Lady Panthers impress at Mount Pulaski

On Friday, Sept. 16 and Saturday, Sept. 17, the Lena-Winslow volleyball squad made the trip to compete at the Mount Pulaski Tournament. It was a good weekend for the Panthers to get back in the win column after dropping conference matchups to Durand and Dakota earlier in the week.

As one of the smaller schools in the tournament, Lena-Winslow was there to prove they belong once again. They opened the tournament facing off with the Taylorville Tornadoes. After taking the first set by a score of 25-20, Le-Win dropped the second set 25-14, tying things at 1-1. Despite taking such a loss in the second set, the Panthers responded by bouncing back in the third. In a back-andforth race, Le-Win managed to come out on top 15-13 to secure the win over the Tornadoes.

Next up were the Riverton Hawks, who stood little chance against the Panthers. Le-Win dominated the Hawks in two sets, winning 25-16 and 25-9. After a tight game against the Tornadoes and an exceptional performance against the Hawks, the Panthers were feeling confident.

They took that confidence into the first set against their next opponent, the St Thomas More Sabers. Le-Win managed to go on an early run, taking the first set by a

score of 25-14, but the Sabers would answer back. In the second set, the Panthers failed to maintain their momentum as the Sabers won 25-23 to even things out. The third set featured a high-intensity match that went in favor of the Panthers as they won 18-16.

A pair of juniors in Grace Groezinger and Molly Amendt led the way as they combined for 20 kills in the match. Groezinger and Amendt finished with ten kills each. A third junior, Kaidynce Lynch, added five kills to help beat the Sabers 2-1.

Amendt continued to dominate on offense in their fourth match, where the Panthers faced off with the Williamsville Bullets. Amendt added another six kills and a pair of blocks to her stat line as Le-Win won by scores of 25-18 and 25-22. Lynch also had six kills and a team-leading nine digs as the juniors continued to lead the way for Le-Win

Up to this point in the tournament, the Panthers were 4-0 and had given themselves a chance to compete for the Mount Pulaski championship. They would have to do so facing off against some tough competition, however.

The Lincoln Railsplitters are a class 3A squad and they came into the championship match with an overall record of 11-3.

To the Electors of the State of Illinois:

The Illinois Constitution establishes a structure of government and laws for the State of Illinois. There are three ways to initiate change to the Illinois Constitution: (1) a constitutional convention may propose changes to any part; (2) the General Assembly may propose changes to any part; or (3) a petition initiative may propose amendments limited to structural and procedural subjects contained in the Legislative Article. The people of Illinois must approve any changes to the Illinois Constitution before they become effective. The purpose of this document is to inform you of proposed changes to the Illinois Constitution and to provide you with a brief explanation and a summary of the arguments in favor of and in opposition to the proposed amendment.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ADD SECTION 25 TO ARTICLE I OF THE ILLINOIS CONSTITUTION ARTICLE I — BILL OF RIGHTS

SECTION 25. WORKERS' RIGHTS

(a) Employees shall have the fundamental right to organize and to bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing for the purpose of negotiating wages, hours, and working conditions, and to protect their economic welfare and safety at work. No law shall be passed that interferes with, negates, or diminishes the right of employees to organize and bargain collectively over their wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment and work place safety, including any law or ordinance that prohibits the execution or application of agreements between employers and labor organizations that represent employees requiring membership in an organization as a condition of employment.

(b) The provisions of this Section are controlling over those of Section 6 of Article VII.

EXPLANATION

The proposed amendment, which takes effect upon approval by the voters, adds Section 25 to the Bill of Rights Article of the Illinois Constitution. The new section will guarantee workers the fundamental right to organize and to bargain collectively and to negotiate safety conditions, wages, hours, working conditions, and economic welfare. The amendment prohibits the passage of any new law within the State that restricts or prohibits workers from engaging in collective bargaining with their employer over wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment, like safety protocols or training.

Arguments In Favor of the Proposed Amendment

This amendment will protect workers' and others' safety. That includes guaranteeing nurses' right to put patient care ahead of profit and making sure construction workers can speak up when there's a safety issue. It will protect workers from being silenced when they call attention to food safety threats, shoddy construction, and other problems that could harm Illinoisans. This amendment protects firefighters and EMTs who put their lives on the line to protect Illinoisans. It means they get the training and safety equipment they need to do their jobs, and can speak out when they see a problem without fear of retaliation. This amendment will help our economy by putting more money in workers' pockets who join together and get raises. That will mean more money going into our communities and small businesses as people join the middle class with good-paying jobs.

