Ukraine farmer shows great resolve amid Russian invasion

FARMWEEK Ukrainian farm-Kohctahtuh Xomehko showed the kind of determination and fortitude currently on display by his fellow countrymen and women during an online meeting with farmers in the Midwest.

Kohctahtuh (pronounced Konstantine) said his "heart is in great pain" but he's extremely confident Ukrainian army can defeat the invading Russians. He also showed the same resolve when asked if farmers in Ukraine will still be able to plant this year's crops amid the war.

"I'm 100 percent sure we can win because it's about people, not just weapons," Xomehko said from his farm during a Zoom call hosted at the Macon County Farm Bureau in Decatur attended by several board members and

'We're together workingall the people in Ukraine," he said. "I understand our army is not that big, but we're very motivated. There are people you know who are dying. We'll never forgive the Rus-

Ukraine farmers are helping their army by providing and transporting diesel fuel and fabricating metal objects for the army to flatten tires on Russian vehicles.

Ukrainian farmers also plow a majority of their fields, which has made it difficult for some Russian tanks to cross without getting stuck.

When asked how other nations, including the U.S., can help resolve the conflict, Xomehko called for air sup-

"We need support to close the air. We don't need soldiers," he said.

But thus far the North Atlantic Treaty Organization has rejected Ukraine's demand to implement no-fly zones.

Meanwhile, reports sug-3 million gest roughly Ukrainian refugees had fled the country in recent weeks. But Ukrainian farmers remain determined to produce their crops this year.

Yes. 100 percent we'll be planting, spraying and fertilizing," Xomehko said when asked about his spring plans





Former prosecutor shares thoughts on what's ahead for former speaker

It's been two weeks since prosecutors indicted former Illinois House Speaker Michael Madigan and a little over one week since he and alleged co-conspirator Michael McClain each entered not guilty pleas on charges including racketeering and bribery.

While the 106-page, 22-count indictment was the culmination of years of investigation into what prosecutors allege to be a near-decadelong "criminal enterprise" overseen by the former speaker, it could be a while before we find out whether the charges stick.

"I cannot imagine seeing a plea deal in this case," said Nancy DePodesta, a former federal prosecutor and current white-collar criminal defense lawyer at Saul Ewing Arnstein & Lehr. "I also think that you're going to see a significant delay before this case goes to trial."

DePodesta's point of view

is an interesting one. From 2003 to 2015 she was a prosecutor in the U.S. Attorney's Office of the Northern District of Illinois – the same office that indicted Madigan and

She doesn't have any insider details, and she's not involved in the trial. But she did share her thoughts with me on what comes next, in a general sense, as someone whose been on both sides of similar legal fights.

For starters, she said, we can expect to see pretrial motions aiming to suppress evidence. Madigan's team could try to toss recordings of Mc-Clain's phone calls with other individuals, she said.

McClain, a long-time Madigan confidante, was initially indicted in November 2020 in connection with a years-long bribery scheme involving utility giant Commonwealth Edison, in which the company admitted to bribing Madigan and others with no-work jobs in exchange for favorable legislation.

DePodesta said it appears the feds had a wiretap on Mc-Clain's calls, and his role in the case is an important one. If the jury believes he acted on behalf of the speaker, it will help the prosecution. But if they believe McClain was a rogue actor, they may be likelier to acquit the former speaker.

"The challenge for the government is really to tie former Speaker Madigan to what was occurring here," DePodesta

The government is seeking to prove several charges under the federal Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act, a 1970 law originally written to go after mafia types.

It's the statute that DePodesta said was used when she was working on an investigation and prosecution of the Latin Kings street gang in her time with the prosecutor's of-

"After a seven-year investigation and multiple indictments along the way, and wiretaps and, you know, cooperating witnesses and sources, we brought RICO charges against the leadership of the Latin Kings street gang," she said.

'It's obviously very different substantively in terms of the acts that were committed and programs of the conspiracy. But there's a lot of parallels with the RICO," DePosta added.

racketeering charges against Madigan to stick, she said, the prosecution will have to prove that the parties engaged in an agreement - formal or informal for an unlawful purpose.

"And then they have to establish that there were acts

done in furtherance of that conspiracy. And here those acts would be the attempts to solicit bribes, perhaps the killing of legislation or passing legislation in exchange for jobs given to political allies," she said.

