Agency agreed to further hearings at request of state rulemaking committee

CAPITOL NEWS ILLINOIS

Those who own certain guns and other items now prohibited under the state's assault weapons ban still need to register them with the Illinois State Police. But ISP says it plans to hold additional public hearings about that process and may refine the rules before they become permanent next

"We are happy to address all questions and comments submitted to ISP and will be doing so in the weeks to come," ISP said in a statement last week.

Illinois lawmakers passed an assault weapons ban during a special lame duck session in January. It came in response to a mass shooting at an Independence Day parade last summer in High-

The law prohibits the purchase, sale, possession or manufacture of a long list of firearms defined as "assault weapons" as well as large-capacity magazines and certain kinds of ammu-

But the law also says that people who already owned those items before it took effect are allowed to keep them, as long as they register them with the state police

Although one judge in the Southern District of Illinois ruled the law is unconstitutional, two other judges in the Northern District ruled that it is not. All of those cases are now pending before the Seventh Circuit Court of Appeals, which has not yet issued a ruling.

Those temporary rules came up for review Oct. 17 at the General Assembly's Joint Committee on Administrative Rules, or JCAR, a bipartisan panel that exercises oversight of the administrative rulemaking process.

"As a committee, we've received many, many questions on this topic as members of JCAR, and we could really literally be here all day and night going through each one of these questions, seeking answers from the Illinois State Police," JCAR co-chair Rep. Ryan Spain, R-Peoria, said during the meeting.

Republicans on the panel made a motion to file a formal objection to the temporary rules, a move that would not have prevented them from remaining in effect but would have required ISP to file a formal response.

But the years unfold, they grow up and you expect them to know things they do not yet know. Like you might not want to spill super glue on the countertop because they call it super glue for a reason.



vrinkle to winter outlook

Now that temperatures in Illinois feel more seasonable for mid-October, at least for the time being, many people probably wonder what lies ahead for winter.

And, as always, there's no shortage of opinions on the subiect.

Sources such as the Farmers' Almanac predict a "cold, stormy" winter season ahead. But the arrival of a strong El Nino, such as the one in place, typically tilts the pattern in Illinois toward a warm and mild winter, according to Chris Yates, chief meteorologist with WMBD and WYZZ

Yates discussed the weather outlook for the rest of fall and winter during a recent interview with FarmWeek.

"We're heading into a strong El Nino winter," he "An El Nino winter historically has been on the warmer and drier side and we tend to not have a lot of snow in the Midwest.

"There have been excepspecifically during weak El Nino events," he said. "But the stronger the El Nino, the warmer, drier and less snowy winters tend to be around here.

That doesn't mean Illinois will avoid run-ins with the Polar Vortex or big snow events this winter. But a typical El Nino winter also contradicts the Farmers' Almanac out-

"Even if the forecast says it will be a warmer and less

snowy winter, it doesn't mean ing the actual precipitation, failing grades and scored four it won't get cold," Yates said. "It will mostly certainly still get cold and it's still going to snow. There's no stopping

"But, at the end of the day, we'll probably be warmer than average and less snowy than average if history repeats

The typical El Nino pattern also contradicts recent observations from those who track the woolly black caterpillar. Folklore suggests the longer the black bands are on the woolly worm, the longer and more severe it will be for the upcoming winter.

"I've heard various things about the woolly worms this Yates told the RFD Radio Network. "From what I've heard, there's been a lot of black ones, which supposedly means a bad winter.

So, what's the history or track record of seasonal forecasts produced by the Farmers' Almanac?

Yates analyzed the Farmers' Almanac winter outlooks the past 10 years by compar-

snowfall and temperature statistics from December through February each year. He reported the findings on his weather blog.

And, while it was spot on in consecutive years last decade, the Almanac's longrange predictions are about as accurate as a coin flip.

'They had some good years and hit the nail on the head in 2013-14 and 2014-15," Yates said of the Almanac winter outlooks. "But the forecasts weren't as good beyond that."

Yates gave six of the past 10 Farmers' Almanac winter outlooks below-average to as average or better for accuracy.

Near-term, much of Illinois could be about done with summer-like temperatures, which would be good for fall anhydrous applications. But Yates can't rule out a return of unseasonable warmth.

Looking ahead, one of Yates' top concerns remains a lack of moisture. Topsoil moisture in Illinois ranked 57% short to very short, 42% adequate and just 1% surplus as of Oct. 2.


"The dry weather has been good for harvest. We're not dealing with a lot of delays



The Scales Mound Hornets earned their twentieth win of the 2023 volleyball season with a victory over the Warren Warriors last week. They would have to battle with a tough Galena Pirates squad before they got there, however.