Arguments Against the Proposed Amendment

A fundamental right provided to all citizens under the First Amendment of the United States Constitution is the right to free speech and freedom of association. This amendment prohibits any law or ordinance that allows union workers to choose whether they wish to be a member of the union or not. Under the 2018 United States Supreme Court decision Janus v. Illinois AFSCME, non-union government workers cannot be required to pay union dues as a condition of working in the public sector. Approval of this constitutional amendment will deny that protection to private sector workers. The amendment also states that lawmakers could never "interfere with, negate, or diminish" certain rights. These terms are broad and undefined and leave lawmakers without the ability to clarify through legislation. Our Illinois Constitution provides such protection to public employees. The result of that protection has been to squash efforts by state lawmakers and voters to address Illinois' pension fund deficits.

Proposed Amendment to the 1970 Illinois Constitution

Explanation of Amendment

The proposed amendment would add a new section to the Bill of Rights Article of the Illinois Constitution that would guarantee workers the fundamental right to organize and to bargain collectively and to negotiate wages, hours, and working conditions, and to promote their economic welfare and safety at work. The new amendment would also prohibit from being passed any new law that interferes with, negates, or diminishes the right of employees to organize and bargain collectively over their wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment and workplace safety. At the general election to be held on November 8, 2022, you will be called upon to decide whether the proposed amendment should become part of the Illinois Constitution.

ALLISON SWITZER Stephen Allison Switzer, 84, eldest son of Stephen and Elva D. Switzer (nee Allison), born Nov. 24, 1937, in Dubuque, Iowa, died Sept. 10, 2022, at Manor Court in Liberty Village, Freeport, Illinois. He has one brother, Robert L. Switzer (Bonnie), Professor Emeritus Biochemistry at the University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois.

Steve served in the U.S. Army for one year at Ft. Knox, Kentucky. He spent one year in the 7th Infantry Division, South Korea, and four years of reserve duty. Dorleen and Steve loved to travel, having visited all 50 states and at least 10 foreign countries, including their favorite destinations, America's West, and Alaska.

Steve was the co-founder, designer, and manager of Patterson Buildings of Rockford, IL, for 32 years. He designed and supervised the construction of several thousand farm and light commercial buildings and hundreds of related construction projects. Steve always said, What a legacy, hundreds of rusty roofs!'

Steve was a long-time free mason, a life member of Evergreen Lodge #170 of Freeport, IL, where he served three terms as Master, two years as Secretary, and was the recipient of the Lodge Builders Award. He was also a member of Orangeville Lodge #687 and served as Master for three terms and received the Lodge Builders Award in 2016. He was a life member of the Scottish Rite Bodies, Valley of Freeport, and was the recipient of the Meritorious Service Award (M.S.A.) in 1999. State National Guard to assist migrant welcoming effort as Gov. Pritzker issues disaster proclamation

State officials provide migrants support as total bused to Illinois from Texas surpasses 500

CAPITOL NEWS ILLINOIS

Gov. JB Pritzker said recently Illinois will continue to welcome migrants bused here from Texas as he blasted that state's governor for relocating them to other cities without sharing information or providing resources.

Pritzker said Texas Gov. Greg Abbott and his agencies have been providing little notice for incoming migrants and has not responded to calls from Illinois' agency heads. That's meant Illinois has had "between three and 24 hours to find shelter for potentially 100 or more people.'

He said that has led to "a needlessly last-minute and complex process that is a heartless display of politics over people."

"Let me be clear, while other states may be treating these vulnerable families as pawns, here in Illinois, we are treating them as people," he said. "And when a person comes urgently seeking help, here in Illinois, we offer them a help-

Pritzker will deploy 75 National Guard members to aid with logistics and will issue a disaster proclamation aimed at expediting the flow of resources. The proclamation enables the Illinois Emergencv Management Agency and other state agencies to work with local governments to help migrants access transportation, emergency shelter, food, health screenings, medical assessments, treatments and other care.

Pritzker said the migrants are residing in the U.S. legally through the asylum-seeking process. They're often fleeing dangerous situations, mostly from Central and South America, and they receive facial and fingerprint scans at the U.S. border that are "cross-checked against terrorist watch lists and criminal databases."

"They have traveled for months, most often without enough food or medicine or support," he said. "Many have literally walked from

seeking safety for themselves and for their families. These are people who have not been accused of doing anything wrong.

Illinois Department of Human Services Secretary Grace Hou said an 11th bus arrived early on Sept. 14. It brought the total number of migrants arriving in Illinois over the past two weeks to more than 500. Buses are arriving daily, Pritzker said.