The indictment alleges that Madigan used his political offices as speaker and committeeman for Chicago's 13th Ward, as well as his control over the Illinois Democratic Party and the 13th Ward Democratic Organization, and his position at the Chicago law firm of Madigan & Getzendanner, to further the goals of what the feds have dubbed "The Madigan Enterprise."

In defending himself, Madigan could argue, DePodesta said, that much of what the government describes as racketeering isn't that far beyond the parameters of what would be expected from anyone in a powerful office such as speaker of the House.

'So I think that if I'm the defense, I certainly want to try to minimize some of the statements, point to some of the things that perhaps the speaker did not say," she said. "Certainly, explain what it means to be the speaker of the House, and what are some of the functions that are expected in in that capacity."

It appears that Madigan's lawyers, Sheldon Zenner and Gil Soffer, viewed that as a strong angle as well when they sent out a media statement on the same day of the indictment.

"I was never involved in any criminal activity," Madigan said in a statement. "The government is attempting to criminalize a routine constituent service: job recommendations. That is not illegal, and these other charges are equally unfounded."

As it stands, the 106-page indictment provides a roadmap for how the government will try the case, DePodesta said. But prosecutors may be wishing they had another source, such as a cooperating witness or other informant.

"The government's case is made up of a lot of different pieces that they will ultimately tie together. It seems, however, that they don't necessarily have somebody to provide context for some of the recordings to really tell a story," she said.

While the prosecution may have been hoping McClain's inclusion in the indictment would lead him to "flip" on the speaker, his public statements so far don't indicate that such a scenario is likely, DePodesta said.

But that doesn't mean there won't be other witnesses testifying against the former speaker that haven't been named in media reports or court documents thus far.

limited to the evidence that it has on the date of indictment," she said. "In fact, it is very common for the government's case to improve and become an even stronger case, as they continue to investigate and prepare for trial."


John Lausch Jr., the lead prosecutor in the case, made clear the investigation was ongoing in a news conference announcing the indictment, and he even called for others to come forward with more information.

The next status hearing in the case is scheduled for April



word after word. It's a one and done. You do the Wordle and wait until tomorrow for a new word to become Wordle-



it's a different word, because playing any other way would be boring.

Then there is the other group, to which I belong. I call us the rigid Wordlers because we have standard words to start our journey each day. Within my first two words, the goal is to use all five vowels along with a handful of the most popular consonants. Lately, my first word is "autos." For the longest time, my second word was "brine," but a couple of weeks ago I changed that to "diner" because I thought having the "er" at the end might be advantageous.

Within a week of that change, the Wordle for the day was (wait for it...) brine. Exclamation point. So much for the "er" on the end being advantageous. Suffice to say I didn't do any bragging on social media that day.

Once I start a game, I finish it within minutes. One of my sons will take a guess or two and then ponder it for an hour or more while he goes about the rest of his day. There are as many techniques to Wordle as there are five-letter words in the English language - and that's a lot.

Some days, the word is tougher than others. This happens (in my opinion) when one letter is used twice in the same word. For instance you know there is an S or a V or an I in your word, but you might not consider two of each of those letters. Consider "vivid," "eases" and "shush."

A year ago, Wordle wasn't in my vocabulary, because it hadn't been invented yet. Now, according to the New York Times, more than 300,000 people play it

daily. I'm one of them. And other countries are jumping on the bandwagon. Canada has its own version called Canuckle.

In times that can seem scary and bleak, Wordle is a vivid bright light. It eases us toward peace, and when we solve, we shush so we don't spoil the quest for others. It can bring about a sense of pride and unity with other Wordlers. From my perspective, there's only one thing that could make it more perfect: If Wordle itself was a five-letter word. But that would be asking a lot – or better put in Wordle terms – heaps, loads and scads.

Pearl City boys drop season opener to Warren Stockton

The Pearl City Wolves' baseball squad had a tough ask in their season opener as they were scheduled to face off with the Warren-Stockton Warhawks. The Warhawks return off a 19-1 season so the Wolves, who went 8-8 last season, found themselves facing some of the best competition from day one.

