# Lady Broncos finish thirty-win season

The Orangeville Broncos saw the end of an illustrious career as Whitney Sullivan played her last game as a Bronco last week. It wasn't just the end for Sullivan, however. After defeating Alden-Hebron in their first game of the postseason, the Broncos were stunned by a red-hot Rockford Lutheran team. With that, an excellent Orangeville squad finished their season going 30-3.
Despite the postseason run being shorter than they would have liked, the Broncos still have plenty to be proud of from the 2023-2024 season. First and foremost, Sullivan cemented her name as perhaps the best basketball player to come through Orangeville. This year, Sullivan went well over 1000 career points and helped the Broncos set three consecutive single
season win records. Sullivan was also named the NUICNorth's Most Valuable Player with a unanimous First Team All-Conference selection.

Joining Sullivan on the First Team was Junior guard Laney Cahoon and sophomore guard Nadalee Doyle. Although losing Sullivan to graduation will be hard to replace, the duo of Cahoon and Nadalee present a promising future for the Broncos yet again. Not only do they return two key players from their recent success, but their head coach Jay Doyle has proven himself in leading the program. In Jay's first couple seasons, he began rebuilding a struggling program. After going just 16-46 through three years, Jay's program began to turn. Since then, the Broncos have gone 85-13. That includes three consecutive conference championships and a regional championship.

The Broncos earned their record setting thirtieth victory on Feb. 13 when they took on the Alden-Hebron Green Giants in the Rockford Lutheran Regional. This year, Al-den-Hebron finished with 22 wins and looked to be a promising opponent for the Broncos. They had no answers for the trio of Sullivan, Cahoon, and Doyle. Sullivan carried the load in the opening quarter with 10 quick points.

In the second quarter Cahoon took over. Thirteen points, including a big three-pointer, helped the Broncos expand their lead. By halftime, the Broncos already held a 47-10 advantage. Doyle helped to expand the offense as her three-point shooting really opened the floor up. Doyle hit a trio of three-pointers on the night as she finished with 16 points. That was enough to match Sullivan's 16 points for the
team lead. Cahoon finished
right behind them with 15 points of her own.

It was a double-double performance by Doyle as she finished the game with 10 steals. The Orangeville defense was dominant allaround as they held the Green Giants to minimal production in each quarter. By the final buzzer, the Broncos picked up a 72-32 victory.

Things couldn't have looked much better for Orangeville as they entered the
regional championship. They
just routed a 22 -win team and appeared poised for a deep postseason run. Sometimes things don't go your way, and that was the sad lesson the Broncos learned against Rockford Lutheran. Perhaps Lutheran's home court advantage gave them the edge, but the Broncos aren't one for excuses. "We played hard until the end, but just wasn't our night," Jay said at the conclusion of the season.

Most teams haven't been

## 2 cans ( 21 oz . each) cherry

 pie fillingGlaze
1 C. powdered sugar
$1 / 2 \mathrm{t}$. vanilla
$1 / 2 \mathrm{t}$. almond extract
2 to $3 \mathrm{t} .2 \%$ milk
Preheat the oven to 350. In a large bowl, cream butter, sugar, and salt until light and fluffy, five to seven minutes. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in vanilla and almond extracts. Gradually add flour. Spread 3 C. dough into a greased $15 \times 10 \times 1$ baking pan. Spread with pie filling. Drop remaining dough by teaspoonfuls over filling. Bake 35 to 40 minutes or until golden brown. Cool completely in pan on a wire rack. In a small bowl, mix powdered sugar, extracts, and enough milk to reach drizzling consistency. Drizzle over bars. Cut into squares.

Strawberry Streusel Bars
$11 / 2$ C. flour
1 C. quick-cooking oats
1 C. sliced almonds
$1 / 4 \mathrm{t}$. baking soda
$3 / 4$ C. unsalted butter, melted $1 / 2$ C. firmly packed brown sugar
1 t . salt
$13 / 4$ C. fresh strawberries, trimmed and chopped
$11 / 2$ C. strawberry jam
Preheat oven to 350 . Line an 8 -inch square pan with parchment paper sprayed with baking spray with flour. In a medium bowl, stir together flour, oats, almonds, and baking soda. Add melted butter, brown sugar, and salt, stirring until mixture is crumbly. Press $2 / 3$ of mixture into bottom of prepared pan. Sprinkle with strawberries and cover with jam. Sprinkle remaining crumble mixture on top. Bake until golden brown and bubbly, 55 minutes to 1 hour. Let cool on a wire rack for 20 minutes. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour before slicing into bars.