"I have said to our team, we live in a state where our leaders are committed to providing a dignified welcome to our state," Hou said. "That is not the question. The question is how we do it when the process is intentionally designed to cause confusion and utter chaos."

Hou said when unannounced migrants arrive, Illinois officials have to "scramble" to provide for the basic needs of babies, pregnant women, children, teens, adults and older people. That includes ensuring access to housing, food, baby formula and health care.

"We've seen pregnant women literally ready to give birth who have been provided next to no support on the buses. Babies, elders, who continue to be treated in a callous manner until they get to the city of Chicago," Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot said.

about arrivals only by unofficial means, such as Texas nonprofit organizations whose only information is that "they've just literally watched the bus drive by." He called on Abbott to provide better

Abbott launched the program in April when he issued a memo directing the state's Department of Emergency Management "to begin coordinating the voluntary transportation" of immigrants who had been released from federal custody.

"President Biden's inaction at our southern border continues putting the lives of Texans—and Americans at risk and is overwhelming our communities," Abbott said in an Aug. 31 statement. "To continue providing much-needed relief to our small, overrun border towns, Chicago will join fellow sanctuary cities Washington, D.C., and New York City as an additional drop-off location."

Hou said the other cities have warned that "this will not relent."

Pritzker said once migrants arrive, city and state staff work with state-funded welcoming centers and nonprofits such as Catholic Charities and Salvation Army to "triage and determine their immediate needs, prioritizing infants, children, seniors and fami-

He and local lawmakers characterized the migrant situation as a national problem. Lightfoot said the situation in Chicago is a "manufactured crisis.

"The normal lines of communication that we have with state leaders, particularly when it comes to issues of emergency management or law enforcement, (Abbott) has shut those off from us. So it is a manufactured crisis by ambush to be very clear," she

Pritzker said Illinois is seeking federal help and his staff has been working with Illinois' members of Congress and the White House to "make sure that we get the resources that we need," such as federal appropriations that have been available in other states that have received migrants from

Lightfoot said resources may have to step up."

Fatal Freeport fire

IDPH reports strong demand in Illinois for updated Bivalent COVID-19 vaccinations

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) reported that about 188,800 Illinoisans have received a dose of the new, updated COVID-19 vaccines since they were authorized for use at the beginning of September.

Data indicates that daily vaccination numbers have jumped to the highest level seen since early February, during the major surge in illnesses caused by the Omicron variant.

The announcement comes as 66 counties in Illinois are at an elevated level for COVID-19. The IDPH is reporting 17,584 new confirmed and probable cases of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in Illinois, including 74 deaths since Sept.

"It is very encouraging to see Illinois residents turning out in such strong numbers to take advantage of the updated bivalent booster shots that are now available," said IDPH Director Dr. Sameer Vohra. "These new booster shots-designed specifically to offer extra protection from the dominant Omicron strain of the virusare the latest, most advanced tool to protect Illinois residents from experiencing the worst effects of COVID-19. It's important for everyone who is eligible to get up to date on

as possible, before a potential fall and winter surge leads to increased infections.

The IDPH reported that over the last week, an average of more than 21,000 doses of the new bivalent vaccines have been administered across the state each day. This is more than double the daily average for all vaccinations for most of the summer. Notably, older Illinoisans, who are at risk of more severe outcomes, have been turning out in higher proportions for the updated vac-

While people 65 and older make up 20 percent of Illinois' eligible population., they have received 44 percent of the bivalent doses.

The CDC authorized two new bivalent booster vaccines on Sept. 2 that include an mRNA component of the original strain to provide an immune response that is broadly protective against COVID-19 and an added mRNA component in common between the omicron variant BA.4 and BA.5 lineages to provide better protection against COVID-19 caused by the omicron variant.

The Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine, Bivalent, is authorized for use as a single booster dose in individuals 18 years of

vaccines and boosters as soon age and older. The Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine, Bivalent, is authorized for use as a single booster dose in individuals 12 years of age and older.

> The updated boosters are available at pharmacies, hospitals, and other healthcare providers. The best way to locate a vaccine provider near you is to visit www.vaccines.gov and search for bivalent booster availability.

> According to the CDC,20 Illinois counties are now rated at High Community Level for COVID-19. An additional 46 counties in Illinois are now rated at Medium Community Level.

> As of Sept. 15, 1,153 individuals in Illinois were reported to be in the hospital with COVID-19. Of those, 145 patients were in the ICU and 49 patients with COVID-19 were on ventilators. The preliminary seven-day statewide case rate is 138 ČOVID-19 cases per 100,000 Illinoisans.