The Warhawks had everything working from the start as they scored runs in every single inning of the game. Their high-powered offense allowed the game to end after just five innings as the Warhawks held a ten-run lead. The Wolves did their best to avoid the ten-run rule as they tallied their first three runs in the top of the fifth. Miles Freedlund drove in their first run with a swinging bunt that drove in Nathan Brinkmeier to score. The ensuing throw went astray, allowing Freedlund to reach second base. The next at bat, James Freytag tripled to drive in Riley Schauer and Freedlund. The three-run inning allowed the Wolves to come within nine, but one run in the bottom half allowed the Warhawks to end the game by way of the ten-run rule. Freitag was a perfect three for three on the game with two RBI. Unfortunately, that was most of their offense as Freedlund and Brinkmeier were the only other Wolves to tally hits. Pearl City Head Coach,

Ryne Plager, is excited for what the Wolves have to offer this season. "Coming off a five hundred season last year in which we were picked to finish last, I have pretty high expectations for these guys.' Plager said ahead of the season opener. Entering his third season as head coach, Plager hopes to see his team accomplish big things for the Pearl City program. "These guys have got the taste of winning and I think they are eager to pick up where we left off. We have a team goal of competing for a conference title and winning a Regional, which hasn't happened at Pearl City in over 20 years." Plager explained.



Incidentally; Oral health care before, during, and after pregnancy major component of overall health. Women who are pregnant or planning to be pregnant should be aware that pregnancy presents a unique set of challenges

to maintaining oral health

and that their oral health has a direct impact on their developing fetus.

Rising hormone levels and physiological changes that occur during pregnancy can lead to dental problems such as gingivitis (swollen, red gums), tooth decay and periodontal disease (which is a proven link between premature birth and low birth weight).

Pregnant women may also develop oral lesions, known as pregnancy tumors (these are not cancerous, may bleed, and are the result of increased hormone levels and inflammation) and loose teeth in the absence of oral disease (response to increased hormone levels that generally resolves after

Approximately twothirds of pregnant women experience morning sickness and/or acid reflux, which can lead to elevated levels of acid in the mouth. Pregnant women often develop food cravings, especially for foods with a high sugar content, which further increases acidity in the mouth. These acids can erode the protective enamel layer of the teeth and lead to cavities. Therefore, it is best for both you and your unborn child that you schedule a dental appointment before you become pregnant so that any oral problems can be diagnosed and treated, your teeth can be professionally

cleaned, and your oral health routine can be evaluated and adjusted as needed.

Maintaining oral health throughout your pregnancy is necessary and dental checkups are safe. However, it is important to let your obstetrician know when you are scheduling a dental appointment.

Each pregnancy is unique, and you may have additional medical conditions or past pregnancy complications that your obstetrician will want to communicate to your dentist. Make sure that your dentist knows that you are pregnant, provide a complete health history and a complete list of all overthe-counter medications, vitamins, supplements, and prescription medications that you are currently taking.

Routine and emergency dental care can be done at any point in your pregnancy, but no elective

dental procedures should be scheduled until after your child is born. If vou experience a dental emergency, a diagnostic x-ray will not harm your fetus and your dentist will utilize a protective apron and thyroid collar as well. Treatment for a dental infection must not be delayed. There are some antibiotics that are deemed safe for use during pregnancy and effective pain management will decrease stress for both mom and baby. Nonemergency dental work is ideally performed during the second semester and should not be scheduled during the last six weeks of pregnancy.

Pregnancy can add a whole new meaning to the word exhaustion. Do not allow this to interfere with your oral care routine. When you care for yourself, you are also caring for your unborn child. When you do not remove the

bacteria in your mouth, it can enter the bloodstream and travel to the uterus. It is imperative that you floss and brush your teeth twice a day. If you have morning sickness, do not brush your teeth immediately after you vomit. Instead, rinse with fluoridated tap water. Using a small, soft toothbrush and brushing later in the morning, after the worse of the nausea has passed, often helps. Drink plenty of tap water, as its fluoride strengthens your teeth and provides defense against tooth decay. Rinse with tap water between meals, as frequent snacking also leads to the increased production of the bacteria, Streptococcus mutans. which produces more acid to weaken enamel. Your dentist may also prescribe a fluoride rinse.