Jo Daviess County Animal Control updates pet registration process

Jo Daviess County Animal Control made a change. In the past, dog owners sent registration applications to PetData in Texas for processing. Pet registrations are now done at Jo Daviess County Animal Control at 9483 US Route 20 W, Galena. Dog owners are able to register through the mail or in person. Located in the Public Health building, Animal Control is open Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. There is also a drop box available after hours.

Every owner of a dog four months

or more of age, who is a resident of the County, is required to have the dog inoculated against rabies as denoted in the Animal Control Act. Every dog owner in the State of Illinois shall pay a rabies tag fee. An unaltered dog is \$30 per year or \$85 for a 3-year registration. A spayed or neutered (altered) dog is \$18 per year or \$50 for a 3-year registration. A three-year license will only be issued when a three-year vaccination is given within six months of the purchase of the license. Licenses are not valid beyond the expiration of

the rabies vaccination.

The money collected from dog licensing fees stays in Jo Daviess County. These funds are an important part of helping animals and owners in Jo Daviess County. The funding allows Animal Control to be dispatched for rescues and complaints and also provides shelter and care for lost and abandoned pets.

Harvest safety tips

With harvest going full speed ahead, I thought I would share a few tips for motorists when they come across slow-moving farm machinery on the roads.

Above all, slow down and be patient. Reduce speed when encountering farm equipment on public roads.

Flashing amber lights mean "caution." Slow down when you see the Slow Moving Vehicle Emblem - the orange and red reflective triangle warns you that the tractor or combine travels at a slow rate of speed. Keep a safe distance from the farm equipment so the farmers can see you. If you can't see their mirrors. they can't see you. Pass wide, large farm equipment only if you know conditions are

safe and you are sure the farmer will not be making a left-hand turn. Be cautious when pulling back in. It is illegal to pass in a no passing lane or within 100 feet of an intersection, railroad crossing or bridge. Be prepared to yield to wide equipment. Always wear a safety belt and heed the road's speed limit. Watch for the farmer's indication of a turn. Newer equipment has one or more amber lights

flashing rapidly to indicate a turn. Older equipment is typically not equipped with turn signals to watch for the farmer's hand signals.

Let's do everything that we can to make it a safe and bountiful harvest for everyone!



Lady Panthers capture NUIC Championship in battle with Aquin

The good times keep rolling for the Lena-Winslow Panthers. Prior to their competition in the Stillman Valley Tournament last weekend, the Panthers wrapped up the 2023 volleyball regular season with a sixteen-game win streak and a conference championship to go along with it.

On Tuesday, Oct. 17 the Panthers were prepped for another week of NUIC competition. Le-Win entered the week with an overall record of 26-2 and a perfect conference record of 10-0. From the very start the Panthers held all the momentum. After getting off to an early lead, a crafty kill by Kaidynce Lynch gave Le-Win a three-point advantage. At one point, the Panthers held a massive 16-4 lead in the opening set. Eventually, they went on to win by a score of 25-15.

Rachael Setterstrom got the second set started with a bang as her opening serve was mishit by the Aquin defense. Later on, with the game tied 11-11, Eden Dietz struck a powerful hit to the back-right corner, giving the Panthers the lead midway through. After a big run by the Panthers, it was Dietz who sealed the deal with a kill to give Le-Win the 25-17

Molly Amendt led the way offensively with 10 kills and an ace. Lynch finished the day with six kills, and Grace Groezinger added five of her own. Both Dietz and Brianna Fye finished with three kills Setterstrom, Lynch, and Daughenbaugh each tied for the team-lead in digs with seven. It was another all-around performance for a very deep Le-Win squad. Sue Amendt, Le-Win volleyball head coach, spoke about the team's magnificent, late season run. "The special thing about this group is that as a whole, they are self-motivated. They enjoy winning, but they hate losing even more," Sue shared.

Stephenson County Farm Bureau news

The Illinois Agriculture in the Classroom (IAITC) program continues to thrive as a resource for educating children about connections to agriculture. This week the program received funding to continue classroom lessons thanks to IAA Foundation grants to local county coalitions. Eighty coalitions serving 89 Illinois counties were awarded \$647000 in grant dollars which can be used for materials, training, educational lessons, and activities taking place during the 2023-2024 school year. "Providing these grants ensures teachers have the right resources to integrate accurate agricultural content into their classrooms," said Kevin Daugherty, IAITC education director.

Last school year, 582,594 students and 40,046 teachers engaged in ag literacy lessons through IAITC. County AITC programs presented 28,848 individual programs throughout the state. Classroom presentations, farm field trips, and agriculture expos add a new dimension to existing curricular standards. "IAITC continues to help highlight Illinois' #1 industry," said Daugherty. "Student reach increased 182%, showing a positive trend as we adjust to post-pandemic education." County coalition grants are made possible through funding from the IAA Foundation, the charitable arm of the Illinois Farm Bureau. The IAA Foundation raises funds for the IAITC program each year, and in addition to county grants, provides funding for Ag Mags, teacher

grants, Summer Ag Academies, and more. "Consistent and sustainable funding is key for IAITC to have great results," said Susan Moore, IAA Foundation director. "And knowing that so many Illinois students are making stronger connections to agriculture drives our donors to keep making ag literacy a priority, and we are grateful for that."