> The counties in Illinois listed at High Community Level are Champaign, Clay, Coles, DeKalb, Douglas, Edgar, Fayette, Ford, Franklin, Fulton, Henderson, Jackson, Johnson, Perry, Richland, Scott, Stephenson, Vermilion, Wabash, and Williamson.

FHN announces 2022 flu shot clinics

FHN has announced a schedule of walkup flu shot clinics at locations throughout northwest Illinois. All events will be pandemic-safe; healthcare personnel and patients must wear a mask throughout the process. Adults under 65 years of age will get a quadrivalent vaccine that protects against 4 strains of influenza for \$31. Adults over 65 will receive a high-dose version of the vaccine (\$67). There is no out-of-pocket expense for those covered by Medicare Part B (please present Medicare card) or a Medicare HMO accepted by FHN (list available at each location - covered persons MUST present the Medicare HMO card instead of the Medicare card for the billing process).

Immunizations may be paid for by cash or check payable to FHN (no credit or debit cards will be accepted). Please note that these prices are only available at these flu shot clinics; other rates may apply in FHN offices. No other insurance coverage can be accepted at these flu shot clinics, and per government regulations, no Medicaid cards can be accepted at these locations.

Because of federal guidelines to prevent identity theft, everyone must present a photo ID to receive an immunization. For their own safety, children should be immunized at their regular healthcare provider's office. Persons with allergy to eggs or the flu vaccine, those with an illness accompanied by a fever or depressed immune system should not receive the flu immunization at these locations. 



It seems as if we must have Sundays with rain. I guess it helps to not have to water flowers, but it wreaks havoc on doing fall things. People want to visit apple orchards and watch football games with the sun shining. We had one more week of unseasonably warm temperatures. I am waiting for the temperature to change, and I am sure it will. This week we have a great dip for football parties, an easy salad and side, and yummy main dishes and desserts. Have a great week cooking.

Cowboy Bean Dip

This appetizer was developed by a group of beef farming wives for those times when they were all at cattle shows. It is a great one for anytime that you need a hearty appetizer. Campbell's makes a Fiesta Nacho Soup if you can find it. Otherwise, you can just use the regular cheese soup.

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 4 T. chopped onion, divided 3 T. chopped sweet red pep-
- per, divided 2 T. chopped green pepper,
- 1 can Nacho cheese soup, undiluted
- ½ C. salsa
- 4 T. sliced ripe olives, di-4 T. sliced pimento stuffed
- olives, divided 2 T. chopped green chilies
- 1 t. chopped seeded jalape-

¼ t. pepper

- ½ c. shredded cheddar
- 2 T. sour cream
- 2 to 3 t. minced fresh pars-

Tortilla chips

In a large skillet, cook the beef, 3 T. onion, 2 T. red pepper, 1 T. green pepper over medium heat until meat is no longer pink, breaking it into crumbles; drain. Stir in the soup, salsa, 3 T. ripe olives

3 T. pimiento stuffed olives, chiles, jalapeno, oregano, and pepper. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered for 5 minutes. Transfer to a serving dish. Top with shredded cheddar, sour cream and parsley; sprinkle with the remaining onion, peppers and olives. Serve with tortilla

Easy Broccoli and Bacon Salad

Someone asked for an easy broccoli salad. This one is probably the easiest around. I bake my bacon in the oven on a cookie sheet lined with foil. Drain the bacon on paper towels. There is no mess on the stove, and it is an easy clean up. I have mentioned before that A.J.'s Lena Maid Meats has the best bacon because it isn't full of fat.

- 12 slices cooked bacon, crumbled
- 1 large heat broccoli, cut into florets
 - 1 C. raisins
 - 1 small red onion, chopped 1/4 C. sunflower seeds
 - Dressing:
 - ½ C. mayonnaise
 - 1/3 C. sugar
 - 3 T. red wine vinegar.

Combine bacon, broccoli, raisins, onion, and sunflower seeds in a large bowl. In a small bowl, whisk together

smooth. Pour over broccoli mixture and stir to coat. Refrigerate for at least an hour before serving.

Monterey Spaghetti

This dish is a great side dish for any meal. It is easy to prepare because it comes together quickly.