Your babies' teeth are forming by the end of your first trimester, so make sure to eat a nutritious diet high in calcium, protein,

and vitamins A, C, D & B12, and low in sugar, throughout your entire pregnancy. When taking vitamin supplements, such as folic acid, do not choose the chewy or gummy types that stick on your teeth.

After delivery, if you have not experienced any dental complications, you can return to your regularly scheduled dental visits. However, if you have experienced dental complications, try to schedule an appointment a few weeks following delivery to resolve these. Maintaining optimal oral health throughout your lifetime is critical to both you and your child's overall health. Moms with poor oral health can also pass damaging bacteria to their children through kissing, sharing eating utensils (such as testing the food to see if it is too warm) and (never do this) putting a pacifier in your mouth to "clean" it.

to grow crops including corn, soybeans and wheat. "But, there is no area in Ukraine that is 100 percent safe. We have areas with more bombs, and areas with less bombs."

The online meeting with Xomehko was made possible in part by Loran Steinlage, an Iowa farmer and field engineer for DAWN Equipment, and Macon County Farm Bureau Board member Paul Butler, who is in an international grain marketing group. DAWN provides ag equip-

ment parts to farmers in Ukraine but pulled its employees out of the country just weeks before the war broke "I'm worried about \$5 die-

sel and how high our fertilizer prices will go," Butler said. But our problems are pretty small in comparison." Scott Irwin, University of

Illinois ag economics professor, said war in Ukraine will also continue to have a widespread effect on world markets for some time.

"There are really two issues," Irwin said in a recent U of I farmdoc video. "One is with old crop. Trade estimates suggest there's 600 million bushels of corn already contracted (from Ukraine). It's trapped and I don't see any way that will get out of there very easily for weeks and maybe months.
"There's even bigger prob-

lems with what will end up getting planted (in the Black Sea region) this spring," he noted. "It could potentially put a huge hole in global grain balance sheets."

Irwin suggested the U.S. needs to think "outside the box" in these extraordinary times and consider measures such as possibly opening up acres in the Conservation Reserve Program for a year to increase domestic crop output.

The not so skinny cook

Everyone seems to be in a better mood now that we have some warmer weather. It is great to see people walking and running again. This week's recipes reflect a little of the warm weather. There is a great appetizer, a tasty salad, two fish recipes, a main dish for those who are anti-fish, and two desserts. cooking this week.

Bacon Pinwheels

These appetizers use crescent rolls for an easy base and add cream cheese and bacon.

What is there not to like in this simple appetizer?

3 oz. cream cheese, softened 2 T. finely chopped onion

1 t. milk

1 tube (8 oz.) refrigerated crescent rolls (unperforated if you can find them)

5 bacon strips, cooked and finely chopped

Preheat oven to 375. In a small bowl mix cream cheese, onion and milk until blended. On a lightly floured surface, unroll crescent dough into one long rectangle and press perforations to seal.

Spread cream cheese mixture over the dough, sprinkle with bacon. Roll up jelly-roll style starting with a long side; pinch seam to seal. Using a serrated knife, cut roll crosswise into 24 ½ inch slices. Place on ungreased baking sheets, cut side own. Bake 12 to 14 minutes until golden brown.

Broccoli Salad Supreme

This salad melds the flavors of broccoli and grapes. If you add a few almonds for crunch you will have a great and refreshing salad. It is a salad that you can use for a crowd. If you want to make it for a smaller group, cut the ingredients in half.

10 C. broccoli florets

6 C. seedless red grapes

1 C. sliced celery

6 green onions, sliced

2 C. mayonnaise 2/3 C. sugar

2 T. cider vinegar

1 lb. sliced bacon, cooked and crumbled

1 1/3 C. slivered almonds, toasted

In a large salad bowl combine the broccoli, grapes, celery and onions. In a small bowl combine the mayo, sugar and vinegar. Pour over the broccoli mixture and toss to

coat. Cover and refrigerate at least four hours or overnight. Just before serving, gently stir in bacon and almonds.

Tarragon Tuna Salad

There are many ways to make tuna salad. This recipe adds an herb to change the flavor, and it also uses Dijon mustard to give it a little zip. If you use Bibb (or Boston or Butter) lettuce, the leaves form perfect cups for the salad. If you are tired of the usual tuna salad, try this one for a meatless Friday.

