stir 2 more minutes. Blend in soup until smooth; remove from the heat and set aside.

Place broccoli in an ungreased 9 x 13 baking dish. Cover with rice and then half of the sauce. Top with chicken. Stir shredded cheese into remaining sauce; pour over the chicken. Melt remaining butter and toss with breadcrumbs. Sprinkle over the casserole. Bake, uncovered at 350 for 35 to 45 minutes or until heated through. Garnish with parsley.

## **Baked Spaghetti**

Baked spaghetti is a popular food recipe this year. This is a casserole that puts all the good things about spaghetti and meat into a 9 x 13 baking pan.

1 pkg. (16 oz.) spaghetti

1 lb. ground beef 1 medium onion, chopped

- 1 jar (24 oz.) pasta sauce
- $\frac{1}{2}$  t. salt 2 eggs
- 1/3 C. Parmesan cheese
- 5 T. butter, melted 2 C. 4 % cottage cheese

4 C. shredded mozzarella

cheese Chopped basil for garnish

Preheat oven to 350. Cook spaghetti according to package directions for al dente. In a large skillet, cook beef and onion over medium heat until beef is no longer pink, and onion is tender, 6 to 8 minutes, breaking beef into crumbles; drain. Stir in pasta sauce and salt; set aside.

In a large bowl, whisk the eggs, Parmesan cheese and butter. Drain spaghetti; add to egg mixture and toss to coat. Place half the spaghetti mixture in a greased 9 x 13 baking dish. Top with half the cottage cheese, meat sauce and mozzarella cheese. Repeat layers. Place baking dish on a rimmed baking sheet.

Cover and bake for 40 minutes. Uncover and bake until heated through, 20 to 25 minutes longer. Let stand for 15 minutes before serving. Sprinkle with basil to garnish

## Lavered Brownie Dessert

Are you tired of plain brownies? This recipe has lots of wonderful flavors with lots of chocolate as its base. It is easy and great for the sweet tooth.

1 C. butter, softened 2 C. sugar 4 eggs 1 t. vanilla 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. flour <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> C. baking cocoa 1/2 t. salt <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> t. baking powder

#### Filling:

- 11 oz. cream cheese, softened
  - 2 C. powdered sugar 2 C. whipped topping
- **Topping:**
- 2 C. cold whole milk

a large mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy, 5 to 7 minutes. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in vanilla. In another bowl, whisk flour, cocoa, salt, and baking powder; add to creamed mixture just until moistened. Fold in nuts.

Transfer to a greased 9 x 13 baking pan. Bake until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out with moist crumbs, 20 to 25 minutes. Cool completely on a wire rack.

In a small bowl, beat cream cheese and confectioners' sugar until smooth. Fold in whipped topping; spread over brownies. In a large bowl, whisk milk and pudding mix 2 minutes. Spread over filling. Refrigerate for 1 hour or until serving. Cut into squares, garnish with whipped topping and nuts.

1 C. powdered sugar

6 oz. white baking chocolate, melted

 $\frac{1}{2}$  C. dried cranberries, chopped

Preheat oven to 350. In a large microwave safe bowl, melt the butter; stir in the brown sugar. Cool slightly. Add eggs, one egg at a time, beating well after each ad-dition. Beat in vanilla. In a separate bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder, salt, and cinnamon; stir into butter mixture. Stir in cranberries and chopped chocolate (batter will be thick). Spread into a greased 9 x 13 pan sprayed with cooking spray.

Bake until golden brown and a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean (do not over bake) 18 to 21 minutes. Cool completely on a wire rack.

For the frosting, beat cream cheese and powdered sugar until smooth. Gradually beat in half of the melted white chocolate; spread over blondies. Sprinkle with cranberries; drizzle with remaining melted chocolate. Cut into triangles. Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator.

## Rutherford Refuge at Twin Bridges becomes JDCF's first nature preserve

The title of "Nature Preserve" carries a very special meaning within the State of Illinois, and it's not a title that is easily attained. A Nature Preserve dedication is the highest form of legal protection that a natural area can achieve in the State of Illinois without an act of Congress.

"Nature Preserve" is also an official status that is reserved for only the rarest and highest-quality natural areas in Illinois. The Rutherford Refuge at Twin Bridges is one such natural area. It contains the "best of kind" wet-mesic prairie and sedge meadow habitats located within Illi-

nois's portion of Driftless Area. The refuge also contains dry-mesic prairie, oak barrens, oak savanna, upland forest, and cool water stream habitats that paint a unique mosaic of habitat types on the landscape, which are home to several rare plant and insect species.

Acquired by Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation (JDCF) in December 2020, the Rutherford Refuge at Twin Bridges was founded with generous financial support from the Rutherford Family and the Illinois Clean Energy Community Foundation. It's named in memory of John and Barbara Rutherford who owned and stewarded the property from 1988 to 2018.

"Our mom had a vision," said Bryn Davis, one of John and Barbara Rutherford's four children that helped create the refuge. "I know she and dad would be thrilled beyond words at the fact that Twin Bridges has been dedicated as a Nature Preserve! They knew that it was a special place and they wanted it to be protected and available for others to enjoy. This dedication just reinforces what our parents and JDCF saw in this little gem of a place."