- 4 oz. spaghetti, broken into 2-inch pieces
 - 1 egg
 - 1 C. sour cream
 - ¹/₄ C. Parmesan cheese
 - ¼ t. garlic powder
- 2 C. shredded Monterey
- 1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen chopped spinach, thawed and drained
- 1 Can (2.8 oz.) French-fried onions, divided

Cook spaghetti according to package directions. Meanwhile, in a large bowl, beat egg. Add sour cream, Parmesan cheese and garlic powder. Drain spaghetti; add to egg mixture. Stir in Monterey Jack cheese, spinach, and half of the onions. Pour into a greased 2-qt. baking dish. Cover and bake at 350 for 30 minutes or until heated through. Top with remaining onions; return to the oven for 5 minutes or until onions are golden brown. Tip: squeeze spinach as dry as possible for best consistency in this casse-

Round Steak Hot Dish

I featured this casserole in my first year of the column. It is an old standby for me. It was given to me by my band tour buddy, Sue. I have been using it for years. It makes a great casserole to serve for a group of people.

11/2 lbs. round steak 1 large onion, diced ½ C. celery diced ½ C. instant rice

1 can chicken and rice soup 1 can cream of mushroom

1 can (4 oz.) mushrooms 1 can of water.

Pound the round steak and dredge it in a flour mixture that contains garlic powder, onion powder, salt, pepper, and paprika. Brown steak, celery, and onion in a small amount of olive oil. Pour into a 2 gt. casserole. Add rice, soup, mushrooms, and water. Blend ingredients; bake at 350 for 1½ hrs.

Chicken Tater Bake

Want a different kind of Tater Tot casserole? It doesn't use the traditional hamburger or mixed vegetables. This dish is perfect for a weeknight meal. It takes like a chicken potpie topped with Tater Tots. Use rotisserie chicken or canned chicken if you don't have regular baked chicken.

- 2 cans cream of chicken soup, undiluted
- ½ C. 2% milk
- ¹/₄ C. butter, cubed
- 3 C. cubed cooked chicken
- 1 pkg. (16 oz.) frozen peas and carrots, thawed

11/2 C. shredded cheddar cheese divided

1 pkg. (32 oz.) frozen Tater Tots

In a large saucepan, combine the soup, milk, and butter. Cook and stir over medium heat until heated through. Remove from the heat; stir in the chicken, peas and carrots and 1 cup cheese. Transfer to 2 greased 8-inch square baking dishes. Top with Tater Tots. Cover and freeze 1 casserole for up to 3 months. Bake the remaining casserole at 400 until bubbling, 25 to 30 minutes. Sprinkle with ¼ C. cheese; bake until cheese is melted, about 5 minutes lon-

ger. To use frozen casserole remove from the freezer 30 minutes before baking. Cover and bake at 350 until heat through about 1½ hours. Do not sprinkle with cheese. (I think you could make 1 casserole in a 9 x 13 baking dish if vou wanted.)

Layered Peanut butter Brownies

I love to make and eat brownies. This recipe adds peanut butter. It doesn't have frosting, but I think you could use Betty Crocker milk chocolate frosting on these too. It is really a great chocolate flavor because it uses cocoa and chocolate chips. Have a great chocolate treat with these brownies

3 eggs, room temperature

- 1 C. butter, melted
- 2 t. vanilla
- 2 C. sugar
- 11/4 C. flour

³/₄ C. baking cocoa ½ t. baking powder

¼ t. salt

1 C. milk chocolate chips Filling:

2 pkg. (8 ox. Each) cream cheese, softened

½ C. creamy peanut butter ¼ C. sugar

2 T. 2 % milk

Preheat oven to 350. In a large bowl, beat the eggs, butter, and vanilla until smooth. In a separate bowl, whisk together dry ingredients; gradually add to egg mixture. Stir in chocolate chips. Set aside 1 C. for topping. Spread remaining batter into a 9 x 13 pan which has been sprayed with cooking paper and lined with parchment paper. Extend parchment over ends.

In a small bowl, beat the cream cheese, peanut butter and sugar until smooth. Beat



6 C. peeled tart apples

1/3 C. packed brown sugar ¹/₄ C. white sugar 1/4 C. orange juice 1 T. lemon juice 1 pkg. (17.9 oz.) snickerdoodle cookie mix

½ C. butter, melted

1 C. coarsely chopped pe-

Whipped Cream

Preheat oven to 350. Toss apples with sugars and fruit juices in a large bowl. Spread mixture into a greased 11 x 7 baking dish. Dump cookie mix into a bowl and stir in the contents of the sugar packet. Sprinkle over the apple mixture. Drizzle with butter and top with pecans. Bake until golden brown and apples are tender, 35 to 40 minutes. Serve warm with whipped cream. I think ice cream would be great too!