2 cans (6 oz. each) light water packed tuna, drained and flaked

1 C. chopped celery

¹/₄ C. chopped sweet onion 1/3 C. mayonnaise

2 T. minced fresh parsley

1 T. lemon juice

1 t. fresh tarragon or ¼ t.

½ t. Dijon mustard

1/4 t. pepper Lettuce leaves

In a bowl combine tuna, celery, and onion. In another bowl combine the mayo, parsley, lemon juice, tarragon, mustard and pepper. Stir mayo mixture into tuna mixture. Serve on lettuce leaves or small rye cocktail rye bread.

Crab Stuffed Flounder

If you are in the market for a really good different fish dish, this recipe will help with a meatless Friday. You can use tilapia, sole, Pollock or halibut fillets. I also think you can use the imitation crab if you don't have the canned

1½ lb. flounder fillets

1 C. crabmeat, drained, flaked, and cartilage removed

1 T. finely chopped green

1/4 t. ground dry mustard

1/4 t. Worcestershire sauce

½ t. salt

1/4 pepper

3 crushed saltine crackers

1 egg white

1 T. mayonnaise

1/4 C. melted butter 1 egg yolk

5 T. mayonnaise

½ t. paprika

1 T. dried parsley

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Rinse the fillets and pat dry with paper towels. Combine crab meat, green pepper, mustard powder, Worcestershire sauce, salt, pepper and crushed saltines in a bowl. In a separate bowl combine the egg white and 1 T. mayo. Stir this into the crab meat mixture. Brush the fish fillets with melted butter. Place in a lightly greased shallow baking dish.

the fillets and drizzle with any remaining butter. Bake the fillets at 400 for 15 minutes.

While the fish is baking, lightly beat the egg yolk in a small bowl. Stir in 5 T. of mayo. Remove fish from oven and spread this mixture over the stuffing; sprinkle with paprika and parsley. Increase oven temperature to 450 and bake until golden and bubbly, about 6 minutes.

Ham Casserole

There will be many hams prepared for Easter and we will be looking for ways to use it up. I usually cut it up and place 2 or 4 cups in a bag ready for a casserole. This dish has a lot of good things in it that will serve as a whole meal.

2 C. cubed peeled potatoes

1 large carrot, sliced 2 celery ribs, chopped

3 C. water

2 C. cubed fully cooked ham

2 T. chopped green pepper

2 t. finely chopped onion

7 T. butter, divided

3 T. flour

11/2 C. 2% milk

³/₄ t. salt

1/8 t. pepper

1 C. shredded cheddar cheese

½ C. soft breadcrumbs

Preheat the oven to 375. In a saucepan bring potatoes, carrot, celery, and water to a boil. Reduce heat and cover; cook until tender, about 15 minutes.

In a large skillet sauté ham, green pepper and onion in 3 T. butter until tender. Add to the potato mixture. Transfer to a greased 1½ qt. baking dish.

In a large saucepan melt the remaining butter, stir in the flour until smooth. Gradually whisk in the milk, salt, and pepper. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Reduce heat; add cheese and stir until melted. Pour over ham mixture. Sprinkle with breadcrumbs. Bake until heated through, 25 to 30 minutes.

Minty Fudge **Brownie Minis**

If you are looking for an easy spring treat, these cute mini cupcakes will fill the bill. The addition of the Andes Mint cookies makes these pretty, too!

1 pkg. (18.3 oz.) fudge brownie mix

½ C. oil

½ C. semisweet chocolate chips

½ C. butter, softened 1½ C. powdered sugar 1 to 2 T. milk

1/4 t. peppermint extract Green food coloring

12 Andes Mints, halved

Preheat oven to 350. Coat 24 mini muffin cups with cooking spray. Prepare the brownie mix according to package directions with oil, eggs, and 3 T. water. Stir in chocolate chips. Divide the batter evenly among the muffin cups. Bake until a toothpick inserted in centers comes out with moist crumbs clinging, 15 to 18 minutes. Let cool for 10 minutes. Transfer from muffin cups to rack and let cool completely.

On medium high speed, beat butter until smooth, 2 minutes. On low beat in powdered sugar and 1 T. milk until well blended and frosting is fluffy; add additional milk if frosting is too thick. Add in peppermint extract and green food coloring. Use a pastry bag with a star tip to drop frosting on muffins.