Partner organizations of IAITC include Illinois Farm Bureau, Facilitating Coordination in Agricultural Education, University of Illinois Extension, Illinois Beef Association, Illinois Corn Marketing Board, Illinois Pork Producers Association, Illinois Soybean Association, Midwest Dairy Association, Illinois Department of Agriculture and the Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. In addition, annual donors include agribusiness partners and individuals with an interest in supporting the future of agriculture. to progress with its upgrades to the wastewater treatment collection and treatment systems. The overall project has been separated into two phases.

The first phase was to construct a flow equalization lagoon north of the existing treatment facility, and sewer piping to directly connect Brewster Cheese to the facility. Other needed collection system upgrades were included in this first phase. The construction of this phase is nearly

The second phase of the project includes the wastewater treatment facility upgrades. These upgrades are required in order to be compliant with IEPA standards. Construction is currently under way and will continue through 2024.

required a \$15 monthly debt service fee on water/sewer bills since Jan. 1, 2021. Effective Jan. 1, 2022, another \$15 monthly debt fee was added for a total of \$30. Effective Jan. 1, 2024, an additional \$12.50 will be added for a total monthly debt service fee of \$42.50. This debt fee is necessary to pay back the loan used to fund the improvements. The Village secured a low interest loan for 30 years through the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency's Water Pollution Control Loan Program.

In accordance with an agreement between the Village and Brewster Cheese, and as good faith stewards of the community, Brewster Cheese will participate in payment of their portion of the conveyance and facility improvements.





Preheat oven to 425. Coat a 9 x 13 baking dish with cooking spray. In large pot of salted boiling water, cook pasta according to package direction for al dente; drain well. In a bowl, combine pasta sauce, tomatoes and their iuices, chicken, and pasta. Layer half of pasta mixture in baking dish; top with half of the olives and 1 C. cheese. Repeat layering once. Cover and bake until bubbling, 25 minutes. Uncover. Broil until cheese is golden, 3 to 4 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. Top with basil.

Crescent Topped Beef Pot Pie

This easy weeknight meal has several short cuts. The use of the Progresso soup saves making a roux for thickening. The Crescent Roll sheets are available in most grocery stores. You could use regular crescents and seal the crescent rolls into one large sheet yourself. I have done this before. Be sure to flour your surface and use a small rolling pin.

1 lb. lean ground beef

1 container (8 oz.) sliced mushrooms

1 C. chopped carrots

½ C. chopped onion

2 garlic cloves, chopped 1 can Progresso pot roast

with country vegetables soup 1 can (8 oz.) Crescent

Dough Sheet 1 T. chopped fresh parsley

Preheat oven to 375. In a large skillet, cook beef, mushrooms, carrots, onion and garlic over medium-high heat 8 to 10 minutes, stirring frequently, until thoroughly cooked; drain. Stir in soup. Cook 2 to 4 minutes or until

heated through. Spoon beef mixture into an ungreased 9 x13 glass baking dish. Unroll dough; place on beef mixture. Cut 3 to 4 vent holes in the center. Bake 15 to 20 minutes or until deep golden brown. Sprinkle with parsley.

Apple Pumpkin Cupcakes

The apple and pumpkin combination makes for a tasty cupcake. Using the cake mix makes for easy preparation. Enjoy these great cupcakes.

1 apple, peeled, cored, and chopped 1 pkg. (15.25 oz.) Spice

cake mix 1 can (15 oz.) pumpkin

2 eggs 1/3 C. oil

2 C. butter, softened

8 oz. cream cheese, soft-

4 C. powdered sugar

Preheat oven to 350. Line 24 muffin cups with liners. Toss apple with 2 T. cake mix in a small bowl. On low speed, beat remaining cake mix with pumpkin, eggs and oil for 30 seconds; on medium speed beat for 2 minutes. Stir in apple. Bake until toothpick inserted into centers comes out clean, 18 to 29 minutes. Let cool 10 minutes. Transfer from pans to racks; let cool.

In a mixing bowl, beat butter and cream cheese until smooth. On low, beat in sugar until combined. On medium-high, beat until light and fluffy for 2 minutes. Transfer frosting to a pastry bag fitted with a star tip. Pipe over cupcakes.

Pumpkin Bundt Cake

As many of you know, I love Bundt cakes. They are usually moist and look great on a cake stand.

2½ C. sugar

1 C. canola oil

3 eggs, room temperature

2 t. baking soda 1 t. cinnamon 1 t. ground nutmeg ½ t. salt 1/4 t. ground cloves 1 can (15 oz.) pumpkin Powdered sugar

Preheat the oven to 350. In a large bowl, combine the sugar and oil until blended. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Combine flour, baking soda, cinnamon, nutmeg, salt and cloves; add to egg mixture alternately with pumpkin, beating well after each addition. Transfer to a greased 10-inch Bundt pan. Bake 60 to 65 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes before inverting onto a wire rack. Remove pan and cool completely. Place on cake plate or cake stand and dust with powdered sugar.

throw hay out on the field for them to eat. It's amazing how a beef cow can get fat on grass and hay while dairy cows will shrivel up and starve if they

don't get some corn. The drive down to KC was quite enjoyable. The first couple hours in the dark I sang along to some great worship songs. There is something about the early morning hours and worshipping the God of the universe. The Bible says in Psalm 19:1, "The heavens declare the glory of God." They sure do! I never saw such a perfectly clear starry sky as I drove down through Iowa on my way toward the Missouri border. I nibbled on an apple I had picked from my apple tree out in the yard and thought about how David, the shepherd boy, must have looked up at the same sky and stars when he

Healthy Halloween smiles

As the calendar approaches the end of October, children's thoughts focus primarily on costumes and candy. Halloween is a big deal in the lives of many children in America. Parents want their children to experience all the Halloween fun they enjoyed as children. However, they do not want their offspring to experience the pain of cavities or cracked teeth that haunt their memories. The following tips can help your child to enjoy their Halloween treats without the tricks that they can play on their oral health.

When it comes to Halloween treats, chocolate represents one of the better candy choices, while sticky treats are the worst. The reason for this is simple. The bacteria in your mouth eat sugar and create acids. These acids eat away the enamel on teeth. The longer sugars stay on the teeth, the more cavity-producing acids are formed. Chocolate is more easily cleaned from the teeth than sticky treats, so the bacteria have less time to do damage. Hard candies are bad because they stay in the mouth for longer periods of time and

can crack teeth when a child crunches down on them. Sour candies pack a double punch as they are usually coated in sugar to offset their sour taste and deliver a prominent level of destructive acid.

In past columns I have talked about the negative impact that celiac and other autoimmune diseases can have on your oral health. Children with celiac disease need to avoid gluten in order to keep the disease under control. Halloween candy poses a potential danger for a flare up. While you may be aware that you should avoid giving your child candies with cookies, pretzels or other foods that obviously contain gluten, you may not be aware of the less obvious ways that gluten-containing ingredients like wheat and barley malt are incorporated in the manufacturing process.

For instance, not only is wheat utilized in the process of creating licorice, but it is also a major component. In fact, brands like Twizzlers and Red Vines list wheat as the second main ingredient. While all natural forms of rice are gluten free, candy bars like Nestle Crunch, Hershey's Krackel and Kellog's Rice Krispy Treats are not, as they contain barley malt.

The celiac.org site warns that candy manufacturers sometimes change recipes for their special holiday candy, so a previously gluten-free candy might become dangerous. One example they gave of this is Reese's peanut butter cups. While the typical Reese's is glutenfree, Hershey's states that its seasonal shaped peanut butter cups are not. To keep your child safe, read the ingredient lists, look for a certified Gluten free logo on wrappers, and/or go to celiac.org to download their list of gluten free candies. These actions will help assure that you know which treats in their plastic pumpkin or treat bag are safe and which need to be swapped out for a less hazardous choice.

It is not only important to

make smart choices about the kind of candy that your child ingests, but when your child eats it. Every time you eat any food, bacteria in your mouth create acids. Therefore, it is best if you allow your child to eat their Halloween treats at the end of their meal when an acid attack is already occurring, and saliva production is increased. Do not let them snack on candy repeatedly throughout the day. Keep the candy out of sight until mealtime. Wait for 20minutes after they finish their meal with a Halloween treat before having them brush their teeth, so your children's

saliva can neutralize that acid. Remember, those spooky decay-causing bacteria thrive in between teeth and under the gumline. Make sure your children floss their teeth to remove plaque and food that their toothbrushes cannot reach.

With all that added sugar from the candy, it is more important than ever to avoid sugary drinks like soda and sports drinks during Halloween celebrations. Make sure that your children are drinking plenty of fluoridated tap water throughout the day. When you know that Halloween parties and other activities will delay

brushing, pack bottles of fluoridated water and sugarless gum for your children. Chewing sugarless gum for 20 minutes after eating helps to remove food particles and increases the production of saliva to help neutralize acids until they return home and can brush and floss.

Instead of bags of candy, you might choose, and/or ask grandparents to choose an alternative treat such as glow sticks, sidewalk chalk, stickers, a small toy, or a book. You can also limit trick or treating to a few houses and then have a Halloween movie and /or game night at home.
